## Wodiczko To Portray 'Let Freedom Ring' <br> On The Bunker Hill Monument

The Institute of Contemporary Art (ICA)/Vita Brevis inaugural exhibition of "Let Freedom Ring" continues whth the showcase of artist Krzysztof Wodiczko's three-night projection on the Bunker Hill Monument in Charlestown, beginning at sundown on Thursday. Sept. 24 and ending on Saturday night Sept. 26. The 30 -minute projection will begin at 8 p.m. each night, and is scheduled to run four times until 10 p.m.

In the Bunker Hill Monument projection, the artist
will literally project video images with sound onto the historic monument. Wodiczko animates the monument through projections of interviews with citizens of Charlestown who speak freely of personal experiences.

Wodiczko recently became the fourth artist in the world to win the Hiroshima Art Prize, which is awarded every three years to a contemporary artist whose work contributes to world peach.
"Let Freedom Ring" is the inaugural exhibition for


ICA/Vita Brevis, a bold new approach to contemporary art and audiences. It commissions artists from around the world to create temporary works of art in untraditional and unlikely settings: public parks, abandoned buildings, historic sites, rooftops and riverbanks. The Freedom Trail was chosen as the first of the Vita Brevis sites for artists to transform.

Other artists in the exhibit a Jim Hodges, Mildred Howard and Barbara Steinman. Hodges creates an aural landscape at the Old North Church using sound via wind chimes as a counterpart to the lantems that signaled Paul Revere's famous ride. Howard evokes struggles to emancipation through her railroad tracks and cannon balls inside the Old South Meeting House. Steinman observes and reconfigures the meaning of the monuments in the Boston Commons

## MORE TAX LAW CHANGES

 TO CONSIDERAs we move into fall and you focus on your year-end tax planning, don't over-look tax legislation passed this summer. The Internal Revenue Service Restructuring and Reform Act of 1998 was signed into law on July 22. The law contains a wide variety of provisions. You will want to factor those that affect you into your tax planning. Among the key provisions in the new law are the following:

- A change in the capital gains holding period. Under prior law, assets had to be owned for more than 18 months to qualify for the $20 \%$ and $10 \%$ capital gains tax rates. Retroactive to January 1998, the new law reduces the holding period for these rates to more than 12 months.
- Modifications in the rules applying to Roth IRAs. One provision closes the loophole that avoided the $10 \%$ early withdrawal penalty when converting a regular IRA to a Roth IRA and then withdrawing some or all of the.funds before the required five-year holding period. Another provision will make it easier for older individuals to convert regular IRAs to Roth IRAs. Starting in 2005 , minimum required retirement plan distributions will not have to be included in the calculation of income used to determine whether one qualifies for a Roth conversion. Also, taxpayers who convert a regular IRA to a Roth IRA in 1998 may elect to have all the income recognized in 1998, rather than ratably over a four-year period
- Shift in the burden of proof in certain tax court cases from the taxpayer to the IRS.
- Relief for innocent spouses. For example, divorced or separated taxpayers can make an election to be separately liable for the income each spouse earned rather than being jointly liable for the total tax bill on a joint return.
- Extension of attorney-client privilege to accountants and their clients. The privilege does not cover criminal cases, nor does it apply to advice given to corporate taxpayers in connection with tax shelters.
