## Bells And Bravos To Honor 'Old Ironsides' On Historic Sail

Excitement is mounting as the day nears for the United States Navy threemasted frigate, USS Constitution to sail under her own power once again the first time that she has sailed in 116 years.
CDR. Michael C. Beck, USN, commanding officer of USS Constitution, invites all residents to Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard on at 7:45 a.m. on Sunday moming, July 20 for a brief program honoring the ship and her crew as they leave their homeport, Charlestown, under tow in preparation for the historic sail - her first sail since 1881. All the churches in Charlestown
will join the tribute by ringing their bells at 8 am Sunday morning, July 20 to honor "Old Ironsides" as she moves out into Boston Harbor under tow.


The U.S. Navy's "Operation Sail 200," celebrating the bicentennial of Old Ironsides, will feature the world's oldest commis-
sioned warship afloat coming under sail off the coast of Mass. USS Constitution will sail with the same six-sail configuration that she normally used for battle.
The historic USS Constitution will sail in formation with two modern U.S. Nayy warships and with a fly-over by Navy fighter aircraft. Operation Sail 200 will highlight the direct correlation of today's U.S. Navy and Marine Corps team, the importance of "forward presence," advanced technology, core values and the dedication and professionalism of our Sailors and Marines with the rich (continued on page 3 )

## Epic Film 'Old Ironsides' To Be Shown Alongside The Ship

The celebration of the 200th anniversary of the USS Constitution continues at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday evening, July 19. Two days before "Old Ironsides" embarks on her first cruise under her own sails in 116 years, The Charlestown Preservation Society, in partnership with the Boston National Historical Park and the U.S. Navy, will present free, an America epic film, "Old Ironsides."

This 1926 Paramount spectacular will be shown on a large outdoor screen next to the ship on Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The original score by Hugo Reisenfeld will be

"OLD IRONSIDES" constructed for 1926 film. played by renowned cinema organist, Dennis James, and as the great sea battle erupts on film, the real ship will come alive with musketeers and cannonades.

The story begins at the Continental Congress in Philadelphia. Barbary pirates have been enslaving American sailors and treating American women passengers unspeakably. With the famous quote, "Millions for defense but not one penny for tribute," America resolved to become a great power. Old Ironsides was launched and sent to sack Tripoli, where our heroes, Wallace Beery (the bosun) and Esther Ralston (the captivating girl), are imprisoned.

Paramount spent millions of 1926 dollars building full-scale replicas, as verisimilitude was cru-

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## Old Ironsides To Sail Again

(continued from page 1) maritime history of the U.S.

USS Constitution, maintained as a national monument at the Charlestown Navy Yard here in Charlestown, recently completed a four-year overhaul to restore her to original hull strength. In-depth structural tests and evaluations of the ship and a lengthy training program for the crew have prepared USS Constitution for this historic voyage in Massachusetts Bay.

School-aged children from all 50 states contributed their pennies to buy the sails that will be used during the sail. The "Old Ironsides Pennies Campaign" led the nationwide effort that was coordinated by the USS Constitution Museum, a private, nonprofit educational institution dedicated to preserving
the heritage of USS Constitution.

The community has had a deep commitment to outfit the ship with sails. Charlestown native, CDR. Robert L. Gillen, USN (ret.), 59th in command of USS Constitution, is serving as chairman of this fund-raising effort for her sails. The Charlestown Cooperative Bank has collected the money raised for the sails at no charge to the committee. Also, the first donation of $\$ 1,000$ was presented to the fund in March of 1996 by the Killilea Fund of Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion. James Conway, chairman of the post's Killilea Fund, had also promised an interest-free loan of up to $\$ 100,000$ if money for the sails had not been forthcoming.

USS Constitution will
be towed 17 miles from

Charlestown to Marblehead on Sunday to stage the ship near the sail operation area in Massachusetts Bay. During the War of 1812 , Marblehead provided USS Constitution a safe haven from two British warships. USS Constitution was last moored in Marblehead in 1931.

The ship is scheduled to engage in sail training in Massachusetts Bay between $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and $1 \mathrm{p.m}$. on Sunday while she is under tow. She will moor in Marblehead and later in the afternoon, the crew will disembark to spend the night on shore.
On Monday, July 21 , the ship will be towed to an area of Massachusetts Bay where, at noon, tow lines will be released and her sails will be unfurled for Operation Sail 200.

Old Ironsides is scheduled to pass abreast of Castle Island at 7 pm . with docking at Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard at 7:45 p.m., greeted by the music of the Pipes \& Drums of Bunker Hill and the unfurling of the 90 -foot Navy and Mt. Rushmore flags.
Residents are invited by CDR. Beck to come to the Charlestown Navy Yard at 7:45 p.m. on Monday, July 21 to welcome USS Constitution back to Charlestown, her homeport since 1897 after her historic sail.
A welcome home ceremony is planned and all the churches in Charlestown will once again ring their bells at 8 p.m. on Monday evening as a tribute to Old Ironsides as she completes her successful sail.

Summer is vacation time, and you might find it appealing to take a vacation from financial matters, including tax planning. But if you want a lower tax bill for 1997, midyear is an excellent time to size up your tax situation and make the necessary adjustments to your tax-cutting strategies.

- If you own a business, consider hiring your children to work for you. Your business gets a tax deduction for the wages paid, and your child pays no income tax on earnings up to $\$ 4,150$. So you've cut the overall family tax bill. Be sure the wages paid are reasonable for the work performed.
- As you review your investment portfolio, consider investing in nontaxable municipal bonds. Work through the numbers here to be sure you're not passing up a better taxable investment that will return higher after-tax dollars than a non-taxable investment such as munis.
- Review your debt. If any of the interest you're paying is not tax-deductible (such as interest on auto loans, credit cards or school loans), consider paying off the debt or converting it to debt that will allow for deductible interest (such as a home-equity loan, where available).
- Don't overlook the 1996 changes in the tax law that could cut your 1997 taxes significantly. For example, married couples with only one wageearner can now contribute up to $\$ 4,000$ to their IRAs (an increase from $\$ 2,250$ ). If you're adopting a child, check into the new adoption tax credit. Certain long-term health care insurance and longterm care costs are now tax deductible. A pilot program for medical savings accounts went into effect this year. If you qualify for one of these accounts, your contributions to the plan would be tax-deductible, and withdrawals to pay medical expenses would be tax-free.
