





Charlestown Site Of USA Tennis Free For All

Charlestown will host one of the USA Tennis Free for All events through the month of May, as part of the first-ever nationwide USA Tennis Month. Festivities begin on May 9, which has been designated as USA Tennis Day by the U.S. Tennis Association (USTA). These 90-minute festivals will introduce the game's basic skills to kids and adults through a variety of tennis-related activities.

The Charlestown event gets underway at 10:30 a.m. on the next four Saturdays at the tennis courts behind the Charlestown Community Center, 255 Medford St.

Beginning and returning players of all ages can head to the Charlestown tennis courts and become a part of the local tennis program, which is under the auspices of CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD). The best local teaching professionals will provide playing tips designed to get everyone on the court and having fun in record time . . . no preregistration is required and it is all for free. Also, there will be an opportunity to sign up for the 1-2-3 summer tennis program at the Free for All.

USTA/New England is spearheading the USA Tennis events in cooperation with the Boston Tennis Council (BTC), the umbrella organization for eight community tennis associations in Boston.





Pierce Honored With Two Prestigious Awards For Hockey

Boston Fire Commissioner Martin E. Pierce Jr., a Charlestown native and the long-time hockey coach of Matignon High School in Cambridge, was recently awarded two prestigious honors for coaching high school hockey.

On April 9, Pierce was inducted into the Mass. State Hockey Coaches Hall of Fame. On May 3, Pierce received the Coach John Mariucci Award, a national award, from the American Coaches Association.

Pierce has coached hockey at Matignon since the program began at the school 34 years ago. His coaching career actually began while he was a student at Boston College. He became involved with coaching a CYO team that led to becoming Matignon's head coach in 1964.

Pierce's firefighting career began in 1969. He rose through the ranks and has been Fire Commissioner/Chief of Department since 1991.

During his years at Matignon, his teams were Catholic League Champions 19 times. Matignon was also Eastern Mass, Champions in Division One in 1975, 1977, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1993 and in Division Two in 1987 and 1988.

Pierce's teams were State Champions in Division One in 1975, 1977, 1980, 1981, 1984, 1993 and in Division Two in 1987 and 1988.

Matignon was also a state finalist in the years 1973, 1978 and 1979.

Pierce's teams have a combined record of 574 wins, 123 losses and 43 ties, a winning percentage of 87 percent. In tournament play they have amassed 86 wins and 24 losses. Between the Boston Garden and the FleetCenter, his teams have played there 56 times. Four of his players have had careers in the NHL or in Europe. Two are still playing in the NHL.

Pierce was honored four times as Coach of the Year by the Boston Globe and once by the Boston Herald.

At the Hall of Fame dinner, Pierce reflected on his years of coaching and his years as a firefighter. "The biggest difference is that in firefighting you always have inherent dangers." High school hockey, he says, 'is a personal sacrifice of a player giving up personal goals for the good of the team. I enjoy the competition and seeing the development of the student/athletes as they move on with their lives.

"The similarities are unselfishness, commitment, dedication and always the team concept in both professions."

Continued Pierce, "I am very fortunate to be involved with two professions that I truly love."

The Coach John Mariucci Award is named after the "Godfather of U.S. Hockey." Mariucci was coach of the University of Minnesota from 1952-1966 and coached the U.S. Olympic Silver Medal Hockey Team of 1956. He also enjoyed a pro career with the Chicago Blackhawks.

The American Hockey Coaches Association presents this national award "To the school coach who best exemplifies the spirit, dedication and enthusiasm of Coach Mariucci. This year's recipient is Coach Martin E. Pierce Jr."

The Rose Of Tralee . . . Help The Tradition Continue

What is the Rose of Tralee? The Rose of Tralee is the second largest festival in Europe, drawing contestants from all over the world. It is a way for a young woman to learn more about Irish culture, and this year, the Charlestown Rose Contest is proud to be a part of this historic tradition.

The Rose of Tralee Contest is unique in that it is not a beauty pageant that focuses on the superficial, but rather the way for intelligent women with poise and goals to gather in a celebration of their heritage.

The original rose was Mary O'Connor, and her story will tell you was a Rose exemplifies.

Mary O'Connor, a shoemaker's daughter, who lived in the aptly named Brogue Lane in Tralee, and William Pembroke (Willie) Mulchinock, the man who immortalized her, came in touch with each other when she was in the bloom of life.

Mary was in her late teens and working at the Mulchinock home in Ballyard as children's nurse. Maria Mulchinock was her employer at West Villa. She had worked as a dairy maid for the Mulchinock family at Cloghers House before going there at 17.

Willie Mulchinock was a frequent visitor to West Villa and became infatuated by the beauty of Mary O'Connor. He visited her at her home in Brogue Lane where she lived with her parents, two sisters, Bridget and Ellen and brother, Willie. The wealthy Mulchinocks disapproved of the friendship because of Mary's humble background but Willie asked Mary to marry him. She was deeply in love with him, too, but rejected his offer of marriage on the grounds that this would estrange him from his family and

friends

Many months later he took Mary out one beautiful evening, just as the sun was setting on a blaze of glory beneath the sea, the young moon had just come above the mountain and all the valley was hushed. There for the first time he uttered the words that have now become world famous:

The pale moon was

rising above the green mountain, the sun was declining beneath the blue sea; when I strayed with my love to the pure crystal fountain, that stands in the beautiful Vale of Tralee.

She was lovely and fair as the rose of the summer, yet 'twas not her beauty alone that won me. Oh no, 'twas the truth in her eyes ever dawning, that made me love Mary, the Rose of Tralee.

The cool shades of evening their mantle were spreading, and Mary all smiling was listening to me; the moon through the valley her pale rays was shedding, when I won the heart of the Rose of Tralee.

The following evening Daniel O'Connell, the famous Irish patriot, addressed a meeting in Denny Street, Tralee, and William Mulchinock led a contingent of supporters from all parts of Kerry. A man named Leggett the Nailer, who lived in The Mall, was also at the meeting and was involved in a scuffle with a rival group. He was mortally wounded by a sword thrust and Willie was wrongfully accused of his murder.

The only course open to him was to flee the country and he headed at first for Slieve Mish, as the police expected he would, but then he quietly doubled back by way of Blennerville to the other side of the Bay, then

to Barrow Harbour and freedom.

Mulchinock, at length, made his way to India where he worked as a War Correspondent and 'midst the shot and shell, and blinding heat, Willie often found solace in remembering the happy days he spent wandering the little mountain roads around Tralee with Mary.

In the early spring of 1849 Willie Mulchinock, whose name had been cleared in connection with the killing of Leggett, returned to Tralee after six years in India. He called into The King's Arms to freshen up before calling on Mary's house. As he sipped a drink, the landlord of the inn closed the curtain as a funeral was passing by. Willie inquired who was dead and the landlord's reply were words that Willie would never forget: "Tis Mary O'Connor, sir, the Rose of Tralee."

Willie disappeared for many months but finally married, after much pressure from his friends, an old girlfriend, Miss Alicia Keogh

from Ballinasloe. Alicia was both shrewd and calculating and in direct contrast to Mary's gentle ways. In the autumn of 1849, both set sail for America where he felt he could forget the memory of Mary O'Connor.

In 1855 they finally parted. She and the two children of the marriage, Alice and Bernadette, remained in America and he returned to Ireland. By now, Willie was a broken man and he began to find a great deal of comfort in alcohol. He was often seen walking the fields around Ballyard singing and muttering to himself the words of his song and of another verse which he had since added:

In the fields of India 'mid war's dreadful thunder, her voice was a solace and comfort to me; but the chill hand of death has now rent us asunder - I'm lonely tonight for the Rose of Tralee.

In 1864, he moved to a lodging house in Ashe Street and on Oct. 13 of that year he died. He was then 44. His last wish was that he be buried alongside Mary's lonely grave in Clogherbrien. There they rest in peace.

'Tis a wonderful story and one that is given new life every year in the famous, Rose of Tralee contest and young Charlestown women between the ages of 18 and 25 are urged to enter and help the tradition continue. Three young ladies have signed up and the committee would welcome others.

"Through John's efforts, hundreds of children were able to take part and enjoy Charlestown Little League," stated Looney. "John Curtin understood that the key to our future is our young people . . . His name is synonymous with baseball,

Before beginning the presentation ceremony, Looney spoke of the support of community efforts, such as those from Bunker Hill Council 62, Knights of Columbus and The Charlestown Patriot. The pastors of the three Catholic parishes in the town, Fathers James Canniff, James DiPerri and Daniel Mahoney, were on hand to offer their congratulations, and Mayor Thomas Menino was present to add his words of praise.

With great spirit and enthusiasm, committee members began their tributes to the seven award recipients and presented each with a pewter design of the Bunker Hill Monument mounted on an inscribed wood plaque, created by local artist Tom Gorsuch.

Receiving the 1998 Business Award was Bunker Hill Community College, which was presented by committee members Kathy Giordano and Tom Cunha. Giordano noted the college's celebration of its 25th anniversary. She said that "over this past quarter century, the college has used its resources, as well as the many talents of its employees, to work quietly behind the scenes with organizations, schools and individuals in Charlestown toward improving the quality of life in the community."

Giordano pointed out the outreach efforts by the college that have involved Charlestown High and the Edwards Middle schools, Friends of City Square Park, Healthy Charlestown Coalition, Austin Street Beautification Project, Charlestown Preservation Society and the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, to name a few. She also told of the "adoption" of Whelan Park in Thompson Square by college volunteers where bulbs have been planted.

Giordano expressed her pleasure in making the presentation to the college for its 25 years of "excellence in education" and "with hopeful anticipation that this 'sleeping giant' in our midst will continue to find ways of reaching out to the people of Charlestown its home town."

Accepting the award on behalf of the college was Anne Hyde, chairman of the board of trustees, and Mon O'Shea, executive director, Corporate and Community Development.

Hyde stated that she was "honored to receive the award on behalf of the college" and hoped in the future, the institution "would be less of a sleeping giant and more of a participant." O'Shea extended the thanks and appreciation of BHCC President Mary Fifield as well as the students, faculty and staff.

Whether it be programs for children, teens or the elderly, the Charlestown Community Center is there and this year's Organization Award recognized the efforts of its staff and board. Judy Evers and Ruthellen -Chardavoyne were the presenters.

beacon and a safe haven for people of all ages for 25 years." At the top of the list of programs, was the Golden Age Center, "a vital part of this community . . . with hundreds of seniors depending on the services of those who work in the center."

The Adult Education Program was cited as being "vital to many members of this community," providing help for adult learners and those motivated to return to their studies to obtain a GED. It was also noted that staff members are among the founders of the Charlestown Collaborative ESL Program.

Also noted was the outstanding pool and recreation staff that provide a wide-range of activities and outstanding programs. Other programs include Tiny Tots and The Teen Connection. The staff was praised for their hard work, enthusiasm and dedication.

Tom Desmond, chairman of the Community Center Council, and Michelle Gorman, long-time staff member, accepted the award on behalf of the center. They, in turn, introduced Executive Director Bob McGann. Desmond extended his praise to the staff for "the high level of service they provide to a diverse community."

Receiving the Public Service Award for going beyond the call of duty, was the director of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, Jerry Steimel. Committee members Marty O'Brien and Peter Looney presented the award. Looney highlighted some of Steimel's involvement with the club and the community over the past decade.

Steimel took over as director of the club when programs and attendance were at an all-time low. He began instituting kid-oriented programs, adding new activities such as computer literacy, expanding the library, forming an education center and increasing the tutorial component. The club now focuses on educational as well as recreational activities - and even some of the most successful programs of the past are back in action. A real plus is Steimel's creation of The Teen Center and his guiding future space scientists as their leader tin the Rocket Club.

Steimel has encouraged the members to become more active outside the club and he, himself has worked with other organizations, including the Kiwanis Club. Also, Looney stated, "Some seven years ago when CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD) was foundering, Steimel volunteered to co-chair the organization and, since then, the program has grown and developed. He is no longer an officer in CHAD, but there is now a strong CHAD team of interested, committed individuals - and this is due in large part to Steimel."

In making the presentation, Looney said that Steimel's "service to the youth of Charlestown goes far beyond his duties as director of the club."

Steimel told the gathering that he would like to share the award with the staff and volent to the young people of Charlestown." He especially noted the work of the program director, John Killoran.

The New Resident Award went to Kathleen and Vince Taormina and was presented by Tom Cunha and Judy Evers.

The couple have lived in Charlestown only about three years, but during that time they "have contributed time, money and gifts to the many children of the Warren Prescott School."

They initiated a community based reading program which focused on one-to-one reading. Kathleen has spent "countless hours contacting local businesses and political leaders to get involved in this reading program and the response has been overwhelming." In addition, both of them read with the same child once a week and they have donated children's books to the library.

It was noted that the Taormina's helped build the playground at the Warren Prescott and even hung the wooden animals around the playground at night so as to surprise the children in the morning.

Other activities noted included hosting block parties so neighbors could meet and decorating their home for the holidays for the enjoyment of community residents.

Vince spoke for the couple in accepting the award. He said that being in Charlestown has been "fabulous," adding that "this is a wonderful place . . . it's the place to be."

Mary Wilkins received this year's "Elderly" Award from Mel Stillman and Kathy Giordano, who began her presentation by saying, "It is a given assumption that the recipient of the 1998 Elderly Award should not be eligible for this honor. Anyone who knows this year's winner can't imagine that she is old enough to be included in this category." She went on to say that "elderly is defined as those 55 years of age or older and this year's recipient - in all our hearts - just barely makes this distinction. So, for this year we'll call it the Outstanding Volunteer Award!"

Giordano took the audience back to 1973 when Wilkins started to teach CCD as a volunteer for St. Mary's Parish and how it would change the life of the parish and its parishioners." She was soon appointed coordinator of the CCD program and went on to teach the First Communion classes, which again led to her becoming the coordinator, a role she held over over 10 years. It was then onto the Confirmation classes.

In 1984, she took on the duties of secretary and worked in the rectory on Monument Square until her early retirement last fall. The donation of her time and talents went far above her duties as secretary and her involvement included Christmas bazaars, summer day camp, elderly retreats and the very special Bible School.

Wilkins told of her reaction when Looney called to tell her she had been selected to receive the Elderly Award. She said that denial brought her to a mirror and, upon looking closely, she had to say, "I am elderly," and she graciously accepted the award.

The 1998 Youth Award went to Neal Boyle, who was recognized by committee members Moe Gillen and Jim Mansfield. Mansfield told of the involvement of this young man, a junior at Boston Latin School, where he has maintained honor roll or high honors every term. He has participated in chorus, clubs, the school newspaper, school literary magazine, community service projects, swim team member and was a founder of the school's Students Against Drunk Driving.

Boyle has been an active participant in St. Catherine's Parish, the Boys & Girls Club,/ Youth Voice Collaborative, WBZ's Kid Company, and has been a teen reporter for the Boston Globe, a writer for "Greenspeak" ... to name just a few involvements.

Boyle expressed his thanks, noting there was "nothing left to say." However, he did introduce his family with pride.

The Unsung Hero Award went to Gerard Doherty, who was unable to attend the event, and his nephew, Dan Doherty, accepted the award from Looney and O'Brien on his behalf.

Looney outlined some of the involvements of Gerard Doherty, who served as campaign director for Sen. Robert Kennedy in Indiana in 1968, and in 1977, he held the same position in New York for Jimmy Carter. He was special U.S. delegate to the funeral of Pope John Paul I in 1977. Looney went on to say that Doherty "has done many things and traveled many places, but he has never forgotten the town he loves nor what he learned in Charlestown . . . take care of your own."

Looney spoke on a personal note of how, when he told his wife of Doherty's selection, she said he had helped her get her first job. That statement led him to think of how many people in the hall had been helped by Doherty, and he added that "we will never know how many lives he has touched . . . taking care of his own, being a good neighbor." Looney acknowledged the help Doherty has given in fund raising for Charlestown Catholic and credited him with the knack of getting people to do things to help and leave them thinking it was their idea.


He concluded by stating that "Gerard Doherty loves Charlestown and we want him to know that Charlestown loves Gerard Doherty."

NEW TAX CHANGES AFFECT ALL BUSINESSES

Although most coverage of the *Taxpayer Relief* Act of 1997 has focused on individuals, the new law also includes changes for businesses. Most are favorable, a few are unfavorable, and nearly all carry the cost of added complexity. Here are some of the more widely applicable changes:

• Long-term capital gains rates will drop for business sole proprietors and owners of passthrough entities, such as partnerships, S corporations and limited liability companies. For most taxpayers, the maximum rate is reduced from 28% to 20%. To qualify for the lower rates, capital assets must be held for more than 18 months rather than the former 12-month holding period.


The changes in rates and holding periods became effective on different dates during 1997, so each 1997 sale should be reviewed with a professional. The reductions are not available to regular "C" corporations.

• Under the old law, net operating losses could be carried back three years and forward fifteen. The new law generally changes these periods to two years back and twenty years forward.

• Beginning in 1998, the alternative minimum tax (AMT) is repealed for businesses averaging \$5 million or less in gross receipts. The AMT, a required parallel tax computation, often resulted in additional tax liability for companies taking large depreciation deductions or net operating losses to reduce their regular taxable income.

The 1997 Act is broad enough to affect nearly every business in one way or another. Retirement plans, estimated tax requirement, home office deductions, corporate reorganizations, and estate tax exclusions for family businesses are some of the other areas changed by the new law.
