Variety Of Issues Keeps Charlestown Neighborhood Council Busy
by Lynn Peters Just more than half of the full 21 -member Charlestown Neighborhood Council sorted through nearly a half-dozen presentations, and its usual order of committee reports and old and new business at the May 5 meeting. Attending the monthly meeting at the Knights of Columbus Hall were Chairman Peter Looney, Vice Chairmen Tom Cunha and Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, and members John Dillon, Jim Conway, Bill McCabe, John Iacoi, David Whelan, Edna Kelly, Don Haska and Billy Galvin.

Brian Keating of the Healthy Charlestown Coalition's Violence Prevention focus group told the council that May has been designated Violence Prevention Month in the com-
munity. He presented a calendar of events taking place across Charlestown that address and encourage nonviolence.
"As a response to the Healthy Charlestown needs assessment, there showed alarming statistics that children here are disproportionately affected directly or indirectly by violence," said Keating, the service and development coordinator of the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force.

Keating said that this month's events include activities at the Boys \& Girls Club, Community Centers, and local businesses, such as Artisans in the Bunker Hill Mall.

Anne Galbraith of the Mass. Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) stirred council members with a suggestion to create ap-
proximately 140 more parking spaces in the Sullivan Square T station area near Beacham and Alford streets.
"It is only a plan on the back of a napkin right now," Galbraith said of an MBTA proactive approach to Charlestown complaints that it serves as a parking lot for commuters. "We're looking for immediate reactions, positive or negative," she said, noting a "severe parking shortage throughout our system."

But many council members did not greet the suggestion warmly.
"We're not here to solve the problems of T commuters," said Billy Galvin. "You're creating a problem for us."

Council members raised several concerns with (continued on page 8)

## Final Plans In Place For Weekend House Tours

Final preparations are set for this weekend's Candlelight House Tour on Friday evening, May 17, and Saturday's House and Trolley Tour, May 18, according to Jan Mastrocola, the Preservation Society's chairperson of the event. "We're excited about our first Candlelight House Tour. And we're grateful to St. John's Parish and its members for inviting us to begin our evening tour with them. We're also pleased that trolleys will be available to take visitors on the Saturday House Tour route."
The Candlelight Tour
begins Friday evening at 6:30 p.m. at St. John's Church on Devens Street, a most appropriate starting place because of the recent refurbishments made to this historic building that dates back to 1840 . The Saturday House and Trolley Tour begins at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. at the Schoolhouse at the Monument, the former Charlestown High School that dates back to the early 1900s, and has been renovated into apartments in the past 10 years.
Each tour will involve a different group of homes, and visitors will be able to see first-hand the care that
has gone into the restoration and renovation of each of these early homes. And each tour will be followed by a reception for House Tour visitors.

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## Variety Of Issues Keep Neighborhood Council Members Busy

(continued from page 1) Galbraith, including: how more parking close to the city might invite more commuters to an already congested area; already high asthma rates in Charlestown; the need for city and state agencies to coordinate an overall redesign of the dangerous Sullivan Square traffic flow; that in previous discussions, the community had not wanted to add T parking; and that the MBTA has yet to respond to dated Charlestown requests for improved service.

Other council members, including John Iacoi, stated the need to investigate suggestions. "People are going to come into the city no matter what," he said, "and we need a parking solution."
"It seems that people are not reacting positively," Galbraith said. "The MBTA is not going to come in and make enemies over 140 parking spaces. We thought it would help relieve parking problems."
"You're seeing a little animosity here," Looney said to Galbraith. "We still don't have a Main Street bus on Sundays."

In a calmer presentation, Charlie Cummings
and Tony Gentile of the Flatley Co. proposed plans to remove the old Brockway Smith building on Medford Street and redevelop it for a new tenant who would be distributing medical products.

Gentile said the 208,000-square-foot building and its grounds have posed a difficult marketing situation. "We waited very patiently for the right tenant to come along," Gentile said, "and we believe we have a highquality tenant."

Products would be similar to those found in drug stores; large quantities of items needed by area hospitals and nursing homes. Parking for approximately 100 employees, including 55 to 75 new hires, would be provided with the area currently accommodating 260 parking spaces. Box trailer trucks would bring supplies in, and smaller vans would move goods off site, for a total of between 30 and 60 trips per day.
Artist renderings of the property showed a complement to abutting Schrafft Center. "It almost looks like a mini-Schraff's," Gentile said.

A public meeting through the council's Development Committee will
be scheduled in the near future to address concerns about the project.
Charlestown resident and community cable-access producer Kevin Burke presented the council with basic information on the upcoming franchise renewal between the city of Boston and the cable company. Burke said a group of producers were asking the city to intervene to ensure community access to local stations.
The 15 -year-old contract called for six neighborhood access centers and to train local young residents through the Boston Neighborhood Network. To date only one access center exists and the network provides training for area university students. Burke also said that as a community producer he has no voting rights at the board level.

The council's Executive Committee had agreed to send a letter in support of the local producers late last month to be in time for a single scheduled public hearing. Burke said that the City Council has recently agreed to hold hearings about the issue.
William Bono's proposal to hold a three-day car-
nival for children under 12 in the Clarence R. Edwards School parking lot over Bunker Hill Day weekend was tabled by the council until next year. Council members said that there was not enough time for proper community input, that impacts on the Bunker Hill Day Parade had not been discussed and that there were parking problems to be considered. Tom Cunha was also concemed that the community had not agreed to the 1993 local Kiwanis Club proposal for a camival fundraiser
In committee reports, David Whelan, who chaired two Precinct 2 meetings on the Harvard-Kent School tot lot construction by City Year, recommended that the council accept the proposal as presented with the provision that all work be complete before Saturday, June 15.

Public Safety Committee Co-Chair Bill McCabe reported that at the April 9 meeting, there was community opposition to the Orchard Hill Condominium developer's request to relocate the traffic signal at the Doherty Park on Bunker Hill Street. The committee voted to recommend to the council that the light not be removed or relocated.

Regarding another issue at that meeting, McCabe said that residents were es pecially concerned about the Rutherford Avenue, Gilmore Bridge and Austin Street intersections. With an accompanying written report, McCabe said the
city's traffic commission should be formally notified to discuss remedies. McCabe noted dangerous pedestrian crossings and the inability of emergency vehicles to move along Rutherford Avenue during the morning commute.

Committee Co -Chairman John Dillon also reported that residents seek enforcement of the Chelsea and Warren streets traffic regulations, and there has been requests for a police presence in the Doherty Park this summer.

Basic Services Committee Chairman Bill Galvin reported the committee's recommendation to endorse Gabriele's three licensing requests. The Navy Yard eatery is seeking to be able to serve alcohol without food, to add cordials to their menu and to have prerecorded music and television entertainment. The council voted approval of the committee's recommendation.
Galvin also reported that the Bill Rawls proposal to put a tourist trolley on a barge in Boston Harbor had been given a one-year tentative approval by the Department of Environmental Protection to operate eight trips seven days per week to Dry Dock 5 . The council approved the Basic Service Committee's recommendation to grant a similar one-year trial approval.

Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha recommended that the council endorse the proposal to develop 16 condo-
minium units and a refaced liquor store in Thompson Square with satisfactory delivery schedules and continued community review. The council voted approval. A committee meeting with abutters and the Thompson Square Condominium developers will be held on May 23.
Revisiting the improper demolition of 51 Park St., Looney said that the Historical Landmark Commission's new law for a twoyear developing moratorium was in place and referred to the city's Inspectional Services Department.
Last month the council voted to seek waiving the moratorium as it negatively impacted the community and not the violating developer. The law calls for a fence to be put around the property with no building for two years when a building older than 50 years was demolished without being properly researched for its historical value. The developer of Charlestown's 51 Park St. is the first to violate the Commission's new ordinance.
Looney also reported that, the Boston Redevelopment Authority is having no discussions about developing the former H.P. Hood dairy on Rutherford Avenue into a new stadium for the Red Sox.

## Hundreds Remember Victims Of Murder At Candlelight Vigil

As each person entered St. Catherine of Siena Church on Sunday, April 28, he or she was presented with a green carnation and a candle, with the bagpipe music of Pat McClellan filling the air outside the church and Tony Romeo at the piano welcomed participants inside.
This was the annual Candlelight Vigil, sponsored by the CHarlestown After Murder Program (CH.A.M.P.) and affords an opportunity for people to come together, share their grief at the loss of a loved one or friend, and gather strength from people who spend this time at the vigil just because they care.

The vigil consisted of prayers, reading of the scripture, several speakers and musical selections by soloist Rhonda Monroe, whose magnificent voice echoed throughout the church. Readings were done by Michael MacDonald, Helen Kerns and De-
bra Kerns Maher.

CH.A.M.P. Co-chairmen Pam Enos and Sandy King welcomed the congregation. King asked for a special prayer for Patrick Nee who was killed just last fall. She also noted that her son, Chris, killed in 1986 , would have celebrated his 30th birthday on this day.

Enos extended her thanks, particularly making note of those people who have not been personally touched by murder and come out of their goodness to support those who have.

King stated that the tiny good thing that has come out of the murders in the community is the good deeds people have done. As she introduced St. Catherine's pastor, Father Ron Coyne, she praised him for opening the parish to the families of those who have lost a loved one.
Father Coyne said that he has met many

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wonderful people in his 23 years as a priest, and among those who have touched his life are the people from CH.A.M.P. He went on to say that although he doesn't know their pain, he is sensitive to them, adding that hearing their stories makes him feel very vulnerable. He added that St . Catherine's will continue to be the home of CH.A.M.P. even after he leaves in August.

In his prayer, Father Coyne asked that people of the town continue to work together for "justice, peace and compassion
setting an example for others so that such pain is never brought into the life of anyone else."
During the service, family members of murder victims shared thoughts with the gathering. Terry Titcomb, whose son "Albie" was killed 15 months ago read a letter from a friend to Albie's special lady Mary Johnson. Karen Burns read a letter her mother wrote in 1978, following the death of Mark Burns in which was a plea to stop the violence and vengeance. And Enos read a poem by the mother of Terry Burhoe who was stabbed over 100 times and killed in 1981 when she was only 14 and, her mother noted, "the killer is still walking around.
Boston Police Department Area A Community Service Officer Jim McNamara introduced the winners of this year's CH.A.M.P. Essay Contest which is held annually with the cooperation of Charlestown Catholic Elementary School. This year's topic was "respect."
McNamara called each of the three winners to the lectern to read their essay and awarded them prizes. The third place winner was Ashley Carr, who had written
"keep loving and caring." Second place winner Raymond Ortiz told the gathering that Charlestown should be respected. "We can all make a difference - if we just try" were the sentiments expressed by first-place winner Sherina Pumell. She added, "There is a lot of violence and it should stop."

McNamara praised each entry in the contest, noting that "there were no losers in the contest as each essay came from the heart."
Enos and King asked that everyone come to the altar with their candle and as it was lighted to say the name of the loved one or friend that they particularly remember during this service. As each name was said or read, Matthew King tolled the brass school bell.
Participants then gathered on the steps of the church as bouquets of balloons, each carrying the name of a victim of murder, were released into the late aftemoon breeze. Serving as junior hostesses for the vigil were Lisa Bowers, Colleen Hoell and Erin McCallum. Among the guests were Boston Police Commissioner Paul Evans, Area A Captain Ron Conway, Boston City Councillors Peggy Davis-Mullen and Diane Modica and Charlestown Neighborhood Council Chairman and CHarlestown Against Drugs Chairman Peter Looney.

RECENT COURT CASE AFFECTS INTRA-FAMILY LOANS
A common strategy for reducing estate taxes is to make annual lifetime gifts to your heirs. You can make yearly tax-free gifts of up to $\$ 10,000$ per recipient - $\$ 20,000$ if your spouse joins in making the gifts.

A technique to get more money into the hands of heirs sooner has been to make loans of larger sums, and to cancel (or "forgive") a portion of the principal equal to the tax-free gift amount of $\$ 10,000$ (or $\$ 20,000$ ) each year. But a recent Tax Court case casts a shadow on this technique.

Miller v. Commissioner
The issue in the Miller case was whether Mrs. Miller made loans or gifts when she transferred $\$ 100,000$ to each of her two sons. Each son signed an unsecured, non-interest-bearing note, and each note was due on demand or at the end of three years. Within the three-year period, Mrs. Miller forgave portions of both notes, and one son made a $\$ 15,000$ repayment. At the end of the three years, Mrs. Miller made no demand for payment and simply forgave the remaining principal over the next several years.

The Tax Court ruled that Mrs. Miller's transfers were gifts. Although both of Mrs. Miller's sons executed notes, and one made a substantial payment, the Court found that these two factors alone were not sufficient to indicate that the transfers were bona fide loans. Also significant was the fact that the Court took into account Mrs. Miller's intent, through systematic forgiveness, not to seek repayment. The Tax Court had ruled in earlier, similar cases that the transferee's intent to forgive loans was not relevant.
The implication of the Miller case is that even if a transfer has some of the traditional characteristics of a loan, the IRS might attempt to challenge the validity of a debt if the principal is systematically forgiven. To help avoid a gift tax problem on such transfers, everything should be in writing, with careful documentation that clearly shows the transfer is intended to be a loan rather than a gift. ## Voke Recognized For Infant Mortality Work

Commenting that "children in Mass. are healthier now because of this program Majority Leader Voke has championed for the past 10 years," Mass. Department of Health Commissioner David Mulligan recognized Rep. Richard Voke at a recent news conference celebrating the tenth anniversary of the Healthy Start Program.

Reacting to news that the state's infant mortality rate has dropped to its lowest level ever, Voke was obviously very pleased.
"No thought could be greater than knowing that thousands of children and their mothers are enjoying better, healthier lives thanks to Healthy Start and other programs targeting infant mortality and low birthweight," said Voke, the author of the Healthy Start program.

Initiated by Voke as a means to provide uninsured pregnant women with access to vital prenatal, delivery and post-partum services, Healthy Start has become a national model. Since Healthy Start's in-
ception 10 years ago, infant mortality rates in Mass. have dropped 34 percent to $6.0 / 1000$ (deaths per live births). The state's rate is 24 percent lower than the national rate of $7.9 / 1000$. Only the state of Washington has a better infant mortality rate than Mass.
"Early and regular prenatal care are key factors in preventing low birthweight and infant mortality. Yet, uninsured pregnant women cannot get these needs met without the appropriate health coverage. That is where Healthy Start has stepped in and been a great success," added Voke, while noting that over 67,000 pregnant women have been aided by the program since 1985.

In addition to strengthening children and their families, reports from the Mass. Department of Public Health also suggest that taxpayers are better off. According to the agency overseeing infant mortality efforts, each low birthweight baby prevented saves $\$ 35,000$ in Medicaid costs in the baby's first

month of life alone,
"Prevention programs not only make fiscal sense but improve the quality of life for some of the state's most needy residents," cormmented Mulligan, under whose direction DPH has effectively targeted numerous public health programs to improve the health status of all the commonwealth's residents.
"Saving lives and saving money is a winning
combination. While we can cheer a program like Healthy Start, we cannot lose sight of the fact that kids everywhere remain at risk of so many factors. It is therefore incumbent upon us all to find the will and the way to continue to develop and support programs which can help our kids build better personal foundations for their future growth and that of our society," concluded Voke.
