

Residents Asked To Comment On City Square Park Designs
by Kathy Giordano Consultants from Childs Bertman Tseckares and Casendino (CBT) brought six schematic designs depicting alternative approaches to the construction of a park to the City Square Park Committee meeting on Aug. 6 Representing CBT were Maury Childs, Tony Casendino and Dave O'Con nor. Stephen Collins, Char lestown liaison with the Central Artery/Tunnel and Central Artery/North Area (CANA) projects, chaired the meeting.
Childs stated that the
park designs came as a result of public input at meetings held during the spring and summer months of this year. Comments made at these meetings defined the ingredients that residents wanted to see in the park. which will be constructed after the CANA project is completed. These concepts included: passive recreation space with trees; benches and grass; a gateway to Charlestown; a foreground for the court house and Roughan Hall; an opportunity for interpretations of Charlestown's history; a

setting for the Veterans Memorial; a buffer from Rutherford Avenue/Chelsea Street traffic; and acknowledgement of significant view corridors.
The alternative plans prepared by CBT incorporated these suggestions.

- Alternative A features a structure depicting the Great House, a plaza with decorative pavement, the Veterans Memorial, benches and an historic map with interpretive inscriptions.
- Alternative B incorporates the Veterans Memorial, a relocated Great House representation, an historic map with interpretive inscription and a gateway arch with wing wall made of wrought iron fencing with interpretative panels and a paved plaza.
- A Great Housc frame exhibit is featured in Alternative C on a decorative paved plaza. It also includes wood trellises, benches and a six-foot brick wall along Chelsea Street and Rutherford Avenue as a buffer to traffic
- The Veterans Memorial and Great House are prominently displayed in AIternative D that also includes shrubbery, a grassy knoll and granite columns around a decorative paved plaza.
- Alternative E is encased by a wrought iron fence on brick piers. Within the park a ground trace of the Great House, the Veterans Memorial, benches, paved plazas and lawns are included.
- The final plan submitted by CBT, Alternative F. includes the Veterans Me-

Joseph J. Kent Dies At 58

When you think about service to the community and working for its residents, one of the names that comes to mind is Joe Kent. Whether it be a booster for the Bunker Hill Day Parade, a chance book for the O'Reilly Scholarship Fund, a light bulb for the Lions Club - to name a few Joe was there, usually accompanied by his wife Margie, to help support the people of the town who were near and dear to him.
The community has lost a caring son with the death of Joseph J. Kent, 58, on Sunday, Aug. 4 at Mass. General Hospital following a brief illness.

A lifelong resident of Charlestown, Joe was a 1950 graduate of Brighton High School. During the Korean War, he served with the U.S. Coast Guard.

Joe was appointed to the Boston Fire Department in June 1962 and assigned to Engine 11 in East Boston. He was later transferred to Charlestown's Ladder 9 and Engine 32.

Department in October 1979, Joe put his interest in coin and stamp collecting on a professional basis as he opened Badger Coin Shop at One Thompson Square. It was from his shop in the old Charlestown Savings Bank building that Joe became increasingly involved in community organizations. He later worked for the Boston Redevelopment Authority.
Joe had been a member of the Society of St. Florian, the Boston Firemen's Mutual Relief Association and the Boston's Firemen's

Relief Fund
He began increasing his activity within the town by assisting the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee with its fund-raising efforts including this year's event when he and Margie set up lawn chairs in the Bunker Hill Mall to sell parade boosters, shortly before he entered the hospital in June. He assisted Margie in the planning and preparations for the Charlestown Elderly Thanksgiving Dinner, raising the funds necessary to host some 450 seniors at he annual event.
Joe held membership in the Old Charlestown Schoolboys Association and the Bunker Hill Irish Heritage Society. It was his Irish heritage that led to his involvement with the Friends of John Boyle O'Reilly, an Irish patriot who lived in this community and died here just over 100 years ago this week. Joe worked with committee that planned a committee that planned and dedicated a memorial to O'Reilly in Thompson
Square and formed an annual scholarship to assist a
ocal boy and girl with their college plans.
He was also a member of the Licensed Builders Trade and the Disabled American Veterans Post 27 in Somerville.
Joe served as treasurer and later as president of the J.F. Kennedy Family Ser ice Center. For his contriutions of time and effort, he was awarded the Action for Boston Community Development annual out standing citizen award. He has also been an active participant in the Charlestown Lions Club.
Joe has been best known in recent years for his efforts on behalf of "Townie Santa," a volunteer program that raises funds to provide baskets of food and toiletry items and delivers them just before Christmas each year to over 100 of Charlestown's elderly, needy shut-ins. Joe, along with three other residents, sat down one day some years back and decided that a program was needed to provide some Christmas cheer for those unable

tered voter has moved within the city in the current year, he or she may notify the Election Department of a change in address by indicating in writing the old voting address, the new address and signing the request.

$\star$ Bunker Hill Street - The traffic signal located on Bunker HIIl Street that allows pedestrians to cross between the Doherty Park and St. Francis de Sales School will be getting some needed adjustments, according o Boston Transportation Commissioner Richard A. Dimino, as part of the Traffic Safety Improvement Program
The program includes upgrading the traf fic signal and wheelchair ramps, and the installation of underground detectors that will minimize delays to both pedestrians and vehicles. The safety program began in July and will run through the end of 1992
Boston-based contractor Mario M. Sus has been awarded the contract for the $\$ 1.2$ million project that includes 20 signalized intersections throughout Boston's neighborhoods.
Dimino stated: "Public safety in the neighborhoods is one of Mayor Flynn's top priorities. In an effort to improve pedestrian and driver safety, the BTD has made great strides upgrading the city's signal system over the past few years."
$\star$ Lowney Way - The installation of barriers on Lowney Way has not only reduced traffic to one lane, but has also limited access for emergency vehicles to Tremont and Mt. Vernon streets. Therefore, the BTD has posted signs on these two streets prohibiting parking 20 feet back from Lowney Way.
The barriers will remain on Lowney Way for the duration of the Central Artery/North Area (CANA)/Tobin Bridge connection project, stated Stephen Collins, community liaison for the project. BTD spokesman Jim Mansfield stated that the "No Parking - Fire Lane" signs will be enforced until the project is completed.

$\star$ Bunker Hill Housing Development The Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force met with The Patriot last week to outline their concerns with the ongoing reconstruction project in the housing development. According to Task Force members, the work taking place in the vacant apartments is not in accordance with a written agreement signed by the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) and the Tenants Task Force. This agreement, they stated, came out of many hours of meetings between the two parties. Chairperson Anne Considine said that the agreement outlined the "nuts and bolts" of the reconstruction work "right down to the color of the paint on the walls.'
Tenants Task Force members first found out about the discrepancies in the reconstruc tion contract last week when they were given a tour of the units being rehabed. What they found during the tour left them in shock, wondering whose decision it was to chang the plans without consulting them
As a result of the work being done under the reconstruction contract, they stated, room sizes have been reduced to a below zoning code level, especially the single bedrooms which have gone from 8 feet by 6 feet to 7 feet by 5 feet. This reduction in size came about as the result of installing the new wiring onto existing walls and covering it with sheetrock and plaster.
Other concerns with the contract include the installation of electrical outlets 18 inches above the floor level, making it convenien for a toddler to place a finger or toy into the
outlet; and the installation of outlets under window sills where they could get wet from rain water. Also, Tenants Task Force members were upset with the additional loss of room size by the boxing in old heating pipes. In addition, these pipes have been made accessible through a vent in the enclosure without the removal of many coats of lead paint, a situation that could also create a health hazard to the families.
According to Considine, all units being refurbished are vacant as part of the BHA relocation policy with the housing development. She stated that residents wishing to return to their apartments would find it difficult due to the reduction in room sizes in the units.
The Tenants Task Force is asking Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to have the work stopped immediately before any other units are touched. They are also asking HUD to include a demolition contract along with the reconstruction contract, automatically granting additional funds to demolish walls in the apartments which will allow all utilities to be installed within the newly constructed walls rather than on top of the existing walls and then covered.
Discussions between the tenants and BHA continue this week. Considine stated that the assistance of city and state elected officials has also been sought to help their effort to have HUD respond to their request. A tour of the units by city and state representatives is being requested from BHA to see firsthand the Tenants Task Force complaints.
$\star$ Charlestown Navy Yard ... Update The three-alarm fire in Building 206 on Second Avenue has raised some degree of sus picion as to what is hidden within the walls of vacant buildings in the Yards End section of the Navy Yard. The July 24 blaze was the third fire of suspicious origin in that area since June, an area that had become a dum ping ground for late-night violators trying to save the cost of properly disposing of debris ranging from household items to, some believe, hazardous waste
Shortly after the July 24 fire was extin guished in Building 206, the Department of Environmental Protection arrived in the Air Quality Monitor Control Unit at the request of Boston Fire Department officials. The unit checked the air quality of the surrounding area but reportedly found no evidence of pol lutants, much to the relief of the firefighters who fought the blaze and residents of the Navy Yard. Fire officials had called DEP concerned that chemicals were stored in the burned out building.
On July 25, the DEP Hazardous Waste team arrived in the Navy Yard for an inspec tion that resulted in the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA)'s receipt of a "Notice of Responsibility" report to be filed with DEP on any hazardous materials that might be dumped in their Navy Yard properties. The Boston Fire Department made simila investigations under the direction of Capt Richard Hartnett, the special hazard inspec tor for the department. During Hartnett's search, 15 barrels were discovered in Building 106, another vacant structure in the area hit by the suspicious fires.

As a result of the various investigations, the BRA has since cleaned out all vacant buildings in the Yard's End section and boarded up all means of entry. According to a BRA spokesperson, routine patrols of the area will hopefully eliminate any further dumping problems.

Lt. Richard Powers, Fire Department spokesman, stated that his department will continue to make routine visits to the Navy Yard to inspect the area for evidence of haz ardous materials and the safety of abandon ed buildings.

Charlestown resident Carl Zellner, a city planner who was formerly associated with the Boston Landsmark Commission, submitted a park plan to the committee that features a sixpoint star in the center with paved walkways stretching out toward the edge of the park. The center star points out historic aspects of Charlestown, Zellner stated. His plan also includes the Veterans Memorial plus the inclusion of a granite bench dedicated to World War I veterans, the Great House, a farmer's market, water fountain, bandstand, lower beds and a game board placed on the pave-
ment. The Paul Revere steps taken from City Square before the CANA project began is also incorporated in Zellner's plan.
