### Mayor Flynn Holds Charlestown "Neighborhood Hearing"

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn made his first public appearance in the Charlestown community last Thursday evening. February 2nd, in what was billed a "Neighborhood Hearing" — the second in a series of 18 such hearings he has planned in the various sections of the city.

Mayor Flynn was greeted by a standing ovation as he prepared to speak to the almost 300 persons who had gathered at the Charlestown High School Auditorium.

Introduced by Joseph Barnes, who was the Charlestown Co-ordinator for the Mayor's election campaign, Mayor Flynn utilized the first portion of this "hearing" to give an of the overview reorganization of some of the departments within City Hall. Mayor Flynn said in his opening remarks that under this administration, city government "is

going to return to basics — fill potholes, educate children, provide services to the people." The Mayor went on to say that he will attempt to make government efficient and accountable with Boston residents determining priorities.

Flynn referred to a chart outlining the several departments instituted during the past month. The first is the Office of Constituent Services, headed by Carmen Pola. Flynn

### Flynn Names Charlestown Man Budget Director

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn announced the ap-1 pointments of four key members of the city's financial team.

In a City Hall press conference. Flynn named George A. Russell, Jr. as Collector-Treasurer; Leon P. Stamps as Auditor; William B. Coughlin as Commissioner of Assessing; and Stuart Vidockler of Charlestown as Budget Director.

Flynn said of the four, "Their integrity, professional track records and academic qualifications put them in a position to make a major contribution to planning Boston's finan-

cial future."

The mayor said the four were selected after "one of the most exhaustive and comprehensive searches we have conducted."

Budget Director Stuart Vidockler, 38, has been employed as budget manager for Houghton-Mifflin Company, Boston, since 1978. Mr. Vidockler was responsible for computerization of the budgeting process and the development of computer models for financial applications. He also administered searches for financial computer software packages. From 1969 to 1977, Mr. Vidockler


was vice president and treasurer of Intermedia Systems Corporation of Cambridge, where he supervised all internal and external financial reporting.

Mr. Vidockler received a bachelor's degree in economics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Class of 1966, where he was president of his class. He received a master's degree in finance and administration from Harvard Business School in 1968.

gram is scheduled to begin in early spring of '84. Councillor Travaglini stated, "I have received assurances from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works, Joseph Casazza, that the project is on schedule and the bidding process is currently being reviewed. No developer or construction firm has been awarded the contract as of yet." The total surface area involved is Main Street from City Square to Sullivan Square as well as Warren Street from City Square to Thompson Square.

Neil Sullivan is director of the third division, which is the Office of Neighborhood Services. The Mayor stated that the object of this department will be to address specific neighborhood concerns and to implement recommendations of the various task forces that were formed during the transition period.

The final office discussed by the Mayor, was the Office of Business and Cultural Development. Flynn noted that the focus of this office will be to assure the neighborhoods a share of the growth in the downtown sector. The office will encourage public and private cooperation for business and cultural opportunity.

The Mayor concluded his presentation stating that the "purpose of this meeting is not just to hear what you have to say, but to make sure that we work with you to see that policy gets implemented.

The Mayor then opened the floor to questions, with Lucy Ferullo acting as moderator. She called on people to speak from a list of those who had signed up prior to the hearing.

Among the areas of concerns were:

-Housing: Mary Crowley expressed concern over a substantial increase in her rent at Charles-NewTown, and noted the lack of affordable rental housing in the community. These sentiments were carried a step further later in the evening when Jimmy Walsh questioned whether, in three or four years, he would as a young married man, be able to afford a house in Charlestown. His concern was not in making mortgage payments, but in saving enough for the large down payment required by the banks.

The Mayor stated that new housing was not under rent control. He pointed out the planned construction of 112 units of Section Eight housing in the Navy

matter of housing for the elderly, but not totally solving the problem. The Mayor acknowledged the need for affordable housing in the city and went on to say that his administration is trying to implement a plan that will allow low income persons to take over abandoned housing at low cost and bring it up to code, paying a low interest rate. Also, Flynn said that there should be a predictable formula per square foot for developers of property in downtown Boston to be turned into a reinvestment fund that would be shared by neighborhoods of the

Abandoned Housing: The Mayor promised Mary DelDotto an answer as to what plans the Boston Redevelopment Authority has for the abandoned housing on High Street, near the Edwards School.

-Development: Robert Wallace suggested the formation of a Land Use Advisory Committee, made up of neighborhood people. Steve Spinetto expressed concern over public access in the area of development, in order to be assured that what would be done here in Charlestown, would be what the community

-Assessments: Many heads nodded in agreement as Don Jackson stated that with the current increases in assessments, many are not going to be able to afford their homes. Jackson pointed out the inequity with the evaluations which are further exacerbated by the inadequacy in the method of finding answers as to why there are such inequities. Mayor Flynn said that a poor job was done in assessing the property and the cost of between \$10 and \$11 million, was the highest per parcel cost of any community in the U.S. Flynn said that in order to make substantial changes, he would almost have to go back and do it again.


-Main Street: Reconstruction and improvements of this main! thoroughfare was on many people's list. Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini announced that \$3.8 million had been allocated in federal monies under the Urban Systems

Program to improve Main Street and the bids would be going out for construction to begin in the spring of 1984. Linda Cataldo and Joseph Flaherty both addressed the subject of trash receptacles on that street. Main Street was once again the focus in a plea to the Mayor by Robert Wallace that Sunday bus service be resumed by the MBTA, especially to accomodate the elderly that reside along that street.

-Parking: This was a

concern on several fronts. Robert Wallace brought it up in reference to cars clogging streets, diminishing access by emergency equipment. Victoria Olken was critical of the inadequate provisions for parking (0 to 8 spaces) in the proposed development of 120 units of elderly housing at the site of the former St. Mary's Grammar School and Cataldo Garage on Warren, Winthrop and Park Streets. She voiced the concern of the residents on the impact this development could have in the area. Mrs. Olken did not get an answer to her question as to why No Parking-Street Cleaning signs were taken down last spring making it impossible for streets to be cleaned, because of the parked cars.

A sea of heads nodded in agreement, when Ken Stone stated that Charlestown has become a 'parking lot for suburbia" and recommended that a resident sticker be considered. The Mayor requested a show of hands, and the majority of the

audience felt that commuter parking was indeed an issue of concern.

-Police protection: Robert Wallace said three categories that the police should "look into" were 1. the breaking into cars, 2. home burglaries, and 3. drugs. Ken Stone asked why the sign for the Police sub station in Thompson Square had been removed. Deputy Superintendent Joseph Saia said that negotiations between attorneys from the city and Store 24 (they own building) reached an impass and the sub station never got off the ground. Saia reported that crime statistics in Charlestown are the lowest in the city and that there has been a decrease in house breaks with recent arrests and car breaks in the Monument Square area have also decreased. Saia said the

anti-crime unit would be sent in if these should increase.

-Branch Libraries: Kathryn Downing told the Mayor that she would like to see a neighborhood person on the Boston Public Library Task Force and that she would hope that in considering a candidate for the Director of the BPL, that the person be a professional who understands the Branch Libraries. Mayor Flynn reiterated his support of the Branch Libraries and offered that this fact would be taken into considera-

-Boston Edison Coal Conversion: Kathryn Downing commended Flynn in his assistance in making the public aware of the potential dangers regarding increased sulfur in the coal emissions from this proposed conversion.

The Mayor noted that the South Boston Edison Plant will have scrubbers to decrease emissions and he stated that he will work to see that Charlestown plant also installs scrubbers. Mayor Flynn referred to Representative Richard Voke who has been working to have monitors installed at two sites selected by residents, in order to record and compile data on pollutants over a long period of time. Voke pointed out the importance of this testing, as Charlestown statistically has a substantially higher rate of lung illnesses than any other area of the city.



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### Proposals To Be Presented On Redevelopment Of Former Bunker Hill School

Four developing teams have submitted proposals for the former Bunker Hill School to the Public Facilities Department (PFD). Many of the developers include Charlestown residents. Most proposals are similar in their design, offering either condominiums or apartment rentals. Only one proposal stands out amongst the others because of its financial packaging and what it will offer the tenant.

This proposal was made by New England Housing Corporation; a non-profit housing development corporation, who is involved in researching and creating housing alternatives for low and moderate income families, financing the project through private investors who benefit from the tax shelter.

The project's occupants would partially own and operate the development through their ownership of a cooperative corporation. The cooperative would have a minority ownership in the partnership. This ownership would entitle the cooperative to control the operations and management of the development. The cooperative would carry

out its partnership duties through democratically electing a board of directors and hiring a professional management firm to manage the daily operations of the property. In ad-

dition, partial ownership of the partnership permits cooperators to accrue equity, similar to the way equity is build in a conventional home or condominium. The proposal is very similar to how CharlesNewTown was supposed to have operated. However, CharlesNew-Town involved federal HUD monies.

The eventual purchase of the building is built into the rents paid by the occupants. The scale below indicates the charges. Remember, these rents includes operating and management costs, property taxes, and utilities.

1 bedroom - \$350-\$650 2 bedrooms - \$450-\$750 3 bedrooms - \$550-\$800

All those wishing to live in the school would be screened to determine compatible living habits and adequacy of income.

To carry out the project, New England Housing has chosen Architects Four of Manchester. New Hampshire as the architectural firm to design the one floor plan which will be duplicated on three floors; Project Management, Inc. of Cambridge as the contractors; and Independent Managers of Boston as the property manager for the first three years.

The other three developers are Bunker Hill Preservation Inc.; Dudley Godfrey, Jr. and Ernest Lonano; and the Crowninshield Corporation.

Charlestown resident, Attorney William Galvin, Jr. is representing Bunker Hill Preservation, Inc. who proposes to build 30 residential apartment rentals. There will be 20 two-bedroom (800 square feet) and 10 one-bedroom apartments (600 square feet). Rental fees will range between \$500-\$700.

Ronald S. Luccio has been chosen as the developer; Ahern/Schopfer Association as the architect and Segal/DiSarcina Association of Boston as Traffic Engineer.

Financing would be provided by the Peoples Federal Savings & Loan Association of Brighton. They anticipate a three to five month construction time.

Atty. Allen Jarasitis, also a Charlestown resident, is representing Dudley Godfrey, Jr. and Ernest Lonano.

Under their plan, 10 twobedroom residential condominiums would be developed and would be marketed for approximately \$80 thousand each.

Charlestown Realty would market and manage the condos and Gallagher Design Group of Charlestown would be hired as architects. A subsidiary company GMS Design/Building Corp. of Charlestown, would be general contractors.

Godfrey & Lonano are responsible for the redesign of St. Mary's Convent in Monument Square.

Neworld Bank has expressed interest in financing the project.

The Crowninshield Corporation has chosen City Design Collaborative as their architect and propose 17. 2-bedroom units of condominium housing.

Thirty percent of these condos would be skewed to be affordable under MHFA (Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency) according to literature in their proposal.

MHFA was established in 1966 and designed to be a self-supporting, agency that would perform the same tasks traditionally expected of a bank. But, by raising funds through the sale of tax-exempt notes

and bonds, the agency is able to offer loans to eligible home owners and developers at reduced interest rates, while channeling thousands of private-sector dollars for housing and housing-related jobs into Massachusetts communities.

Crowninshield's condos would sell for approximately \$102,000.

City Design was responsible for the development of the self-guided Navy Yard tour for the National Historic Park Department. This includes design of the concrete pedestals capped with bronze plates engraved with historic information.

Jane Noonan, Real Estate Project Manager at Public Facilities, said a public meeting will be held by the department on Wednesday, February 15 at St. Francis de Sales' Bishop Lawton Hall, 313 Bunker Hill Street, at 7:00 p.m. to show the plans to interested residents.

Presently PFD and the BRA are reviewing the plans and will then suggest a tentative designator for the site. The designation will be voted upon by a three-man commission. Two of the commission members are newly appointed by Mayor Raymond Flynn. They are Ray Dooley and Luis Alisia.

Noonan said tentative designation would be based on





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

# Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

"Why don't you write an article about valium?"

Valium is a tranquilizer which can be misused and very commonly is. Tranquilizers can be divided into two groups: antipsychotics and anti-anxiety drugs. Valium, Librium, Serax, and Miltown (or Equanil) are in the second group, and are widely prescribed by doctors. They are used as daytime sedatives to reduce anxiety and tension. Valium, the most common of these has a relaxing and calming effect on the central skeletal muscle control. Research has revealed that tranquilizers have undesireable side effects, can be habit forming and have a potential for abuse. Yet they are promoted by manufacturers as a way of coping with stress. Physical addiction can easily occur when these pills are taken repeatedly over time, especially in high doses.

Valium does not cause sleep but is often used to relax a person so he/she can fall asleep. Higher doses can cause uncoordination and drowsiness. Chronic intoxication with these tranquilizers produces symptoms similar to alcohol intoxication: sluggishness impaired thinking, emotional instability, slurred speech, staggering gait, loss of sex drive. Tolerance (the need to take more to get the same effect) is another dangerous aspect of this drug.

The effect of mixing valium with alcohol is the most common cause of death from overdose. There is no way to control the combination, or to figure out the safe amount of alcohol to drink with the drug. The presence of both these drugs in the bloodstream is dangerous. If valium is prescribed, it is extremely important to take it according to the prescription. Recent statistics have shown that the prescribing of tranquilizers is on a downward trend and some authorities believe this trend will continue.

In any case: beware of taking valium and alcohol together.

be acquired for use as a town hall; request by Joseph Flaherty that the Mayor designate lower Main Street and Sullivan Square a CARD district and expand the NDEA loan program to the rest of Charlestown, so businesses will be eligible for low interest loans; Helen Sweeney asked if there is a daycare program for children under three, so young mothers might be able to find jobs; a sugges-

tion from Dorothy, Moscovitz was that residents might buy saplings to plant, followed by her question as to whether the park department would care for them (this question was met with a "whoop" from a park department employee, Morris Curran, as he queried her as to whether she expected the park department come out to water the trees).

The audience had been attentive during the hour

and a half meeting, with Mayor Flynn exchanging anecdotes with the gathering; offering polite applause as each speaker concluded her his/her presentation or question; and there was a laugh now and then, especially when a reference was made to "the other Mayor ... Mayor who?"

WHAT ARE SPACE MAINTAINERS?

When a deciduous (baby) tooth is lost too early, the adjacent teeth tend to drift into the space. As a result, the permanent tooth may erupt out of alignment or not

Space maintainers hold the space until the permanent tooth is ready to erupt. They may be attached to one or more of the remaining teeth or be a removable type. In any case they are small and contoured to fit the exact shape of the mouth with no change in the bite. In cases where the space has already been lost, a modified device can usually be made to realign the teeth that have shifted and recreate the space

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### **Charlestown Police Line**

From the desk of Deputy Superintendent Joseph V. Saia, Jr. Commanding Officer, Area A Downtown, East Boston, Charlestown, Beacon Hill

On January 28, 1984, officers responded to Water Street, on a report of an assault and battery. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to the victim, who stated that as he was driving on Water Street, he was cut off in traffic, and the occupants of both vehicles became involved in an altercation. Both parties claim to have been assaulted by one another. The officers advised all individuals involved to seek complaints against each other in the Charlestown District Court.

On January 28, 1984, officers responded to Dunstable Street on a report of family trouble. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to the victim, who stated that the suspect had slapped her and that he also broken the front window. The officers found the suspect to be drunk, and possibly a threat to himself and others. At this point, the officers placed the suspect under protective custody. The victim was advised to seek complaints in the Charlestown District Court.

On January 29, 1984, officers responded to Baldwin Street to take a report of a breaking and entering. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to the victim, who stated that persons unknown had entered the front door by breaking the door and frame. Once inside the front door, the suspects then broke the door and frame of the first floor apartment. The victim was not sure if anything had been taken from the apartment during the break. He was advised to submit a complete list of missing property to District A, upon review of all property in the apartment.

On January 31, 1984, while on routine patrol, an officer found an elderly woman lying face down in the middle of Bunker Hill Street. The woman was bleeding heavily from her head. The officer immediately radioed for an ambulance. When the ambulance arrived, the woman was taken to Mass. General Hospital. The woman died an hour later. There was no foul play suspected in this death, however the Homicide Unit was notified, and will conduct a preliminary investigation.
