EDWARD LEE JOHNSON

Edward Lee Johnson, son of Florence and the late Lee Johnson, was born on February 16, 1946. After attending the Clarence R. Edwards and Boston Technical High School, he joined the United States Marine Corps on November 1, 1965 and was assigned to the Navy Military Provincial Hospital Assistance Program Team N2 Compound.

While manning a machine gun at Hoi An, Quang Nam Province, under intense enemy mortar, rocket and small arms fire, Edward lost his life in the service of his Country on August 27, 1967.

A Bronze Star medal with Combat V was awarded posthumously to his parents on May 18, 1968. The Edward Lee Johnson Memorial Chapel at Hoi An Compound, 50 miles from DaNang, was dedicated on March 3, 1968.

To the delight of the youngsters, Santa Claus arrived atop Boston Fire Department's Ladder 9 to begin the festivities.

The Raymond Group must be commended for their generosity. To these children, many of whom have been emotionally scarred by the fire, it was the boost desperately needed to return the sparkle to their eyes, that which is the essence and true spirit of this special holiday. One community leader attending the party was overheard remarking that, although many children enrolled in the Headstart Program will fully enjoy Christmas, "there are others in this room who will receive nothing more than what is given to them here today!"

For the past twenty years, the Headstart Program alone has been able to reach these children, the ones who seem to fall between the cracks, and offer them a safe, secure classroom to go to each day with caring teachers who give them not only the fundamental foundation on their climb up the educational ladder, but also a sense of self worth that will stay with them all through their life.

Of the over 160 youngsters between three and ten years of age enrolled in the school, 108 are left without a classroom because of the lack of adequate facilities. Although many offers have come in to facilitate the lost classrooms, none have been found licensable space. The school must have space in a certified facility.

Many donations of toys and supplies have been offered, but due to the safety restrictions imposed on these items and the desire to retain the quality of education previously provided by the program, this equipment will have to be purchased by a qualified administrator to meet the requirements for certifica-

Commish Johnson will have more information on the Banquet at a later date.

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
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Voke Honored By Hotels And Motels Association

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
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
