There will be a meeting of the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee on Monday evening, May 21, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion Hall, 27 Chestnut Street. Workers are welcome.

The parade along with the commemorative celebration will be held on Sunday, June 17th.

The dedication of the "Mary S. Colbert Senior Citizens Apart-ments," to be constructed in the old John Harvard Elementary School in Charlestown, took place Friday, May 11, at the site, 20 Devens Street.

Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., Speaker of the House of Representatives, presided over the dedication ceremonies, attended by Mrs. Jody King, First Lady of the Commonwealth, Mayor Kevin H. White as well as other state and local officials.

The John Harvard Elementary School, built in 1871 and used until it was abandoned about a decade ago, will be renovated into thirty apartments for elderly and handicapped residents of the Charlestown district under the sponsorship of the John F Kennedy Family Service Center and the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation.

Mayor White, Speaker O'Neill, Senator Edward M. Kennedy, and former Senator Edward W. Brooke were instrumental in securing the financial support of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the renovation last September, less than four months after the Charlestown application was submitted to the federal agency. Internal demolition of the Harvard School has already begun, and construction is

estimated to be completed in early 1980. Although the apartment building is located in a desirable residential site, rents will be limited to 25 percent of a tenant's gross income. The remainder of the cost will be subsidized by the federal government

The Harvard School conversion project is one of several undertaken by the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation, a subsidiary of the Kennedy Center, under a Community Services Administration (CSA) grant from ABCD.

For more than 60 years, Mary Sebastian Colbert, a life-long resident of Charlestown, has had a profound impact on the quality of life in this community.

Born May 1, 1890 Charlestown, she began her dedicated work for the citizens of her community as a child by working in her church's service organization and she continues this dedication today by her participation in more than a dozen service organizations.

Mrs. Colbert attended the Warren School, St. Francis School, and the Girls High School. She was married to Sylvester B. Colbert in 1919 and the couple had one child, William, who was killed at the age of 20 in a car accident in 1940.

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


We are making a special effort this year to recruit handicapped children or children with special needs that our program can meet. We welcome referrals from you concerning families in these circumstances.

White Swears In Police Recruits

A resident of Charlestown was sworn into the Boston Police Department by Mayor Kevin H.

White on Monday, May 14, 1979. He was part of a class of 45. The recruits were selected from a

preliminary list of 671 candidates released by the state's Division of Personnel Administration after the Mayor personally appealed to the governor for a speed-up in the selection process.

The new recruit is Matthew Francis Whalen Jr. of Old Ironsides Way.

In addition to the current class the Mayor also announced that a second group of fifty-five recruits would be added to the Police Department in August. These actions follow a pledge the Mayor made in February that the city would add one hundred new police officers to beef-up neighborhood patrols before the end of 1979.

The class represents the first addition to the Police force since January, 1978. Members of the class passed the last police exam given by the state in May, 1978 and their names were finally released to the city in February, 1979 after the Mayor's action. The delay was caused by an inability of the Division of Personnel Administration to determine a passing score. Beginning on May 15, 1979 MBTA buses will no longer run on Washington Street between West and Bromfield Streets.

These buses will run on the present timetable.

Route 92 (Sullivan Station - Downtown via Main Street) and Route 93 (Sullivan Station - Downtown via Bunker Hill Street) will terminate at Franklin and Washington Streets instead of at Summer and Chauncy Streets.

The City of Boston will close Washington Street May 15 to begin water main construction work. This is another step in improvements to the Downtown Crossing pedestrian shopping mall.

This temporary diversion will become the permanent route on June 16 when the MBTA summer timetable becomes effective.



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Special Use Of The Navy Yard

Recently questions have been raised about Boston National Historical Park's granting of Activity Permits for use of facilities in the National Park Service owned area of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

To clarify what land Boston NHP administers in the yard, only 30 acres of the 130 acres that comprise the yard are owned by the National Park Service. The remainder is maintained by the Boston Redevelopment Authority. The uses of buildings and property within Boston NHP jurisdiction are bound by the Code of Federal Regulations, Massachusetts Statutes, and their status as National Landmarks.

National Parks are special areas set aside for use by all people because of their inherent educational, historical, cultural and/or recreational value. Boston National Historical Park

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wants to encourage compatible use of the historic buildings and land. Any organization, group, or society that will assume responsibility for a gathering or event may apply for an Activity Permit. Within the past six months, the Charlestown Community Center, the Charlestown Senior Citizens and other groups have used the navy yard facilities and will continue to use them.

There are qualifications that must be met by applicants. Most important is that the rooms and grounds cannot be used for political fund-raising, commercial, and/ or advertisement purposes. Another frequent request is for weddings and private parties which are not permitted.

A point system is applied to any group who requests use of Boston NHP facilities. A questionnaire, with designated points for each answer, is filled out by the park's

Special Events Coordinator for every applicant. The points are accrued according to the information the group or its representative gives on their application. Every group must meet the same qualifications.

Boston National Historical Park is committed to serving visitors, the Boston community, and in particular the neighborhods in which park sites are located. The services that we provide are interpreting historic events, maintaining the park




Dedication Ceremony Marks Groundbreaking For Mary S. Colbert Senior Citizen Apartments

In 1919, she became a charter member the first treasurer of Bunker Hill Unit American Legion Auxiliary and over the years has maintained her involvement in the Legion, the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary, The Women's Club of St. Mary's Church, the Chelsea Soldiers' Home and the Catholic Boys' Guidance Center. She served over fifteen years as State Treasurer of the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary.

A longtime friend of the Kennedy family, Mrs. Colbert established the first John F. Kennedy congressional campaign headquarters in 1946 in Charlestown and then acted as co-chairperson for the future President's congressional campaign. Her experience in political campaigning goes back to 1932 when she worked on the presidential campaign of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Her tireless dedication has aided young and old alike. She was instrumental in the creation of Bunker Hill Community College and organized the first free shuttle bus for the elderly of Charlestown. She served as a founding director for the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center as well as the Charlestown Community Council. She is a member of the advisory boards of the Charlestown Navy Yard, the Bunker Hill Health Center, and is treasurer of the Senior Home



Care Corporation - Boston III. When the "El," the unsightly

and noisy elevated train system. was finally demolished several years ago, Mrs. Colbert who had worked for its removal for 60 years, broke a champagne bottle against the first girder to be taken down.

At 89, Mrs. Colbert still holds numerous positions within the community. She is an honorary member of the Board of Directors of Action for Boston Community Development and an Associate Commissioner on the

Affairs of the Elderly.

Mary Colbert's devotion to her community has been recognized by dozen of organizations and officials over the years. She has been honored by Mayors Kevin H. White and John Collins for her outstanding and exemplary civic leadership, by the National Conference of Christians and Jews "for outstanding service to the ideals of brotherhood," and by many service organizations that have recognized her contribution; among them are the Disabled American Veterans

Auxiliary, Action for Boston Community Development, the American Legion, and the John Kennedy Family Service Center

As partial thanks to her, the people of Charlestown fondly dedicate the Mary S. Colbert Senior Citizens Apartments at ground-breaking ceremonies May 11, 1979. These new apartments will be constructed in the dignified old John Harvard Elementary School, which her husband, Sylvester, and many of her friends attended back in the 1890s. Mayor White dedicated this day "Mary Colbert Day In Boston" in honor of this fine lady.

Mary Colbert has been known for her untiring efforts on behalf of the Charlestown community and has always prided herself in working for the people of her district, and we hope she continues to do so for the next 100 years.

"No person deserves this honor more than the First Lady of Charlestown," stated Speaker of the House Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill. "Mary and I go way back, and I am delighted to be here to share this moment with her. I only wish Jack Kennedy could be here also.'





Mayor White Resolves Stalemate

Mayor Kevin H. White is to be congratulated for his leadership role in resolving the stalemate between the Boston Redevelopment Authority, Mass Port and the city's Economic Development and Industrial Commission which now clears the way for the development of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Mass Port, as we mentioned in our April 19th edition, was holding hostage the Immobiliare development of 1200 units of housing in the Navy Yard with an investment of over 200 million dollars by refusing to grant title to necessary land in which it had a reversionary interest. It was clouding the title to this land in order to force EDIC to lease land in South Boston to Mass Port for the construction of a Containerport Terminal.

This settlement announced last week at a press conference by Mayor White now clears the reversionary title held by Mass Port on land at the Navy Yard and provides for EDIC to lease land at the former South Boston Annex of the Boston Naval Shipyard to Mass Port for the construction of their Containerport Terminal.

This timely and successful intervention by Mayor White has saved the development of the Navy Yard which has been hailed as a vital renovation project for Charlestown and a financial "shot in the arm" for the city.



Senator Timilty expressed confidence "that the citizens of Boston are ready for a new administration, and eager to introduce a new spirit of openness and cooperation to build a better city for the 1980's and beyond.

It's hard to find words to express what I feel after such a wonderful gathering.





The program, coordinated by the Division of Constituent League Services of the National League for Nursing, featured Bjorn Secher, author of Appointment with Success, and Dr. William H. She was looking for a new career, but "I felt I didn't want to get into a woman's job," she said.

So she enrolled in the City of Boston's energy technician training program. Operated by Econ, Inc., a private company specializing in energy conservation training, the program prepares CETA-eligible Boston residents to be expert technicians in fields such as oil heat, solar energy, or heating, ventilating and air conditioning.

The city's Employment and Economic Policy Administration (EEPA) sponsors the program, with funds from CETA, the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act. EEPA also pays participants a stipend while they are in training.

"By training Boston residents

in the energy field, we're providing them with a highly marketable skill, a skill they'll be able to use to serve the com-munity," Mayor Kevin H. White said.

"I like this kind of work-working with my hands," Darlene Wilson said. "It's constructive work."

Donna Callen, 26, is another Charlestown woman enrolled in the Econ training program. "It offered the prospect of a more interesting job, a more in-teresting field," said Callen, who has worked as a waitress, "I enjoyed that, but here the money is a lot better and there's more security."

Participants in Econ's energy technician training program receive 23 weeks of initial classroom and hands-on training in energy use and conservation. This is followed by an additional 5

to 12 weeks of specialized training in an area such as solar energy or oil heat.

"A lot more women should try to get into this field," Wilson said. "It's good work and it offers good pay.
