## Eighth Congressional Caucus For Clinton Delegates To Be Held April 13

The Democratic State Committee will be holding an open caucus on Saturday, April 13 at the Somerville High School Field House, 81 Highland Ave., Somerville to elect delegates from the Eighth Congressional District to nominate President Bill Clinton at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago in August.

The Eighth Congressional District has been allowed four male delegates, three female delegates, and one male alter-
nate. All participants must check in by $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. in order to qualify to vote at the caucus. The caucus will begin promptly at 10:15 a.m.

The caucus is being chaired by Senate President Thomas Birmingham and will be open to all registered Democrats from the Eighth Congressional District.

The Eighth district includes Charlestown.

Charlestown native Jim Walsh of St. Martin Street will be seeking election as a delegate to the National

Convention at this caucus. Walsh has arranged for buses to transport Charlestown democrats to the caucus. The bus will leave the K . of C. parking lot on Saturday morning at 9 a.m., 9:20 a.m. and 9:40 a.m., and will make three return trips starting at $12: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Somerville Mayor Mike Capuano, the host of this year's caucus, will hold a pre-caucus breakfast at the Colonial Room Restaurant at Somerville High School. All caucus participants are welcome to attend.

## Information On Charlestown Incidents

The Boston Police Department's Area A detectives issued a bulletin this week requesting information on an individual wanted in Charlestown.

## Charlestown Runners . . . It's A Matter Of Pride

It seems that a pinch of springtime weather has unleashed scores of cabinfevered walkers and runners all over Charlestown. For some that itch to exercise, to move some of that winter bulk around, is much more than that. Many of the racing reds, greens and purples, the lucky wore-torn sweats and ragged T -shirts belong to some serious runners.

Monday's 100th Boston Marathon has attracted 63 registered Charlestown residents among the 38,500 runners set to start the grueling 26.2 -mile course. The largest in history, this year's century-old event will sport a record number of entrants from across the world . . . and across Charlestown.

Never mind who can really run or who a lucky lottery pick is. There are 126 Charlestown feet ready to run in this historic athletic race.
A variety of residents
from all around Charlestown will be out there making history this Patriots Day. There'll be "Townies," long-timers, newcomers, the young, the older, men, women, the seasoned and the "I guess I have to go through with this now" folks.
Bruce Daniel, 46, of Common Street will be running his first marathon, and Shirley Foley of Allston Street has the dubious honor of being Charlestown's oldest runner at 65 .
Twenty-eight-year-old Tommy Lynch from Washington Street is our top male runner, although Christopher Carter, 31, of Winthrop Street is noted to be very fast. Charlestown's top woman runner is Lynne Schuler, 31, of Monument Avenue.

Among the experienced runners are Marathon Tours husband and wife Thom and Sharon Gilligan of High Street. His 18th race, her 12th, the Gilligans are old "hands" at this
running game. They put together the April 9 meet-the-runners night at the Warren Tavern, receiving some 25 to 35 RSVPs from Charlestown marathoners and another dozen or so from other areas.
"This is really exciting," Gilligan says of the high turm-out of local registered entrants. "It's amazing. There are usually about 10 from Charlestown."
Billy Smith from Tibbetts Town Way is running his first Boston Marathon. At 39, Smith has participated in several half-marathons in Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont and Rhode Island. He runs six days a week for a total of 60 miles in preparation for Monday's event. "They think I'm crazy," Smith says of his family of nonrunners. "I'm doing this for my kids, Shauna and Shane."

Smith describes his 5-year-old daughter and 3 -year-old son as being thrilled and anxiously waiting
for the day to finally arrive. "They keep asking if it's time yet," Smith says.

No matter what their experience, their time, their competitive standings, Charlestown will be cheering on its runners from beginning to end of their three-hour moment in history.

meeting to explain why he sought removal of the traffic light, McCabe asked the audience to express their feelings on the light.

Joanne Doherty, head of the Friends of the Clougherty Pool, stated that even hough there is no longer a school across from the park, traffic continues to speed over the hill. Others commented on the children who have been taught to use the light to cross and how all the Bunker Hill Street stores are on the even side of the street. It was mentioned that with the change to a pole light at that location, it would be difficult, if not impossible, for drivers to see the light as they came over the hill.

[^1]McCabe said that he was about to close the meeting and was not going to reopen the topic. He suggested that private meetings be held with the residents after the public meeting closed.

McCabe spoke of two traffic patterns that cause problems for local drivers.

The first involves the traffic that comes up Rutherford Avenue to turn right onto the Gilmore Bridge, does not follow the traffic channel barrier and goes to the traffic light at Austin Street where the drivers take a right. McCabe pointed out that this results in gridlock and impairs emergency vehicles.

His suggestion is that a "no right turn" sign and arrow be installed and that a law-enforcement officer be stationed there, not to tie up traffic with tickets, but to direct vehicles straight across Austin Street down to City Square. He said that he is going to determine the ownership of this roadway and will bring a full report to the next CNC meeting.

The other area of concern is on the Warren Street extension by the Ironside Grille. Traffic has been forming a third lane going toward Chelsea Street and forcing traffic heading toward Thompson Square to the right. McCabe said that tickets could be issued in this area by the Boston Police Department and he will request that they do so.

Other issues discussed were the incidents reported in an article on page one.

Looney spoke about the May 14 meeting, co-sponsored by CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), that would focus on the heroin problem in this town. He also told of a planned June 10 march on drug awareness.

## Marathon CNC Meeting Covers Myriad Of Issues

Spring cleaning at the April 2 Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting took more than three hours to straighten, sort and tie up the loose ends of winter snows that kept folks at home last month.
Seventeen of the 21 council members were in attendance at the Knights of Columbus Hall: Chairman Peter Looney, Vice-Chairman Tom Cunha, Second ViceChairman Mel Stillman, Treasurer Nancy Keyes, Ken Stone, Rusty Sergeant, Marty O'Brien, Don Haska, John Dillon, Jim Conway, Billy Galvin, John Iacoi, Judy Brennan, Bill McCabe, David Whelan, Edna Kelly and Kate McDonough.

The council swept through an initial six presentations before its monthly reports, assigning each to a proper committee for upcoming public reviews.
Bunker Hill Community College Interim President Mon O'Shea presented preliminary plans for a 20,000 -square-foot sound stage on the Charlestown campus. The $\$ 13.5$ million facility would combine academic and commercial use, according to O'Shea, for the college's expanding Media Technology Program and would become the state's largest sound stage. The state's Division of Capital Planning and Operations will carry out the design and construction.

O'Shea said that the BHCC Sound Stage would attract business, capitalizing on creating jobs and growth within the film industry in Massachusetts. WGBH currently houses the largest sound stage at 7,500 square feet. BHCC is the only public college that offers an accredited associate degree program in Media Technology.
"The sound stage will take on a very important life of its own," O'Shea said. "It is the marriage of educational development and economic development."

Among the sites considered for the new Media Technology Center is where the school's tennis courts are currently located. At approximately $\$ 140$ per square foot, DCPO's most current cost estimate for con-
struction, O'Shea said the design will call for changes in existing renovation plans for the $E$ Building and equipment features.
"We're nowhere near the approval stage," O'Shea added. "We only have auth orization for the design." O'Shea said that the college will bring any design of the facility to the community for review.

The council will hold public meetings on the sound stage's development.

The comprehensive 18 -month study of the Freedom Trail will cite recommendations next month for revitalizing the city's historic walkway. Charlestown residents have been among the 80 citizens representing four communities along the Boston National Historic Park attraction, and local recommendations will be included in the expected May 15 final report.
David Dixon of Goody Clancy consultants presented a slide show about the Freedom Trail, referring to it as "America's Foremost Pathway Through History."

Explaining that tourism in Massachusetts is the third largest industry after cars and food, Dixon said that the rate of visitors to the Freedom Trail has been flat since 1980. While the Navy Yard is holding visitor interest, many are not making the additional journey to the Bunker Hill Monument. The New England Aquarium and Museum of Science, however, have been gaining visitors. Revitalizing the Freedom Trail is an attempt at reinteresting people in American history to compete with the technology of tourism.
"The Freedom Trail is a piece of Boston's economy and an institution in its own right," Dixon said," and Charlestown is its grand finale."

BNHP spokesperson Peter Steele said that Charlestown upgrades could include sidewalk medallions, public art, watershuttle connections, Bunker Hill Museum improvements, a USS Constitution show and a change from the trail's red painted line to inlaid brick.

Looney referred the project to the Committee of the Whole, which will meet at 7
p.m. on Thursday, April 18 at the Legion Hall, 23 Adams St. to review the recommendations for the Freedom Trail before May 15.

The Harvard-Kent Elementary School is one of two sites selected in Boston for City Year's national service project. According to Robert Lewis Jr. of City Year, some 500 people, organized through the national youth service organization, will build a playground for the school in a single June day.

City Year's Annual National Convention will take place through June 12 and 15 . Last year the organization built playgrounds in Ohio through, what it describes as, a high-impact barn-raising tradition.

Looney referred the project to Precinct 2 council member Whelan who will hold a meeting at 7 p.m. tonight, Thursday, April 11 at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St. to review the details.

Ivey St. John of the Austin Street Beautification Committee asked for the council's unanimous support via letter to the Boston Transportation Department for the group's ongoing work to improve the area near the Bunker Hill Mall.
St. John said the group recommends reducing the width of the roadway by 15 feet to increase the greening of Austin Street. Plans include designing a gateway to Charlestown from the Gilmore Bridge, brick-based wrought-iron fences, sidewalks closer to the streetside along the residential area of Austin Street and additional pedestrian access to the mall.

St. John said the council has supported the group in the past and that another $\$ 500,000$ decision is expected to be made in October for the committee's ongoing beautification plan.

The council voted to unanimously endorse a support letter to the city.
Bill Rawls presented his alternative to area land-water tours, suggesting putting a trolley car on the East Boston Knott's Island Ferry Boat for access to the Navy Yard's Dry Dock 5. The ferrying trolley would be for fun and actually cost less to
maintain than Boston Duck and Gloucester Lark land-water vehicles, he said.
His idea has been considered by the ferry and trolley companies, Rawls said. The Boston Redevelopment Authority also heard the pitch. "They didn't say yes, but they didn't say no," Rawls said.

The proposal was referred to the Basic Services Committee.
Looney also referred a request for a cordial and entertainment license at Gabriele's, a Navy Yard eatery, to the Basic Services Committee.
Cunha registered the only opposing vote to the council's decision to send a letter to the Historic Landmarks Commission asking for a waiver on its two-year moratorium policy for improperly demolished 50 -year-old and older buildings. The council also voted that the developer of the now-demolished 51 Park St. make a $\$ 5,000$ voluntary contribution to the enhancing of the Training Field on a recommendation by Conway.
Local developer Vahid Nickpour explained to the council that he did not know about the requirement to report to the Commission before the Inspectional Services Department can issue permits for renovations on possible historic buildings when he took down the building at 51 Park St. last month. Local architect for the project and council member Rusty Sergeant said that he doubted the building held historical significance.

The circa 1806 original residence underwent three different building additions and had been moved to create Park Street. "The windows were improper, and the building was without any particular architectural style," Sergeant said.

The Commission's 1995 ordinance calls for no building on a site for two years when a building older than 50 years old is destroyed without the proper permits.
"The negative is to the community," Sergeant said. "Other than slapping a developer on the wrists, (leaving the site) wouldn't be worthwhile."

## Marathon CNC Meeting Covers Myriad Of Issues

The majority of council members said they did not believe that the community should have to live with an abandoned site for two years because of a developer's mis take.
"I feel hurt by the whole incident," Iacoi said, "but I guess I have no choice but to endorse a new plan." Whelan said that he felt forced to vote against the moratorium too. "I feel like I have no choice, that this is being shoved down my throat," he said.
McCabe said that the city should be held just as responsible for providing the permits without regard to historic requirements. "The Licensing Board should be communicating when issuing permits," he said. "It has more responsibility than to just take fees.

Cunha, in his single vote of opposition said: "A law is law. We rarely send endorsement letters after a law is broken. The neighborhood shouldn't have to suffer, but going against the Commission that works in our best interest does not seem right."

The issue was referred to the Basic Services Committee for ongoing design review.
Public Safety Committee: Co-chairman John Dillon reported that there were 136 calls to the police in February. There were 34 arrests, 10 of which were drug-related. A total of 89 traffic citations were written.
Co-chairman Bill McCabe reported that a request was being made to remove the raffic light on Bunker Hill Street at the Doherty Playground and former St. Francis de Sales school. The issue will be looked
at and discussed at the next committee meeting.
Looney said that CHarlestown Against Drugs would also like to be added to the agenda of the May 14 Public Safety Committee meeting to talk about the serious heroin problem in town
Basic Services Committee: Chairman Bill Galvin reported that the committee voed to recommend endorsing the Duckworth Lane licensing request at 73 Main St . contingent on ongoing community input and a pre-9 a.m. trash pick up. The Executive Committee acted in accordance.
Galvin stated that the BFI trash transfer facility causing air-quality concerns in Charlestown will be moving closer to Lechmere Station. "This basically moves it away further from the Charlestown community," Galvin said.
According to BFI representatives, Galvin said that the relocation includes an education center on site and would be completely enclosed, releasing no odors and attracting no birds.
Galvin also reported that on March 12 the committee voted to support the Chow Thai Cafe in its request for a beer and wine license. The CNC Executive Committee added its approval.
Development Committee: Chairman Tom Cunha reported that the committee recommended that MJC Realty Trust redevelop the Muster House in the Navy Yard. The Hull Lifesaving Museum had not secured financing, and a third proposal did not include nonprofit space as the MJC plan did. The Executive Committee acted on the committee's Feb. 26 decision, and the BRA
has since then accepted the MJC bic

Cunha reported that the committee recommended Boston Aging Concern's proposal to develop the old JJ McCarthy's building on Main Street into permanent housing for the formerly homeless. The Feb. 29 decision carried stipulations that potential tenants undergo C.O.R.I. record checks and that the community have ongoing input in any public safety issues that should arise. The Executive Committee supported the vote.

Cunha also reported that the state's Division of Capital Planning and Operations Commissioner Lark Palermo recently met with a CNC delegation on the decision-making process concerning the development of the City Square parcels. Palermo said she welcomed the continuing input of the Charlestown community, according to Cunha.

Arts and Cultural Committee: Chairman Don Haska reported that the committee needs local involvement in the Artery Arts design plan. He said that he had New Rutherford Avenue access concerns for the sole design presented and supported by the Mass. Cultural and Arts Commission.

Billboard Committee: Chairman Ken Stone reported on a Murray Communications proposal to place a billboard at 70 Cambridge St., near the B\&M Railroad yard and Spice Street. Stone said he drafted a letter to the company citing that new billboards are forbidden under community zoning requirements. The council supported Stone's letter and approved sending a letter to city agencies asking for support of the no-billboard rule.

Environmental Committee: Chairperson Judy Brennan asked that her report be tabled until the May council meeting.

In other business, Whelan expressed concem that the city has been inconsisten in monitoring and enforcing its building permits. "They seem to put some people through hell and ignore others," Whelan said. Resident Dan Kovacevic suggested use of the confidential telephone number for the city building inspection office: 635 5300.

The council noted that rumors surrounding a possible Charlestown site for a new baseball stadium were being actively inves tigated.

Massport Community Liaison Dorothy Steele reported that a busy public meeting process was being put together for abutters to the Tobin Bridge as the repainting project nears. She also said that the Reques for Proposals for the former Revere Sugar site were forthcoming, and that the Optimization Maritime Zoning updates under the Seaport plan were ready for finalization.

Dillon sought the council's support on organizing a meeting with the Boston Housing Authority to see its "blueprint fo the future of the housing development." Dillon said he was concerned that the authority's integration efforts of several years ago may be keeping Charlestown families from access to housing in the neighborhood.

The next monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will be held on Tuesday, May 7 at 7 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 W. School St.

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- Use a voucher system. Although most large businesses use such a system, many small business owners view it as "more paperwork."

Using a voucher system means that all purchases require a purchase order number and advance approval. This helps to prevent unauthorized and duplicate purchases, as well as excess shipments and overcharging by suppliers,

- Age your accounts payable every month. This will show how much you owe, to whom you owe it, and the age of each debt. An aging schedule can quickly identify cash flow problems, mounting interest charges and possible billing errors. This information can help you prioritize your debt payments and prevent embarrassing situations with critical suppliers.
- Take advantage of purchase discounts. It is usually advantageous to pay a bill within the discount period, even if you have to borrow to do so. You should track the discounts in a separate account to give you a clear picture of how much cash you're saving.
Also, if a vendor doesn't offer early payment discounts, don't be afraid to ask up front for better payment terms.

Watch your inventory levels. A penny saved is a penny earned. Don't buy more stock at one time than is necessary. Pay attention to turnover ratios and inventory backlogs when deciding when and how much to order.
Always keep the lines of communication open with creditors. They, too, have money invested in your business and can be your best supporters, especially when times are tough and cash is tight.
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
