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
Fourth Graders Express themselves through Poetic Forms

ingredients found in Ancient Persia. Students used math skills to measure ingredients for their dough and added dried fruit and nuts. After the cafeteria staff baked the bread for us, we tasted bread that would have been eaten 2,500 years ago. Baking gave them a unique way to learn about Persian culture. Students discussed what a typical Persian diet might have been, based on the ingredients available. Students also theorized that the Persians must have had tough teeth based on the hardness of the bread.
