Shannon McLaughlin, a Charlestown teen-ager, will be profiled on the locally produced documentary "Lean On Me," scheduled to air at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 14 on WFXT-Fox 25.

Poll Results Spur Unique Media Buy





★ Charlestown Neighborhood Council . . . The CNC Committee-of-the Whole will hold a public meeting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 24 at Bishop Lawton Hall, St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill St. to discuss the plans of J. M. Cashman Inc. to use the Charlestown Marine Park at 425 Medford St. as a transfer site for landfill from Deer Island as part of the Boston Harbor Cleanup Project.

Representatives from J.M. Cashman Inc., the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority, Marine Park Ltd. Partnership/Harold Brown, Boston Health and Hospitals and the Boston Environmental Department have been invited to attend.

The public is welcome.

★ 425 Medford St.... The city of Boston Public Safety Commission, Committee on Licenses, has denied without prejudice an appeal by Harold Brown's Marine Park Ltd. Partnership to store fuel and house a garage at 425 Medford St., the site of the former Amstar Sugar refinery. The Sept. 9 hearing took place before Inspectional Services Commissioner Thomas McNicholas, Boston Fire Department Fire Prevention Captain Maurice Mahoney, Boston Transportation Department Official Donald Kehoe and Commission Secretary William Keddy.

Brown's legal advisor, Attorney Bernard Shadrawy Jr., informed the Commission that the appeal was made on behalf of Baystate Express, a tenant of the property. McNicholas stated that the request was not a legal use of the site and the appellant should not have come before the Commission prior to holding a public hearing in Charlestown. McNicholas informed Shadrawy to go before the Charlestown Neighborhood Council before reapplying for permits.

Health and Hospitals Inspector John Shea stated that there was a major asbestos problem at the site, adding that it was the most contaminated site he had seen in 10 years.

Judy Evers, community liaison for the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, stated that she was asked to speak on behalf of 200 families from CharlesNewtown and hundreds of residents from the Bunker Hill Housing Development to express their strong opposition to the request because of public safety issues.

Representatives of the community at the hearing included Charlestown Neighborhood Council Chairman Peter Looney, Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield and member Bob Scalli.

Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini had notified the Commission of his opposition based on the lack of com-

munity notification on the appeal and public safety issues. He urged the Commission to demand community participation on any planning for the site.

Sen. Thomas Birmingham also sent representation to the hearing in support of the community's opposition.

★ Police Officer Injured . . . A Boston Police Officer was seriously injured by five Charlestown men after one of the men was placed under arrest by the officer for public drinking and the possession of a class D substance. The incident occurred on Friday, Sept. 4 at 1:15 a.m. on Main Street at Mishawum Park.

Officer Michael Calabro spotted the group of men outside 230 Main St. and noticed one of them drinking from a can of beer. Upon closer observation, Calabro also found the man to be smoking marijuana. As Calabro was placing the man under arrest, four of his friends attacked the officer, knocking him to the ground. The four, who have been identified, proceeded to kick the officer and beat him. Calabro suffered facial lacerations and injuries to his back, neck and chest. He was taken to Boston City Hospital for treatment.

A call was placed for "an officer in trouble," bringing five police cruisers into the neighborhoods. The four suspects fled on foot from the scene when the additional police officers arrived. After a search of the area, two were apprehended and placed under arrest for assault and battery with a dangerous weapon and aiding in an escape of a person under lawful custody. Complaints for the remaining suspects were sought in the Charlestown District Court.

According to Area A Community Services Officer Joseph McNulty, all suspects were in their early 20s. A crackdown by local patrols has taken place since the incident, McNulty stated, adding "no more warnings are being given."

★ Charlestown Navy Yard . . . The Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital on Nashua Street is scheduled to be razed as part of the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel (CA/T) project. In searching for an appropriate site to relocate the hospital, the Charlestown Navy Yard's Yard End section has received serious consideration.

The report of the Charlestown location was released in a Boston Globe article on Sept. 5. According to the article, the hospital would be removed to make space for a series of tunnels under the Charles River connecting the new highway system with Storrow Drive and I-93. The tunnel scheme is part of the revised Central Artery/North Area (CANA) connection with CA/T, replacing the controversial Scheme

Z proposal.

Representatives from the Boston Redevelopment Authority and State Transportation Secretary Richard Taylor have reportedly held a series of meetings regarding the relocation of the hospital to Charlestown. The site mentioned would be adjacent to the Mass. General Hospital buildings in the Navy Yard.

Confirmation from BRA Director Paul Barrett could not be attained by press time.

★ Ironsides Toastmasters . . . seeks new members. ★ Olives Restaurant . . . The city of Boston Licensing Board has set a hearing date of Wednesday, Sept. 23 at 10 a.m. to consider a petition by Olives, Inc. "Olives," 67 Main St., Charlestown, holder of a C.V. 7-day malt and wine beverage license to remove a restriction forbidding "take out" from the premises.

The hearing, which will take place in Room 809A at Boston City Hall, is open to the public.

The location, 67 Main St., is the former site of Olives restaurant. A new eatery opened at 10 City Square this past June.

The Mayor's Office of Consumer Affairs and Licensing granted a request by Olives restaurant at 10 City Square to increase the restaurant capacity from 125 to 145 seats. The Sept. 9 approval requires the restaurant's owners, Olivia and Todd English, to return by Oct. 15 with a detailed floor plan outlining the increased usage, along with an inspection report by the Boston Fire Department.

Commissioner Diane Modica informed the Englishes that she had received a number of complaints from residents of Park Street regarding improper trash disposal. To eliminate the abutters' complaints, the restaurant owners agreed to place a dumpster at the rear of the building as a trashdisposal unit.

★ Street Reconstruction Update . . . Bryant Associates Inc. engineer Ralph Cunningham reports that the bonding company, St. Paul Mercury Insurance Co., is evaluating the street contract in preparation for the rebidding process with prospective new contractors. This process, Cunningham stated, should take a few more days and new contractor is expected to be chosen by next week.

Cunningham stated that the Middlesex Paving Co. will be taking on the responsibility of handling any emergency repairs needed during the interim between the departure of the John Mahoney Construction Co. from the streets of Charlestown until a new contractor is hired. Emergency calls may be made to Judy Evers, community liaison for the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, at 635-3485, or Peter Looney, community liaison for the street reconstruction contracts, at 722-4300 ext. 5674.

According to Cunningham, the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) reconstruction project continues to proceed on schedule. At the present time, concrete is being poured for the foundations of the stairs. This time-consuming, precise and meticulous work is approximately one-third complete, and is expected to be finished within 10 weeks. Cunningham added that the recent rain storms have caused delays in the schedule.

★ School Begins . . . Can Christmas Be Far Behind? Two meetings are being held to begin preparations for two annual holiday events.






