## New Water Street On-Ramp Opens For Access To Tobin Bridge

Motorists heading north toward the Tobin Bridge and Route 1 will be faced with changes in access to the Bridge starting today, Thursday, April 14.

Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) Commissioner Jane F. Garvey announced the changes, which include the opening of the new Water Street on-ramp, as part of the Central Artery North Area (CANA) roadway reconstruction project.

The new Water Street on-ramp is located diagonally across Water Street from the Bunker Hill Pavilion at

the entrance to the parking lot formerly utilized by the National Park Service for visitors to the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The Water Street on-ramp will remain open from Thursday, April 14 to Tuesday, April 19. On Tuesday, the on-ramp will be open from 2 p.m. to 7 a.m., Monday through Friday, and 24-hours per day on weekends.

When the Water Street on-ramp is closed to allow construction work, the Chelsea Street on-ramp will be open (7 a.m. to 2 p.m., Monday through Friday).

This schedule of operation for the ramps is expected to be four months in duration, after which the Water Street ramp will be opened permanently.

David Flanagan, community liaison for the MDPW, stated that signs have been posted to direct motorists to Water Street and onto the ramp.

Commissioner Garvey warned that come December of this year, motorists will be impacted when the Temporary Detour Structure is scheduled to open. At that time, motorists tra-

Raymond L. Flynn joined together to co-sponsor this event. The total realized was \$56,000.

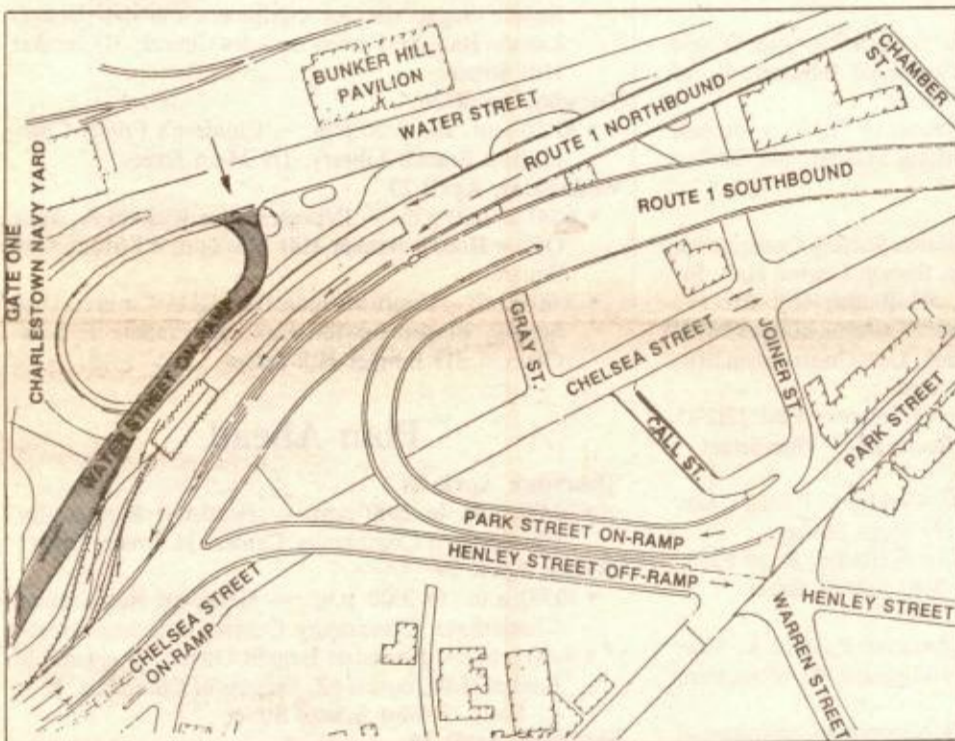
Among the contributors to this event were 12 who made donations of \$1,000 (continued on page 9)

When the Water Street on-ramp is closed, the Chelsea Street on-ramp will be open. This schedule will continue for approximately four months.

veling to the Central Artery from Route 1 south and the Tobin Bridge will be restricted to one 18-foot lane of traffic for a four year period and will eliminate access from City Square to the Central Artery.

Garvey noted that the success of the Southeast Expressway project was, in a large part, due to the willingness of commuters to try alternatives. She said that increased MBTA capacity, additional water transportation, as well as an increased number of park and ride lots, are being planned. She said that there is a "need to encourage the use of alternate modes of transportation" during construction.

Horace Del Grosso, CANA administrator for MDPW, provided an overview of the project which is slated to be completed in November of 1993. He said that the project involves eight contracts, two of which, the pre-load contract and the demolition of the YMCA, have been completed. Construction of the Temporary Detour Structure has been underway since 1987 and the maintenance of a field office off Rutherford Avenue is an ongoing contract for the duration of the project.

Currently, the early viaduct construction contract is out for bid to be followed by a \$150 million four-year tunnel construction contract. The last two contracts will involve construction of the loop viaducts connecting the tunnel system under City Square to the Central Artery, followed by the connection of the Tobin Bridge to the tunnels.

Garvey said that the project, estimated at over \$250 million, is currently on

schedule. When asked whether CANA was connected to the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel project, Garvey stated that the two projects were entirely separate but there "will have to be interfacing" although she indicated that she "didn't know what the interfacing would be." She added that it was unlikely that there would be significant changes in the CANA project at this point.

When asked about the benefits of this project, Del Grosso stated that it was primarily to improve public safety on the dangerous curve and merge points at the Route 1/I-93 intersection. He did state that City Square area would benefit with the opening of new parcels of land previously under the unsightly overhead ramps. He did note that the land in City Square was a city and community issue and the MDPW would not be involved in development of the site.

## Light Manufacturing Zone Discussed At Planning And Zoning Meeting

The Planning and Zoning Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council met on Thursday, April 7, to discuss a proposed zoning amendment that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board will address at their next meeting on April 21st.

Ellie Spring of the Economic Development and Industrial Corporation (ED-IC) outlined the proposal to create a new Light Manufacturing Zone (LMZ) in Boston. The new zone is intended to protect and

strengthen Boston's manufacturing sector and to maintain production jobs in the City. Once the new zoning category is approved, the EDIC and the BRA will work with neighborhood residents, community organizations and local businesses to outline areas where an LMZ is appropriate.

The primary goal of such a Zone would be to preserve space for the growing number of Boston manufacturers, expansion of manufacturing employment opportunities for Boston resi-

dents, the mitigation of the impacts of manufacturing development and activity on abutting residential areas and the enhancement of the physical attractiveness of manufacturing areas.

To achieve these goals, the Zone would forbid the development of noxious uses, establish performance standards and design guidelines, call for new truck routes, require adequate off street parking and limit the development of competitive uses.

The LMZ is one of two efforts to maintain a balanced and diversified economy in Boston. In another effort, the BRA has proposed an interim amendment to the zoning code to make office uses conditional in Boston's Manufacturing (M) and Industrial (I) zones. For one year after the amendment making office uses conditional in M and I zones is enacted, the BRA would review large-scale proposals to convert industrial space to office uses and comment on the effect of these proposed conversions on Boston's economy. The BRA Board has approved this

amendment and is awaiting action by the Zoning Commission.

Examples of light manufacturing uses that would be allowed under this zone are design, development, manufacture, altering, assembly, testing or packaging of manufactured products with directly related activities such as wholesale distribution or testing, repairing or servicing of equipment involved in manufacturing. Further examples would be the manufacture of electronic and communication products or of medical, dental, scientific, photographic or optical instruments, printing, engraving or related reproduction processes or artists' live/work spaces.

Supportive uses of the Zone would be trade schools, day care centers and certain service establishments that supply qualified employees for manufacturers, make job training easily accessible to local residents and provide important services for manufacturing employers and employees. Other examples of allowed supportive uses

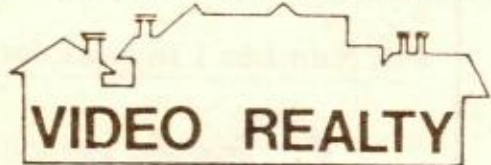

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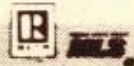

## Development Of 127 Main Street Delayed Following BRA And BOA Hearings

Plans for the development of housing and commercial units at 127 Main Street, Charlestown have been sent back to the drawing board. A series of meetings have been held concerning the development of this parcel, dating back a year and a half, with unresolved differences evolving between the developers and the abutters.

Developers Dick Held and Paul Kelly have proposed to construct a four-story building with 21 condomini-

um units, two office spaces and underground parking, on this parcel of land that was originally purchased by Charlestown Liquors, Inc. in 1977.

This parcel has been the subject of two public meetings in recent weeks. A Housing and Development Committee meeting on March 29 erupted in name calling and accusations and concluded with the committee voting in favor of the proposal. This was countered when members of the Charlestown Neighborhood

Council voted not to endorse the controversial design of the development at their April 5 meeting.

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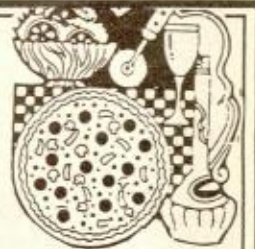

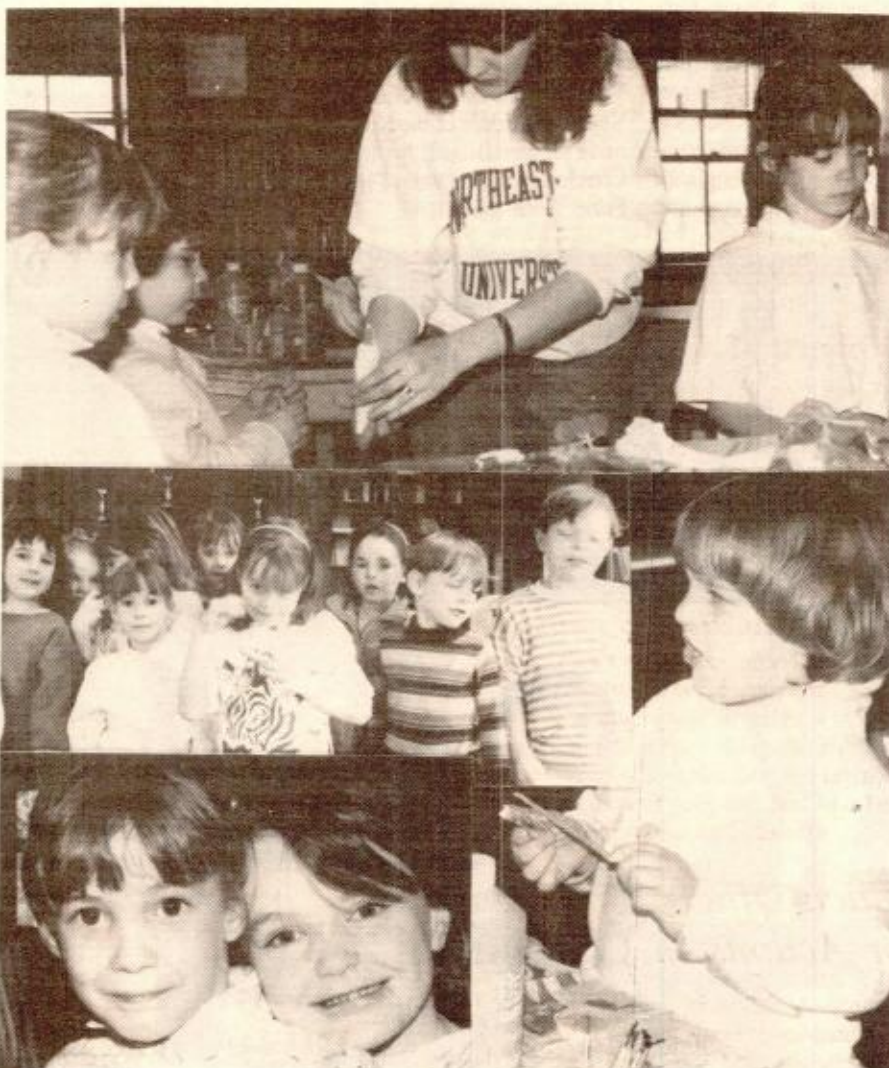

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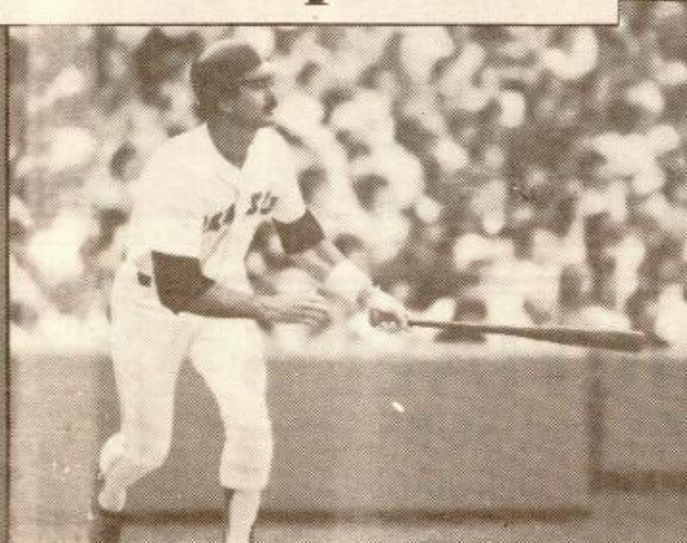

Cardoza was patrolling on Monument Street when he observed four men drinking in their car. Aware of the reputation of these individuals, Cardoza called for assistance. Cardoza approached the individuals and noticed a shotgun in the front seat. One suspect began to run as additional police arrived, but was apprehended after a short chase.

As a direct result of this incident, these individuals were arrested on firearms charges and further investigations resulted in the issuance of six search warrants. These warrants resulted in the confiscation of six firearms and the arrest of four other persons on charges of assault with intent to murder, armed robbery and firearms violations.

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## "Buckle Up" And Anti-Drunk Driving Focus Of Public Safety Meeting

Charlestown residents are being encouraged to change their driving habits for safety's sake by using seat belts and driving soberly.

The Boston Transportation Department sent Transportation Planner Edwina Cloherty to the police/community relations meeting on April 12 at the Kent Community School which was combined this month with the public safety committee of the Neighborhood Council. Cloherty talked about a small Governor's Highway Safety Bureau grant being used to increase seat belt use and decrease drunk driving in the city. The Community Traffic Safety Program is attempting to reach the community consciousness with "Buckle up" wastepaper bags and key chains, accident posters and information hand outs. A realistic accident video is also available for presentations upon request by local organizations.

"The program isn't saying, 'Just say No,'" Cloherty said. "The literature is not preachy. It just promotes common sense in a positive way."

Car accidents were the leading cause of death among 1- to 44-year-old Americans and cost nearly \$41.6 billion in medical expenses last year, according

to statistics published by the Governor's Highway Safety Bureau and the Massachusetts Passenger Safety Association. On the average, a person can be in seven accidents in his life, and seat belts are said to double the chance of surviving serious incidents.

"The number one child killer is accidents," Cloherty said, explaining that, since August 1987, a driver in Massachusetts can be stopped and fined \$25 for not strapping a seat belt on a child 12 and under. "The law needs to be enforced, but not everyone's aware of the law," she said.

The program is trying to get its message to Charlestown by encouraging residents to promote awareness through public education, presentations and volunteer involvement. On June 11, the first Saturday of Charlestown Pride Week, a traffic safety booth will be part of the effort. A car crash simulation machine will allow residents the opportunity to experience the shock of an abrupt stop behind the wheel.

"Even though you're only going 6 mph," Cloherty said, "You'll be glad you buckled up."

Neighborhood Council Chairman Dennis McLau-

ghlin is part of a steering committee involved in developing a pilot project aimed at reaching alcohol servers to decrease drinking and driving. Owners of drinking establishments would be asked to educate their servers on the affects of alcohol on customers.

McLaughlin said he hopes to see a seminar training program for servers and, possibly, a certification process to create awareness of how many drinks they serve and how fast they serve them to people.

"We'd like to see licensees and servers paying attention," McLaughlin said. "We'd like to see a full awareness of the condition that people are being sent out on the streets."

McLaughlin also suggested that the police and fire departments join forces by talking to residents about

their experiences with accidents and drunk drivers.

"People don't realize all the implications of drinking and driving," McLaughlin said. "It can be a very expensive experience and affects families, jobs and losing a license."

In Massachusetts, a drunk driving first offense can realistically cost a person \$3,000 or more when court costs, towing charges, bail, fines and a \$650 First Offender Drunk Driving Program fee are totaled. McLaughlin said it is not alcohol abusers the awareness program is trying to reach, but the average citizen who does not realize the consequences of driving home from a night out.

"We just want to protect the public from drunk drivers," McLaughlin added. "And make the public aware that they're the ones driving."

School Street, the proposed developments at 23-24 Common Street and at 286-290 Medford Street will be on the agenda.

Navid Realty Trust has proposed to construct four two-bedroom condominiums with four parking spaces on the 2,446 square foot parcel at 23-24 Common Street. The plans were originally presented at a community meeting on February 16th. The developer subsequently requested and obtained a deferral from the

City of Boston Board of Appeal in order to review suggestions from residents that included the turn radius from the parking spaces, the mass of the structure and the planned front doorway.

The second development proposal that will be considered by the committee is a plan by John Stevens to construct a 12-unit apartment building with garage parking for 31 vehicles at 286A-290 Medford Street.

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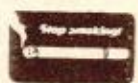
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## Light Manufacturing Zone Discussed At Planning And Zoning Meeting

in the LMZ include branch banks and restaurants of less than 1,000 square feet. Conditional uses would include repair garages or gas stations and retail stores.

Uses such as office or commercial development, which drive land values out of the range affordable to manufacturers or those which would degrade the district, would be forbidden under the LMZ.

Examples of the forbidden uses would be heavy industrial, such as auto junkyards or salt piles, nuclear reactors, asphalt plants, and large scale retail or service establishments such as auto dealerships, department stores or supermarkets.

Performance standards would ensure compliance with environmental standards. In an LMZ, manufacturers would be required to use an assigned truck route. Design guidelines would create physically attractive manufacturing dis-

tricts and contribute to a sense of pride and ownership for workers, employers and nearby residents. Special buffering efforts would be required where a manufacturing use abuts a residential use. Fencing and landscaping would screen parking lots, loading areas, disposal equipment and outdoor mechanical equipment from residential areas and public rights of way.

Spring stated that "in the last several years, manufacturing in Boston, in general, has lost quite a lot of jobs. Vacant buildings have been bought and rentals are too high for manufacturers to afford. The purpose of the EDIC is to help preserve light manufacturing and jobs created by it. We have discovered that this zoning tool is necessary" to achieve this preservation. "We desire that manufacturers stay in the city and expand. This LMZ supports the economy in Bos-

ton."

Kathryn Downing, co-chairperson of the committee, asked if the BRA or LMZ had looked at sites in Charlestown that would be likely areas for this zone. Dave Armanenatti, special assistant for the BRA, stated that this has not been done as of yet, but this would be included in the process of developing the Interim Planning Overlay District (IPOD). He noted the importance of "why we need an IPOD for Charlestown. There are so many abuses city-wide and critical issues" that the IPOD would clarify.

Spring stated that the zone would preserve the potential for blue collar jobs. "Manufacturing jobs offer a salary around \$24,900 per year. For the same educational level, a worker would make \$19,000 in the service industry," Spring stated. "Most manufacturers need a five year

lease, but for the most part will only be offered a three-year lease, that when renewed will have a rental price too high for the manufacturer to afford. If they have to keep moving, they will leave the city. Once the manufacturer leaves the city, the potential for blue collar jobs at the site is lost forever," she stated.

Spring told the committee that if this zone was passed, it would be another tool they could work with. "You are faced with this issue that we are trying to address," she stated. She requested the support of the committee by notifying the BRA Board of that fact before their meeting on April 21st. She also stated that residents could contact her at 725-3342 for further information.

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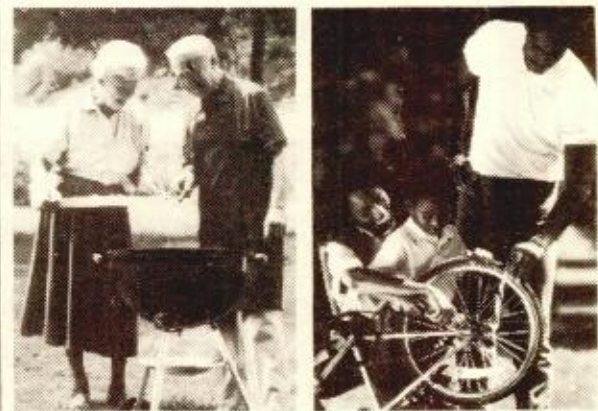

## Development Of 127 Main Street Delayed Following BRA And BOA Hearings

Appeal to go back to the neighborhood and work out their differences.

The BRA Board met on Thursday, April 7 and voted to deny the proposal on the recommendation of their staff whose concern over density and height and the input from the neighborhood forced the review of "further basic design options."

"Due to the community participation and staff review, the staff recommended denial based on density, floor area ratio, traffic, etc. The staff felt that the proposal should not be granted on the present design," stated David Armanenatti, BRA special assistant. "An amendment to the Land

Disposition Agreement (LDA)" voted at the Board meeting "would give more control over the project back to the BRA and the neighborhood," he stated. "The BRA will reconsider the scale and density of the buildings, the affordable housing component and neighborhood consensus in modifying the project." The LDA amendment voted on by the BRA Board states:  
1.) That the design and scale of the proposed project be consistent with the Authority's and the community's planning objectives for this area;  
2.) That the developer submit to the Authority an affordable housing plan which addressed inclusion of affordable housing units

either on site or on another location in Charlestown; and  
3.) That the Charlestown community and the Neighborhood Council be involved in the ongoing design and development review of the project.

On April 12, the Board of Appeal voted a deferral until June 14. During this time the developer must meet with the Neighborhood Council and abutters to scale down the project.

The Office of Neighborhood Services asked the Board of Appeal for the deferral in order for the neighborhood to have a chance to discuss their con-

cerns with the developer. The BRA will actively participate in all scheduled meetings to oversee the design, planning and density changes.

Developer Dick Held stated that a meeting was held last Sunday evening with the abutters and the developers that started the groundwork for future discussions on design changes. Held stated that he intends to meet with the community on a regular basis to work out differences in density, height and open space in order to complete the project in a reasonable length of time to avoid added construction costs.

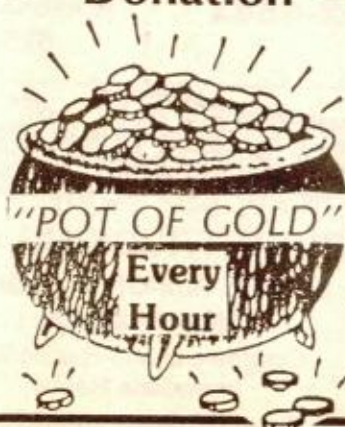
