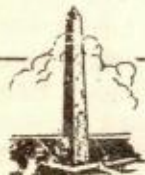

O'Shea Named Interim President At Bunker Hill Community College

Anne Hyde, chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Bunker Hill Community College, announced that the Board has accepted the resignation of the college's President Charles E. Stikes effective immediately. Hyde indicated

that Stikes resigned last Thursday for personal reasons.

Stikes has been president of Bunker Hill Community College since October 1992.

Hyde also announced that the board has asked

Maurice F. "Mon" O'Shea of Charlestown, current vice president of Academic and Student Affairs, to serve as Interim President. O'Shea will cut short his sabbatical leave to assume the post.

In the next few months the board will initiate a search for a permanent replacement.

Senate President Bulger Entertains And Enlightens At Sunday Lecture

A standing-room-only crowd packed the function room at the Charlestown Armed Services YMCA on Sept. 24 as Senate President William Bulger brought his wit and wisdom to town as the first speaker in the "Life In The City" lecture series.

Bulger recalled some political names in Charlestown's past - Dave Powers, Gerard Doherty and Tony Scalli. He noted that Charlestown is the "sister city" to South Boston, adding that "the people are at their best when they are struggling." He spoke of his Charlestown connection - his mother came from Corey Street before the housing development was built.

He related some of the history of the Irish in Boston politics, noting that the famine in Ireland of 150 years ago had much to do with the shaping of politics here in Boston.

Bulger stated that "politics is fun . . . it's like being in the front box at a game."

He talked about the decree of 22 years ago relative to school desegrega-

tion. Bulger said that there was more openness and generosity before that decree came down. He added that it had good social purpose but it "singled out those of modest means" and was "destabilizing."

Questions Bulger fielded from the audience included those on Congress, Colin Powell for president, what newspapers he read (he said the Patriot) and on the UMass presidency, he said "intriguing!"

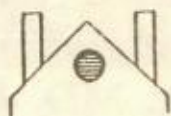

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USS Cassin Young 10th Annual Sea Trials Honor Naval Veterans As 'A Grateful Nation Remembers'

USS Cassin Young (DD-793) will get underway on Saturday, Oct. 7 at 10 a.m. for the 10th annual USS Cassin Young Commemorative Sea Trials. Commissioned in 1943, the Fletcher Class destroyer served in the South Pacific during World War II and in the Korean Conflict.

In the US Navy, commissioned ships are taken out on Sea Trials prior to deployment in order to test the ship's seaworthiness. USS Cassin Young, now de-commissioned and a museum ship maintained by the National Park Service, is taken out on a Commemorative Sea Trial annually to recognize the many people who are affiliated with the ship's pre-

servation and history.

This year, the Sea Trials will honor the conclusion of World War II as "A Grateful Nation Remembers," the Navy's 220th birthday, and will acknowledge the many contributions of the Cassin Young volunteers, many of whom served aboard USS Cassin Young while she was on active duty.

"We are proud at the National Park Service to have the opportunity to pay tribute to people who served our country during a time of conflict," said John Burchill, superintendent, Boston National Historical Park.

Visitors can view the ship from Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard as

she is tugged out to Castle Island and back to the Navy Yard. From the pier, visitors can also hear former US Naval personnel address invited guests about the contributions made by many Americans in the fight for peace during World War II.

Invited guests on board the ship will be former Congressional Medal of Honor recipients, active duty personnel and the Cassin Young volunteers who help the National Park Service maintain the ship throughout the year.

Named for Cmdr. Cassin Young, who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his brave action at Pearl Harbor on

Dec. 7, 1941, the destroyer now serves as a permanent exhibit in Boston National Historical Park. Open year-round for visitors, she symbolized the Navy Yard's 174 years of shipbuilding and repair and commemorates the tens of thousands of men and women who worked at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

USS Cassin Young was de-commissioned in May 1946 and then recommissioned in Sept. 1951 at the outbreak of the Korean Conflict to carry out various duties in Atlantic and Mediterranean waters. She was de-commissioned again in April 1960.

IF YOU WANT TO READ THE WHOLE THING!

When you buy a house, you're asked to sign an amazing number of documents, especially if you're obtaining a mortgage. While it may seem prudent to read all of these papers before signing, it may not be practical to do this at the settlement. If you're the type who really does have to read everything first, we have some suggestions.

In an ideal world, the settlement attorney would have everything ready for your perusal several days before the big event. What often happens, however, is the lender delivers the paperwork to the settlement office at the last minute — sometimes later than that. If you insist on reading everything, including all fine print, you'll probably draw some serious groans from the others at the table. One solution is to request copies of all standard forms a week before settlement, since most of the papers are boilerplate. Then at settlement, you just check to ensure the blanks were correctly filled in.

cations and other patriotic observances.

He stated that though the war was over 50 years ago, there is still fighting and bombing in Europe. He said: "W.W. II didn't bring us peace, and some of our boys are still over there."

"The real heroes," MacGillivray noted, "were those killed in action and left in Europe and the South Pacific and the other areas of World War II whose graves are marked with white crosses."

MacGillivray said he was tired of hearing of the criticism of President Harry Truman for ordering the atomic bombing of Japan. He said there would have been no need for the dropping of the atomic bomb if

there were no Pearl Harbor, Corregidor, the Bataan Death March and the suicidal defense by the Japanese as the Americans brought the war close to Japan. "Truman should be praised," stated MacGillivray, "for ordering the dropping of the atomic bomb which saved hundreds of thousands of American G.I.'s."

He concluded by saying: "Fifty years has still not brought us peace in the world and, as we well know, the price of peace is very high as is seen by the 'white crosses of freedom.'"

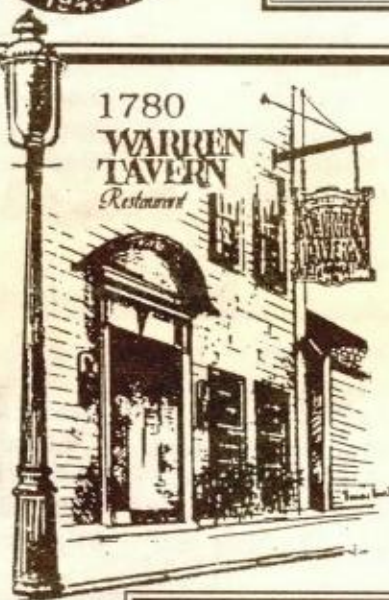

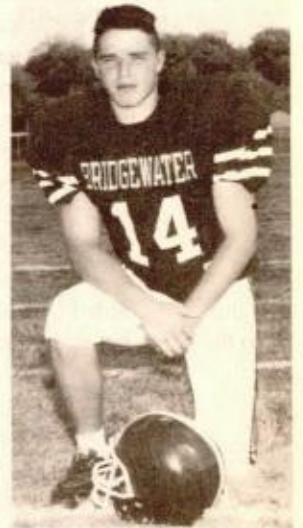

Money Matters

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TIPS AND TAX REPORTING

If you own or manage a restaurant or other business where employees receive tips, you should know about a new voluntary IRS program. It's called Tip Rate Alternative Commitment (TRAC), and it's a way to avoid an IRS audit of your tip income. Here's how it works.

You commit to do three things:

- Set up a program to train all new employees and retrain existing employees on their tip reporting requirements. The training must be held quarterly.
- Set up procedures to prepare a monthly written report of both cash and credit card tips for each tipped employee.
- Promise to maintain all required records, file all returns and deposit all taxes in a timely manner.

In return, the IRS promises not to conduct an audit of your business's tip income. However, the IRS may still adjust the payroll taxes you owe if it finds employees have underreported their tip income.

The new program does not change the current rules - it's just an incentive to businesses to improve their tip reporting procedures. At present, employees receiving more than \$20 of tips in a month must report the total amount to their employer in writing by the 10th day of the following month. The employer withholds income tax and FICA from the employee on the reported amount and must pay the employer's matching share of FICA taxes. Tips of less than \$20 per month need not be reported and are exempt from FICA taxes, although the employee must still declare them as wages and pay income taxes on them.

If your business has to report tip income, it may be worth learning more about the new program. Contact our office if you'd like more information.
