Charlestown needs the total cooperation of every community and city-wide agency if we are to solve this onslaught of terror.

Drugs and weapons are the constant topic of conversation on our street corners - and both are readily available to our youth. Angel Dust (PCP) a drug originally introduced as an anesthetic

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

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


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Knights Knotes



Boys' Club Team combined their talents and efforts to develop a more skilled unit. The teams compete in twelve meets in each league, keeping the swimmers busy with one and sometimes two meets a week. This after school program starts in late September and runs to the beginning of April.

This alliance gave all the athletes use of a better facility at the new Quinn Athletic Facility on Medford Street where they practice four nights a week during the school year. The warmer months finds the dedicated swimmers expanding and refining their abilities at the outdoor pool on Bunker Hill Street.

learning the importance of each.

In addition to the coaches, the Charlestown Swim Team receives assistance and instruction from many volunteers who help at meets and at practices. Michelle Barrett, Michael Shea, Chris Hennessey, and Ann Connolly all have given much support to the team. Another volunteer, Mike Donahue, is helping to develop a diving team. At the present the Charlestown Swim Team does not compete in this event, but Reardon is hopeful of new talents in this area.

Both Houlihan and Reardon look forward to an increasingly superior team in years to come. Already the younger members of the team show promising capabilities. As these youngsters grow and practice, they'll become the winning force that contribute to the success of the Charlestown Swim Team.

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

in hospitals but subsequently discontinued because of adverse reactions, now reigns supreme in the drug culture of our town for those looking for highs. PCP-Angel Dust, which causes the alteration of the chemistry of the brain - which originally was developed to help people, has become a horrible monster that is destroying many of the youth of our community and its use is the foremost cause of the acceleration of violent crimes in our district.

Law enforcement agencies serving our community can no longer sit back on their haunches and react to the violence.

Our local police, in concert with Federal and State law enforcement agencies must immediately develop an effective plan to combat the seige of drugs and weapons. Charlestown Mormon Stars In Original Play

"Saints in Boston - 1844", an original musical play, will be presented on May 16 and 17 at Alumnae Hall, Wellesley College. The play is being created and produced in celebration of the Sesquicentennial (150th) anniversary of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (or 'Mormon' church), which was organized with 6 members on April 6, 1830 and has currently expanded to 4.5 million members worldwide.

Russell Corl of Charlestown portrays James Bailey, a lighthearted violinist. "Learning to play the violin, even when not making the actual sound, is just one of the challenges given to me by this production," he commented. "I have worked with play groups over the years, but the depth asked of this character is helping me develop as an actor with more understanding and focus." Mr. Corl, an optician by profession, has gained theatrical experience with the Charlestown Working Theatre over the past five years and is enjoying lending his skills to this production.

'Saints in Boston' is a delightful combination of fancy footwork, pleasing music, clever lines and a bit of romance in a historical setting. The story is actually based on two separate events, joined for the sake of brevity into one evening's entertainment. The first was the 1832 visit of two dedicated but very

weary missionaries. Samuel H. Smith and Orson Hyde, to Boston. During the course of their brief time in the city they stayed at the Cobb boarding house. There they taught the gospel to a number of people, including, not insignificantly, a "milkmaid from Scarborough, Maine" named Agnes Coolbrith and a bright and cultured young lady named Mary Bailey. Though Mr. Cobb was decidedly even violently opposed to the two young preachers, not only his

wife but also her two women friends were persuaded by their teachings, and ultimately joined the Church. Agnes Coolbrith subsequently met and married Don Carlos Smith, the Prophet's younger brother, while Mary Bailey married her missionary Samuel Smith, to whom she bore four children.

The second historical event on which the plot is based is the 1844 Presidential candidacy of the Prophet Joseph Smith and his martyrdom shortly thereafter.

The script and lyrics were written by Kathryn Kimball, of Belmont, who is also directing the play. The music was com posed by John Roeder, formerly of Cambridge, who is now studying at New Haven, Connecticut

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
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C.H.S. Students Learn Emergency Driving Techniques

The Charlestown youth guided the Ford Fairmont down the paved roadway at a speed of about 40 miles per hour, being careful to stay within the marked

Suddenly, he hit a wet, slick patch in the road. He hit the car's brakes, locking the wheels and throwing the car into a complete 360-degree spin. With water spraying and tires screeching, the car ground to a halt, undamaged, with the driver un-

The above scene did not take place on Bunker Hill Street, or anywhere in Charlestown, for that matter. This maneuver was recently performed, deliberately, on the driver training area, or "skid pan," at Liberty Mutual Insurance Company's Research Center in Hopkinton, Mass.

Such practice skidding is part of a unique, advanced course of instruction in automotive safety taught by Liberty Mutual, which is called Emergency Reaction Driver Training (ERD). A group of 19 students from Charlestown High School got a first-hand taste of the ERD program in a recent visit to the Research Center, as part of the ongoing CHS-Liberty

Mutual Partnership Program.

Liberty Mutual's ERD program combines classroom instruction with actual behind-thewheel practice of selected exercises, to teach drivers how to handle emergency situations on both wet and dry surfaces. Having been given the class-room instruction at CHS prior to their visit, the students were ready for the wet skidding exercises when they arrived in Hopkinton.

Accompanied by instructors Gil Drake and James Dolliver, the students were each shown on the flooded skid pan how locking the brakes on the front, rear or all four wheels can produce a different kind of skid; this was done with the student driving, and the instructor locking the brakes with a dual set of pedals located on the skid car's passenger side. In succeeding runs onto the skid pan, the students used what they had learned in the classroom. together with the guidance of the instructors, to bring the car under control in each kind cf skid.

"When they get into a skid, some people don't know what to do and they panic," said CHS student Miguel Rivera after he had completed his driving on the skid pan. "If I get into this situation now. I will know what to do. It's good experience," he continued. adding that he thought high schools "should have this course as a regular class, to teach people how to really drive.

Mike Walsh, who once "spun completely around" when he tried to avoid hitting a dog on a wet roadway, said he felt he had "learned a lot," and could avoid such skids in the future. Gerard Sullivan also described a wet skid he had experienced, and said that the braking techniques he had learned on the skid pan would give him "more control of the car" in a similar situation.

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CDBG Human Services Cuts -To Hit Charlestown

Citing the elimination of funds for all human services in the administration's proposed Year VI Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application, Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn, chairman of Council's Committee on Government Finance which will review the budget, stated, "The CDBG budget is the most important source of discretionary funds which the city has to assist neighborhood-based social services such as elderly home care, youth programs and community health centers. I am deeply disturbed that the administration has eliminated CDBG funding for these vitally needed programs. For many agencies, the funding provided from the CDBG budget makes the difference in being able to continue operation, and without the services provided by these organizations, many neighborhood residents will be severely impacted.'

Among the programs in Charlestown which received CDBG funding last year were: The Kent Community School's Exceptional Children's Center, the Charlestown Boys' Club, the Charlestown Teen Center, the Kennedy Center, the Bunker Hill Housing Development, the Charlestown Historical Society and the Sullivan Square Economic Development Study.

Flynn noted that \$26.1 million was available to the city in CDBG funds for fiscal year 1981, an increase of \$1.2 million over last year, (The CDBG program was established by Congress to "provide housing and a suitable living environment and expand

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economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income.")

"Obviously every year there are more proposals submitted than there are funds available and many worthwhile programs go unfunded," Flynn stated. "While we can't provide more money, we can work to ensure that administrative overhead is kept to a bare minimum so that every available dollar goes o providing direct services to the people who need them most."

Flynn said he intended to work to try to restore CDBG funding for human services and public housing programs which have been cut from the administration's proposal. "I think it's important to provide a balance between social services and economic and neighborhood business development programs and I believe that was the intent of Congress in passing the original CDBG legislation. The difficulty the City Council faces

in trying to restore the cuts is that under law we are required to give final authorization of the submission of the proposal to the department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), but we do not have the authority to initiate spending. It will be a difficult fight, but I hope we can persuade the administration to reconsider some of its priorities and include human services funding, even if it means decreasing the administrative overhead."




