in hospitals but subsequently discontinued because of adverse reactions, now reigns supreme in the drug culture of our town for those looking for highs. PCP-Angel Dust, which causes the alteration of the chemistry of the brain - which originally was developed to help people, has become a horrible monster that is destroying many of the youth of our community and its use is the oremost cause of the acceleration of violent crimes in our district. Law enforcement agencies serving our community can no onger sit back on their haunches and react to the violence

Our local police, in concert with Federal and State law enforcement agencies must immediately develop an effective plan to combat the seige of drugs and weapons. They must take positive action to wrest our streets from the hoodlums on "dust" and pick up the countless guns in the possession of our youth and young adults.
However, law enforcement
agencies cannot do it alone. They
need the cooperation of all the need the cooperation of all the residents of our town, and that
of both community and city-wide of both community and city-wide social services agencies if we are ever to bring safety back to our streets for all our people regardless of color and provide help for those youth caught up in the drug/weapon scene.
Charlestown can no longer hide her head in the sand like the her head in the sand like the existence of the onslaught of existence of the onslaught of drugs and violence on our youth. ligious leaders must band together ligious leaders must band together, stop beating their breasts and press for remedial action.

Charlestown should demand the full cooperation of the City Administration in solving the rampant drug related crimes in our community. Let the Mayor of Boston come to our assistance with help rather than with political rhetoric and grand standing outside of Police Station

## C.H.S. Students Learn Emergency Driving Techniques

Such practice skidding is part of a unique, advanced course of instruction in automotive safety taught by Liberty Mutual, which is called Emergency Reaction Driver Training (ERD). A group of 19 students from Charlestown High School got a first-hand taste of the ERD program in a recent visit to the Research Center, as part of the ongoing CHS-Liberty

Mutual Partnership Program. Liberty Mutual's ERD program combines classroom instruction with actual behind-thewheel practice of selected exercises, to teach drivers how to handle emergency situations on both wet and dry surfaces. Having been given the class-room instruction at CHS prior to their visit, the students were ready for the wet skidding exercises when they arrived in Hopkinton
Accompanied by instructors Gil Drake and James Dolliver, he students were each shown on the flooded skid pan how locking the brakes on the front, rear or all four wheels can produce a dif ferent kind of skid: this was done with the student driving. and the instructor locking the brakes with a dual set of pedals located on the skid car's passenger side. In succeeding runs onto the skid pan, the students used what they had learned in the classroom together with the guidance of the nstructors, to bring the car under control in each kind cf skid
"When they get into a skid, some people don t know what to do and they panic," said CHS student Miguel Rivera after he had
ompleted his driving on the skid pan. "If I get into this situation pan. "If I get into this situation now. I will know what to do. It's good experience," he continued adding that he thought high schools "should have this course as a regular class. to teach peo ple how to really drive.
Mike Walsh, who once "spun completely around" when he tried to avoid hitting a dog on a wet roadway. said he felt he had learned a lot." and could avoid such skids in the future. Gerard Sullivan also described a wet skid he had experienced and said that the braking techniques he ta the braking techniques he ha learned on the skid pan would give him "more control of th ar" in a similar situation

CDBG Human Services Cuts
To Hit Charlestown

Citing the elimination of funds for all human services in the administration's proposed Year VI Community Development Block Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn, chairman of Council's Committee on Governmen Finance which will review the budget, stated, "The CDBG budget is the most important source of discretionary funds which the city has to assist neighborhood-based social services such as elderly home care, youth programs and community health centers. I am deeply disturbed that the administration has eliminated CDBG funding for these vitally needed programs. these vitally needed programs For many agencies, the funding provided from the CDBG budget makes the difference in being able to continue operation, and without the services provided by these organizations, many neighborhood residents will be severely impacted.
Among the programs in Charlestown which received CDBG funding last year were The Kent Community School's Exceptional Children's Center the Charlestown Boys' Club, the the Charlestown Boys Club, the Kennedy Center the Bunker Hill Kennedy Center, the Bunker thll
Housing Development, the Charlestown Historical Society Charlestown Historical Society
and the Sullivan Square Economic Development Study. Economic Development Study.
Flynn noted that $\$ 26.1$ million was available to the city in CDBG funds for fiscal year 1981 an increase of $\$ 1.2$ million over last year, (The CDBG program was established by Congress to "provide housing and a suitable living environment and expand

economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income.
"Obviously every year there are more proposals submitted than there are funds available and many worthwhile programs go unfunded," Flynn stated. 'While we can't provide more money, we can work to ensure that administrative overhead is kept to a bare minimum so that every available dollar goes o providing direct services to the people who need them most
Flynn said he intended to work to try to restore CDBG funding for human services and public housing programs which have been cut from the administration's proposal. "I think it's im portant to provide a balance between social services and economic and neighborhood business development programs and I believe that was the intent of Congress in passing the original CDBG legislation. The difficulty the City Council faces
in trying to restore the cuts is that under law we are required to give final authorization of the submission of the proposal to the department of Housing an Urban Development (HUD), but we do not have the authority to initiate spending. It will be a dif ficult fight, but I hope we can persuade the administration to reconsider some of its priorities and include human services funding, even if it means decreasing the administrative overhead."

Flynn announced that the City Council hearing for CDBG funding for Charlestown and South Boston would be held Wednesday evening, May 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers before the Committee on Government Finance. The other members of the Government Finance Committee besides Flynn are Councillors Rosemarie E. Sansone and John W. Sears
