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Doherty Gymnasium Dedication To Take Place Oct. 16

In its dedication of the "Gerard F. and Marilyn M. Doherty Gymnasium" on Oct. 16, Malden Catholic (MC) High School will honor two of its most faithful supporters, said Headmaster Brother Richard Cook.

"They have given selflessly of themselves and without desire for praise or recognition," Brother Cook said, calling Doherty, a member of the MC class of 1946, "our most active 'distinguished' alumnus."

The dedication ceremony and dinner will occur in the gymnasium. A personal contribution of \$25,000 from the Dohertys and proceeds from the event are expected to raise over \$100,000.

Things Are Happening In The Warren-Prescott Schoolyard

School's out and while the children are playing, the bulldozers and earth movers have come to tear up their schoolyard. Work began this week at the Warren-Prescott School in Charlestown on a beautiful new state-of-the-art playground.

"Playground" is actually an old-fashioned and somewhat limited term to describe this development. The play equipment will include slides and climbing structures made of the lat-

est, splinter-free materials and underneath will be special safety padding to help prevent scrapes and bruises. The equipment will exceed the Consumer Product Safety Commission's guidelines as well as being handicapped accessible. Parents will have benches to sit on and a new fence will help provide security. There will also be many attractive trees, bushes, grass and flowers planted where once there was only an "asphalt night-

mare," in the words of a neighbor.

Dedicated people in the Charlestown community have been working for two years to get a new schoolyard for the Warren-Prescott. Members of the local Kiwanis Club really got the ball rolling with their gift of \$12,000 toward the project. The Mass. Biomedical Research Corp. in the Charlestown Navy Yard very generously gave \$10,000 last year. Many fund-raisers, including a dance, chocolate sales, T-shirt sales and an art sale, raised still more money.

The timing of the project was very fortunate, for just as discussions with the

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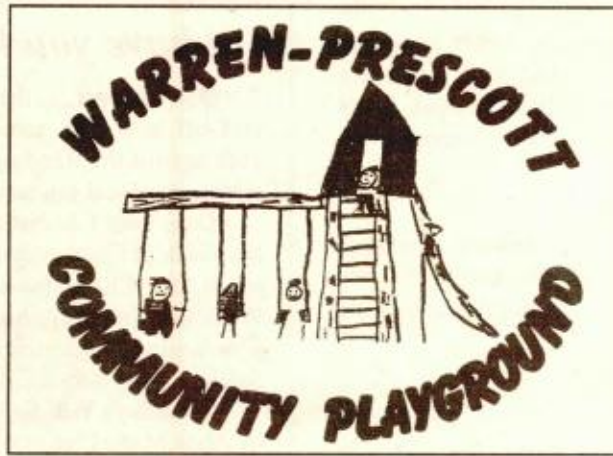

school committee about the project were taking place, Mayor Thomas M. Menino started the new Schoolyard Initiative. This program was created to renovate and improve the facilities in the Boston Public Schools.

This play area in Charlestown will now be the very first project to be done under the Schoolyard Initiative. It will thus be a showcase for the program and will demonstrate what can be done with community efforts in partnership with the city.

Doug MacDonald, a local developer and a member of the playground committee, says, "It will be beautiful. Everyone will enjoy this space, children as well as adults. This has



been a true community effort."

Patricia Simpson, mother of a student at the school and the chairman of the playground committee, hopes the children, parents, teachers and community residents will help to design a curriculum for both the children who attend the school and for other chil-

dren who live in the community. Simpson says, "Children learn so much by playing and exploring. Incorporating an outdoor learning space will broaden and deepen our children's learning while they're having fun. Trees, grass and flowers will offer children a way to relate to nature and the environment

in a positive way. It's very exciting."

Menino and the Schoolyard Initiative members have worked closely with the community in the planning and development of this project. Dr. Domenic Amara, principal of the Warren-Prescott, states, "We are very fortunate to have a mayor that is seriously committed to the future of our children. He really cares."

★ **Is Your Water Smelling?** . . . The Mass. Water Resources Authority (MWRA) has announced that an outbreak of algae in the Wachusett

Reservoir is continuing to cause water taste and odor problems for residents. The particular strain of algae, synura, is very difficult to eliminate because it resides at depths 20 to 30 feet beneath the water surface," said Kelly O'Day, director of operations for MWRA Waterworks. "Even after several treatments with copper sulfate, water quality problems, such as the taste and odor, are continuing.

O'Day said that while the water may taste "fishy" or smell unusual, algae does not pose a health threat and is safe for normal uses such as cooking, washing and drinking.

MWRA started taking immediate steps last week to treat the Wachusett Reservoir to counteract the recent growth of algae and will continue to work aggressively. Because of the difficulties associated with treating synura, it is not possible to predict how long it will take for the algae to clear.

Youth Voice Collaborative (YVC) was founded by the YWCA Boston in 1993 in collaboration with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston, the Patriots Trail Girl Scouts and the Urban League of Eastern Mass. It is designed to support urban youth to become criti-

cal consumers and creators of media in order to have more effective voices in their communities.

"I'll be able to vote in four years and I'll graduate from Boston Latin in three. Just because I'm not grown

up doesn't mean I can't voice my opinions or mingle with adult matters," Boyle said. "United States youth, especially youth from Charlestown, can report and make an impression in politics."

Boyle has been designated the Youth Voice Collaborative Press Corps' youth reporter. He will serve as the project's television, radio and newspaper interviewer and reporter.

He is interested in attending college for journalism and psychology and a minor in education.

KNOW THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CASH AND PROFITS

If you started a business last year, and it now has more cash than you put into it, is it profitable? If your business has less cash, has it suffered a loss? The answers to these questions aren't as easy as you might think.

According to the way accountants measure things, you have a profit for a given period if you add up your sales, subtract your expenses and end up with a positive number. If you end up with a negative number, you have a loss.

Unfortunately, adding up your sales is not the same as adding up the cash that came in, and your expenses won't always equal the cash that went out. For example, you have sales without receiving cash by making a sale on account, and you receive cash without having sales when you borrow money or receive a customer payment on account. Likewise, you incur an expense without spending cash when you make a credit purchase or when you record depreciation on the books. You can also spend cash without incurring a current accounting expense when you buy an asset such as a building or a computer.

So which do you want - cash or profit? Well, you want both. To keep your business afloat for the short-term, you need cash to pay suppliers and employees (perhaps even yourself). In order to obtain that cash, you may have to expedite collections from your customers, stretch out payments to pay your suppliers or borrow from your bank.

Over the long-term, however, you will need to show a profit. In other words, the sales that you ultimately realize in cash must exceed the expenses that you ultimately pay in cash in order to maintain a successful business.

He is also a member of the Boston Public Library Foundation and the Advisory Board of Charlestown Catholic Elementary School. He is a trustee of the John F.

Kennedy Library Foundation. In 1994, Doherty was named "Irishman of the Year" by the John F. Kennedy Library.

Mrs. Doherty worked for the Commonwealth of Mass. in the Legislative Research Bureau on the staff of past Senate President William Bulger. One of her most important concerns during that time was the repeal of a law prohibiting the state from lending textbooks to private school children.

Mrs. Doherty directed her husband's four successful campaigns for election to the state House of Representatives. She was a trustee of Elms College from 1977 to 1983. Mr. and Mrs. Doherty received

honorary degrees from the college this year.

During the school year, she is a member of the Boston Partners in Education, and is a teacher's helper at Mission Grammar School in Roxbury. She also reads to students at the Burns Library at Boston College. She is a member of the Friends of the Irish Studies Program at BC and, by mayoral appointment, she is a trustee of the Charitable Donations for the Inhabitants of Boston.
