
Charlestown To Commemorate The 215th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill *********

The highlight of the celebration of the 215th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday afternoon, June 17 through the streets of Charlestown.

This parade is sponsored

by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the city of Boston.

1 p.m., will be Chief Marshal William McCabe, the Commissioner of Public Safety for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. As of July 1, McCabe will be the commanding officer of the State, Metro, Capitol and Registry of Motor Vehicles Police Department under the consolidating act of Massachusetts.

McCabe served 26 years in the Massachusetts State Police, attaining the rank of Lieutenant Colonel by the time he reached the mandatory retirement age of 50. McCabe, a lifelong resi-

dent of Charlestown, is a Korean-era veteran of the U.S. Army where he served as an E/5 (staff sergeant) in the Signal Corps.

McCabe has served in various capacities in several Charlestown organizations. (continued on page 17)



Jack Sheehan Testimonial Set For June 21

It's hard to believe - but it's true. Jack Sheehan is not a "Townie" - at least not under the definition of the word. Legend has it that a Townie is a person born in the community. But if the truth be known, "Townieism" is much more than that. It is an intangible spirit that can only be seen through a glimmer in the eye or through the warmth of a smile. The essence of that spirit is one of neighborly caring and sharing, doing for others and an unmatched sense of generosity to the need at hand.

Through no fault of his own, Jack cannot claim the birthright of a Townie. But after 24 years of service to this community, especially to its youth, his other qualifications to the title are undisputable.

On June 1, 1965, Jack Sheehan joined the staff of the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center. Although hired as a youth worker, his first duties were to establish a surplus food program in Charlestown. Not only did he get it off the ground, he watched it grow into the large distribution and certification center that exists today.

Jack's involvement at the center grew to include the Summer Youth Employment Program which introduced hundreds of Charlestown youth to the world of work. In addition, he established a tutorial program in conjunction with local colleges and universities for both public and parochial school students, and personally assisted many high school students and their parents in the preparation of financial aid forms for college tuitions.

Jack directed the Charlestown Headstart Program in 1966 and 1967 and continued to oversee several youth programs throughout the years. He has been active with several local and city youth-serving committees representing the Kennedy Center and the Charlestown neighborhood.

His efforts to bring the various community youthserving agencies together in a collaborative program resulted in the establishment of the College Club and the Charlestown Collaborative Day Camp.

Jack's ties to the community are immeasurable and the friendships he has bonded over the years are unbreakable. In the spirit of the Bunker Hill Day festivities, when Charlestown displays its neighborhood pride, his friends have set aside a night to show their appreciation at a testimonial dinner to be held in his honor at the Knights of Columbus hall on Thursday, June 21 from 7 p.m. to midnight.

Tickets for the testimonial are \$20 per person. which includes a buffet dinner catered by Bob Scalli, and the music of a disc jockey. Many of Jack's old friends wil be there. Jack Sheehan, although no longer working in the community, will long be remembered by the youth and parents he serviced as a caring and dedicated person. His colleagues remember him best as a strong and effective leader. All who know him consider him a friend.





Keane Fund-Raising Breakfast To Finance Harvard-Kent School Computers

Keane Inc. and the Harvard-Kent School will host an informational fund-raising breakfast to support the school's computer learning program on Wednesday, June 20 at 7:45 a.m. at the school facility located at 50 Bunker Hill St. in Charlestown. Local businesses as well as all other interested individuals and firms are invited to attend.

The school is seeking to raise \$29,000 by a June 30 deadline and a total of \$145,000 over the next five years in order to purchase computer equipment loaned to them by IBM over the past year. The school was the beneficiary of the loan as a participant in the Boston Public Schools' PS 2000 plan for using technology to improve reading, mathematics and science education for all Boston students so their achievements will equal the nation's best by the year 2000.

Keane Inc., a custom software development firm headquartered in Boston. has pledged, as a Technology Partner, \$10,000 in the campaign to save the elementary school's computers. According to the company's president, John F. Keane: "Keane Inc. is pleased to be able to make this investment in the future of the children of Charlestown and surrounding areas that attend the Harvard-Kent School. We realize the importance of the introduction of technology in the classroom both as a learning tool and as a means to provide skills needed by the businesses of Boston."

Statistics show that with use of computer technology Harvard-Kent School student scores in various areas of study in kindergarten through grade five are climbing. The integrated learning systems allow teachers to monitor student performance, accurately assess student progress and prescribe appropriate individualized lessons as well as group lessons.

According to Harvard-Kent School Principal Jo-

anne McManus: "In using the computers, students are allowed to develop skills while remaining continually challenged. Many times,

our Charlestown students come to school early just so they can work on the computers. Through our Chapter I Reading Program, we have also been able to provide students from neighboring St. Catherine's School with the opportunity for computer learning on a daily basis."

Each of the 45 workstations at the Harvard-Kent School includes a 640K computer with color monitor and extensive courseware. Some computers also possess speech capability to facilitate such programs as "Writing to Read," designed to teach kindergarten and first-grade students how to write what they can say and to read what they can write. Other equipment being utilized under loan includes a printer, several headphones and a Model 60 server.

Installation, maintenance and professional development costs for the systems have been incurred by the Boston School Department, however, the assistance of the private sector is now needed to finance equipment and courseware obtained on loan. Contributions are tax deductible and pledge cards will be available at the breakfast. Voke Recognized By J.F. Kennedy Family Service Center

Rep. Richard A. Voke last week accepted an award from Charlestown's Kennedy Center Headstart program for his continuous efforts in raising funds and working toward the rebuilding of the center's Moulton Street facility, which was seriously damaged by fire in 1987. Voke received the award, an engraved brass schoolbell, from the center's Executive Director Katherine McDonough and Board of Directors President Nancy Keyes. Voke secured a \$50,000 capital improvements grant for repairing the ailing structure in June of 1988, and dedicated the award in the name of the late Charlestown activist, Gus Charbonnier.

Despite being recognized for his efforts in landing funds for the renovation of the building, Voke insisted that the importance of revamping the property had little to do with the building itself, and more to do with the services the Kennedy Center has been providing for the area's children for over 20 years. "The children are what made doing this (rebuilding the facility) so necessary," Voke noted. "The Kennedy Center has offered the best in care and services through its Headstart program, and has consistently provided Charlestown's kids with opportunities they would have gone without." Voke continued, "This is about children, not a building. The kids are who we are fighting for!"

Voke, who is Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, was the first state official in the nation to use state funds to supplement Headstart, a federal program that provides educational services to children below the poverty level. Since Voke began channeling state dollars into the program, the account has grown from \$2.5 million to its present level of \$6

million. In Voke's budget recommendation for fiscal year 1991, he has again added to the account, suggesting another million to bring the level of funding up to \$7 million for the children of the Commonwealth.


Voke is clearly ambitious about Headstart, and admits it is a program that he favors: "The Headstart program has proven results, when one considers that children participating in the program are twice as likely to be literate, twice as likely to acquire post-secondary education, and half as likely to need public assistance, and thus enjoy the level of independence that every citizen of our Commonwealth has the right to obtain."

In addition to continuously expanding Headstart funding, Voke also increased the Department of Social Services budget by \$16.2 million above the administration's recommendation for fiscal year 1991. A substantial amount of these funds will retain day care and other child welfare programs which are provided by organizations like the Kennedy Center.


"This is a great day for the Kennedy Center and for the children of our community who rely on this facility for the miracles it works for them," Voke concluded, "I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to lend a helping hand."





and was appointed to the department in 1961. Clougherty died in the collapse of a front wall at 34 Trumbull St. in the South End during a five-alarm fire on Oct. 1, 1964.

· Fire Lieutenant John J. Geswell, Ladder Co. 26. He was born on March 30, 1924 and was appointed to the department in 1955. He was promoted to Lieutenant in 1964. Geswell died in the collapse of a front wall at 34 Trumbull St. in the South End during a fivealarm fire on Oct. 1, 1964.

 District Fire Chief Richard E. Sullivan Jr., Districts 1 and 2. He was born on

Aug. 12, 1914 and was appointed to the department in 1941. He was promoted to Lieutenant in 1947, Captain in 1954 and District Chief in 1966. Sullivan died of over-exertion and inhalation of heat, smoke and gases during a working fire on Nov. 23, 1968.

· Firefighter Edwin H. Foley, Engine Co. 30. He was born on July 28, 1920 and was appointed to the department in 1943. Foley died when he was thrown from and run over by an engine while responding to a fire on Dec. 30, 1970.

· Fire Lieutenant Daniel T. McInness, Engine Co. 8. He was born on March 31. 1920 and was appointed to the department in 1947. He was promoted to Lieutentant in 1969. McInness died of a heart attack while fighting a fire at the Boston Navy Yard on Aug. 17, 1971. · Firefighter Patrick J. Kelly, Engine Co. 26. He was born on Feb. 17, 1929 and was appointed to the department in 1957. Kelly died from a fall in an elevator shaft at 132-144 Lincoln St. while fighting a five-alarm fire on Nov. 22, 1971.


· Firefighter Thomas W. Beckwith, Engine Co. 32. He was born on March 22. 1937 and was appointed to the department in 1966. Beckwith died in the partial collapse of the former Hotel Vendome on Dartmouth Street and Commonwealth Avenue during a four-alarm fire on June 17, 1972.





At a recent meeting of the Associates, it was said of the fallen firefighters. "They should not be forgotten, and they shall not be forgotten."













Cape Cod Band To Participate In The Bunker Hill Day Parade




A mummer is defined as "one who goes merrymaking in disguise during festivals." History records that when the pioneer Swedes came to this country, they settled in an area known as Tinicum, bringing with them many customs of the old country. Important among them was the ageold habit of visiting friends the day after Christmas through the first day of the new year. They would travel in bands of men through South Philadelphia engaging in a series of festivities. This informal celebration continued until Jan. 1, 1901 when the first organized parade was established, and hence, tradition was set.

The band, whose theme this year asks "Are You From Dixie?", will allow listeners to revisit the sights and sounds of the era when the dignified South was on the rise as they travel below the Mason-Dixon line for their 1990 championship presentation.

pom-poms. The band will be led through its routine by Captain Stan Magenta Jr., who will wear an elaborate white and silver Southern gentleman suit.



Joseph Warren – Martyr of Bunker Hill

On a quiet summer afternoon about 230 years ago, some Harvard College students shut themselves in an upper dormitory room to arrange some affairs pertaining to their class. Another class member desired to be with them - knowing they intended to thwart some fondly cherished purpose of his own. They refused to admit him; the door was closed, and he could not gain admittance without violence, which he chose to avoid.

Reconnoitering the premises he discovered that one of the windows in the room was open and he noticed a nearby waterspout that extended from the roof to the ground. He climbed to the top of the house and slid down the eaves, then laid hold of the spout and descended until he was opposite the open window. With a prodigious physical effort he thrust himself through the window and landed in the room! Simultaneously, the waterspout crashed to the ground; had it fallen a moment sooner the boy would have been thrown to the pavement below and, undoubtedly, seriously injured. He cooly remarked to himself, "It served its purpose!"

That Harvard boy was Joseph Warren, later to be known as Doctor Warren and General Warren, the martyr of Bunker Hill and the Grand Master of Masons (Massachusetts Provincial Grand Lodge) in North America. The boy had already given promise of the man in whatever he undertook. The fearless act of getting into that room was the swelling bud which opened and blossomed and bore fruit in his adult life.

Born in Roxbury in 1740, he graduated from Harvard and was made a Mason in the Lodge of St. Andrew in Boston on Sept. 10, 1761. He received the Second Degree on Nov. 2 of the same year, but it was not until Nov. 28, 1765 - four years after his initiation - that he was made a Master Mason. The delay was in the spirit and practices of the time.

In December 1769 Warren received a commission from the Earl of Dalhousie, Grand Master of Masons in Scotland, appointing him Provincial Grand Master of Masons in Boston and within 100 miles of the same. The commission was dated May 30, 1769. When the Earl of Dumfries succeeded Dalhousie as Grand Master of Scotland he issued another appointment to Warren dated March 7, 1772, constitution Warren "Grand Master of Masons for the Continent of America," thus extending his original limits. He was indefatigable in the discharge of his Ma-

sonic duties and, coupled with the labors of discourse, he simply approached the officer his extensive medical practice, the care of his motherless children, together with his patriotic devotion to his country, won for him the highest regard of the public and the Craft. His name is indelibly engraved on the mystic temple of Freemasonry, just as it is on the pages of American History.

Somewhat impetuous in his nature, but brave to a fault, Warren craved the task of doing what others dared not do - the same courage imbued in Paul Revere, Samuel Adams and other patriots. On the anniversary of the Boston Masssacre on March 3, 1770, Warren was the orator. While it was a duty which won him distinction, it was also one of peril. English military officers usually attended in order to heckle Warren and it required a brave man to stand up in Old South Church, in the face of those officers, to boldly proclaim their bloody deeds. It required a cool head and steady nerves, and Grand Master Joseph Warren had both.

The crowd at the church was immense, the aisles, the pulpit stairs and the pulpit itself were filled with officers and soldiers of the garrison, always there to intimidate the speaker. Warren was equal to the task but entered the church through a pulpit window in the rear, knowing he might have been barred from entering through the front door. In the midst of his most impassioned speech, an English officer seated on the pulpit stairs and in full view of Warren, held several pistol bullets in his open hand. The act was significant; while the moment was one of peril and required the exercise of both courage and prudence, to falter and allow a single nerve or muscle to tremble would have meant failure - even ruin - to Warren and others.

Everybody knew the intent of the officer and a man of less courage than Warren might have flinched, but the future hero, his eyes having caught the act of the officer and without the least discomposure or pause in his

and dropped a white handkerchief into the officer's hand! The act was so adroitly and courteously performed that the Breton was compelled to acknowledge it by permitting the orator to continue in peace.

On June 14, 1775, three days before the Battle of Bunker Hill, Dr. Warren was elected Major General by the Provincial Congress of Massachusetts. Without military education or experience, he was placed in the presence of the whole British army. Against the protests of Gen. Artemus Ward, Gen. Israel Putnam and others, Warren chose to shoulder a musket and join the fighting men behind the barricades on the hill. He had felt a premonition of his death and declared to Betsy Palmer, whose husband joined the Tea Party and the Battle of Lexington, "Come, my little girl, drink a glass of wine with me for the last time, for I shall go to the hill tomorrow and I shall never come off."

The shooting lasted less than one hour but only because the Patriots ran out of ammunition. Warren had been shot in the back of the head and thrown to the ground. His body was thrown into a ditch by a British officer and buried with the others. It was discovered months later and identified by Paul Revere who recognized a false tooth he had made for Warren. He was next buried in the Granary burial ground at Tremont Street in Boston where he was laid after Masonic ceremonies in King's Chapel and, thirdly, he was buried in the Warren Tomb in St. Paul's Cathedral, Boston. Finally, on Aug. 3, 1855, 'The precious ashes were carefully deposited in an imperishable urn and placed in the family vault at Forest Hill Cemetery where they now repose." (G.L. Proc. 1855-69 p. 511.)

On April 8, 1777 Congress ordered a monument to be erected over the grave of Gen. (continued on page 26)



Warren in the Town of Boston, but like many other things that Congress resolves, it was never accomplished. In 1794 King Solomon's Lodge of Charlestown, now meeting in Somerville, erected a monument on Bunker Hill

on land donated by Benjamin Russell for that purpose. It was "a Tuscan pillar 18 feet in height placed on a platform eight feet high. eight feet square, and fences around to protect it from injury."



THE FIRST BUNKER HILL MONUMENT

was formed in 1823 for the "purpose of erecting on Bunker Hill a more fitting and enduring monument to the memory of the brave men who fell there in the cause of human liberty." King Solomon's Lodge then gave the Association the ground which it owned, together with the monument it had erected to the memory of Warren, on condition that "some trace of its former existence" might be preserved in the monument to be erected.


On June 17, 1825, the Grand Lodge opened at 8 a.m. and a procession was formed on the Common which proceeded to Bunker Hill in Charlestown. There in the presence of Marquis de Lafayette, representatives from every New England state except Rhode Island, along with the Grand Lodge of New Jersey, Grand Master John Abbot and Senior Past Grand Master Isaiah Thomas, assisted in laying the cornerstone and Lafayette and Daniel Webster addressed the great gather-

ing. The monument was completed and dedicated June 17, 1843, but without the presence of the Grand Lodge. It was during the anti-Masonic era and a resolution to attend was defeated.

Inside the present obelisk is a model of the first monument that had been erected by King Solomon's Lodge. It is made of the finest Italian marble and, including the granite pedestal on which it stands, is about nine feet in height and bears substantially the same inscription as the former one. The memorial is now under the jurisdiction of the National Park Services and anybody can climb the 294 steps to the top without charge. From windows you can view Boston and, in particular, the Charlestown Navy Yard where the USS Constitution is berthed.

Joseph Warren, like Revere, John Hancock, Samuel Adams, George Washington and many others including Henry Knox, John Sullivan, Thomas Jefferson and Benjamin Franklin, seems to have been born and raised to inaugurate the glorious struggle for freedom, and then gathered to the heaven of the virtuous dead to herald the coming of their successors who have fought to preserve the freedom gained by the Patriots. From the writ-of-assistance trial of 1761 to General Washington's resignation from the Continental Army in 1783, Masons, men and women fought the most powerful nation at that time and forged a new nations of democracy that today links itself as the strong ally of the nation it defeated.

More Than 600 Runners Expected At Bunker Hill Road Race 1990

For the first time in its more than 20-year history, the Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race has been designated the New England 8K Championship NEAC Grand Prix Road Race by The Athletic Congress. This prestigious designation is expected to attract more than 600 runners from the six-state New England area on Sunday, June 17 starting at 9:30 a.m.

The challenging course will begin in front of The Raymond Group offices located in Building 149 in the Charlestown Navy Yard and wind its way through the streets of Charlestown before returning to the Navy Yard for the finish line. During the race the runners will traverse Bunker Hill, pass the Monument and test their stamina against the hills of one of Boston's most historic neighborhoods.

A two-mile novice race will start at 8:30 a.m. and will also begin in front of The Raymond Group offices.

All proceeds for the road race, now in its 22nd year, will directly benefit the

Charlestown Boys & Girls Club. The event was created in the late 1960s by the group's predecessor the Charlestown Boys Club to help commemorate Bunker Hill Day. The event's chief sponsor The Raymond Group is a major developer of the Charlestown Navy Yard, the largest historic redevelopment project in the country.

"The Boys & Girls Club is a wonderful organization with a vitally important role to play in the community," says The Raymond Group President David Francis. "We are proud to do anything we can to support this deserving institution."

Pat Sweeney, a member of the executive board of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club and Road Race Committee chairman, says: "The road race is tremendously important for us, not only as a fund raiser, but also as an awareness booster. Thanks to The Raymond Group's sponsorship and the Championship Grand Prix designation bestowed upon the event by The Athletic Congress, we are certain to have our best year in 1990."

Proceeds from the race will be used to maintain the Club's youth and social services through recreational and educational activities, according to Sweeney.

Participants in the first few Bunker Hill Road Races came primarily from the ranks of the Charlestown Boys Club. As the event began to gain awareness in the running community of Greater Boston it began to attract high caliber athletes, and its popularity grew with each passing year. Finishing times are now on a par with most other TAC sanctioned and certified races in the area.

In the past the event has drawn many full marathoners to its field, most notably John Treacy who competed in 1989. Tracey placed third in the Boston Marathon in 1988 and 1989. Organizers of the Battle of Bunker Hill 1990 Road Race anticipate the largest field in the event's history.





The Ladies' Fair

by Doug Cummings

Warren, Prescott, Stark, Putnam! These are men whose names leap to mind today. These are men whom poets and painters, sculptors and scholars have memorialized for 215 years. These are men who, with their 140 fallen comrades are listed on the Training Field tablets. These are the heroes of Bunker Hill who changed the world.

Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, Mrs. Jonathan Chapman, Mrs. William Prescott, Mrs. John Warren, Mrs. George Durracot, Mrs. Thomas B. Wales?

These are women whose names we find unmemorialized, unsung and almost unknown. These are women without whose efforts the Bunker Hill Monument would certainly never have risen beyond the height of 87 feet it reached in 1837. These are women to honor today.

We celebrate not only the Battle, but the Monument itself. Its magnificent presence soars above us daily. Not unlike the majestic USS Constitution, the Monument belongs especially to Charlestown.

The earliest Monument was an 18-foot wooden Tuscan pillar erected in 1794 by the Charlestown Freemasons on pasture land donated by James Russell. In 1823 the Bunker Hill Monument Association was founded for the purpose of building a permanent structure. The Association moved quickly. By 1824 it had raised \$55,000 and acquired 15 acres, and the cornerstone was laid.

The following 18 years, however, were a tale of fits and starts, enthusiasm and despair almost as harrowing and thrilling as that of the one-day Battle. A national depression, the Panic of 1837 and a threatened mortgage foreclosure forced the sale of 10 of the precious acres. Several selfless citizens who had given surety on pledges faced financial ruin. No work was done from 1836 to 1840. The Monument stood frozen at 87 feet.

Enter the women named above. As early as 1830, Sara Joseph Hale, editor of "Ladies Weekly," had urged women to participate in efforts to complete the Monument through articles in her magazine and by extensive correspondence throughout the country.

Their decision was to hold a seven-day Fair in Faneuil Hall in September 1840 which would coincide with the national Whig convention meeting in Boston. some condemned the women publicly for "stepping out of their sphere." But inspired by the requests of these Charlestown and Boston women, their sisters through Massachusetts and beyond toiled to knit, crochet, embroider and sew articles for sale at the 47 tables at the Fair. Thousands thronged the aisles on opening day, and thousands more throughout the week.

The final profit, presented in a meticulous

down-to-the-penny financial report was an unbelievable amount — \$30,035.53. The heroines of this tale had raised approximately 25 percent of the total cost of the Monument — construction began again and the capstone was emplaced in 1842.

A full and heartwarming chapter Fair and its participants is found in George Washington Warren's "History of Bunker Hill Association," James R. Osgood, publisher, Boston, 1877. The motto for that chapter reads:

Next to God we are indebted to women

- first for life itself and then for making life worth having.

The Spirit of America Brigade is the youngest special activity unit. Its uniforms depict the history of the U.S. Army from inception to the present day. A few of these uniforms are originals, and the rest are exact reproductions made in the same way and with the same type material as the original would have been. A Brigade goal is to have each member knowledgeable about his uniform's period of history and able to discuss the soldier's way of life in that period.

The color guard consists of four soldiers: two carrying rifles and two carrying the National Colors and the Army Flag.



'USS Kidd' To Visit Charlestown

The guided missile destroyer USS Kidd (DDG-993) will visit Boston at Piers 4 and 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard from June 15 to 20, in support of Bunker Hill Day.

According to Cmdr. Robert Gillen, USN (Ret.), military coordinator for the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, USS Kidd will be invited to participate in the "Salute To Charlestown" cruise of the frigate USS Constitution on June 16. Crewmen from Kidd will also march in the Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 17. USS Kidd is the leader of its class of only four guided missile destroyers, sometimes referred to as the "Ayatollah Class" due to the fact that these ships were originally built for use by the Imperial Government of Iran when the Shah was in power, and were canceled by the succeeding government. The U.S. Navy acquired them in 1981 and 1982.

The ship, homeported in Norfolk, Va., is 563-feet long and 55-feet wide and carries a crew of 25 officers and 297 enlisted personnel. Its armament includes two five-inch guns, two twin missile launchers, Harpoon anti-surface ship missile launchers, torpedoes and two Vulcan Phalanx rapidfire Gatling guns. The ship is also capable of carrying two helicopters.


Other ships of the Kidd class are USS Callaghan (DDG-994), USS Scott (DDG-995) and USS Chandler (DDG-996).


