Public Hearing On City Districting
Monday, December 21st

Monday evening, December 21 st is the date set by City Coun cillor Rosemarie Sansone to con duct a public hearing here in Charlestown in order to obtain input from the community on the
drawing up of districts for the Boston City Council and School Committee, as was mandated last month when Boston voters passed a referendum requiring that future city councils and school committees be made up of nine members elected from districts and four elected at large. Voters favoring this plan, did so without voting for specific dis-

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ricts and thus the present public hearings, which are being scheduled throughout the city, re termed by a spokesperson in Sansone's office as preliminary in nature and aimed at getting public input into the structuring of the districts.
The city council has ninety days from the day they receive official notice of the passage of the referendum to draw up the the referendum to draw up the
districts and if they cannot agree to the districts in that time frame, the process is turned over to the Mayor. The council has not, as of this date, been given the official notice by the election commission, as a recount of ballots is presently in progress.
The meeting on Monday, December 21 will be held at 7:00 p.m. at the Legion Hall, 27 Chest-

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## Governor King Responds To Call

## For Tough "Angel Dust" Law

Governor Edward J. King wil announce details of a bill which provides a mandatory minimum one year prison sentence for persons convicted of selling or manufacturing phencyclidine commonly called "angel dust."

ceremonies at St. Catherine of ceremonies at St. Catherine of
Siena Church in Charlestown, Siena Church in Charlestown,
Sunday, December 13, 1981 at 2:00 p.m. with a reception in the church hall immediately following. Charlestown has been chosen to make this formal announcement because it was here that a statewide movement to remove this dangerous drug from the streets began. The public is invited to attend.
The legislation was introduced to the General Court by Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee Michael F. Flaherty (D-South Boston) who will join Governor King in the formal announcement.

At a recent state house briefing on drug abuse, Governor King stated "No longer will those who profit on the sale of this dangerous drug go unpunished " The Governor also paid tribute to the coalition of civic, business and religious groups who had led a statewide effort to rid their communities of this dangerous drug.
''Throughout the Commonwealth, our citizens have spoken in one strong voice that they don't want these drugs in their cities, towns and neighborhoods," Governor King said.
"The community effort that began in Charlestown and spread throughout our state will surely bring a happy ending to what could have been a very sad story," the Governor concluded. To expedite the implementation of this directive, Governor (continued on page 2)

## Drops One Thompson Square

One Thompson Square went on the selling block last Thursday after a majority of the Charlestown Economic DevelopCharlestown Economic Develop ment board voted to transfer the building's deed and all "property therein" back to the Charlestown Savings Bank. The bank will now seek interested buyers for the property.
The board meeting last Wednesday evening at the Mary Colbert Apartments was chaired by Attorney Atlen J. Jarasitis who had drawn up the legal papers for the transfer and the
sole purpose of the meeting was to obtain approval for this transaction.
A definite split appeared between appointed and elected board members. Appointed members felt they had no choice, while elected members disapproved of the action.
Jarasitis spoke of the fact that the "EDC didn't have the money or expertise to keep it going...it didn't work.
Apparently, push came to shove about a month ago when (continued on page 3)

(continued from page 1) the Charlestown Savings Bank heard from an interested party wanting to purchase the building.

After financial analysis, it was determined that it would be a long time before operating income would be sufficient to carry the debt. As of the end of October the Kennedy Center, as guaran tor, owed the bank a total of over $\$ 500,000$. The bank felt it was in everyone's interest to get the building back.

Several board members felt the action taken to give up the building was not in the best inbuilding was not in the best in terests of either current tenants or Charlestown in general.

The final vote on transfering the building back to the bank was six in favor, one opposed and four abstaining.

Rumors of deals and of con
dominiums coming in were equally denied.

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## Carving Up The District

Everyone knows how to carve up a turkey for Thanksgiving or Christmas. You start slicing and hope you do it right. Well, in many ways that's how Boston's new nine city council and school board districts are going to come into being, carving and hoping!
As the City Council begins the process of implementing the changes of Boston's governmental structure approved by voters in the recent city election, I am writing to ask that you or your group help in the process of drawing district lines.
It is very important to remember that the legislation is remember that the legislation is
very specific as to the composivery specific as to the composi-
tion of each district. Each must tion of each district. Each must
be: 1) Compact and equally be: 1) Compact and equally populous-based on the 1975 state census, each must have approximately $69-70,000$ people; 2) Comprised of contiguous existing precincts and; 3) Drawn with a view to preserving the integrity of existing neighborhoods.
The last requirement is the hardest to define, but the most important to ensuring the success of the plan and it is vital that this requirement be met fully in order to see that all order to see that all
neighborhoods are given a fair
and equitable voice in their municipal government
My major concern is how Charlestown will be carved up and/or who it will be placed with. The mostly likely district for us appears to be a district comprising most of the first three wards of Boston (Charlestown, North End and East Boston). In this district neither the North End nor Charlestown would have a fair and equitable chance of electing one of their own. In fact, it would become a guranteed East Boston District according to most knowledgea according Charlestown hasn't had a city Councillor in more than 30 years Councillor in more than 30 years and if the above district comes into being, it will be another 30 years or more before we could elect anyone!
After much research I have come up with what some might call a viable option that leaves Charlestown with a "fair and equitable" shot at a council and school committee seat.
My proposal would include Charlestown (Ward 2), North End/West End/Waterfront (Ward 3) and eight out of ten precincts in Beacon Hill/Back Bay (Ward 5).
