Menino Announces Capital Plan For 1997-2001

Mayor Thomas M. Menino has unveiled his third five-year capital plan for 1997-2001, entitled "Getting The Job Done." The \$1 billion plan, \$1.54 million for Charlestown, marks Menino's largest yet, adding 113 new projects for a total of 463 projects in the plan. Education is the major focus of the plan; public safety, neighborhood revitalization and economic development are other priorities.

Under the mayor's education plan, the Warren-Prescott School will benefit from the School Yards Initiative with a \$5,000 planning grant for the planned playground improvements or, as it has been termed, an "outdoor classroom." Also, the replacement of the roof at the school is in the plan for \$540,000.

There are two new roadway projects included. Painting and repairing the fender system of the Alford Street Bridge for \$362,300. Renovations to Cambridge Street over the MBTA tracks is authorized for \$253,000.

The installation of an automatic chlorine treatment system, at a cost of \$53,300, is planned for the Clougherty Pool in the Doherty Playground. The basketball court at the playground will also be renovated.

In the playground at Union Street and Old Rutherford Avenue, \$100,000 has been allocated to expand the existing facility to include street hockey, tennis courts, a play area, a passive area, new lighting and landscaping.

Renovations to the Training Field, Winthrop Square, carries a \$336,550 price tag. Included is the repair of the ornamental iron fence and granite bases, the cleaning and repair of the monument, the providing of a water supply, drinking fountains, benches, bollards, flagpoles, landscaping and the reconstruction of stair-

Other capital improvement projects previously funded include: the upgrade of the entrance, bathrooms and the addition of an elevator to the Charlestown Branch Library at the cost of \$748,700, which is currently in the design stage; the removal of the playlot at the Harvard Mall, replacing it with passive open space, removing obsolete and dangerous equipment, installing new curbing and repairing pavement with a \$230,000 allotment, which is in the design stage; and the replacing of play equipment with a new ADA-compliant playlot for \$172,500 at the Ryan Playground is also in the design stage.

CYHA Asks For Fall Re-Opening Of Skating Rink

When asked what the Charlestown Youth Hockey Association (CYHA) wants for the closed Emmons-Horrigan-O'Neil Rink by Metropolitan District Commissioner David Balfour, the response is: Fix the roof and open in September.

CYHA board members met Balfour and representatives of Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Thomas Birmingham as recently as last week. CYHA's John Tobin says the discussions show signs of some movement toward reopening the rink.

Closed in January, the rink's roof, last repaired in August 1994, showed new signs of collapse. Those renovations cost some \$500,000. According to Tobin, evidence of the roof's rotting wooden beams were found on the ice. MDC consultants later identified up to 17 and 18 inches of rot on almost all the 24-inch beams in the rink's roof.

Most recently, the MDC has told CYHA representatives that it has

\$500,000 to spend on Charlestown repairs. A portion of an allotted \$2 million in emergency funds through the state Division of Capital Planning and Operations would be for here, Hyde Park and Brighton. A Dec. 15 opening has been quoted.

CYHA teams have been provided with ice time at the North End's Steriti rink, an immediate response to this season's situation, but not a resolution. Tobin says that Balfour and the MDC have been nothing but helpful, and he is impressed with the agency's level of commitment.

However, Tobin says, "The wheels grind very slowly. We won't have a program if it's Dec. 15." The board would at the very least seek an Oct. 1 opening, he said.

CYHA boasts a respectable league record, winning the state championship, adding 28 female players to the zero of two years ago and providing a solid coaching staff.

"We can't afford to be without a rink," Tobin says.

While the basic roof work is essential, CYHA has also put together its own wish list for rink improvements that would do little more than update the facility. Local architect Dieter Gartner estimates the expense at \$2.2 million.

The list of hoped-for modernizations includes making the rink's side entrance active; increasing parking from approximately 30 spaces to 62; a median in the parking lot to keep children and cars separated; opening street access to Austin Street; landscaping and facade work; and adding showers and updating locker rooms, with one for girls.

These kinds of improvements, however, require state legislation and budget changes. Tobin says CYHA would still like to pursue modernizing the rink in the next couple of years. Rumors of a brandnew rink for Charlestown







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Mayor Awards Over \$800,00 In City Grants To Non-Profit Organizations

Mayor Thomas M. Menino has awarded grant money in the amount of \$862,062 from the city's "Partners with Non-Profits" program to 31 neighborhood non-profit agencies to assist them in making necessary repairs to their facilities.

"I am happy that the city of Boston is able to assist non-profit organizations in the neighborhoods. These are the agencies that are successfully doing the ground-level community work. Supporting these agencies helps promote strong neighborhoods across the city," said Menino.

Grants of up to \$50,000 are made available to neighborhood and citywide organizations with limited cash reserves. Funds for emergency repairs to keep facilities operational are also available.

To be eligible for fund-

ing, the group must be a non-profit organization that operates a public facility - that is, the facility must be open to members of the general public. In awarding a grant, the Pub-

lic Facilities Department considers a number of factors, including the severity of the needed repairs and the organization's commitment to provide a portion of the cost of the repairs.

CHS Designated As A 'School-To-Career' School

Boston School Superintendent Thomas Payzant announced the designation of five high schools, including Charlestown High School, as "school to career" schools, eligible for funds made available through the federal School to Work Opportunities Act.

Each of the five high schools will be able to appoint a faculty member as school-to-career coordinator to work with family teams to integrate workplace learning experiences and classroom teaching. School-to-career includes innovations such as career pathways and smaller learning communities within the larger high school. For example, it is significant that Boston Latin chose to compete for school to career designation. All our high schools can improve academic performance by connecting teaching to real world experiences. School to career is part of our large er strategy to improve teaching methods and student success in all our schools."

MARCH MADNESS IN CHARLESTOWN

While the media is flooded with news about "March Madness" and the NCAA Tournament, another even more historical tournament began in Charlestown last Friday. The Charlestown Boys & Girls Club has been hosting the Nate Hurwitz Basketball Tournament since 1923 and outside of the Bunker Hill Day Parade and the Harborfest, it probably brings more people into the community than any other event.

Each year, over 1,000 basketball players come to compete in what is recognized as the oldest basketball tournament in the country. In my years as club director, I have encountered more people who know of our club-house through this tournament than anything else. Even my next door neighbor in Groveland (where the heck is that?) knew of the club since his father's team from Newton competed in the Hurwitz in the 1940s.

The tournament was started in 1923 by Nate Hurwitz who was then athletic director at the Charlestown Club. Nate, as we all affectionately refer to him, held this position from 1920 to 1945. He was well known throughout



Boston and the Boston Globe referred to him on one occasion as the "Father of 10,000 boys." He was a member of the Boston Whirlwinds, a professional basketball club, and also spent some time as a professional boxing manager.

From 1943 to 1955, her served as a representative from Cohasset in the state legislature. His daughter, Marie Jeanette Murray, now holds the seat from that same district and attends the tournament finals annually.

This year, the club welcomes NIKE as corporate sponsor of the Nate Hurwitz. While NIKE has regularly supported Boys & Girls Clubs of America, this is the first time they have directly supported an event in a local clubhouse. We're glad that Nate Hurwitz and the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club is receiving this kind of national recognition. are not that realistic, he says,
but a pipe dream at this
point. A new rink would
mean finding a new parcel
of land, extensive financing
and could result in Charlestown's site becoming a
regional facility.

For now the basic roof work is needed for next season, but the repairs are not likely to improve the facility's susceptibility to the same problems.

The rink was designed to be an open-air facility, but does not include a proper ventilation or dehumidification system to deal with the moisture that is generated by normal use.

This winter, seven feet of snow had accumulated on the roof, only adding to moisture collection. Additionally, the rink has seen past closings because of poor air quality.

"Replacing the roof without improving the ventilation will not treat the problem," Tobin says. "We don't want the same problem again. The water damage and air quality need to be treated."

Discussions will continue, as CYHA board members work toward workable solutions for the league.

"This is a major community asset which serves a majority of the community," Tobin says, "and we need to insist that it's done right. It will take a step-by-step approach, but we want people to know that something's being done."

Irish Musicians Gather In Boston To Support Irish Language Education In Northern Ireland

The promotion of the Irish language among school children in Northern Ireland will serve as the focal point of a special fund-raiser featuring continuous performances by Irish musicians from throughout New England at McGann's Bar and Restaurant, 197 Portland St., Boston.

The event at McGann's, one of Boston's newest Irish locations, will feature continuous Irish traditional and contemporary music from 2:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Sunday, March 31. The minimum donation is \$10.

Unlike the Irish Republic, funding for Irish language education is not provided by government departments in Northern Ireland to school's educating Irish children in Irish language, although full funding is provided by the British government for Welsh and Scottish Gaelic speaking schools in those countries. But despite this lack of government support, there has been an increase in the number of preschool, primary schools that provide education in Irish throughout the six counties.

To assist in that effort the Gael Foundation has been established in Northern Ireland by supporters of Irish language education. All proceeds from the March 31 event will go to support the activities of the Gael Foundation.

A special feature of the event will be an exhibition

of paintings of the West of Ireland by a local Irish-American artist Kevin Mulligan, who recently returned from an extended painting visit to Ireland.

The organizing committee includes Sean and Eireann Connolly; Anne and Frank Costello; Kevin Mulligan; Jack Meehan, Past State President of the Ancient Order of Hibernians; Mary Folan Irish Outreach Coordinator for the Irish Immigration Center; and Marty Foley former COPE director for the Mass. AFL-CIO, among others.

Cathal O'Donnaghaile, one of the founders of the Gael Foundation in Northern Ireland, states, "Fundraisers like this by our friends in America are essential if vital funding is to be achieved for educating Irish boys and girls in their native language in their Irish homeland." O'Donnaghaile is an Irish language teacher at Meanscoil Feirste in West Belfast. "We are gratified that this event is going forward and that so many fine musicians are donating their time to supporting the Irish language in the North and hope that all friends to the Irish language and culture will support this effort."

Frank Costello and Sean Connolly, as spokesmen for the committee, stressed that "every dollar raised will go directly to the Gael Foundation."

NIGHTTIME WORK ON SUMMER STREET

Summer Street, between Atlantic Avenue and Dorchester Avenue, is being reduced to one lane from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. The lane will run westbound only, toward downtown. Eastbound traffic to South Boston across the Fort Point Channel will be diverted to Congress Street and to the Summer Street bridge via Dorchester Avenue.

This change, which is required for work relating to the Central Artery/Tunnel project, will remain in effect until May. Regular two-way traffic will run during the day.

NIGHTTIME CLOSURE OF HIGH STREET RAMP

Starting on Friday night, March 22, exit 23 (High Street) from the southbound Central Artery will be closed Monday through Friday night from 7 p.m. to 6:30 a.m. To reach High Street and the Financial District during those times, southbound drivers should take either exit 24 (Callahan Tunnel/Logan Airport) and use the surface artery to Purchase Street, or exit 22 (South Station), turn left at Summer Street, left onto Atlantic Avenue and left again onto High Street.

This change will remain in effect on weekends during the next three to four weeks. The ramp will be open during the day as well as Saturday and Sunday nights.

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The Royal Yacht 'Britannia' To Visit Boston

The Royal Yacht Britannia will visit Boston for a week, arriving at Pier 1 in the Boston National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard at 10 a.m. on Thursday, March 28. The Britannia will be berthed alongside the newly refurbished USS Constitution.

HMY Britannia was named and launched by HM Queen Elizabeth in 1953 at Clydebank, Scotland, and commissioned in January 1954. She serves as an official and private floating residence for The Queen and other members of the Royal Family when they are engaged on visits overseas or voyaging in home waters.

Britannia's full complement is 19 officers and 217 men, all of whom are specially selected from volunteers within the Royal Navy. The yacht is 412 feet in length, has a gross tonnage on 5,862 tons, a maximum speed of 21 knots, and a range of 2400 nautical

miles.

The yacht's commodore is Anthony John Clare Morrow, who joined the Royal Navy in September 1962 and became Commodore Royal Yachts last April.

While docked in Boston, the Britannia will host a number of events including the celebration of the launch of "The World," the global radio news program; the New England chapter of the British Olympics Association reception; and the launch of the British Tourist Authority's "Style and Design" year.

During the ship's stay, the Royal Marine Band will play on the Grand Staircase in the Mass. State House at noon on Friday, March 29, and at the Old North Church at the 11 a.m. Palm Sunday service on Sunday, March 31.

His Royal Highness Prince Andrew The Duke of York is scheduled to attend several events on the yacht.

The Britannia will not be open to the public.


