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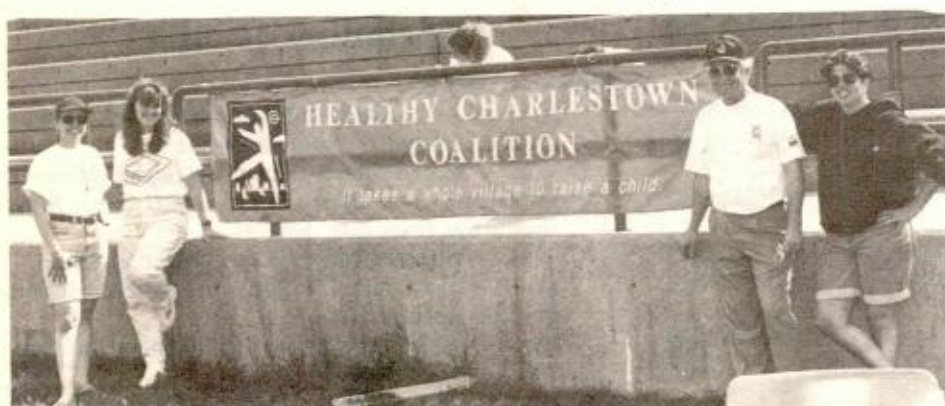

★ **City Slams Billboard Decision . . .** City officials and residents this week blasted the state's Outdoor Advertising Board for its unanimous decision to allow construction of a billboard overlooking 50 Brighton St.

"It was a completely irresponsible decision" said Judy Evers, the mayor's liaison to Charlestown.

At its May 17 meeting, the Outdoor Advertising Board said it saw no reason that the billboard cannot be raised — despite

overwhelming evidence to the contrary.

The city, which will appeal to the Suffolk Supreme Court, told the Board that the land near 50 Brighton St. is slated for development as a park and regulations prohibit billboards from being erected too close to a park. Despite the city's firm capital commitment to building the park soon, the Board voted in favor of the billboard.

On hearing of the Board's denial of the city's appeal regarding the Brighton Street billboard, Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini stated: "I am surprised that the Board would disregard the opinion of the hearing officer who found this billboard in clear violation of the Board's own regulations concerning the proximity to a public park. The city will again appeal this misguided decision."

Ken Stone, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Billboard Committee, said: "From the outset, I was very disturbed that the people on the Outdoor Advertising Board knew the lawyers from the billboard company on a first-name basis." Stone also referred to the recommended denial of the permit to erect the billboard by the Board's hearing officer and the fact that the Board "completely disregarded the hearing officer in making its decision."

Stone went on to say that the Board is "going against its own rules and regulations governing where billboards can and cannot be erected." "Furthermore," he added, "The proposed billboard is over and above the allowed building height." "The Outdoor Advertising Board has ignored information provided by the city. It's a travesty and an insult to the community. The decision flies in the face of logic and the community process," exclaimed Evers.

The city has 30 days to appeal.

★ **A First For Charlestown Community Gardens . . .** Gardens for Charlestown Inc. will celebrate the opening of access to the Sullivan Square garden by those who use wheelchairs with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on the site at 11 a.m. on Monday, May 24.

The garden is the first community garden in the Commonwealth to comply with the American Disabilities Act passed by Congress.

Charlestown friends and neighbors are invited to the ceremony. Refreshments will be served. In the event of rain, the

ceremony will be held on Wednesday, May 26.

★ **Public Hearing . . .** The Boston Conservation Commission will hold a public hearing in Room 801 at Boston City Hall on Wednesday, May 26 at 6 p.m. This hearing is relative to a Notice of Intent submitted by the Massachusetts Port Authority for maintenance drainage of the berth at Moran Terminal in Charlestown. This is a continuation of a May 12 hearing. For further information, call 635-3850.

★ Street Reconstruction Update . . .

Mario Susi & Son continue to make good progress on the Charlestown Street Reconstruction Project. Another five streets were paved this week with the base and binder courses of pavement. Depending on the status of the gas company situation, which prevented the installation of the services to the gas lights, the top or finish course of pavement could be postponed until later in the project. The final paving will be held up until the services are installed to avoid trenching through the new street surface.

During this past week, Common and Park streets got paved with the base and binder courses and the utility castings were raised. Lawrence and Seminary streets also reached the same stage of completion. The sidewalks and curbing were finished on Lexington Street, the base and binder pavement was also put down, and the utility castings raised.

On Ferrin Street, the roadway was graded and the concrete base for the paver blocks was poured. The conduit was also completed between the light bases for the new electric lighting.

On Prospect Street, Susi's water subcontractor completed the installation of the new water main and installed the new hydrant near Tremont Street. The new line was then

pressure-tested, chlorinated and the contractor began to hook up the new services.

Susi did some exploratory excavation in the intersection of Prescott and Devens streets to connect the new drain from Prescott Street, and is now installing the drain which will be followed by the installation of the new roof drains and the remainder of the street work.

Susi's subcontractor for the tree planting is also expected to get started this week but will have to begin on Russell Street instead of Old Rutherford Avenue, since the Russell Street pear trees were inadvertently shipped instead of the Old Rutherford Avenue maple trees. Old Rutherford Avenue is scheduled next. Some of the Russell Street trees arrived damaged, were rejected and will have to be replaced. These may not be able to be installed until the fall planting.

All except one of the Training Field's new park benches were shipped and hopefully Susi can get started installing them this week. All but the missing one will be in by the time of the parade. Depending on the manufacturer, the other bench could be fabricated and installed in time.

On the Forty Flights, Middlesex Corporation is making good progress toward the completion of their project. The cobblestone tree wells were built and the temporary sidewalks removed in preparation for the permanent concrete sidewalks, some of which were poured this week. The railing subcontractor has also been back and most of the railings are now completed. Only a couple of temporary rails remain. The lights have been turned on and the stairs have been left accessible by the contractor after working hours.

"We're sick of these bills and we're not going to take it any longer. My proposal will allow the AG to fight the wave of projected rate increases. As ratepayers, we need the AG on our side to make the case that our water bills are drowning us," exclaimed Voke.

Voke said the bill requires the AG to intervene

in any law suit or action that seeks to modify or downsize the scope of the Boston Harbor clean-up project. Further, the chief lawyer for the commonwealth will take appropriate steps to ensure that any clean-up mandates imposed by the MWRA or the federal court are required under federal regulations governing environmental policy.

"We need to make our point clear: ratepayers cannot afford to bankroll the clean-up. The AG should take whatever necessary steps he deems appropriate to dispel the impression that we can afford to keep paying more for our water. By including the AG in our struggle, we will enlist yet another soldier in our bat-

tle for rate relief," said Voke.

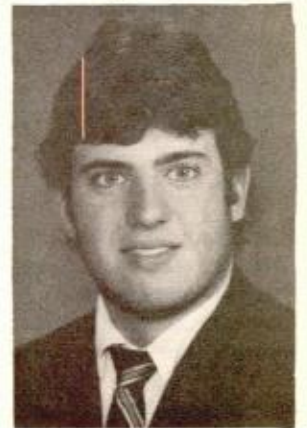
Noting his drive to gain both federal and state assistance for the project, Voke, the Majority Leader of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, said he hoped his persistence will pay off. In addition to leading a

trip to Washington to highlight the problems ratepayers face, Voke has also pushed the state to pay for debt obligation incurred by the MWRA. He also indicated that he planned to address rate relief in the House's upcoming budget debate.

BHCC To Sponsor Non-Filer Day

Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC), in partnership with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), will sponsor a Non-Filer Day at the College on Saturday, May 22, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Representatives of the Massachusetts Department of Revenue (DOR) and the American Bar Association (ABA) will also attend.

BHCC students from the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program will be available to assist in preparing the returns. IRS employees will be available to work out payment plans. DOR employees will assist with the state tax returns

and members of the ABA will provide a free 15-minute legal consultation.

Since late October, more than 155,000 people have called the IRS about filing prior year forms and other 58,000 individuals visited IRS offices to get information and assistance with their returns. Nearly 45 percent of those late filers who have sent in returns received refunds. The IRS reminds late filers that refunds must be claimed within three years from the original due date.

To receive assistance, people should bring any W-2 and 1099 forms or other information they may need to complete the return. If the delay in filing is because the forms are not available, the IRS will help to reconstruct the records.

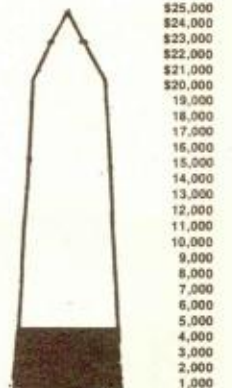

Gala Ball At International Place Celebrates The 100th Anniversary Of The Charlestown Boys & Girls Club



Labor Secretary Reich Spends Monday Morning At CHS

Some 35 Charlestown High School students gathered at three tables in the school library on Monday morning, talking with counsellors and career specialists about recent summer job interviews and how they prepared themselves for this first step into the working world.

As the delegation of appointed and elected officials descended the ramp into the library, escorted by members of the CHS Air Force JROTC and under the scrutiny of television cameras and the glare of flashes from dozens of still cameras, they applauded the guests and began to respond to their questions.

CHS was just one stop on a day-long visit to Boston by U.S. Labor Secretary Robert Reich, accompanied by Sen. Edward Kennedy, Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy and Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, along with Boston School Superintendent Lois Harrison-Jones, and several representatives of the Boston business community and the Private Industry Council (PIC).

Reich and both Kennedys listened to the students — their plans, hopes and aspirations — and each sat down with the students at one of the tables. They simulated job interviews, shared some of their own experiences as they began their careers and questioned the students on what they see as important in the school-to-work transition program.

Project ProTech, the Bos-

ton PIC's youth apprenticeship program, is being looked at by the Clinton Administration as a model for national school-to-work legislation. Until now, the program has been instituted in Boston, Brighton and English high schools and only in the health field. This fall, the program will expand to banking and insurance — thus CHS was a natural selection with its business component under PIC being Liberty Mutual Insurance.

Neil Sullivan, executive director of PIC, explained that there is a PIC employee assigned to each school and at CHS that counsellor is Ed Powell. He added that there will also be a career specialist at each high school involved in the program. Sullivan said that it is a "team effort" and requires the involvement of the headmaster and the faculty. He added that the career specialists act as intermediary between schools and employers and is a key to Boston's ability to make almost 3,000 student work placements.

Each of the speakers at the press conference which followed the discussion with the students reiterated the cry from the students themselves — the need for summer jobs.

Flynn was critical of those in Washington who can't come together on important issues such as jobs, both for the students and their parents, Headstart, health care, safety in the

streets. He stated: "Kids are together, they know what they want. They are looking for jobs and economic opportunity." He related that there were 11,751 jobs in Boston last summer "and not one incident."

Reich told the gathering that "kids are dedicated." He added: "We talk about responsibility. Kids are working hard and taking responsibility." He went on to say that young people "should have summer jobs that, if possible, relate to future jobs."

Reich stated that programs for employment only work when government, business, education and the community join together. He praised Boston where these components are coming together to merge resources and create jobs.

Sen. Kennedy spoke of President Clinton's commitment to jobs. He spoke of the CHS program that, with the help of Liberty Mutual, assists young people in the move from school to employment. He commended the young people in the program, noting that he saw "enthusiasm and the desire to work."

Congressman Kennedy, pointing to the students in the room, spoke of them as "the future of America," adding that there has to be an investment made in this generation.

Harrison-Jones stated it was "encouraging and rewarding" that there were people present who stand up and speak out for youth.



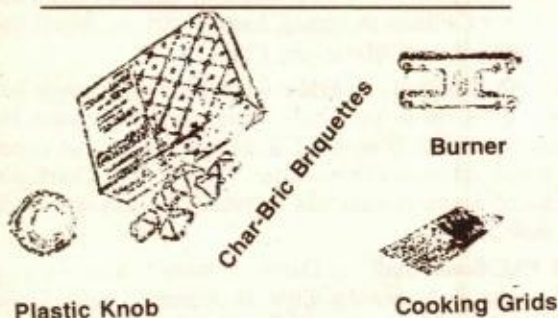
She added that she is "going to be champion of whatever the students need," noting that students are no longer allowed the luxury of transitional time after graduation, they go right into work.

Chandra Morgan, a CHS senior, honor roll student and recipient of a four-year scholarship to Boston Uni-

versity, stated that she will work this summer at Liberty Mutual. She encouraged everyone in power to help

Boston youth find summer jobs, adding, "investing in students is an investment in the future."

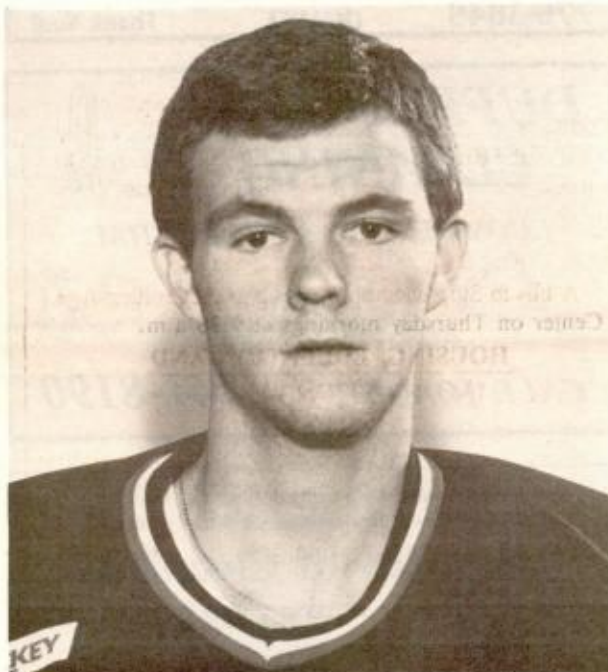
