Gillen, USN (Retired), past Commanding Officer of USS Constitution, has been selected Chief Marshal of the gala parade to commemorate the 212th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill. Hosted by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, the 1987 parade will be dedicated to the Bicentennial Anniversary of the United States Constitution and will step off at 12:30 p.m. sharp on Sunday, June 14, from Hayes Square at Saint Catherine's Church.

Gillen, born and raised in Charlestown, entered the Navy and the Naval Securi-

UPDATE ON YMCA DEMOLITION

The Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) will be awarding the contract to demolish the YMCA building in City Square by mid-June. The contract includes the demolition of the building and adjacent DPW garage, complete asbestos removal, cleaning and grubbing of the site, placement of concrete barriers and fencing for pedestrian safety and the filling of cellar holes.

In addition to the asbestos removal, the department is requiring the removal of the cornerstone of the building, two ornamental panels on the south side of the building which are inscribed with the letters USN and USA, all metal grates and all cast masonry ornaments mounted over entries, including the two eagles over the front door.

Two Charlestown residents were among approximately 2,500 graduates to receive degrees from Boston College at its 111th commencement exercises on May 18.


United Nations Ambassador Vernon A. Walters delivered the commencement address to the new graduates and over 20,000 family members and friends in attendance at Alumni Stadium.

THE SETTLEMENT SHEET

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"Old Glory" To Be Unfurled In Flag Day Ceremony In Navy Yard

Star Spangled Banner yet wave? It certainly will wave, like it never has before.

This Old Glory — one the size of a basketball court — will unfurl and hang on "Old Ironsides" before it makes its final journey to South Dakota for July 4th ceremonies at Mount Rushmore.

President Ronald Reagan will use the flag on the nation's birthday to unveil Abraham Lincoln's mountainous stone face for its 50th anniversary celebration.

One year ago, the National Park Service commissioned Halifax resident Marc Valentine and the company he runs in his spare time called Orches-



and paid \$10 to throw donated pies at one another to raise money for the Department of Youth Services, where Valentine is also employed as a case worker.

"This is a whole national moment about energy," Valentine said of the pending Mount Rushmore event. "Energy just from the idea that thousands of people across the country have touched this flag," he said.

Since January, the field of blue with the 50 stars has been on a national tour, allowing thousands of people to view it and touch it. The tour ended at a special ceremony at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C.

However, before the national tour, the origins of the flag began in the Bay State

Other Massachusetts residents played important roles in the development of the flag events. The Flag Center of Cambridge made the flag, while George Sturtevant of Plymouth County constructed the cherry wood chest used to transport Old Glory.

The 350 pound chest has 13 panels on it that represent the original 13 colonies.

On April 18, a special train, accompanied by the National Park Service, was sent to Halifax to pick up and transport the chest and the flag to Boston.

The blue section went to the John F. Kennedy Library where the red and white stripes were added and it was completed and dedicated. The final pressing and folding took place at the Copley Plaza.

On Bunker Hill Day, which is also Flag Day, the completed flag, that measures 45 by 85 feet, will be unfurled aboard the USS Constitution after the flag and the chest are paraded through Charlestown.

As part of the Bunker Hill Day celebrations, the special storage chest containing Old Glory will leave the **Constitution** on a caisson drawn by nine Clydesdale horses. After it travels in the parade, the flag will return to the ship.

"This is a chance for people to actually see history passing by them," said Valentine. "Most people never get into the intimate moment" of history, he said.

A special program will begin on the Constitution at 5:00 p.m. that includes the raising and unfurling of the flag for the first time since its completion. A crane will hang it one to two feet above the ground so the public may touch it.

Patriotic music will be

featured as Harry Ellis Dickson conducts the Lexington Choir and the gathering of people on hand for this ceremony. Following the singing of "My Country 'Tis of Thee," which will accompany the raising of the flag, four verses of the National Anthem will be sung.

Valentine said that he wanted to stress the entire National Anthem because it is a song that most people don't know.

He said that when people cheer the song before it ends they "miss the most important words of the song; 'the home of the free and the brave.'

In addition to the music, the cannons of the Constitution will fire a salute.

Valentine stated that the history of Charlestown is important and that is why he is having the flag unfurled here before it continues its journey on to Mount Rushmore.

"Just the fact that the unveiling is in Charlestown shows that Charlestown must be a special place," he said.

After the July 4th ceremonies with the president, the flag will be stored in the Hall of Records which is a carved out section in Mount Rushmore just behind the four presidents' heads.





All of the removed artifacts will be stored at the Boston National Historical Park in the Navy Yard except for the metal grates which will be stored at the MDPW building in South Boston.

The project has two phases, asbestos removal and demolition, and has a completion date of October 31, 1987.

UTILITY RELOCATION WORK ON WEEKENDS IN CITY SQUARE

Utility relocation work in City Square is being done during weekends on the North Washington Street Bridge and will force the reduction of traffic to two lanes in each direction.

The work is being done between 5:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays to minimize the disruption of traffic flow in the City Square area. Steel plates will be used to cover the trench at night when the bridge will return to normal operation.

A complete police detail will keep traffic moving and an emergency vehicle lane will be in place during construction. Workers are now installing a 36-inch steel gas main across the bridge. Telephone and electrical ducts will also have to be relocated across City Square this summer.





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

The dedication was sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion, with the approval of the Charlestown Veterans Committee.

During this ceremony, Private Daniel A. Kelley, USMC and S/Sergeant James P. Kelley, USMC were honored by a square dedicated in their names at Bunker Hill and North Mead Streets. Private John W. Powers was similarly honored with a square dedicated in his name at Bunker Hill Court and Bunker Hill Street.

The ceremonies, under the chairmanship of James W. Conway, Commander of Bunker Hill Post 26 and Past National Historian of the American Legion, opened with the presentation of the colors by the United States Marine Corps and the USS Constitution Color Guards. Music was provided by the Milton Post Band.

The Invocation was delivered by Reverend William J. McConnell, Curate at Saint Francis de Sales Church and former United States Navy Chaplain who served with the United States Marine Corps in Vietnam. Reverend Isaiah Sears, retired pastor of the First Baptist Church in Charlestown offered the Benediction.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Senior Vice Commander and Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post Florence Johnson, a Gold Star Mother. Chairman Conway recited the poem "Memorial Day" by Joyce Kilmer after which the two squares were dedicated.

In referring to the two Kelley brothers and Private Powers, Conway stated that "all three made the ultimate sacrifice — the offering of their lives for the most noble of causes." For Private Dan Kelley and Private John Powers, it was on the field of battle in combat, while S/Sergeant Jim Kelley gave his life in an heroic attempt to save his friend and a fellow Marine in a fire.

S/Sergeant James P.
Kelley and Private Daniel
A. Kelley were two of seven
brothers who, in the typical
Charlestown "Townie"
tradition, answered their
Country's call, enlisting in
the United States Marine
Corps during World War II.

Jim Kelley, who enlisted prior to Pearl Harbor, died a hero on the night of November 28, 1942 in one of the most horrendous catastrophes in the history of Boston — the Coconut Grove Fire. After helping a number of people to safety, he re-entered the building to search for a friend and fellow Marine and perished in the attempt.

Inspired by his brother's heroism and sacrifice, Dan Kelley enlisted in the USMC in June 1944, as soon as he was old enough to do so. After six months of basic training, he departed for the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre of War and was killed in action on March 3, 1945 at Iwo Jima.

Private John W. Powers, Sr. entered the United States Army on June 1, 1944, though he was a young man with four children at the time. Private Powers participated in some of the fiercest fighting in the European Theatre and while serving in the 345th Infantry, 87th Division of the Third Army, under the leadership of General George Patton, he was killed in action at Neustein. Germany on February 27, 1945 and is buried in Henri Chapelle Cemetery in Belgium. Powers had been home on leave in January of 1945. At the time of his death at the age of 25, Powers left behind six year old John, Grace Ann who was

three, Robert "Bobbie" who was two, and one year old Kathleen. His wife, Grace, was pregnant at the time that she was notified of his death and later gave birth to a son, Hugh.

Phillip Joseph Kelley, brother of Daniel and James and a Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post, unveiled the square in honor of his brothers. Hugh Powers then unveiled the square named in honor of his father, John Powers.

Memorial wreaths were

placed on the squares by Bunker Hill Post Graves Registration Officer and Past Commander Patricia Farris and Post Junior Vice Commander and Past Commander Arthur Hurley.

Among the distinguished guests participating in the ceremonies were Senator Francis D. Doris, Representative Richard A. Voke, Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and Sergeant John Mathews, US Army.

Conway noted that this community, Charlestown,

has witnessed the departure of her sons and daughters to war in all conflicts in which this nation has engaged from Bunker Hill to Vietnam. He stated that it was "with pride and honor" that they gathered to dedicate the squares and honor these departed heroes. He said, "We pray not only for the Kelley brothers and John Powers but for all those men and women from Charlestown and across this nation who have made the supreme sacrifice.'

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



Senator Doris Receives Master Of Science Degree



Councillor McCormack Calls For Investigation Into Creosote Emissions

An order was filed in the Boston City Council on Wednesday, June 3 by City Councillor Michael Mc-Cormack calling for an investigation of the potential health risks associated with creosote emissions in the water near the Charlestown Navy Yard Piers that may affect the city's boating program slated for that area.

McCormack reported that creosote, a toxic substance widely used to preserve wood, was used on the pilings of the National Park Service's Pier Two in the Charlestown Navy Yard and the substance is being emitted from the pilings into the harbor. He stated that although a boom has been placed in the water to contain and absorb the creosote run-off from the pilings, it is not clear how much creosote remains in the harbor around the piers.

Creosote is known to cause a wide range of health problems in workers exposed to it, ranging from skin irritation to nerve damage and-cancer. There may be associated health risks with periodic exposure to the substance in diluted forms.

McCormack expressed concern that the City intends to sponsor a boating program from Pier Four, a short distance from the pier that is emitting creosote and noted that potential health risks from the creosote

emissions should be investigated and ruled out before boating program staff and young participants are permitted to use the water around the National Park

McCormack requested in his order before the City Council that the Parks and Recreation Commission consult with city, state and federal environmental health agencies to determine the level of creosote in the waters that will be used during the summer boating program and to determine if there are any health risks to program staff and the young participants before the sailing program commences.

McCormack further requested that the City Council Committee on Environment conduct a public hearing prior to start of the boating program to review the results of the Parks and Recreation Commission's investigation.



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
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
