hearing and weren't ready to sit quietly by and let the plans become a reality without a battle.

O'Brien said that the PWD wanted to advertise the reconstruction contract in August of this year and be ready to do some preliminary work this fall. The bulk of the work, running along the street from just west of the Navy Yard to the street's intersection with Main and Medford streets, would be done in the spring with an estimated two to two and one-half months completion time.

The main contention with the plan as outlined by O'Brien related to the fact that gas, Victorian acrylic heads or acom-type lights were not in the plans, nor were trees.

One woman told O'Brien that there was more that one way to look at Bunker Hill Street. The first way was as an artery with commuters passing through and streetlights shining in bedroom windows instead of on the streets. She said the second way was to look at the street

* Where's My Refund? . . . Wondering where your refund is? Has it been eight weeks since you filed your retum or four weeks if it was filed electronically?
If you answered yes to either of these questions, you can call the IRS Tele-Tax System (Automated Refund Information) at 1-800-829-4477. To get the status of your refund, have your social security number, your filing status and the exact amount of refund ready. The Tele-Tax System is updat-


## ed weekly.

Refund delays may be caused by a variety of reasons. The most common is the social security number and name mismatch. The last name and the social security number of the taxpayer must be the same as on last year's return or the return will be delayed a minimum of one week for rematching.
If your return required rematching, you will be sent a notice of verification which must be filled out and returned to the service center before the refund can be released. Once the information is received, the IRS will process it and mail your check.
$\star$ Charlestown Navy Yard Walking Tours . . . The National Park Service will offer free walking tours of the historic Charlestown navy Yard on both Saturday, July 2 and Sunday, July 3 at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. each day.

The $60-90$ minute tours, given by $\mathrm{Na}-$ tional Park Service Rangers, will include the yard's dry docks, Commandant's House, Marine Barracks, Rope Walk, Chain Forge and other sites of historic and architectural significance.

Also, there will be free tours of the historic Commandant's House on Sunday, July 3 and Monday, July 4. The 45 -minute tours will be offered at 1,2 and 3 p.m. and will be given by a National Park Service Volunteer-in-Parks. The house, completed in 1805, is one of the oldest structures in the Navy Yard, and served as both a private home and public place for more than 179 years.

All motorcycles that pass a complete and proper inspection will receive a sticker which will now be displayed on the license plate. Previously, motorcyclists were only required to carry the inspection sticker with them, not display it.

Motorcyclists will bring their vehicles into one of the 100 " M " stations located throughout the state. The bike will be thoroughly gone over by a certified inspector, trained in motorcycle safety. A display sticker will go on the rear license plate of an approved motorcycle and will be good for one year. The fee for a motorcycle inspec tion is $\$ 15$ and must be done prior to April

Excavation of the existing pavement surface and placement of gravel for the new

Another resident told O'Brithat Main Strect is just much an artery as Bunker Hill Street and gas lights are aesthetically pleasing and would increase the area's and town's property value. ## Voke Gets Kids Health Insurance

As debate continues around the nation on providing health care access to those in need, Rep. Richard Voke says last week's unveiling of his major initiative to provide primary and preventive pediatric services to kids lacking health insurance is a tremendous victory for the state's children and their families. Voke says the "Children's Medical Security Plan" is one of the most important measures he has ever sponsored.
"Primary and preventive health care can be the most vital of building blocks. Unfortunately, with up to 100,000 of our kids starting their formative years without the proper health insurance, many could suffer from the effects of illnesses and diseases that could plague them for the rest of their lives. Fortunately, though, we have acted to
get those kids coverage," said Voke.
Although there are no income restrictions on qualifying for the plan, there are sliding scale fees for families with incomes over 133 percent of the poverty level. Children up to the age of 12 are eligible for coverage. Voke says he is presently pushing for a further extension of this program to cover the children between the ages of 12 and 18 .
"The plan is very cost effective," notes Voke. "Not only are we compassionately treating children, but we are also taking an important step in controlling health care and other social welfare costs. If we can prevent serious illness and keep families working, instead of relying on more expensive secondary treatments or forcing people onto welfare in order to get
health insurance, we can help families stay physically and financially fit, while saving taxpayers millions. I am very proud to have contributed to such a great program."
Contributing to such programs is not new to Voke, a recognized leader on health care policy. Voke's "Healthy Start" program, which provides prenatal and post-partum services to expectant mothers and their newborns, is a national model which has been credited with lowering rates of infant mortality. He too is the author of the "Kaleigh Mulligan" program which provides severely disabled children with comprehensive health care in their homes.

## Funds For BHCC's Sound Stage In Senate Capital Bill

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham announced that a recently passed Senate capital spending bill includes $\$ 13.5$ million authorizing Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) to construct a sound stage to be used as both an educational and a movie production facility.
"The sound stage will benefit students interested in movie production and will help Mass. develop its film industry," said Birmingham. "By helping to establish Mass. as a major player in the entertainment industry, the sound stage
could result in the infusion of tens of millions of dollars into our economy."
George W. Cashman, president of Teamsters Lo cal 25 and of MOVIE (Mass. Organizations Vying for the Industry of Entertainment), has also pushed hard to ensure that the sound stage is built. "This appropriation will result in more jobs for the members of the Mass. production community and will also enable students to learn firsthand about the telecommunications and production industry," said Cashman.

Birmingham noted that

Boston is slated to receive $\$ 22.3$ million for roads and the city will be eligible for grants for new library and police facilities. A computerized central registry of voters is funded under the bill, too, so that cities and towns are relieved of the data processing costs a recently passed "motor-voter" law is likely to generate.

Birmingham noted that the House has passed a capital spending bill that differs in many respects from the Senate bill. A conference committee will work out differences between the two versions.

## Relief At Last

## Dear Gloria,

Mishawum Park Housing Development has been a part of the Charlestown Community for 21 years. For 20 of those years, the residents have had to suffer through blistering heat waves and stifling humidity with no hope of relief.
After weeks of negotiations spent working out a reasonable and safe solution to very complex electrical restrictions, which stood in the way of air conditioning for the development, an agreement was signed between Fulton Management and the Mishawum Park Tenants Association (MPTA) on June 22. This is a great example of what can be accomplished when the tenants and management work together toward a goal. The MPTA is committed toward making Mishawum Park a clean, safe place to bring up our children and can use all the help the residents can give to meet this goal.

I would like to thank John Weiss, Bob Kenney Jr. and Terry Connors for their time and cooperation. I would especially like to thank John Twomey for his expert electrical help and advice. Being an electrician myself, I can appreciate all the research and hard work that went into his effort. Hopefully in the future, Mishawum Park will be a cool place to live.

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## HELPING YOUR CHILD PURCHASE A HOME

Assisting one of your children in buying a house can be a rewarding experience, but it can also give you tax problems if the transaction is not handled properly.

If you present your child with an outright gift of money, you will have to contend with the gift tax. You can get around this by giving no more than the permissible annual amount, $\$ 10,000$ if you file individually, $\$ 20,000$ for a combined gift from you and your spouse, if you file jointly.

If your child needs a larger amount, you can spread the gifts over successive years. You could, for example, make a joint gift of $\$ 20,000$ late in December and another similar gift in early January, for a total of $\$ 40,000$, all without being hit with a gift assessment.

Instead of a gift, you may decide to simply loan your child the money. If you make a personal loan, however, you must report the interest you receive as income. And, unfortunately, your child would not be able to deduct any of the interest because it's considered "personal" interest. You can make the interest fully deductible, though, by lending money to your child in the form of a second mortgage and recording the loan with the registrar of deeds.

Another way to help your child get into a home is through an "equity-sharing" arrangement. Shared equity is when two parties, one called the owner-occupant, the other called the ownerinvestor, combine to purchase a house. As each party pays his share of the monthly mortgage costs and taxes, both are usually entitled to deduct a share of the mortgage and real estate taxes on their federal tax returns. Equity-sharing arrangements, while excellent tools for first-time home buyers, can be somewhat complicated. If you are considering such an agreement, be sure to obtain qualified legal advice.

## Constitution To Fire National

 Salute To Our Country's BirthdayOn Monday, July 4, the officers and crew of the USS Constitution will celebrate our country's 218 th birthday. The ship will close briefly from 11 am . to 12:30 p.m. for a private ceremony on board. Active duty U.S. Navy sailors in 1812 uniforms will provide free guided tours of the Spar and Gun decks from 9:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. until 3:50 p.m. Self-guided tours of the Spar deck will occur from 3:50 p.m. until sunset.
At 11:45 a.m. the commanding officer will address the public from the ship, followed by the official 21 -gun National Sa lute to our country's birthday fired from the Constitution's cannons at noon.

Simultaneously, the Mount Rushmore flag, an American flag, 90 feet by 45 feet, will be unfurled on Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard next to the USS Constitution.
On Sept. 25, 1992, the USS Constitution entered Drydock 1, adjacent to Pier One in the Charlestown Navy Yard, a unit of the Boston National Historical Park, commencing the drydock phase of a drydock ing and repair period. The purpose of the drydocking is to ensure the ship is fit for its bicentennial and third century of service to the nation. The ship is scheduled to leave drydock in November 1995, and be fully rigged and back at its berth alongside Pier One in March 1996
