### CANA Project Found Lacking Adequate Police Presence

Public safety is an issue of paramount importance to the residents of Charlestown and to their public officials. The protection of the public's safety has been curtailed and practically eliminated from the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) roadway reconstruction project in City Square. Despite promises from the Massachusetts Department of Public Works for adequate police coverage in the construction area, "adequate" has become the key work in the present situation. Adequate to the project coordinator is not adequate to those who live in

the community or travel through it as a daily commuter. A mitigation process was undertaken with the MDPW prior to the start of the CANA project, a process that went as far as litigation to seek an injunction to stop the project if proper public safety measures were not in place. The Charlestown community and the state came to a mutual agreement that every precaution would be taken to assure the safety of motorists and pedestrians at City Square. The Charlestown Neighborhood Council, in a unanimous vote taken in April 1987, went on record and

petitioned the MDPW to ensure the safety of community residents throughout the duration of the project. Charlestown Attorney Michael Powers brought the case before Justice Irwin on April 23, 1987 to stop all work until the issue could be resolved. In response, the MDPW set down a plan for public safety that was agreeable to the Court, the Neighborhood Council, elected officials and the residents of Charlestown. The project began on May 7, 1987. Police details set down under that joint agreement not only eliminated the anticipated traffic

## McLaughlin To Be Honored At ABCD's Community Awards Dinner

Join Action for Boston Community Development in a great Boston tradition as it hosts its 17th annual Community Awards Dinner on Oct. 25 at the Sheraton Boston Hotel & Towers, with keynote speaker Sen. Tom Harkin (D-Iowa) and featured speaker noted author and pediatrician T. Berry Brazelton, M.D.

ABCD, the city's most venerable anti-poverty institution, serves the largest human services population in New England, and will again honor the work of committed community volunteers who bring hope to the neighborhoods where they live and work. The theme for the evening will be "Strengthening our Families: Supporting Children and Youth."

The honoree from Charlestown will be Dennis McLaughlin. McLaughlin has, until now, been one of the "unsung heroes" of Charlestown. Always willing to lend an ear, he has the ability to make both the lifelong resident of Charlestown and the newcomer feel like part of the community. His energy and dedication are an encouragement to others to participate in making their neighborhood a better place in which to live.

McLaughlin believes a neighborhood is more than just a cluster of homes. He sees the families that reside there and he recognizes the need for a strong, safe community. For years he has been a consistent advocate on behalf of the JFK Family Service Center. In an effort to support a healthy start for children, he played a key role in securing funds to rebuild the Old Kent School, the home of the center's Headstart and day care programs, after it was destroyed by fire.

He continues to provide his unwavering commitment to the town through his work as treasurer and charter member of the Bunker Hill Associates, member of the Friends of Camp Bunker Hill, chairperson of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and chairperson of the Bunker Hill Associates Charlestown Pride Week Committee.

McLaughlin is also an innovator in the development of new programs to better serve the needs of the community. He is a founder and

current member of Charlestown Against Drugs and the founder of the Charlestown Affordable Homes Committee. He was the organizer and first president, and remains a current board member, of the Friends of Metro Boston Inc. which provides recreational activities for the city's homeless mentally ill.

McLaughlin's pioneer spirit thrives in his current efforts to establish two pilot programs in Charlestown. One will provide residential housing for women in recovery from substance abuse; another will provide emergency housing for battered women. He is working in conjunction with the Armed Services YMCA to form this nonprofit support program.

He is currently working as a certified Employee Assistance Professional for the city of Boston Department of Health and Hospitals.

At the dinner, Harkin, along with Brazelton, will assist ABCD's Executive Director, Robert M. Coard, in honoring this year's community award recipients.

Harkin, a vibrant, liberal democrat and recent entrant into presidential politics, is fast developing a reputation

as an outspoken advocate for the development and implementation of a strong national agenda focusing on the needs of children and the elderly, education, the environment and our nation's economic revitalization.

Brazelton, often referred to as the "Dr. Spock of the 80s and 90s," hosts a "Lifetime" television series and has published 22 books on pediatrics and child development. He frequently ap-

pears on national television, including NBC's "Today Show," discussing child development and opportunities in early infancy for strengthening families.

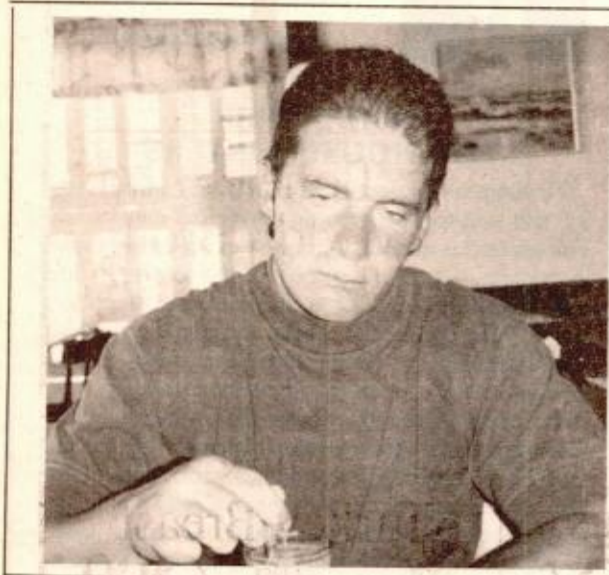

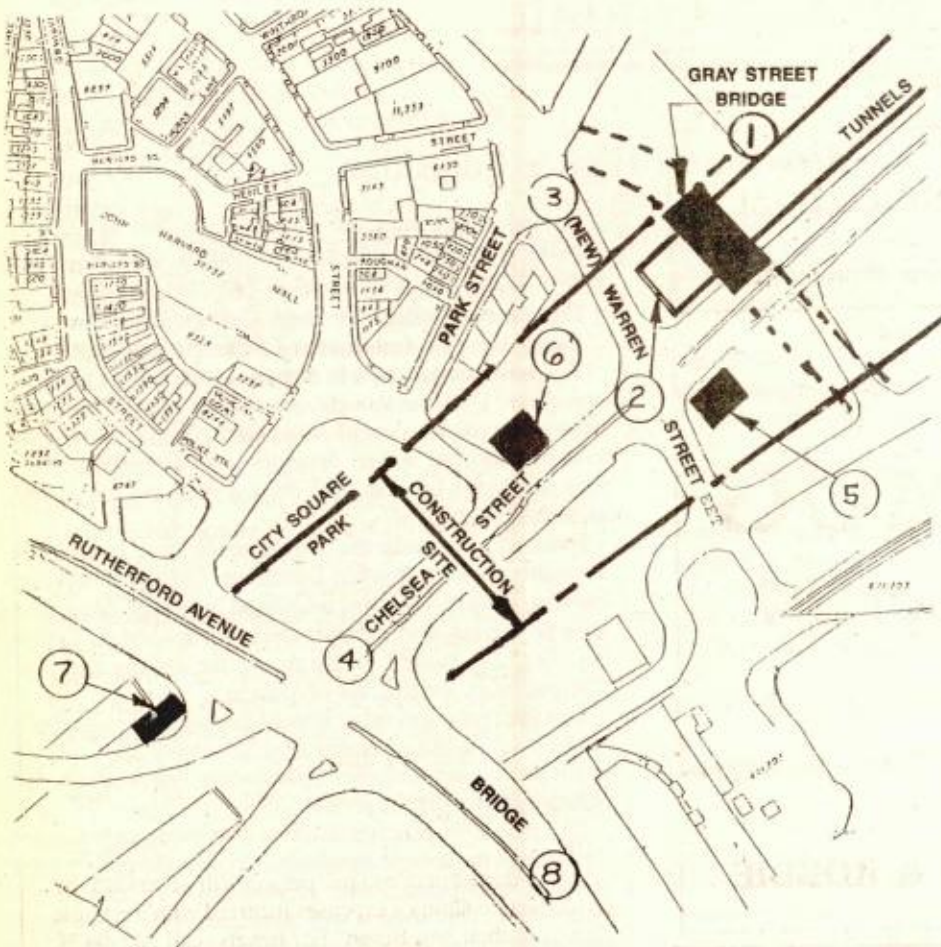

## City Square Big Dig Taking Shape

Charlestown's big dig is not a big hole in the ground any longer. Now as we look at the construction site, we are starting to see something definite taking shape.

Looking at the map above, you will see the new street configuration that will be in place in 1993. The heavy lines on the map show the present construction area.

1.) The temporary Gray Street Bridge will be relocated so that the area under the bridge can be completed. This map shows the existing roads entering and leaving the bridge.

2.) At this point the highway will completely disappear into the tunnel.

3.) Extended Warren Street will connect the existing Warren Street to the waterfront.

4.) New Chelsea Street in City Square will be located approximately 40 feet closer to the waterfront than the old Chelsea Street.

5.) This large concrete structure rising out of the ground is one of two ventilation buildings that will be approximately 40-feet tall and located at either end of the tunnels. This structure can be seen from the Gray Street Bridge looking toward City Square.

6.) A smaller ventilation building, also visible from the Gray Street Bridge, is located over the deepest portion of the tunnel and will be used only during emergency situations within the tunnel.

7.) The second 40-foot high ventilation building is located on Rutherford Avenue across from City Square.

8.) The newly reconstructed Charlestown Bridge in City Square will be a few lanes wider than the old bridge.

This illustration was compiled to address the many inquiries received on the status of the construction project. Members of the North Area Task Force hope that it will be helpful in informing residents on what is going on in the project area.

One more point — the worst is over! When the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project is completed, all cars, trucks and buses that once entered City Square from the Tobin Bridge will no longer clog our streets. The heavy traffic that traveled around the rotary in City Square will be replaced by the new City Square Park. This is called progress!

## CANA Project Found Lacking Adequate Police Presence

(continued from page one) gridlock, but offered pedestrians a safe passage through the construction area.

Changes began to happen in the late winter and early spring of 1989. Cutbacks in police details were noticed first in Sullivan Square. In May, a tragedy occurred when an elderly man trying to cross through the traffic at Chambers Street was struck down by a tractor trailer and succumbed to the injuries he suffered in the accident.

Pedestrians trying to cross City Square today have less protection than in May 1989. Neighborhood activists are starting a campaign to bring safety back to the area before another tragedy happens.

At the Oct. 8 Public Safety/Police Community Relations meeting, the lack of police coverage in City Square was addressed. Public Relations Officer Joe McNulty stated that details in the area remain at only three locations: Park and Gray streets, Chamber Street and the North Washington Street Bridge, and in the afternoon hours at the Rutherford Avenue traffic signal. There are no longer police officers stationed at Henley and Main streets, at

the City Square crosswalks, at Water and Gray streets or at the Gray Street on-ramp. These police details were handled by the Boston Police Department.

At the beginning of the project, officers from the Massachusetts State Police, Metro Police and other authorities were also assigned to City Square and at crucial locations leading into the construction area. Today, all of these details have been eliminated.

The decision on public safety in and around the CANA project falls on the shoulders of CANA coordinator Ed Barr. Barr stated: "The decision on police assignments is mine alone. I am the project coordinator." When asked about pedestrian safety in City Square, Barr responded: "Pedestrian walkways are signalized. All they have to do is push a button and traffic will stop." When informed that residents are finding it difficult to cross the square because vehicles are bumper to bumper and not willing to let them through, Barr stated: "It is safer for them to cross in heavy traffic than in light traffic when cars travel through going 60 miles an hour."

Although the CANA project is under the operation of the state, the jurisdiction of city streets falls under the Boston Transportation Department. Commissioner Richard Dimino has been a strong advocate of public safety and remains openly concerned with daily traffic situations in and around the construction area.

In a statement issued on Oct. 9, Dimino said: "This office will be in immediate contact with the MDPW. I will seek restoration of police details at all City Square locations." CANA/CA/T Project Director for the Transportation Department Peter Welch stated: "It's unacceptable to the city that the residents of Charlestown are not receiving police services from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini, chairman of the council committee on Commerce and Transportation, stated: "Whenever any state or city bureaucracy comes to a community and makes a presentation on any given project, inherent in that are certain commitments in return for community support. When you give your

word, it should be kept and the rules of the game should not change half way through without going back to those initial players and running it by them for their support.

"Changing the rules and breaking your word is unacceptable, unprofessional and sets a very dangerous precedent." Travaglini added: "If the state officials do not restore law enforcement presence to the original level promised, they'll answer to me as chairman of the Transportation Committee at a formal hearing. If I have to subpoena them, I will."

The Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services Community Liaison Judy

Evers stated that she and the Mayor's Hotline have received many telephone calls from residents concerned with pedestrian safety in the construction area. She stated: "We don't want further traffic studies. We only want what was promised to the community before the project began." She added: "Pedestrians cannot get across the streets in City Square and traffic is tied up every day because no police officers are in place to keep a steady flow moving."

Ken Stone, co-chairman of the North Area Task Force, a community organization that has been working with the MDPW for over 10 years on the CANA project, stated: "Safety is

an issue that the state promised the community to maintain through to the completion of the project. If the problem is not rectified and adequate police coverage allocated to the specifications set down by the community — not the CANA coordinator — the NATF will make the state come back to the community and answer its concerns."

CNC Chairman Dennis McLaughlin has requested that CA/T Community Liaison Stephen Collins attend the November CNC meeting to address the public safety issues relative to the CANA project. Collins has agreed to attend and present an update on the current MDPW policy.

## John L. Ridlon Dies At 57

John L. Ridlon, 57, of West Roxbury, a retired Boston Police detective, died Oct. 7 at Milton Hospital after suffering a heart attack.

Born in Charlestown, Mr. Ridlon was a Boston Police officer for 30 years and a combat veteran of the Korean War. He was co-founder of Boston's Finest Detective Agency with retired Boston Police detective Paul O'Neil.

Mr. Ridlon was a director of the Boston Police Detectives Benevolent Society, a deputy sheriff in Norfolk and Suffolk counties, a member of Boston Police VFW Post 1018 and a member of the Thomas J. Rob-

erts - Cecil Fogg Post 78, American Legion in Hyde Park.

While growing up in Charlestown, Mr. Ridlon belonged to the Charlestown Boys' Club where he was a member of the musical group the Bunker Hillbillies.

He is survived by his wife Maryann (Walsh); two daughters, Deborah Smith of Hyde Park and Diane Naughton of Jamaica Plain; two sons, Boston Police officer John L. Jr. of Weymouth and Richard M. of West Roxbury; four sisters, Dorothy Trifan of N.J., Barbara M. Owens, Mary Beasley and Margaret Dabulis, all of Charlestown; sev-

en brothers, Arthur T. Ridlon, James M. Owens, Joseph F. Owens, Patrick J. Owens and Stephen Owens, all of Charlestown, Robert E. Ridlon of Weymouth and Thomas J. Owens of West Roxbury; and two grandchildren.

A Funeral Mass will be said at St. Theresa's Church in West Roxbury on Friday, Oct. 11 at 10 a.m. Visiting hours are today, Thursday, Oct. 10 from 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. at the Gormley Funeral Home, 2055 Centre St., West Roxbury.

(continued from page one) adding: "Bobbie Delaney was my dear and valued friend, my pal — I loved her dearly." He went on to say: "If she was your friend, she was a true friend."

Walsh told the gathering of how rapid the necessary 300 signatures were collected to request approval of such a dedication — a half day — which he said was a record-breaking time. He spoke of looking through pictures with Bobbie's sister Eleanor Sawyer and coming across one of Bobbie lecturing Mayor White during a Bunker Hill Day Parade. He said: "She was after Tot Lots!" Walsh added: "She was a 'Townie' and she was what everyone thinks Charlestown is."

Asked to say a few words, former Mayor Kevin H. White said that Bobbie was always fighting for things for the community — things

like Tot Lots. He said that there were three things he remembered particularly about Bobbie. The first was that she was "a loving mother brooding and worrying about her own and extending that emotion to the kids of Charlestown." The second was that she was a community leader and would "fight for things she believed in like a stevedore — she would take on anyone." And lastly, White spoke of her friendship and loyalty. He said: "Behind the blue smoke and laughter that could rock a room, I think she was a softie."

White concluded by thanking the Flynn administration and Parks Commissioner Larry Dwyer for this memorial to Bobbie. He added: "If we were in power, we would have probably built something bigger than the Monument."

Suzanne Delaney, Bob-

bie's daughter, spoke for her family including her father Bob and her brothers William, John and Robert, thanking everyone who was present. In a voice cracking with emotion, she said: "Thank you all so much. You all knew her and loved her — it means so much."

As the ceremony concluded and the sign denoting the Roberta "Bobbie" Delaney Tot Lot was unveiled, Walsh introduced Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and announced that it would be a new Tot Lot in the spring as \$75,000 had been allocated for renovation of the Tot Lot.

Those in attendance agreed that this dedication was a fitting tribute to a lady who devoted much of her time and energy to the children of Charlestown and it will serve as a lasting memorial to her efforts on their behalf.

**Reclamation Artists To Revisit Charlestown**

Reclamation Artists, a group of over 75 Boston-based artists and architects interested in identifying

overlooked urban and suburban sites for the installation of temporary outdoor art works, will return to Charlestown this coming weekend for a three-day exhibit. Using abandoned areas located near major transportation corridors, the artists have organized two exhibitions of outdoor artwork over the past year,
