Gauge Containing Radioactive Material Stolen From CANA Field Office

The Mass. Highway Department (MHD) informed the Nuclear Regulatory Commission on Nov. 9 that a gauge containing radioactive material used to measure the density and moisture of highway paving material was reportedly stolen over the weekend from the job site at 250 Front St. in Charlestown. At the time, the gauge had been locked in a closet within a locked

construction trailer. A MHD employee discovered the trailer had been broken into and the gauge was missing early Monday morn-

The gauge was last seen around 4 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 6. The device was in a rectangular plastic container colored bright yellow and measuring approxi-mately 22" x 44" x 12". The container has a dia-

mond-shaped U.S. Department of Transportation radiation label. The top half of the label is yellow and the bottom half is white, carrying a black three-bladed propeller symbol.

There is another label on the container with the legend: Troxler Model No. 3411B, serial number 18849, and a listing of the radioactive materials in the device, including cesium-137 8mCi and americium-241 40mCi.

The gauge inside measures 14.5" x 9" x 7" with a handle sticking out of the top, approximately 12.5". There is a small numeric keypad that is mounted on (continued on page 20)

The Armed Services YMCA Dedicates New Navy Yard Facility

It was a joyous occasion on Oct. 30 when state and local officials, military personnel, veteran and auxiliary leaders, and community residents gathered in the Charlestown Navy Yard and watched and listened as speakers recalled a proud past and a promising future for the Armed Services YMCA. This ceremony marked the dedication of the new facility at 150 Second Ave. and the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the A/S YMCA in Bos-

The former A/S YMCA stood as a landmark in City Square for almost 70 years, and was demolished in early 1988 to make way for the Central Artery/ North Area roadway reconstruction project. It took with it memories that began with the opening of its doors on May 16, 1918 memories of hundreds of thousands of service men and women and their families who passed through its doors and those of residents to whom the Y was part of their lives.

After a three-year search for a suitable site in Charlestown for the new facility, ground was broken in the Charlestown Navy Yard in August 1991, and work began in earnest to construct

Two Charlestown Residents Honored At ABCD Awards Dinner

Action for Boston Community Development Inc. (ABCD) continued a great Boston traditon by hosting its 18th Annual Community Awards Dinner on Oct. 23 at the Sheraton Boston Hotel & Towers. U.S. Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell delivered the keynote address and Deborah Prothrow-Stith, M.D., assistant dean for Government and Community Programs at Harvard University School of Public Health, delivered a special guest

ABCD, Boston's 30-yearold anti-poverty institution, honored the work of Boston's committed community volunteers who bring hope to the neighborhoods where they live and work. ABCD's 20 Community Award recipients were saluted at a gala affair and acknowledged for their unselfish acts of community spirit.

The Community Award recipients from Charlestown were Sister Ann Rita Sullivan, O.P. and Zelma Lacev

The Charlestown Healthy Aging Program (CHAP) was conceived and developed by these two healthy Charlestown seniors. Four years ago, Sister Ann Rita and Lacey, with some assistance from the Kennedy Center, developed a program to educate and organize seniors in their community. These two special women became advocates, fighting to improve the quality of life for Charlestown's elderly. Sister Ann Rita and Lacey, both over 70 years old, bring endless energy and spirit to their cause.

The two have recruited a core group of volunteers who keep apprised of issues important to elderly residents of Charlestown. Health care insurance, social security and legal issues are just a few of the concerns they tackle regularly. This core group has organized a phone tree of more than 70 seniors who call each other about important legislative issues. Each member then calls or writes to city, state and federal elected officials to in-

key policies and legislation on the elderly.

CHAP seniors have also organized around local issues. They were influential in the decision to provide benches so that seniors and other could sit while waiting for transportation after shopping. They joined other community groups in lobbying the city to put traffic lights at Hayes Square. Most recently, they fought to allow Charlestown residents the convenience of paying their utility bills at local stores.

CHAP regularly sponsors educational forums on such topics as health benefits, long-term care, the health care proxy and living wills for Charlestown seniors and their families.

Lacey and Sister Ann Rita recently became members of the Charlestown Interagency on Aging Volunteer Program. Along with continuing their CHAP activities, they have been working to recruit, train and coordinate volunteers for visiting services and to escort frail seniors to medical appointments. Their newest initiative is lobbying for a nursing home in Char-

Lacey has three children, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. She enjoys crocheting, dancing and collecting dolls. She is retired from Mass General Hospital, where she worked for 18 years as a recep-

Sister Ann Rita is very close to her sister, Marguerite Zuffante. She enjoys reading, visiting and nature. She is a retired school teacher with advanced degrees in education and gerontology.

These two tireless, dedicated women are truly an inspiration for both young and old in any community. Charlestown and the Kennedy Center are proud and grateful to call Zelma Lacey and Sister Ann Rita Sullivan their own.

People who do title searches for a living don't have real estate's most exciting job, but it is an important one. They must ensure that the sellers really do own the property you're buying and that all liens against the property are taken care of before or as a result of settlement.

lf, for example, your seller has had financial difficulties and didn't pay bills, there might be judgments that must be satisfied when the property is sold. The Charlestown architectural firm of J.W. French Associates Inc. was commissioned to develop a modern facility with state-ofthe art athletic facilities and living accommodations beneath an historically accurate facade under guidelines set down by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the National Park Service. The surrounding buildings were designed by Alexander Parris in the mid-1850s and this new structure, built by Peabody Construction, blends into the area. In fact, the resulting building has led residents and visitors alike to question whether the building is new or the renovation of an existing structure.

The facility has been designed to meet the needs of the military population of the Boston area as well as those of the Charlestown

community with social, recreational and support faci-

At the dedication cerenonies, Rev. Lynn Smith. minister of Mariners' House and Senior Port Chaplain, opened with an invocation which was followed by the presentation of the colors by the USS Constitution Color Guard.

Voke told the gathering that he was very pleased that the facility was rebuilt here in Charlestown. (continued from page 10) dents and for the clients of Life Focus Center, Charlestown's program for the mentally retarded and physically handicapped. Barrett went on to praise Voke as one of the "people who made this Y possible," noting that Voke "is always there for the people of Charlestown."

Barrett spoke of the memorial to Korean War veterans scheduled to be dedicated next year at Shipyard Park and the ongoing relationship between the city and the military. He stated: "The partnership between the Y and the community speaks well of the future." He concluded by saying that the A/S YMCA "adds to the strength of the Navy Yard, not just from the community but from around the world.'

Lt. Col. John R. Yates, USMC (Ret.), president of the A/S YMCA Board of Trustees, told the gathering that this was "a happy day - the beginning of a new era" - and was the culmination of 10 years of effort. He commended Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, Voke, Charlestown residents Jim Conway and the late Dennis McLaughlin for their efforts on behalf of the Y, and the Charlestown community who, he said, has supported the Y for the past 75

years.

The dedication ceremony featured the unveiling of a plaque commemorating the 75th anniversary of the A/S YMCA in Boston. Plaques were presented to the Hon. Charles S. Bolster, president emeritus of the Y's Board of Trustees, and to the family of Harry A. Psarris, longtime chief executive officer of the Y, who was unable to attend the event due to illness.

The ribbon was cut and the guests were afforded an opportunity to tour the building and enjoy a collation in the gymnasium.

The \$12-million, six-floor building is designed as a modern, comfortable home away from home.

The recreation facilities include and indoor pool, an exercise/fitness center and a gymnasium with locker rooms and a sports shop. In addition, there is a function room with a capacity of 150, meeting rooms, a board room, game room, laundry and a vending area as well a chapel or meditation room.


Hours for the physical fitness facility are Monday to Friday from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., Saturday from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m. Prior to Dec. 4, Charlestown residents can join the facility for \$360, \$40 less than the stated an-

nual fee.

The 148 residential rooms, some with twin beds and others with bunk beds, are tastefully furnished and each have a private bath. Some 60 of the rooms have kitchenettes. Acting Director Paul Harvey said in an interview that it is estimated that room rates will range from \$55 to \$65 a night. He stated that these rooms will not be for longterm residents. In fact, he said, there is a two-week limit on a stay, with the option to renew for two weeks more if there is space available.

The exception to this residency rule is the Dennis McLaughlin Alternative Lifestyle Program which involves 10 rooms on the fourth floor of the Y. Harvey said this non-profit program will provide its own staff and is governed by its own Board of Directors. According to Harvey, the Y will just provide the space for this program.

Harvey stated: "Our mission is service to the military. As soon as we are assured that mission is accomplished, we will work on programs for Charlestown families. I can't make a commitment on specific programs until then." He did add that the community programs would probacontinued on page 12)

Harvey stated that 85 percent of the new employees hired by the Y are Charlestown residents. He added that as use of the facility increases with the resulting rise in cash flow, more employees will be hired.

He stated that Life Focus Center staff and clients have been hired to assume the maintenance and housekeeping duties at the Y.

Residents will be able to tour the facility and register to join the Y during a special pre-opening period from Nov. 16 to 25 on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The Y facilities will be open on Nov.

As the doors to the new Armed Services YMCA open, a decade of planning, meeting and overcoming many obstacles along the way, has resulted in a building of which the Y's Board of Trustees, staff, the city and the community can be justifiably proud.

As Father Ronald Coyne, pastor of St. Catherine's Parish, offered in his benediction at the dedication, the three words that came to his mind were "housing, recreation and hospitality." His hopes were that the Y and the community would "continued to grow together to celebrate many other wonderful times."

Gauge Containing Radioactive Material Stolen From CANA Field Office

(continued from page one) top of the gauge. The handle was locked in its position and the MHD still has the keys to the device.

Radiation levels on the outside of the device are approximately six millirem per hour on the top of the gauge, 14 millirem per hour on the sides of the gauge, five millirem per hour on the back of the gauge near the handle and 15 millirem per hour on the front of the gauge.

The radiation emanating from the cesium-137 source, should it be exposed from its normal shielded position, would be 28 millirems per hour at a distance of one foot from the source and significantly higher if anyone were to touch the source. In comparison, the radiation levels from a single chest x-ray is 10 to 20 millirems per second. Thus exposure to this device would not produce any observable medical effects. If anyone knows of the location of this object or if

anyone has seen it, they

should not attempt to tamper with it. They should leave it at the gate at the CANA Field Office, 250
