Halloween Happenings Highlight Weekend Activities In Charlestown



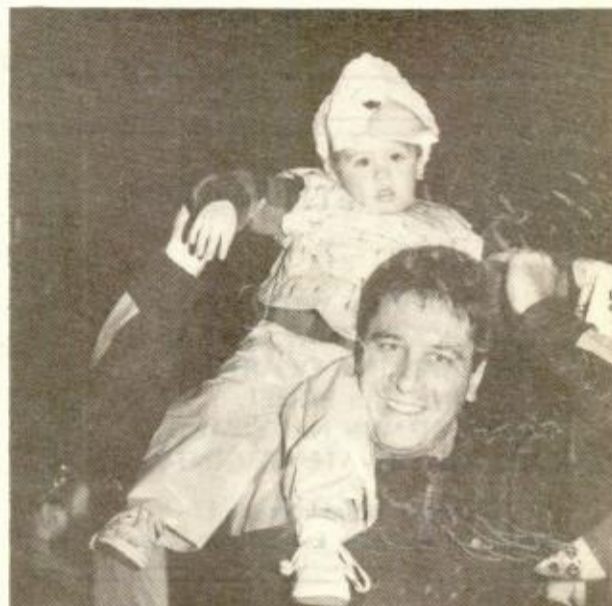

ton — an election which saw some 6,394 persons, representing 79 per cent of the registered voters in Ward Two, Charlestown, go to the polls.

In Tuesday's City of Boston Election, 44 per cent of the registered voters in this community cast their ballots, four per cent higher than the average for the City as a whole, but low for this traditionally politically active area. The unofficially listed 3,499 of the total of 7,945 registered voters in the community as going out to the polls.

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn captured 57 per cent of the Charlestown vote, some ten per cent lower than his city-wide average, with 43 per cent going to his challenger, City Councillor Joseph Tierney. The Mayor captured all seven



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Charlestown Navy Yard To Be Site Of Vietnam Memorial

On a crisp autumn day in late October, after many disappointing months searching for an appropriate site for the construction of a statewide memorial honoring all Massachusetts Vietnam Veterans, Scott Ployer, executive director of the Memorial Fund, escorted by City Councillors Albert O'Neil and Robert Travaglini met Boston Redevelopment Authority Executive Director Stephen Coyle and Assistant Director of Harbor Planning and Development John Leigh at Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard, the site of the soon to be built memorial.

Coyle stated that Mayor Raymond Flynn and the City Council, as well as the Boston Redevelopment Authority, give their total support of the memorial being placed in the Charlestown Navy Yard. He further stated that it is hoped that the dedication of the memorial will take place on Harborpark Day in the fall of 1988.

Ployer commented on the memorial being "designed to perpetuate the memory of the 1,325 men and one woman from Massachusetts who were killed in action or remain missing in action, as well as to honor those who returned to live and work in our communities." Over 260,000 Massachusetts citi-

zens served in this country's Armed Forces during the Vietnam era, between 1959 and 1975.

Councillor O'Neil stated that 40 other states have already constructed memorials and paid for the cost, but in Massachusetts all funds needed are being raised through donations to the Memorial Fund. To date, one quarter of a million dollars has been raised and construction materials and services have been donated. The total cost of the memorial and its perpetual care is

estimated to amount to \$1 million.

Councillor Travaglini stated that he is confident that the needed funds will be raised through the "good people of Massachusetts."

Travaglini also expressed his delight that this "Memorial will be placed in Boston near the Freedom Trail so that more tourists and citizens of the Commonwealth can have an oppor-

tunity to visit and reflect on the significance of the memorial."

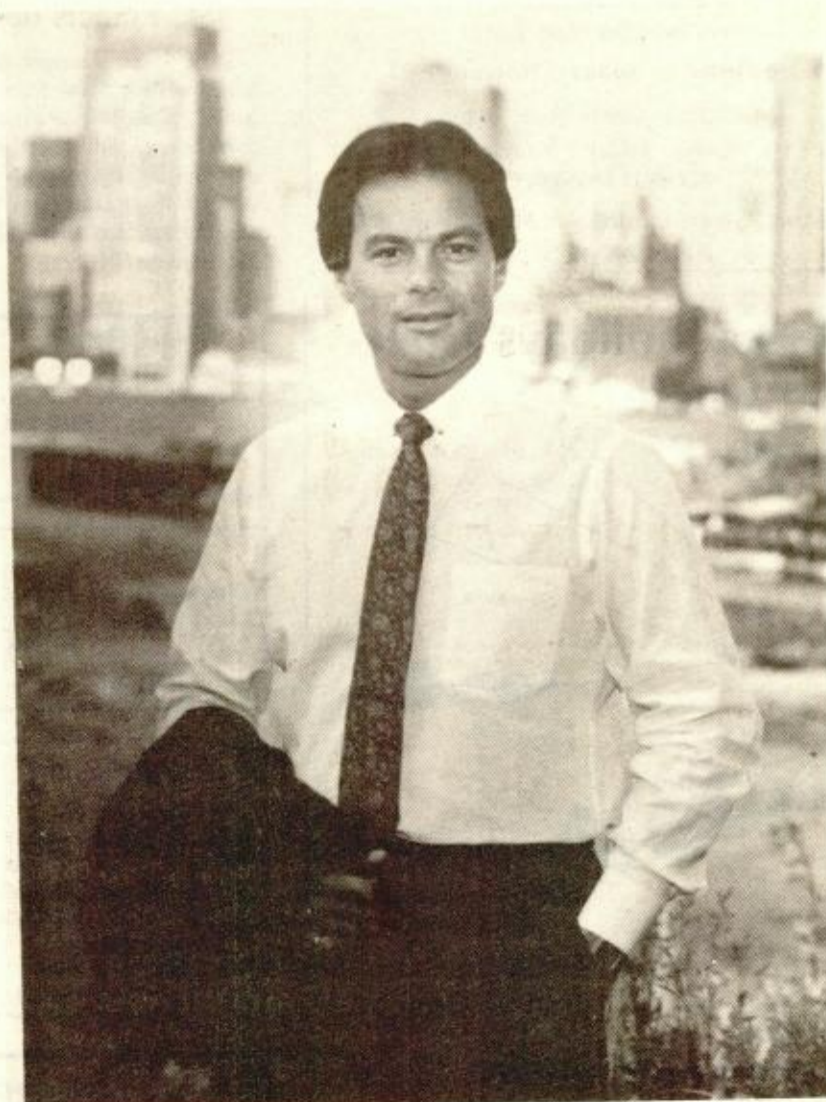

"Information Please" At Logan Launched By Massport/State Police

Massport Executive Director David W. Davis and Acting Aviation Director Patrick B. Moscaritolo have joined Massachusetts Public Safety Commissioner William McCabe of Charlestown and Captain Edward Cronin to announce the Massachusetts State Police Troop F new "Information Please" program at Logan International Airport.

According to David, the "Information Please pro-

gram is similar to Drop-A-Dime programs already established in Boston, Revere and Lynn." He added, "The program is geared toward six crimes that have occurred at Logan; cargo thefts, baggage thefts, pickpocketing, garage larcenies, drug use and drug smuggling."

Commissioner McCabe called the program a "useful tool to prevent crime." He said, "Since the program began in April, the

State Police have received numerous phone calls leading to the arrest of several people involved in crimes both on and off the airport."

Moscaritolo pointed out that the program will be publicized throughout the airport. "A four-color poster has been designed for placement in employee offices, bus shelters, employee parking lots, taxi pools and parking garages, near elevators and telephone locations." He added that posters will also be placed in Ackerley advertising kiosks in baggage claim areas and along concourses in terminals.

In addition, special post cards with peel-off phone stickers describing the program will be mailed to all airport tenants as well.

Captain Cronin emphasized the "importance of cooperation from tenants, employees and the general public if the program is to work properly." He pointed out that all phone calls are in the "strictest of confidence."

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Garbage And Street Depressions Continue To Take Their Toll

The Green Street saga and the lack of garbage pick-up in two separate areas continue to plague the Charlestown community.

Green Street has another problem, in addition to the sewage leak and unpleasant odor. A mystery hole, measuring approximately 18 inches in depth, has suddenly appeared near the corner of Main and Green Streets.

Walkers beware so as not to stumble upon or into it.

Although originally believed to be caused by Boston Gas Company digging in the area, the Gas Company spokesman stated that all excavations undertaken by that company were filled in. Thus, the hole's origin remains unknown.

Frank Arricale, director of Public Information for the Gas Company, said that the hole will be investigated.

The five month long Green Street sewage problem has been put on hold because of inconclusive information as to the source of the leak, according to Judy Evers, community liaison for the Mayor's Of-

fice of Neighborhood Services, who has spoken with engineers working on this problem. Evers quoted John Ready of Briggs Engineering as saying that progress is being made, but they cannot tear up the street without knowing the location of the leak.

Evers added that consultants and contractors hired by the owners of the three properties involved, Boston Water and Sewer and City engineers will meet on Green Street this Friday, November 6 to discuss the situation, identify the problem, and find a resolution. Because digging is expected to commence on Friday, Green Street will be closed between Main and High Streets from 9:00 a.m. to noon. Should the work become more extensive, these hours will be extended, she said.

Nearby in Thompson Square, a pile of opened garbage bags has spread across the sidewalk as they have sat untouched by garbage men since Friday, October 30. A resident stated that she notified the City of Boston Code Enforcement

of the situation on Monday. The city employee in Code Enforcement told the caller that she did not know which day of the week garbage is collected in this particular area. At press time, the garbage remained.

And finally, the garbage mini-series occurring at the former DaPratto Statuary building, located at the corner of Main and Essex Streets took a dramatic twist on November 2nd when the owner of the property hired a private company to collect the nearly 100 bags of garbage piled eight feet high, to avoid prosecution in housing court after health inspectors visited the site and cited residents, according to Evers. Approximately half of the garbage was taken away, although a large amount does remain.

Frank Sylvester, senior health inspector for the rodent control department, said he will monitor the area himself each Friday until the day of the show cause hearing to ensure that the area continues to be maintained. If his records show the garbage again

piles up without removal, he will recommend in housing court that action be taken to enforce regular trash collection. Should removal meet his satisfaction, Sylvester said he would dismiss the case.

He added that he has some concern regarding the lack of containers for the bags, and he is not satisfied with the bags simply placed behind the fence.

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Human Services Committee Approves New Freedom Trail Route

The Human Services
Committee of the Neigh-

borhood Council met on
October 28 with represen-
tatives of the National Park

Service (NPS) and resi-
dents to discuss the re-rout-
ing of the Freedom Trail
through Charlestown until
the construction work in the
City Square area is com-
pleted. Ten people gathered
at the Bunker Hill Museum
on Monument Square to
analyze the best walking
routes for visitors as they
tour the historic sites of the
Town.

Two changes were dis-
cussed at the meeting that
received the approval of the
Committee, but the NPS
must now await approval
from the Neighborhood
Council at their November
4 meeting before they can
initiate the changes. In ad-
dition to the route changes,
the group had some discus-
sion concerning printing a
brochure to guide visitors
to other sites in Charles-
town.

One of the changes
would direct pedestrians up
Tremont Street, across
Lexington Street onto the
sidewalk along the side of
the Monument as opposed

to the side with the houses.
The other change would
have visitors exiting the
Monument grounds on the
Monument Avenue side,
crossing to the Bunker Hill
Museum, and after either
entering or passing the Mu-
seum, pedestrians would
walk along Monument
Square to Winthrop Street.
Continuing along, they
would travel down Win-
throp Street and enter into
the Training Field, and
from the Training Field the
tourists would walk down
Winthrop Street to Main
Street.

Charlestown resident
Ron Taylor and Committee
Chairperson Moe Gillen
both said that the Training
Field should be accessible
to Freedom Trail hikers.
As Taylor said and Kay
Whelan, president of the
Historical Society confirm-
ed, the Training Field is
older than the Monument
area and would be an his-
torical point of interest for
visitors.

Also discussed at the
meeting were plans to or-
ganize a brochure for visi-
tors to Charlestown. Taylor
added that other points of
interest in the community
not on the route of the Free-
dom Trail but within rea-
sonable walking distance
should be detailed in a bro-
chure distributed to visi-
tors. Additionally, printing
the names of the streets that
the route follows would
prevent tourists from be-
coming lost, he said.

Gillen noted that the bus-
iness community was not
being heard from on the
matter of the re-routing, as
their establishments would
be influenced by the chan-
ges. Park Ranger John Pil-
tzecker, newly appointed
supervisor at the Bunker
Hill Monument, said that
NPS will meet with mer-
chants, the Historical Soci-
ety and Preservation Soci-
ety concerning places that
should be listed in the bro-
chure.

One important detail that

should be included in the
brochure would be direc-
tions to rest rooms along the
route, the residents told the
NPS representatives. When
Piltzecker said that many
rangers already guide tour-
ists to the needed facilities
at the Monument, Whelan
noted that many Bunker
Hill Monument rangers di-
rect visitors across the
street to the Museum rest
rooms instead of those at
the Monument. Piltzecker
showed surprise and some
dismay upon learning this
news and told Whelan that
should it occur in the future
he should be notified at the
time.

The changes in the Free-
dom Trail will be marked
with a painted red line and
posted signs, according to
John Debo of the NPS. Judy
Evers, community liaison
for the Mayor's Of-
fice of Neighborhood Ser-
vices said that following the
approval of the Council,
the changes will become
effective.

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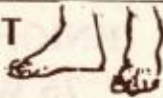

Opposed To Congregate Housing Not Opposed To Elderly Housing

Dear Ms. Chapnick:

I have attended the two public meetings regarding the Municipal Building at 112 Bunker Hill Street, Charlestown. After reviewing my notes and the comments at the meeting of October 20, I have concluded I am opposed to congregate housing.

On October 22, I called Public Facilities and left a message for Ms. Ann Wilson informing her of my decision. At approximately 4:00 p.m. on the 22nd, Mr. Barry Berman returned my call and we discussed the pros and cons of congregate housing.

My opposition is based on 21 years experience working with senior citizens. If they are "young" elderly, "old" elderly or "frail" elderly, in my opinion, they should be given the dignity of a private bathroom and shower facilities (not shared by 2 and 4 people).

Also, they should have kitchen facilities so they can make a meal or tea when they wish to do so.

Another issue was homemaker services. Ms. Jeanne Moltenbrey of the Department of Elder Affairs, stated, after I brought up the number of hours a client is allowed is mandated by the state and therefore Senior Homecare is limited to the number of hours a client will receive, that the limitation could be waived for residents of congregate housing. If indeed this is fact, then seniors living in public housing or housing other than congregate housing are restricted to the number of hours of homemaker services they receive. This is a classic case of discrimination.

I do not oppose elderly housing; I do oppose congregate housing.

precincts in the Town, with margins ranging from 20 votes in Precinct Five to 93 votes in Precinct Two.

Incumbent City Councillor Albert L. "Dapper" O'Neil topped the slate for At-Large City Council with 68 per cent of the vote cast in Charlestown for that office. He was followed by incumbent Michael McCormack with 47 per cent. Incumbent Christopher Iannella took 38 per cent and newcomer Rosaria Salerno captured 26 per cent locally.

Three of the candidates for At-Large City Council had substantial votes in this Ward, but were out of the money in the city-wide race. Former City Councillor Fred Langone polled 38 per cent, Stephen Murphy 37 per cent, and School Committee Member Joe Casper received 35 per cent.

District One School Committee Member and President of the School Committee, John Nucci, was the top vote-getter in Charlestown, polling 2,383 or 68 per cent of the vote in his quest for an At-Large

seat on the Boston School Committee.

Nucci, a resident of East Boston, placed first on the ballot city-wide. Following the election, Nucci stated, "I am absolutely delighted. Topping the ticket city-wide is a considerable achievement and I'd like to think that it means my leadership and commitment has been recognized in every neighborhood. I look forward to serving city-wide. It's been a real valuable learning experience to have been a city-wide candidate."

Second to Nucci city-wide and in Ward Two, was Rita Walsh-Tomasini, who has been a dedicated At-Large member of the School Committee. She polled a 53 per cent vote in Charlestown.

Placing third in the Charlestown tally with 42 per cent of the vote but out of the running city-wide, was Michael Kennedy, who was virtually unknown. One political observer noted that this was the perfect example of voters casting a ballot based simply on name recognition.

Incumbents John O'Bryant and Jean McGuire were

re-elected to At-Large seats on the School Committee with 33 and 35 per cent of the Charlestown vote, respectively.

Incumbent District One City Councillor Robert Travaglini was re-elected to his third term, capturing 65 per cent of the Charlestown vote and 61 per cent of the vote in the District. His challenger, East Boston businesswoman Maria DiLibero, campaigned long and hard in an effort to unseat the incumbent.

Travaglini told the Patriot, "First of all, I would like to share this victory equally with each and every individual who worked so diligently throughout the

course of the campaign to ensure victory. Secondly, I would like to commend my opponent, Maria DiLibero, for a very formidable campaign which highlighted issues of concern which she felt needed to be addressed. I spoke to her last evening (Election night) and assured her that she would have the opportunity to converse with me relative to her concerns."

"And finally," stated Travaglini, "I am deeply grateful for the overwhelming vote of confidence that the Charlestown community has given me and I pledge not to betray the trust and confidence placed in me to represent the residents full-time and effectively."

In a contest that was too close for the political pundits to call, Robert Meany Cappucci captured the District One School Committee seat with 54 per cent of the vote in Charlestown and 52 per cent throughout the District. Only 260 votes separated Cappucci and his opponent, Attorney Stephen Tassinari, in Charlestown. Cappucci has been a familiar figure in Charlestown for the past several years, having run for public office on several occasions including District City Council in 1983, United States Congress in the Eighth District in 1984 and again in 1986.

State Officials Review Improvements To Charlestown Skating Rink

State Representative Richard A. Voke and Metropolitan District Commissioner William J. Geary were joined by Ann Considine and Phil Coleman of the Charlestown Youth Hockey Association this past week to review the recent improvements made to the MetroParks Emmons-Horrigan-O'Neil Rink in Charlestown. The inspection tour was made in anticipation of the rink reopening scheduled for November 15.

A total of \$550,000 was appropriated through a legislative measure co-sponsored by Representative Voke and Senator Fran Doris to replace the trouble plagued ice bed and refrigeration system at the O'Neil Rink. After securing this funding, Charlestown's two state legislators worked with Commissioner Geary and other MDC officials to ensure that all repairs and improvements would be done in a timely fashion without interruption to the skating season.

"This is certainly a very happy day for Senator Doris and me," exclaimed Voke. "Knowing how unreliable this ice rink has been in the past, while also realizing how vitally important its reliable operation is to the many youth groups and others who utilize it, Doris and I worked together to secure the funding and coordinate the schedule of repairs. Needless to say, we are both quite pleased to see that a much improved rink is now ready to be opened in Charlestown."

In his comments, Geary praised Voke and Doris for their role in the O'Neil Rink renovations, saying, "Representative Voke and Senator Doris were instrumental in providing the funding that made the improvements to the rink possible. Thanks to their generous support, residents of the Charlestown area can enjoy a first-class ice skating facility for many winter seasons to come."

Although the rink was held together last year

through a "band aid" approach, Voke noted that in past years the rink seemed to be constantly shut down. "The band aid solution was no solution at all. We were constantly faced with shut downs and costly repair bills with no end in sight. Finally, we can all look forward to a rink well equipped to operate a peak performance."

Earlier this fall, when it became evident that their efforts to replace the rink bed and refrigeration system had succeeded, Voke and Doris turned to the MDC to make even more improvements to the local facility. "I am also happy to announce that an agreement has been reached with the MDC to place stands in the rink for public use," commented Voke. Although the special order for the stands could not be done in time to meet the November opening, it was generally agreed upon that the work to place the stands in the rink could be done during the skating year, without interrupting the service. "Their dedication to the kids was very evident from the start of this process and was indeed inspirational," stated Voke.

"What pleases us the most is that the reliability and convenience of this newly improved rink should greatly aid our local youth programs. Because our kids surely have felt the effects of the poor ice facilities in the past, both Senator Doris and I sincerely hope that our efforts to improve this rink will provide them with many worthwhile and exciting moments," concluded Voke.

Heelen To Be Inducted Into EHS Hall Of Fame

English High School, the first public high school in America, will induct fifteen Charter Members into the Athletic Hall of Fame at the First Annual Hall of Fame Banquet on November 12 at Lombardo's in Randolph.

Five of the fifteen will be inducted posthumously.

Among the ten living legends to be inducted, selected from over 100 nominees, is Jim Heelen, a member of the class of 1964.

A Charlestown native, Heelen lettered in swimming, football and track.

On February 22, 1964 another of English's great athletic achievements occurred when the E.H.S. Swim Team became the first team from Eastern Massachusetts to win the State Championship. Coach Dan Tarpey (EHS - '44) credited the title to his senior co-captain, Jim Heelen. Tarpey says he'll never forget Heelen's feat. Heelen climbed out of a sick bed with a temperature of 103 degrees and his eyes closed from the bug, consumed a gallon of orange juice on the long trek to the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. On that memorable day, Jim Heelen anchored the two winning relays,

recording his best times ever to post the Blue and Blue to its championship. Coach Tarpey said, "that is the sum and substance of Heelen's character."

Another memorable feat attributed to Heelen was portrayed in the EHS — Latin football game of 1963 when he tallied two of the Blue and Blue's three touchdowns — one an 87 yard kickoff return, and he had a pass interception in the waning minutes to preserve English's 18-12 victory.

Heelen matriculated at Northeastern, where his football talents earned him honors on the All-New England Team and an invitation to the Patriot's camp.

Heelen now resides in Marblehead with his wife, the former Kathleen Hoey, and their three sons, Scott, Greg and Kirk. He is currently employed at Boston University as Executive Director of the Office of Rental Property Management.

Heelen has never forgotten his heritage and is quickly willing to identify himself as a "Townie."

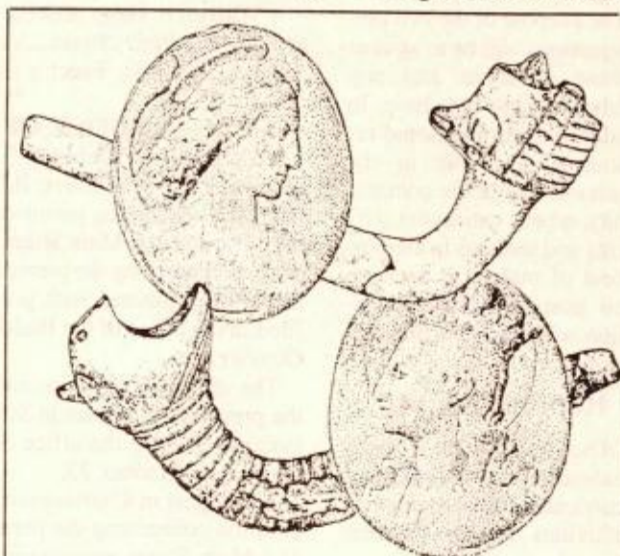
Bradley Author Of Recently Published Book On Onondaga Iroquois Indians

A strong characteristic of a certain neighborhood in Boston named Charlestown is that its inhabitants know their American history as well as they know current political events. Granted, this knowledge usually focuses upon the time period encompassing the American Revolution, because of the relevant involvement of this community.

However, there is one Charlestown resident who turned his attention to another aspect of the early American past and recently published a book on his study.

James W. Bradley penned a book entitled "Evolution of the Onondaga Iro-

quois. Accommodating Change, 1500-1655" which, according to the book's jacket, "examines the Onondaga Iroquois, the central nation of the Iroquois Confederacy, and how their culture changed as a result of contact with Europeans.

In Bradley's own words, the first American citizens learned to incorporate tools of the Europeans into their own culture. The Indians did not rapidly disappear because of infectious diseases carried to this country by the new settlers from the Old World. Thus, the Indians survived "tremendous change" without coming "apart at the seams."

work at Syracuse University. This book grew out of his 1979 doctorate.

Over the past few years, Bradley has been a familiar figure at Lorraine's Coffee Shop on Saturday mornings, working on the manuscript for this book amidst the hustle and bustle of patrons seeking eggs, toast and coffee.

History is more than just an avocation with Bradley, it is his vocation as well, for he is the Director of the Division of Preservation Planning for the Massachusetts Historical Commission.

Bradley moved to Charlestown in 1981 and currently resides on Park Street with his wife, Peggy. Peggy may be familiar to "Townies" as she plays an active role in the North Area Task Force. Bradley, himself, has served as a Trustee of the Charlestown Preservation Society.

He described Charlestown as "home" for him and his wife as they are "interested in the issues of the town."

The publication of the book was celebrated with a reception at the Globe Corner Bookstore last month and Bradley indicated his delight in seeing his long years of work finally in print with the fine illustrations and maps complimenting the text.

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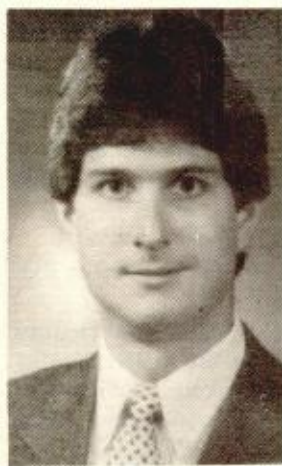

SSNs FOR KIDS AND OTHER DEPENDENTS by Peter Toland Social Security Manager in Boston

Nex year, over 100 million taxpayers will file tax returns for calendar year 1987. Those who list a dependent age five or older will be required to show a Social Security number for that dependent. This is a requirement of the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

About two-thirds of all children already have a Social Security number, so they will not have to obtain another one. But parents whose children are among the one-third without Social Security numbers should apply for a number for any child age five or older. Adults who are listed as dependents on tax returns also must have Social Security numbers, if they don't already.

It would be wise to obtain a Social Security number for a dependent this year. If people wait until next year, Social Security offices may be very busy and there could be delays in issuing numbers.

Parents can apply for numbers for their children by mail or phone at any Social Security office. Or, they can make an appointment to apply in person. If a dependent is 18 or older, he or she must apply in person.

Evidence of the dependent's date of birth, United States Citizenship or lawful alien status, and identity is required. A public birth record established before age five is generally sufficient to prove age and United States Citizenship. School, medical, day care, and certain other records can be used for identity.

Young people who obtain a Social Security number now will be prepared to enter the work force later. Nearly everyone needs a Social Security number sooner or later because most work is covered by Social Security.

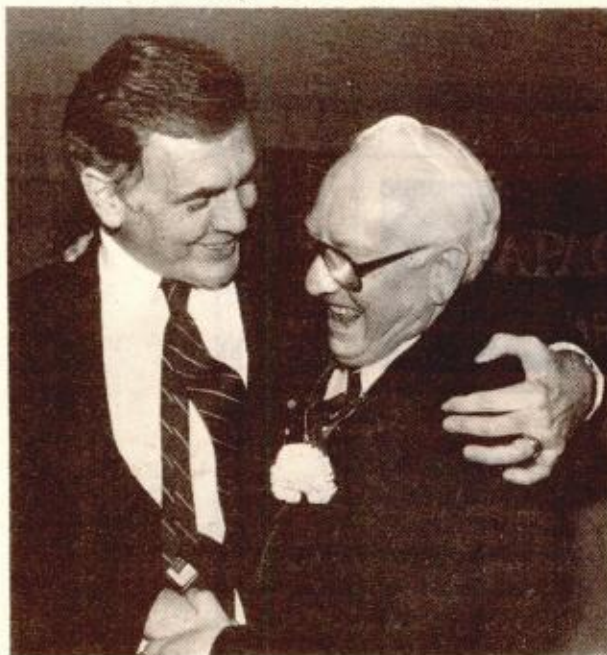

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Saturday Work On CANA Project Subject Of Tonight's MDPW Meeting

The Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) will sponsor a public information meeting to discuss the inclusion of Saturday work hours for the Central Artery North Area (CANA) project on Thursday, November 5 at 7:00 p.m. in the lower hall of the Knights of Columbus, 75 West School Street.

According to the MDPW, allowing the contractor to work Saturdays, extending the project work week from five eleven-hour work days to six, will effectively cut a year off the project's completion date.

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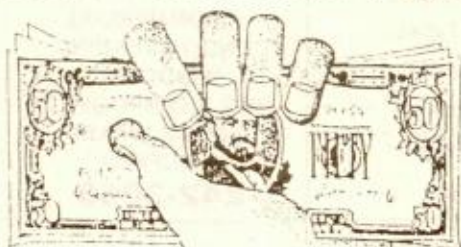
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
