

Gay Captures Democratic Nomination In Governor's Council Race

Somerville neighbor Dorothy Kelly Gay placed first in the seven-person race for Governor's Council in the Sixth District. In an unofficial tally of the district, which covers 19 cities and towns including Charlestown, Gay received 20,285 votes.

The tally put the other six contenders in the following order:

Meeting Set On Medford Street Landfill Transport Facility

by Kathy Giordano Parties involved in the controversial Boston Harbor Cleanup Project landfill tranport facility, scheduled to open at the Charlestown Marine Park, 425 Medford St., will attend a Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 24 in Bishop Lawton Hall, St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill St.

Expected to be present are representatives from Hamilton Realty, owners of the property that formerly housed the Domino Sugar

refinery; J.M. Cashman Inc., contracted transport company; Massachusetts Water Resources Authority; Massport; Boston Marine Terminal which includes Boston Sand & Gravel and Trimount Bituminous Produces Co.; Boston Environmental Department; and Boston Inspectional Services Department; along with community residents, business persons and political leaders.

The community first heard of the transport facility at the September Neighborhood Council meeting

when Alan Perrault of J.M. Cashman announced that his company was contracted by MWRA to transport landfill from Deer Island to the Charlestown site to be trucked to areas throughout the region. Perrault stated at that time that barges would be used to carry the dirt from the island to the former sugar refinery. He announced that an average of 400 truck trips would be generated by the facility each day to transport the material.

Harborpark Day 1992 To Be Held Sunday, Sept. 20

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn has announced that the city's eighth annual Harborpark Day celebration, sponsored by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, will be held on Sunday, Sept. 20, from noon to 6 p.m. at Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Mayor Flynn said: "Harborpark Day is our way to welcome residents as well as visitors to our historic waterfront to show them what the waterfront contributes to our city. We look forward once again to making this a day for family entertainment.

As in past years, the Harborpark Day celebration will be held in conjunction with the annual "Chowdafest," sponsored by Horizons For Youth, a nonprofit organization that provides outdoor education, counselling and camping programs for inner-city

children in need. Twenty Boston-area restaurants will prepare over 1,500 gallons of clam chowder to compete for the 1992 "Chowda Champ" title as chowder aficionados go from booth to booth tasting the various offerings and voting for their favorite chowder. The admission fee for visitors is \$6 for adults and \$3 for senior citizens and children under 12. All proceeds will be used to support Horizons For Youth.



ebration also offers many



announced this week that the authority has delayed plans to open a personnel transfer site on the adjacent waterfront site, formerly the Revere Sugan refinery, until the spring of 1993. This facility would bring over 300 automobiles into Charlestown by personnel who will be transported by ferry to Deer Island to work on the clean-up operation of the harbor.

Members of the Neighborhood Council met with Perrault last week to request that Cashman delay his operation in Charlestown until after the scheduled Sept. 24 public meeting. Perrault agreed to the council members' request, but informed them that the company is within its legal right to operate at the site.

Trucks have been seen leaving the former Amstar/ Domino Sugar refinery site since that meeting. After in-

vestigating the origin of these trucks, it was learned that the Reddish Hauling Co., a tenant at the site for the past two years, has been transporting "gravel and virgin clay," according to the company's principal Paul Reddish. He further stated that his trucking company is not currently working for Cashman, but would submit a bid to haul the landfill from the site.

Reddish said that an average of 70 to 75 trucks leave the Medford Street facility each day as part of his ope-ration. "This has been going on for a couple of years," he added. "We try to be good neighbors. My door is always open for anyone who would like to see what's taking place here."

The community is welcome to attend the public meeting and participate in discussions on the planned landfill transport facility.



MWRA Responds **To Birmingham Letter**

Dear Sen. Birmingham:

This letter is in response to questions raised during your recent meeting with Michael Ralph and Brian Leahy regarding the use of the former Domino Sugar site in Charlestown by the contractor, J.M. Cashman, Inc. We would like to clarify the MWRA's (Massachusetts Water Resources Authority) position and our knowledge of the facts to date.

First, it should be clearly understood that the MWRA's contract with J.M. Cashman requires that the contractor take all responsibility for removal and final distribution of the clean fill from Deer Island. Pursuant to that responsibility, the contractor negotiated a private business arrangement with the owners of the site, and pursued all applicable permits privately. The MWRA did not have a role in either the selection of the site, or the contractor's process to obtain a lease. We regret that the neighborhood council was not directly informed of the contractor's arrangements with the property owners.

The following information addresses several questions which have been raised:

(1) J.M. Cashman has been the successful bidder on many contracts related to the construction at Deer Island. The total value of the 10 contracts awarded to date is over \$186 million. As with any contract, the contractor is responsible for including sufficient funds to meet all of his responsibilities under the contract within the bid price.

(2) It is our understanding that the contractor has obtained all applicable permits for operations at the former Domino Sugar site, and that the proposed use is consistent with current zoning regulations. Further information on permits may be obtained from the contractor.

(3) It is our understanding that the contractor may plan to use this site for other projects besides MWRA contracts. For this and many other reasons, we believe it is inappropriate for the MWRA's ratepayers to effectively subsidize the contractor's operation by providing additional funding for activities unrelated to this contract.

(4) There is a fundamental difference between Cashman's relationship with Charlestown, and the MWRA's relationship with its neighbors in Quincy. In Quincy, the MWRA sited both its residuals processing facility and construction staging area for the Deer Island project at the former General Dynamics Shipyard property, which the Authority purchased. Consequently, the Authority entered into certain agreements with the City of Quincy to mitigate the impacts of the operation of these facilities. Similar agreements were made with Charlestown regarding the planned operations at the former Revere Sugar site, where the MWRA leases space. Again, in this instance it was the contractor's responsibility to obtain a location for his operation, and the MWRA did not select the Charlestown site. Relevant paragraphs of the Memoranda of Understanding between the MWRA and the City of Quincy and the Town of Braintree are enclosed.

(5) There has been some confusion between the MWRA's planned use of the former Revere Sugar site for personnel ferry operations and Cashman's use of the Domino Sugar site. Most recently, the Authority has had very positive discussions with the neighborhood council and Massport regarding landscaping at the personnel ferry site, which we believe reflects our commitment to working with the community. There is no relationship between the MWRA's use of the Revere Sugar site, and Cashman's activities at Domino Sugar, except that the recently announced delay in the opening of the personnel ferry site means fewer vehicles will be using local roadways.

(6) We have no direct knowledge of the terms of Cashman's lease with the owners of the Domino Sugar site. However, as was discussed at the recent neighborhood council meeting, we believe Cashman is paying approximately



Shipwrights and riggers from the Naval Historical Center Detachment Boston uncovered dozens of old coins under the lower mainmast of "Old Ironsides" when they removed the ship's 12-ton mast section on Sept. 16.

The mast removal is part of the ongoing 18-month "Drydocking & Inspection" (D&I) of USS Constitution which began on July 17. Cmdr. Richard B. Amirault, the 63rd commanding officer of USS Constitution, presided over the "unstepping" or removal of the mast.

Placing coins under a mast before it is installed is a centuries-old maritime tradition, intended to bring good luck to those depositing the coins.

Folklore has it that the

tradition was begun hundreds of years ago: superstitious sailors would put the coins under the mast so that if the ship sank, the sailors would have money to pay the ferryman to cross the River Styx.

today, but in a slightly different fashion. Coins are still placed under the new masts of today's naval ships, but the metal masts are then welded to a topside platform rather than "stepped" into a wooden keelson.

Coins found under Constitution's mainmast included pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters dating to almost every decade in the ship's history.

The oldest coin, an American penny dated 1797, the year Constitution was launched, was placed under



Good Luck Coins Uncovered Beneath Masts Of 'Old Ironsides'

the mast in November 1979 when the mainmast was repaired. The coin was donated by the late Joseph Kent. a Charlestown resident and owner of the Badger Coin Shop, who put the coin there himself in 1979.

Some of the coins were imbedded in the bottom of the wooden mast, due to the incredible weight of the mast section. The lower mainmast weighs 12 tons, and is more than 104 feet long.

Coins were also uncovered beneath the mizzenmast and the foremast, both removed recently.

Fifty-six coins and one rapid transit token were found under the mizzenmast. The face value of the coins was \$1.79, and the oldest was a 1798 penny.

Under the foremast, 46 coins were discovered, with a total face value of \$3.55. The oldest coins were a Spanish piece of eight and a 1797 penny.

All three of Constitution's masts will be repaired during the D&I. Three new lower masts and three new

topmasts are being manufactured in the Navy Yard by the Naval Historical Center Detachment Boston. Each mast consists of three pieces. The new masts will be "stepped" or installed after the ship leaves dry dock at the end of 1993.

USS Constitution is remaining open for tours throughout the D&I, which continues through the end of 1993. U.S. Navy sailors

continue to give guided tours of the ship's spar deck from 9:30 a.m. to 3:50 p.m. every day. Self-guided tours of the spar deck are available from 3:50 p.m. to sunset.

The ship will enter Dry Dock 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard on Sept. 25 where she will stay for approximately 13 months. The D&I entails some routine repairs and a thorough in-

spection to prepare the ship for her Bicentennial commemoration in 1997, expected to be a national celebration

The Naval Historical Center Detachment Boston is the maintenance and repair operation for USS Constitution, which is maintained by the U.S. Navy. "Old Ironsides" is the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world.


