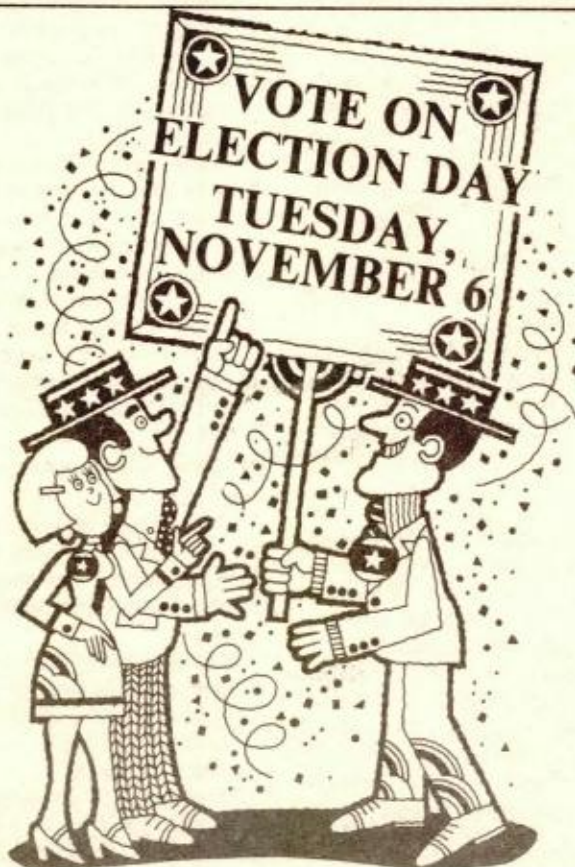

## Water Safety Questioned On Pipe Repair By-Pass

"You are telling the people of Charlestown to trust you. Well, I don't trust you," Charlestown resident Bernie Evers told City of Boston Water and Sewer officials in regards to the

safety of the water which will flow from temporary piping on Bunker Hill Street.

Presently, the Water and Sewer Commission plans to clean and cement-line the existing pipes on

Bunker Hill Street in order to facilitate increased water pressure to the area. However, in order to complete this project, it is necessary to utilize a temporary bypass line to service the residents while the main line is restored.

While no one is voicing opposition to the project, per se, concern has surfaced as to the possibility of health hazards resulting from utilizing the temporary piping, since the pipings' previous uses are unknown.

At a meeting held on Monday, October 29, 1984 in City Councillor Robert Travaglini's office, Bernie Evers who lives on St. Martin Street told Ronald Catena, Assistant Director of Administration and John Sullivan, Engineer, both of the Water and Sewer Commission, that he did not

## Water Safety Questioned On Pipe Repair By-Pass

think a "major city" such as Boston should allow the use of such piping for transporting water for the purpose of human consumption.

Evers told the officials that when he examined a pipe which was lying in front of his house, he discovered that the pipe was rusty. In fact, Evers stated that upon lifting the pipe off the ground, he was able to fill a two pound bag with rust from inside the pipe.

Evers also stated that there were no identifying marks or serial numbers on any of the pipes which he examined during the past week, which could determine where the pipes came from.

Engineer John Sullivan told Evers that after adequate chlorine flushing of the pipes, which would not only kill bacteria in the pipes but also remove all rust and dirt from within the pipes, water travelling through the pipes would not be unsafe for consumption.

Sullivan also stated that

once the pipes were hooked up to one another and the system closed, the pipes will "remain bacteria free."

The problem, however, remains as to where the pipes came from and what were their former uses.

According to Sullivan, the pipes are owned by the Brisco Company of Fall River who is the contractor for the project. The engineer could not, however, answer as to the former uses for the pipes.

"Why is it that you do not know where these pipes have been?" asked Representative Richard Voke of the officials.

Evers stated he did not

want his family to drink water from these pipes, since no one could guarantee the former use of the pipes.

"My main concern," stated Evers, "is we are talking about pipes carrying water to be used for human consumption."

While Sullivan stressed that the Commission was operating "by the book" as far as federal procedure and that the water would be safe for consumption, he emphasized that the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering (DEQE) was responsible for setting the standards and the matter would be addressed to their attention.

Sullivan stated that the chlorine has a 100 percent bacteria kill factor and while the federal government allows for "a certain amount (bacteria to remain), we strive for zero."

Evers stated that he felt that there should be legislation restricting the use of piping to be used to carry water for human consumption unless properly identified and inspected.

Sullivan agreed with Evers in that "idealistically new pipe should be used each time", but added "this is not practical."

Travaglini asked the officials, "Where do we go from here?" The coun-

cillor also asked if the officials could deliver some sort of guarantee to the residents as far as safety and procedure.

Sullivan stated that the matter would have to be brought to the attention of the DEQE, since they were the governing body responsible for the procedure which, according to Sullivan, has existed for 30 years.

As it stands, Sullivan

stated that he would contact DEQE and report his findings to both Travaglini and Voke. Meanwhile, Sullivan told Evers that the Commission takes three samples of water each day from eight parts of the city and tests for safety of the water and if anyone was to take a look at the conditions of the pipes existing under the streets of Boston, they would be shocked.

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## New Courses And New Interior At Jesuit Center

A wide range of courses and a sparkling fresh interior will greet the public this Fall as they enroll in the season's adult education program at the Jesuit Center, Sullivan Square, Charlestown. The Center is located in a 100 year old building which was originally a public school. Much in need of renovation, it was treated this summer to an internal face lift. Freshly painted walls, highly polished floors, new electric lighting, and artistic wall hangings await participants in the evening courses for adults which have been part of the Jesuit Center's work over the past 20 years. High above its front door is a

newly created sign designed by Sr. Mary Southard, an artist from Chicago. Started in 1948, the Center was for many years the home of St. Joseph Retreat League for Men. At its height, some 1200 men came for evenings of prayer and spiritual conferences.

Since Vatican II, the Center each year offers courses in contemporary religious, psychological, historical, and social questions. Personal enrichment and understanding of contemporary issues are the goal of these courses, covering such topics as Psychogenesis, Women in the Hebrew Scriptures, The Road Less Traveled, A Search for Catholic Roots,

and So Who Wants To Be Perfect? Among the instructors are David M. Thorp, Director of Charismatic Renewal Services for the Boston Archdiocese, Carol A. Klein, Pastoral Assistant at the Family Life Apostolate, Michael

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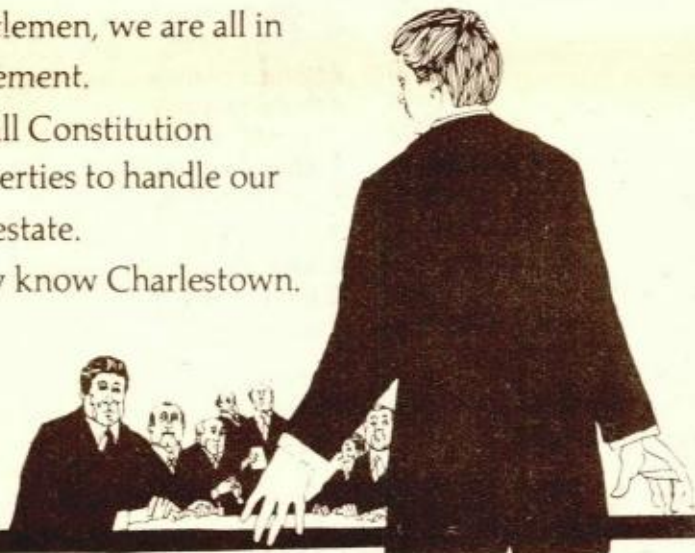

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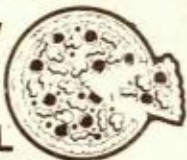

## Phipps Street Burying Grounds To Be Featured In Documentary

When Norita Lee was a little girl in Charlestown, the historic Phipps Street Burying Ground was considered a fun place to play amid the antique tombstones bearing the names of founding fathers and mothers... Austin... Lawrence... Parker... Russell... Tufts... and Phipps for whom the cemetery was named.

"When we were growing up in Charlestown, my sisters and I used...and probably abused...this and other historic sites in town. We were much too young to realize the important role Charlestown played in the founding of this country...or that when we abused these sites we abused history," stated Lee.

Lee, now a civic-minded communications specialist who still calls Charlestown

"home", is certainly making her amends by helping to focus attention on the natural erosion and vandalism in the cemetery and the need to return it to "Townie pride".

She is the narrator of a documentary on Phipps which has been produced in cooperation with the Charlestown Preservation Society, the Charlestown Historical Society and a number of Charlestown residents intimately involved in restoration, all of whom have helped to make "A Chapter in Charlestown History." Also involved in the production is Robin Gilbert, community access coordinator for Charlestown from the Boston Community Access and Programming Foundation which operates BNN-TV, Cable Channel A3, Boston Neighborhood

Network.

The plight of the 353 year old Phipps site is common in many cemeteries today where vandals have overturned stones and treated the burying grounds with disrespect.

The documentary will be shown on the Boston Neighborhood Network, BNN-TV, Cable Channel A3, on Friday evening, November 9, 1984 at 7:00 p.m.

The oldest remaining tombstone, among over 100 from the 17th Century, is that of Maude Russell, dated 1652.

Headstones are simple in design and usually feature death's heads and angels or classical urns and willows.

Appearing in the documentary to appeal for public support in restoring historic cemeteries for future generations are:

Norita Lee of Norita Lee Communications who lives on Mystic Street with husband, Bruce of WEEI radio, and has served on the board of the Preservation Society; Tom Cunha of Charlestown, a neighbor to the burying ground, who talks about his childhood visits to the cemetery, especially on Halloween; Mike Cornish, Association of Gravestones Studies, who talks about the various stone carvings and stone cutters; Jim Bradley of Charlestown, also from the Massachusetts Historical Commission, who speaks about vandalism and its damage; Carol Bratley of Charlestown, trustee of the Charlestown Preservation Society, who talks of early efforts to preserve the cemetery; Kathryn Downing, president of the Charlestown Preservation Society, who explains why she moved to Charlestown; Joe Barnes of Charlestown, Deputy Commissioner of Boston Parks and Recreation Department, who talks about what his department is doing for preservation and how residents can do their share.

The documentary is being offered to other cable community access channels in the Greater Boston area and to interested organizations for showing. Ms. Lee can be reached at 267-0203.

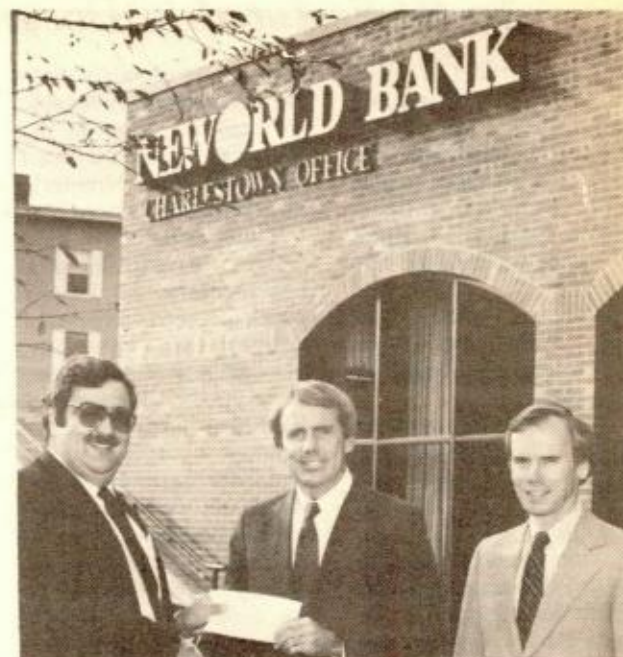

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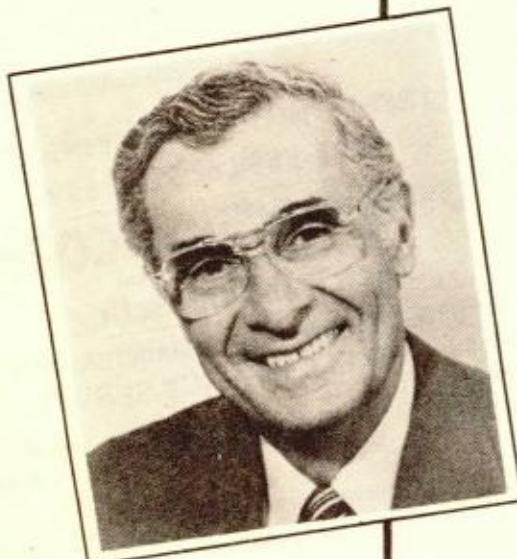
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# An Open Letter from Ray Shamie



October, 1984

Dear Friend:

Public life is new to me.

My first sixty years were spent as a private citizen. As a husband and father and grandfather. As a pilot during World War II. As a founder of two businesses. As an employer of hundreds of Massachusetts residents. And as an American who was grateful to his country for the opportunities it had given him.

Like millions of Americans, I come from a modest background. My parents were both immigrants, who had been brought as children to America, the land of hope and dreams. When I was 16, my father died, and I had to go to work mopping floors in order to support my family.

Those were the Depression years, and I was growing up in Brooklyn -- a tough time and a tough place for a young kid starting out in life.

But I had a few things going for me. I married a wonderful girl, who has been my closest friend for 42 years. I had some big dreams, and I was willing to take chances and work long hours to make them come true. I moved to Massachusetts, a state that not only cherishes its great beauty, but encourages people to build great futures for themselves and their children.

But above all, I lived in the United States, a land of freedom and opportunity -- even for a poor kid from Brooklyn, whose family spoke English with an accent.

In my sixty years as a private citizen, I learned a few things. I learned about experience and maturity, and how to get a job done without excuses. I learned how to balance budgets and cut waste and create jobs. I learned that people can run their own lives and spend their own money better than the government can do it for them.

But one thing I didn't learn was how to be a politician. I didn't learn how to be slick, or to flip-flop, or to duck issues. So now that I'm a candidate, I continue to do what I've always done: when I'm asked a question, I answer it. When I need more information, I make it my business to learn. When I speak, I tell the truth.

The Founding Fathers didn't envision a Senate filled with career politicians. They expected Senators to be people who had achieved something in life -- people who could bring a record of experience to the governance of America.

I'd like to take my experience to Washington. I want to be sure that we continue to preserve the values and freedoms that have always made America a beacon of hope to the world. And I want to know that our children and grandchildren will find the same opportunities waiting for them that I found waiting for me.

Please stand with me. And on November 6, please give me your support.
