

# By Allowing Its Players To Build Simulated

For instance, students benefit from using "Minecraft" to enhance learning in STEM/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, [Arts], and Math) and English Language Arts content areas. In addition, teachers benefit from using "Minecraft" to increase academic engagement with students and reinforce parental involvement.
