## Shakespeare In The Park At The Warren-Prescott School

"Oh brave new world, that has such people in it!" This famous line from Shakespeare's The Tempest could also have been uttered by Tina FabianoChampagne's third grade class at the Warren-Prescott School, preparing for a production of The Tempest on Oct. 28.
On Oct. 3, they were visited by professional Shakespeare director Steve Maler of New York. Maler's credits include being the artistic director of Shakespeare on the Common here in Boston and directing many other Shakespeare productions in New York, Japan
and around the world. Maler used his talents to show the children how to bring the words on the page alive. He began by answering questions about Shakespeare and acting. He then had the children explain the story and used their ideas to create the first scene of the play. The play begins with a storm conjured by the wizard Prospero to cause a shipwreck and bring the sailors to his island.

Under Maler's direction, the children became the ship, the sailors and even the ocean, beginning with gentle whispering wave noises and then how-
ling like a storm. "He had a way with the children that naturally unleashed their imaginations," said Fabiano-Champagne.

Pat Simpson, the coordinator of the event, was proud the school was able to attract this distinguished director to take time out of his very busy schedule to help the students.

In addition to Maler's help with directing, the production will also have the contributions of Mr Velez, a well-known Bos ton papier-maché artist who will be assisting with some of the sets and masks for the play. His wife,

## BFD Reminds You To

Change Your Smoke Detector Batteries!

Each year, thousands of people needlessly die or are injured in home fires. Tragically, many of them would be alive or unharmed today had their home been equipped with working smoke detectors.
Working smoke detectors cut the risks of dying in home fires by nearly one-half. They provide an early warning and critical extra seconds to escape. One problem, though, is that while smoke detectors
are in 82 percent of all homes, nearly one-third of these have worn out or missing batteries.
Boston Fire Commissioner Martin E. Pierce, Jt states "A smoke detector without a good battery is pointless. It provides zero protection and gives people a false sense of security."

On Saturday, Oct. 25 when daylight savings time ends and clocks are turned back, the Boston

Fire Department urges everyone to change their smoke detector batteries.
Change your clocks, change your batteries has long been the slogan of the fire service.
"If we can get people in the habit of twice a year changing their smoke detector batteries, it will go a long way toward increasing the public's chances of getting out alive if a fire breaks out in the home," said Pierce.

A legal notice appeared in the Boston Globe on Oct. 17 as a "Notice of an Initial Site Investigation and Tier II Classification for Barry Playground, Chelsea and Medford streets." It went on to say that a release of oil and/or hazardous materials has occurred at this location with "response actions at this site" being conducted by Aldo G. Ghirin, senior planner, of
the Boston Parks and Recreation Department.

Ghirin explained that in mid-1996, consultants from the Mass. Water Resources Authority (MWRA) conducted soil boring tests for the purpose of determining suitability of the Barry Playground as a possible Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) facility. They found some soil samples with lead and hydrocarbon levels above concentrations that require reportings to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) under Chapter 21E

In October of last year, the Boston Parks and Recreation Department was notified of these results by the MWRA and reported the findings to DEP.

Ghirin stated that after additional study, the Parks Department submitted a Phase I report to DEP, classifying the site as Tier II, a classification appropriate for sites with low-level releases.

The department's consultant, William R. Swanson, has determined that there is no immediate concem to the health of park users. Lead and PAHs (polyaromatic hydrocarbons) were detected in the soil surface, but not beyond normal urban background concentrations. In some samples from soil at least 8-10 feet down, higher than normal concentrations of PAHs were found. Swanson has determined that the park can continue to be used for softball or other sports activities. According to Ghirin, the site will continue to be monitored.

Ghirin reiterated that there was no cause for concem and the department would be talking to people who have permits to use the site. He can be reached at 635-4505.

## WHO SHOULD OWN

YOUR BUSINESS REAL ESTATE?
If your business is incorporated, it is often a good idea to personally own the real estate used by your corporation
If appreciated real estate is sold by a corporation, the gain will be subject to double taxation if the corporation distributes the money to you. However, if you own the real estate personally, there is no double taxation. Though the double taxation generally does not apply to S corporations, there can be tax problems when an $S$ corporation sells its operating business and its real estate.
The general advice is for you to own the property and lease it to the corporation. Because of the depreciation, you may well generate a tax loss on your personal tax return.

You might consider having another family member own the real estate; then the property will not be part of your estate. That could save estate taxes.
There are advantages to personal ownership of the real estate not related to taxes. As the value of the property increases, you may be able to generate cash by refinancing. Also, if the corporation does not own the real estate, you can readily sell the business and keep the property

Property now held by your corporation can be transferred to you via a sale. You could then lease it back to the corporation.

The advantages of personal ownership of business real estate are significant. In reviewing the benefits in your particular situation, you must give due consideration to the passive loss rules and other complexities of the tax laws. 8) Veterans - I am asking my fellow veterans and their families to please come out and vote on November 4. It is common knowledge that when the veterans needed me, I was always there for them.
9) Let me point out that my comrades in Europe and the South Pacific made the supreme sacrifice so that we could live and protect this wonderful country. My war record is comprised of eight battle stars, a Bronze Arrowhead for assault landings, and a Presidential Citation from the late President Harry S. Truman.
10) I ask the voters throughout Boston to please support my candidacy for re-election. In addition, it must be noted that as chairman of the Public Safety Committee for over 20 years, I have constantly supported the police and fire departments, and now I ask you to continue to support me.
11) Unions - I have a $100 \%$ voting record for all unions, especially Local \#285 and Local \#589. I stood by them when they needed me and now I request that they stand by me.
12) I am opposed to privatization because it is nothing but union-busting. Case in point - the merger of the Boston City Hospital and University Hospital,
which is now known as the Boston Medical Center. This vote was 9-4 in passage of the merger which cost $\$ 25$ million of taxpayers' money for legal fees and consultants' fees. The final vote was taken and 11 councillors were in favor of giving the $\$ 25$ million. Two of my colleagues changed their votes to approve the $\$ 25$ million. How do you vote against the merger and yet vote to spend $\$ 25$ million of taxpayers' money? The only two who stood firm in rejecting this proposal were Councillor Yancey and myself. With the fiscal year, ending Sept. 30, 1997, the Boston Medical Center had overspent its budget by $\$ 14$ million . . . just as I predicted!
13) Recently, the Boston Medical Commission came in to the council for approval of a grant order of $\$ 62$ million. I asked them what they wanted to do with the additional appropriation, but they had no answers. The answer they gave me was that once they got the money, they would tell me what they were going to do with it. I voted against giving them the money until they gave me answers to my questions.
14) School Busing - A BIG COLOSSAL FAILURE! I voted against this in 1974 when we had 93,000 students in our public schools, with a budget of $\$ 103$ million. We have closed 127 schools since then, and have lost over 50,000 students, and our budget now is well over $\$ 500$ million. We spend $\$ 40$ million a year on those "big, yellow buses," and I am still opposed to busing our children.
15) Water And Sewer Commission - Again in 1974, I begged and pleaded with City Councillors not to create this commission for this reason: look now at what it has done to your water and sewer bills! When John Howe was acting chair of the Water and Sewer Commission, I asked him how many people would be hired by this commission, and his answer was no more than nine. We now have approximately 385 employees.
16) As it was said in one of the local newspapers not long ago that I was "well ahead of my time." I predicted these things would happen and they did, but it never gets reported to the taxpayers. "It makes me sick."
17) Let's put the cards on the table - in the primary election held recently, only $16 \%$ of the 236,000 registered voters voted, and that, to me is a disgrace. For example, in one precinct in Brighton, only two people voted the entire day. To open the precincts throughout the city costs the taxpayers $\$ 180,000$. I love this country but I can honestly say we will lose it if we do not exercise our constitutional right to vote.
18) Many years ago, all nationalities came to this country and did not come here with their hands out. They overcame the language barrier and raised good families and gave up sons and daughters to fight for this great country. These people came here to work hard and to have a better life, and I applaud them.
19) If I had my way, any illegal alien who is serving time in any of our correctional institutions would be sent to Logan Airport the day they came out of jail and deported right back to where they came from. In addition, I have always supported legislation for the death penalty for first degree murderers.
20) Finally - I am asking all law enforcement officials, firefighters, union members, senior citizens, Ladies Auxiliary, Gold Star Mothers, VFW, American Legion, Disabled Vets, Korean War Vets, Middle East Vets, my brother Knights, Emerald Society, the IrishAmerican Vets, the Sons of Italy, the college students and all the registered voters of this city to please remember that I will always stand up for you when you need me.
21) On Election Day, you will not see any poll workers working on my behalf because I believe when you come to the polls, you have already made up your mind on whom you want to represent you in this great city of ours. I ask for your continued support.

In conclusion, I am, as I said before, \#3 on the ballot. I want to continue to be your voice. Without your vote, I can't. Please vote on November 4.

## O'Neil Charges . . .'Stupid Is As Stupid Does'

Boston City Councillor Aibert L. "Dapper" O'Neil declared, "In the movie Forrest Gump, the lead character, who was deemed to be leaming impaired, uttered this pearl of wisdom, 'Stupid is as Stupid Does!' Based on the Boston Public School's announced test scores, Forrest Gump's statement could be the Boston Public School's educational slogan. How can they defend spending a re-cord-setting $\$ 511$ million in taxpayer dollars to not educate our children?"

O'Neil went on to say that detailed analysis of the Stanford 9 basic reading knowledge test over the past two years indicates that at least half of Boston's Public School students, who will be required to take a state-mandated test in the year 2001 and pass as a prerequisite for graduation, would fail. He asks, "What is the Boston Public School system doing with all of our money?"

In the past, stated O'Neil, when school ad-
ministrators were confronted with low reading test scores, they simply responded by teaching the test. He said, "Oh! You want higher test scores! Then we'll simply teach the test. That is not what public education is supposed to be about in Boston. We want Boston's children to actually be able to read, write and communicate effectively. Right now, Boston's students are achieving at a level 1 . which is less than basic knowledge.
"Boston School Superintendent, Thomas Payzant, pledged to use the report to promote change this year in the district's 125 schools," stated O'Neil. "Part of that change must not include teaching the test. Payzant also noted my educational achievement challenge by acknowledging that many 10th graders will probably not reach level 2 (which is basic knowledge), by the time they graduate. A normal year of progress is not going to be sufficient.
"Last spring, some 79\%
of Boston Public School 11th graders scored at level 1," noted O'Neil. "What are they doing with the $\$ 511$ million? Let's get back to the basics of public education. Let's focus on the basics of reading, writing and mathematics. A school system that cannot teach children to read and write in 12 years is a failed school system. The Boston Public School's educational agenda and leaming priorifies get a failing grade. The lack of basic education I predicted was and is happening. It has now been documented to be an absolute point of fact. I don't want to say I told you so . . BUT!
"As I have charged over and over again, the Boston Public School system fails o educate our children and school administrators must and will be called before the Boston City Council to discuss their failing educational efforts.
"What are they doing with our \$511 million," concluded O'Neil.

## Do You Know What's Happing?

Dear Concemed Residents:
Our neighborhood has seen many changes over the last 25 years. We've witnessed the close of the Navy Yard and the subsequent loss of jobs. We've seen the negative effects that busing has had on education in our schools. We've seen the hard-working, blue-collar family displaced by single, white-collar newcomers. We've seen homes that once housed families converted by condo developers and investors into top of the market units. Many of the families that made this close-knit, supportive community have been forced out by high rents. The lack of adequate parking has many of us circling the block in vain. We have seen a shift from the stable, cooperative and caring sense of neighborhood to one of frequent change, arrogance and anonymity.

In the face of these changes, you and I try to adapt. We might utter our complaints to one another, but many feel helpless to stop this change that some call progress.

I consider myself very fortunate to live on a street where $75 \%$ of my neighbors have lived for more than 40 years. The mood is one of respect, caring and warmth. There are neighbors who rent, but the turnover has not been unusually high so my family has experienced the stability that has become more and more uncommon here in Charlestown.

But . . I must tell you of another change coming to our town. As you know, Boston attracts many visitors, tourists and business people. The need for more hotels is evident in the lack of accommodations and this situation has given rise to a new and lucrative type of business. Are you aware that a Bed \& Breakfast could open on your residential street? Are you aware that the proprietor does not need neighborhood approval and does not even need to disclose
to you the existence of such a business? Perhaps you don't know that no permits are required, provided there are three guest rooms or fewer.

Would you choose to abut a building which has a high turnover of guests? How would you like to experience that unsettling feeling of a steady stream of strangers, coming and going at any time during the day or night, with whom you must now compete for parking?
Perhaps this enterprise is in existence on your street. Are you going to continue to accept these changes that have begun to unravel our sense of community? Will you allow newcomers to further deteriorate what we've known as home?

I would urge you to make your concerms known to our neighborhood council. I would urge you to attend one of the many meetings and watch these dedicated residents of Charlestown as they try to balance changes with the need to maintain a good quality of life here. Express your dissatisfaction to those who can protect our town from these changes. We must struggle to maintain our sense of who we are
. a stable, warm and concerned neighborhood. Don't let your silence be misunderstood for acceptance of situations which concem you and the safety of your children and our respected elders.

Those of us who have lived here for many years know why we love this place. Do the newer residents and tenants have enough appreciation for this community to show respect to the families who have made this place a great neighborhood?

## Let's Talk Trash . .

Let's talk trash. Many of the points raised in the 10/9/97 Patriot (Charlestown . . . is becoming a trash town!) we agree with. While it's helpful to cite the rules and regulations about trash placement, pickup, etc., you missed a couple of very important points.

Your belief that the "newcomers" are mostly responsible for the trash situation in Charlestown simply isn't true. Newcomers alone don't toss Dunkin' Donut cups and Burger King bags out their car windows on just about every street in town. Newcomers alone don't put their trash out whenever the whim seizes them. Newcomers are not responsible for there being no trash barrels along Main Street except for those provided by Jenny's Pizza and Peg \& Al's. Newcomers aren't the ones leaving the Bunker Hill Mall parking lot (Johnnie's) looking as if they just finished a tailgate party.

You talk about people not knowing what the regulations are. Newcomers will not find out by reading the Patriot as most of them do not even know it exists. We would suggest that the "oldtimers" take the trouble to simply introduce themselves to the "newcomers" and inform them when to put out the trash. It would serve as a great way to meet each other!

Have you noticed that a lot of garbage shows up around the first of each month when rental units turn over? Doesn't the landlord have the primary responsibility to make sure that trash is properly disposed of?

Moreover, it would be great if parents would set an example for their children. We often see kids walking to school dining on the breakfast of champions - potato chips, Cheese Puffs or Twinkies. Guess where the wrappers wind up? We (newcomers) have placed trash barrels at each end of our street, that we empty every week. This is our way of dealing with the multicolored mounds of trash that would otherwise pile up on our streets. Despite our efforts, we all too often find wrappers and cans thrown onto the street just a few short feet from the trash barrel.

We have a beautiful town, and we should ALL want to keep it that way. One of the simplest things we can do is to just keep it clean.

However, the article in the Oct. 9 Patriot was to bring to the attention of residents the city's rules and regulations relative to trash pickup and provide a telephone number so that flagrant violators can be reported to Code Enforcement and cited for violations. Its focus was not on cans and candy wrappers, which we agree are nuisances.
Each incident of trash violations reported to the Patriot over the past several months has been a relative "newcomer" to the town. As for "Townies" approaching newcomers as a means of getting acquainted, in two separate instances, a Townie neighbor did just that. One response from a violator was "we have no room to store the trash" and the second response was "so what!" This is sure a grand start to a friendship!

Many trash violations have been reported to Code Enforcement in recent weeks and yet the trash keeps appearing. Between Sackville and Belmont streets, trash was on the sidewalk Monday afternoon for a Wednesday pickup. Also, between Sackville and Cook streets, a mattress and box spring was put out early in the week - in front of a neighbor's door. That neighbor placed a note on the mattress reminding the person of the Wednesday trash pickup and asking him/her to put it in front of their house.

Our guess is that you, as newcomers, read the Patriot and can only hope you will let your newcomer neighbors know about us. And, by the way, the telephone number to report trash violators is $635-4896$ and, maybe, by working together, we can have a cleaner town.
