estimated to be completed early 1980. Although the apartment building is located in a desirable residential site, rent will be limited to 25 percent of a tenant's gross income. The remainder of the cost will be subsidized by the federa government.
The Harvard School conversion project is one of several undertaken by the Charlestown Economic Development Cor poration, a subsidiary of the Kennedy Center, under a Community Services Administration (CSA) grant from ABCD
For more than 60 years, Mary Sebastian Colbert, a life-long resident of Charlestown, has had a profound impact on the quality of life in this community. Born May 1, 1890 Charlestown, she began her dedicated work for the citizens of her community as a child by working in her church's service organization and she continues this dedication today by her participation in more than a dozen service organizations. Mrs. Colbert attended Warren School, St Francis School, and the Girls High School. She was married to Sylvester B Colbert in 1919 and the couple Ba one child. William who was killed at the age of 20 in a killed at the age of 20 in a car
accident in 1940 .

## White Swears In Police Recruits

preliminary list of 671 candidates released by the state's Division of Personnel Administration after the Mayor personally appealed to the governor for a speed-up in the selection process
The new recruit is Matthew Francis Whalen Jr. of Old Ironsides Way
In addition to the current class the Mayor also announced that a second group of fifty-five recruits would be added to the Police Department in August. These actions follow a pledge the Mayor made in February that the city would add one hundred new police officers to beef-up neighborhood patrols before the end of 1979.

The class represents the first addition to the Police force since January, 1978. Members of the class passed the last police exam given by the state in May, 1978 and their names were finally released to the city in February, 1979 after the Mayor's action. The delay was caused by an inability of the Division of Personnel Administration to determine a passing score.

Special Use Of The Navy Yard

Recently questions have been raised about Boston National Historical Park's granting of Activity Permits for use of facilities in the National Park Service owned area of the Charlestown Navy Yard.
To clarify what land Boston NHP administers in the yard, only 30 acres of the 130 acres that comprise the yard are owned by the National Park Service. The remainder is maintained by the Boston Redevelopment Authority. The uses of buildings and property within Boston NHP jurisdiction are bound by the Code of Federal Regulations, Massachusetts Statutes, and their status as National Landmarks.
National Parks are special areas set aside for use by all people because of their inherent educational, historical, cultural and/ or recreational value Boston National Historical Park
wants to encourage compatible use of the historic buildings and land. Any organization, group, or society that will assume responsibility for a gathering or event may apply for an Activity Permit. Within the past six months, the Charlestown Community Center, the Charlestown Senior Citizens and other groups have used the navy yard facilities and will continue to use them. There are qualifications that must be met by applicants. Most important is that the rooms and grounds cannot be used for political fund-raising, commercial, and/ or advertisement purposes. Another frequent request is for weddings and private parties which are not permitted.
A point system is applied to any group who requests use of Boston NHP facilities. A questionnaire with designated points for each answer, is filled out by the park's

Special Events Coordinator for every applicant. The points are accrued according to the information the group or its representative gives on their application. Every group their application. Every group mu

The veto won't mean that the charge is coming but only that the phone company can still seek it provided they get the consent of the DPU.

## Flat Rates

Last month, I read in the PostGazette that Gov. Edward J. King has proposed a "flat rate" excise tax.
It would work like this: Currently the graduated struc-

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ture of $\$ 66$ per $\$ 1,000$ valuation requires a luxury car owner to pay a higher excise tax than the one who owns a well-used car The owner of the first car could pay up to $\$ 600$ while the latter could pay only $\$ 18$.
The governor's proposal would replace the status quo situation with a flat $\$ 50$ excise tax on all vehicles, from an old VW to a Caddy.
It is a sinister tax and Taxachusetts is only one of four states which imposes such a heavy duty.
