Open Letter To Charlestown

Dear Editor

In the past few weeks, there have been several stories in the news media about minority families moving into Bunker Hill Development. These articles have led to rumors and confusion. I would like to summarize what is happening at Bunker Hill Development, in order to lay these rumors and confusion to rest.

1. Reoccupancy and Repair of the Bunker Hill Development.

The Boston Housing Authority is committed to preserving Bunker Hill as public housing for low-income families. Our first goal for the preservation of Bunker Hill is to reoccupy the many vacant apartments in the development. In 1982, we increased the number of occupied units at Bunker Hill by 81 units. We expect to receive approximately \$4.2 million this year, to prepare roughly 180 more vacant apartments for occupancy at Bunker Hill. With this money, we expect to achieve full occupancy of the development by the end of 1984, except for the seven secured buildings at th · Polk Street end of the development. We do not have enough funding to reoccupy these buildings at the present time

2. Tenant Selection for Reoccupancy

An applicant for public housing in Boston can select up to three public housing developments to apply for. His or her application is then placed on the waiting list for each of the developments selected by the applicant. The waiting list is maintained in chronological order, by date of application. As units become available, they are offered to the applicants at the top of the waiting list, who have the oldest applications on file for that development.

We expect to reoccupy roughly 90 vacant units per year for the next two years. In addition, approximately 55 occupied units turn over per year. In summary, over 140 families from the waiting list for Bunker Hill Development will be offered housing in the development each year, in 1983 and 1984.






Caucus Runs Smoothly



Civil Service Finding "Just The Tip Of The Iceberg"

The findings by the state Civil Service Commission that the City of Boston violated state law in firing and demoting Boston police officers is "just the tip of the iceberg in a pattern of official actions jeopardizing the public safety of Boston residents," stated Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn.

Flynn urged public participation at a previously

scheduled hearing by the Council's Committee on Public Safety requested by Flynn to investigate complaints by Boston neighborhood residents and firefighters on the continuing lack of public safety protection in the city.

"Public safety protection in Boston has never recovered from the massive layoffs of police officers and firefighters in 1981 which were criticized

in unusually sharp terms in the Civil Service Commission report," Flynn said. "While the Commission's report rightly charged the city with acting in 'bad faith' in demoting and firing officers while more than \$1.3 million in funds were available," Flynn noted, "there may be a tendency to believe that the problem has now been addressed. 



Is Charlestown An Impacted Area?

Dear Gloria

In the late nineteen fifties, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts divised a new state agency. The name of this newly appointed firm was the Massachusetts Port Authority, or more commonly known as MASSPORT.

Since its inception, Massport has grown bigger and more powerful due to its holdings in communities such as Charlestown. In case some residents are not fully aware of those holdings please allow me to inform those residents here and now.

Massport controls in Charlestown alone, the following facilities: the Mystic-Tobin Bridge, Mystic Pier, Moran Terminal, and Hoosac Pier. Now let me ask the residents of Charlestown, if it is safe to say we are an IMPACTED AREA with those facilities operating within our community?

Now let us get to the theme of this letter. If Charlestown is an impacted area, what is Massport's policy regarding this matter? Does Massport have any guidelines which it adheres to pertaining impacted areas? Having answers to these informal questions could enlighten our community greatly.

While you're tossing those questions around inside your heads, let us move on to the crux of this dilemma. During the course of a year at Massport, a lot transpires. In that period some new jobs are developed, older employees retire, after school work programs and summer jobs for youths are set up, all which are processed by Massport's internal departments. Wouldn't it be comforting to know our residents were being considered for some of those positions due to Massport's impact on Charlestown? Too bad there isn't a liaison in the community to keep us abreast of Massport's 'activities.

Well, lets not put the horse before the cart, as the saying goes. Again I would like to reiterate the question, "IS CHARLESTOWN AN IMPACTED AREA?" My guess is that it will always be NO until WE ask the questions.

roughly fifty Charlestown residents now on the Bunker Hill Development waiting list will be offered housing at the development as their turn comes up, over the course of the next two years. At the same time, we expect some black and Hispanic applicant families to be offered housing, as applicants move up the chronological list. The first such move-ins would likely occur in the fall or early winter of 1983. The BHA will not force or induce any family, of any race, to move into a development they do not wish to move to. If a minority family rejects occupancy at Bunker Hill, they still can obtain housing at either of whatever other two developments they have applied for. But the BHA will not deny any applicant family their right to live in the community of their choice.

By July 1983, all applicants for public housing in Boston will be screened for their rent paying history and suitability as tenants. Those same screening standards will be applied to all Bunker Hill applicants.

3. The Future of Polk Street

At the present time, there is not enough money to complete the renovation of the buildings along Polk Street. The BHA hopes to work with the Bunker Hill resident community, and representatives of the larger Charlestown community, to develop a plan for these buildings. Should they be reoccupied? Converted to elderly use? Demolished or made into recreation and social service space? Converted to town houses for Bunker Hill's larger families? These are the questions we hope to answer, in consultation with the community.

4. Multi-Service Center for Bunker Hill and the Community

As we proceed to reoccupy Bunker Hill Development, we hope to provide space for a comprehensive multi-service center at the development. We have identified a potential location in a substantially vacant building, and we are discussing possible funding and programs for the development with local Charlestown social service agencies.

In the last two years, Bunker Hill Development has made substantial progress towards the goal of stability, decency, and full occupancy. Together with the resident community, we have accomplished improvements that many of us would not have thought possible two years ago. We hope that in the next two years, we can advance the restoration of Bunker Hill, and secure the stability and tranquility of the development for years to come.

MDC Considering New Pumping Station

by Maria Girvin No objections were made at the recent MDC hearing concerning future plans for the Charlestown Pumping station.

Although no definite decision has been made on the pumping station, it appears the MDC wants to the old one, near MBTA property located on the opposite side of the Alford Street Bridge. The MDC's study of the pumping station is part of an overall study of the existing sewer system.

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
This option of rebuilding appears more practical than rehabilitating the existing station, now located at the foot of the Edison Plant.

Should the station be built, it would be completed in 1989 and paid for through the cherry sheets of Boston, Somerville, Cambridge, and Medford.

The new station would help prevent sewer overflows into the Mystic River, which does occasionally happen now at the Amelia Earhart Pumping Station. MDC spokemen claim the new station could handle any industrial growth which is expected in Cambridge. However, no population growth is expected in the areas surrounding the Charlestown station.

The pumping station conveys wastewater from surrounding areas to the Deer Island Sewerage Treatment Plant in Winthrop. Constructed in 1890, the plant is presently functioning properly, having undergone several engine overhauls and other maintenance procedures as would be expected of equipment nearly 100 years old. However, according to Associate MDC Engineer Phil Carbone, now is the time to consider overhauling or rebuilding the pumping station before the existing station malfunctions

To date, the pumping station uses diesel engines to pump approximately 29 million gallons of sewerage per day through miles of underground pipe to the Deer Island Treatment Facility. The last pumping station built by the MDC was on Deer Island in the 1970s. The Deer Island Treatment plant is scheduled to be expanded.



THE ABCESSED TOOTH

When an abcess hits you, you'll know it! The pain is seven and constant, with the side of the face swelling in a .ex days. This is an emergency.

The abcess normally starts with a cavity which is left untreated. The bacteria begin their treacherous work by destroying the outer case of enamel, then the inner (more sensitive) part of the tooth called the dentin. Eventually, the cavity will invade the innermost part of the tooth, called the pulp where the nerves and blood vessels are. Now, you've got trouble and you'll know by the pain. It is caused by the swelling of the blood vessels against the nerves since the pulp is surrounded by rigid walls.

The pulp loses the battle and slowly dies, leaving the tooth full of decomposed tissue and swarming with germs. When the germs reach the tip they will set about making an abcess. Then they will proceed to gradually destroy the surrounding jawbone and tissue.

A filling will not help a root abcess. The decision now (after the infection is treated) is whether to save the tooth by root canal therapy or have it extracted. This pain and possible tooth loss can be prevented by having cavities filled early.
