City Gardens: Growing Vegetables - Seeds

Seeds - there are hundreds of varieties available through catalogues and at nurseries. The tiny seeds hold the promise of a beautiful, bountiful garden in July, and it is hard to choose just a few packages. Here are a few guidelines to remember when choosing and starting seeds.

Seeds are very inexpensive, and it's wise to buy the best quality available. Look for disease resistant varieties that suit your space limitations. Local stores carry seeds which are grown for our climate, but when ordering from a catalogue you must check the zone code to make sure that the variety will flourish in our limited growing season.

Last year's seeds can often be used, but test them before planting. Simply place at least ten seeds on a wet paper towel, and put the towel in a plastic bag, closing with a twist tie. Keep the bag at room temperature. After a week, open the bag and count the number of seeds that have sprouted. If less than half have germinated, close the bag and wait a few more days, and check again. If less than four seeds sprout, the germination rate is 40% and the seeds should be replaced to ensure success.

Most seeds will be planted directly into the garden. The seed packages will give most of the specific planting information: depth and row width, germination time, etc. There are a few general principles that are applicable for all types of seeds:

- 1. Always plant seeds at the proper depth.
- 2. Firm the soil over the seeds to prevent air spaces.

3. Water thoroughly after planting.

Seedlings will appear between two and fourteen days, depending upon the variety.

It's time to plant beets, carrots, chard, leaf lettuce, onion sets, peas, radish, and turnips now. Before planting the seeds, make sure the soil is not too wet after all the spring rain to avoid seed rot.

An innovative new program to rebuild abandoned properties in Boston's neighborhoods while offering job training opportunities to local residents has been launched.

Boston Rebuilds -Building Skills and Rebuilding Neighborhoods' is now recruiting residents interested in learning housing rehabilitation trades.

Sponsored by the City's Neighborhood Development and Employment Agency (NDEA) and the Boston Private Industry Council (BPIC), the program seeks to train 90 individuals in all aspects of

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the housing rehab trades. Client support services including job placement, counseling, bi-lingual education, and reading and math tutoring will be provided.

In kicking-off the recruitment drive. NDEA director Paul Grogan said, "Boston Rebuilds" aims to develop a qualified, skilled housing rehab workforce while upgrading the city's housing stock. The training program will also insure that city residents will be able to take advantage of the projected demand for qualified construction workers over the next five years, and as such, will



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Legislative Package To Address Housing Needs

by Mayor Raymond L. Flynn

An 80 year old woman is living in Charlestown without electricity or heat in a deteriorating tenement. She is being held hostage by a fixed income. Her three story building has open windows, exposed wiring, falling plaster, sinking floors, and rats. She sleeps in a chair by the stove and uses her flashlight to get around. Her pipes sometimes freeze and she buys tap water from neighbors for \$2 a gallon in plastic jugs.

The building this woman lives in has just been purchased by an individual who wants to renovate it, and the new buyer wants this elderly woman and the second floor tenant to move out so that renovations can begin. After the refurbishing is complete, the rents will skyrocket.

This is just one example of the many difficult problems faced by our neighborhood residents of low and moderate income: that is, increasingly they face eviction, higher rents, or condominium conversion. My campaign for

funding from the Music Performance Trust Funds, administered by the American Federation of Musicians, Local 9-535. Mayor stressed an expansion of the city's housing stock; the protection and expansion of opportunities for home ownership, and the protection for tenants and small landlords. Within the next weeks my administration will put forward a legislative package which I believe will begin to address these desperate needs.

Consider the following statistics:

*The city's rental housing vacancy rate in November, 1983 was 2.29%, according to the Rental Housing Association of the Greater Boston Real Estate Board.

•The city has estimated it will need 18,000 new rental units in the next decade to keep pace with the demand.

•A growing number of homeowners find themselves in financial distress, unable to keep pace with the costs of maintenance and upkeep.

*Between 1970 and 1980, rents rose an average 99%, which median income in Boston lagged with an increase of only 56%. Today the average rent in Boston is over \$460 a month. The average rent for a 3 bedroom apartment, the type needed by a family, is over \$680 per month.

•Even more shocking, 14,000 units of housing stand vacant in our city. More than 6,000 units of low and moderate income housing are in various stages of financial distress.

 As of January 1, 1983, there were 12,366 residential condominiums in Boston. Their average assessed value is approximately \$77,000.

•An estimated 55% of Boston's two-person families are eligible for subsidized housing. The shortage of privatelyowned, rental housing is so severe for these groups of Bostonians that the Boston Housing Authority has a waiting list of over 6,000 applicants.

•12,000 homeowning families and 58,000 tenant families are considered "shelter poor" by housing experts. That is, they pay such a high percentage of their incomes for shelter that they must do without other necessities of life. These 70,000 families make up one-third of all Boston families.

WE NEED CREATIVE SOLUTIONS

Last week, for example, we announced plans to renovate 20 of a projected 50 vacant and abandoned properties in Boston's neighborhoods throughout the city through the City's Urban Homesteading Program. Through this program the State, for the first time has allocated a substantial block of funds to Boston's housing and rehabilitation programs which will allow families of moderate income to get lower-interest mortgage monies from the Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency. This cooperative approach enables us to maximize use of existing resources and shows what can be accomplished when we work together to address housing and community needs.

In order for Boston in the 1980's to be a place where low and moderate income households, including the elderly, minorities. long-term residents, and their children, can continue to live and work, there is a critical need to protect them as well as the housing stock from the negative impact of economic revitalization. Effective rent, eviction and condo conversion controls are an essential element of a comprehensive program to control displacement and to preserve affordable housing. My administration is committed to that.

NEW HOMES SMALLER

Homebuilders are adjusting to affordability problems by building smaller houses with fewer amenities. After a decade in which the median number of square feet in new homes steadily rose, those built in the past three years have become smaller. The median living area of new homes completed last year was 1,550 square feet. This is 45 square feet less than the previous year and 105 square feet smaller than those built just three years ago.

Builders are also reducing the number of amenities in new homes to cut costs. More new homes with just one bathroom are being built while the proportion of homes with two or more bathrooms is slowly decreasing. Also, more homes are being built with two bedrooms or less. Last year, only 20% of new homes had four or more bedrooms. One amenity is bucking the trend. Almost two thirds of homes built last year had central air-conditioning. This is an 11% increase over the past three years.


