## Public Hearing On MBTA Cuts

There will be an important public hearing to discuss cuts in MBTA service on Wednesday, June 10th at the Kent School auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. Representative Richard Voke requested the meeting after he was presented with signed petitions from Charlestown residents concerned over the changes in service on the Bunker Hill and Main Street bus routes.

Representative Voke has filed

legislation which if passed will prevent arbitrary cuts in bus service in the future, but in the meantime he feels, "the best way to get results from the MBTA is to keep the pressure on them. We can't let them cut service without putting up a fight".

The hearing will be conducted by MBTA officials and everyone attending will have the opportunity to speak. Everyone is invited. Come and bring a friend.

## Property Revaluation Underway In Charlestown

A program to revalue all real property in the City of Boston by the Fall of 1982 is now underway. The State Supreme Judicial Court has mandated that all 351 cities and towns in the Commonwealth revalue property to determine full market value.

Representatives from the Office of Property Equalization (OPE), the agency established to carry out this task, are currently visiting properties in Charlestown. Data collection inspec-

tions began in Thompson Square, continue through the neighborhood, and finish in the Medford Street area.

During their visits, which will take 20-30 minutes, the OPE representatives will record such information as square footage, perimeter and the story height of your property in addition to the number of apartments, number of bedrooms, type of plumbing and the electrical and heating system. Their only function is to collect the information neces-

sary for valuing your property equitably and accurately.

OPE representatives will identify themselves with picture identification cards bearing the City of Boston seal. Do not for any reason admit anyone to your property without proper identification.

## Two Critically Injured In Medford Street Fire

The Arson Squad continues investigating a fire which occurred late Sunday night on Medford Street, seriously injuring a woman and putting a man on the critical list. An estimated \$40 thousand of damage was done.

Colleen Whalen, 23, is listed in serious condition at Mass. General Hospital suffering from first and second degree burns

over 60 percent of her body while Robert Fitzgerald, also 23, remains on the critical list at Boston City Hospital, with first, second, and third degree burns over 90 percent of his body.

According to witnesses police were the first to discover the fire at 254-256 Medford Street and notified dispatchers of a working fire. Patrolmen Gary Greenwood and Anthony Pezzulo entered the second floor apartment bedroom where the fire began, according to the fire department spokesman, and rescued Whalen. A third floor rescue was attempted by Pezzulo, Greenwood, and Patrolmen John McLean and Saul Chajmowizz, who arrived later on the scene, but flames kept the men from entering the stairway to the third floor. McLean was knocked down to the second floor landing by flames

and heavy smoke, causing him to hit the ground. He was taken to the New England Medical Center and treated for back and knee injuries.

Firemen rescued Amanda Burnett 24, and her young son Benjamin. Neither of them were injured.

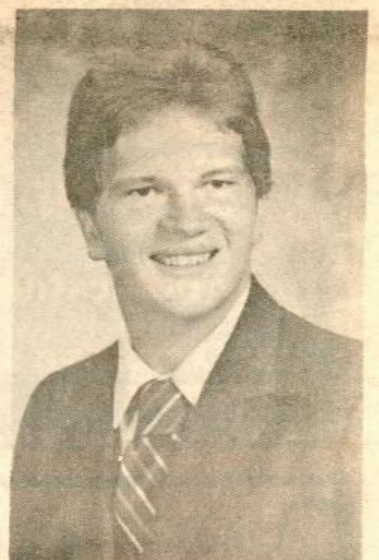
Fitzgerald was the last to be rescued, approximately 20 minutes after the fire began, and taken to Mass. General. Two hours later he was transferred to Boston City Hospital.

"I smelled smoke and thought it was my wiring," said Debbie Cooney who lived on the first floor with her five month old baby. I started alerting others and grabbed the baby and ran out. I saw flames coming out of the second floor and heard a woman screaming on the third floor with

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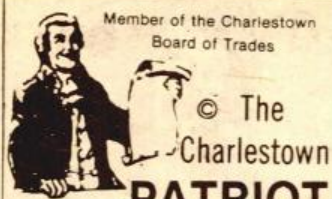

## Voke On Record For More Local Aid

The annual battle over a new state budget for the coming fiscal year heated up over the weekend on Beacon Hill. Charlestown's Representative Richard Voke has been a consistent and vocal supporter of more local aid to Boston and the other cities

forced to cope with the mandate of Proposition 2½.

Representative Voke was one of only four Boston legislators to support the "better budget", and alternative budget plan which would have returned 17 million dollars more to Boston than the

budget recommended by the House Ways and Means Committee. Although the better budget was narrowly defeated, its supporters filed so many amendments that the House leadership recessed the House until today in order to have time to regroup.

Representative Voke strongly disagrees with those elected officials who are doing little or nothing to lessen the impact of Proposition 2½. "I find it hard to believe that the intent of the supporters of Proposition 2½ was to jeopardize the lives and safety of the people of Charlestown. I am committed to returning an amount of state aid to Boston which will give the city government enough money to provide essential services to its neighborhoods," declared Representative Voke.

Debate on the state budget resumed this morning with Representative Voke renewing his pledge to bring as much local aid as possible back to this district.

No blood was found in the van which leads police to throw out the possibility that one of the culprits was hit in the leg by a Wells Fargo guard during an exchange of gunfire, as reported by the guard.

According to reports, three men, described to be age 18 or 19 years old, appeared after the truck drove through the driveway of the Charlestown Savings Bank

to make a delivery.

Police said the guard, Edward Kashian, 24, with his revolver in hand in accordance with company policy, walked to the rear of the truck, and "everything seemed to be OK," so he opened the rear door of the vehicle and began pulling out two money sacks.

Suddenly, he said, he heard a voice from atop an embankment behind him "yell something." The gunman was standing near a large hole cut in a chain link fence.

Kashian said he turned and saw a masked man with a rifle aimed at him. Police said the guard ran around to the driver's side of the truck for protection and pounded on the driver's door, as the gunman fired several armor piercing slugs. Two shots penetrated the 1/4-inch thick steel side of the money truck.

Kashian and Kelleher told police the two other robbers climbed through a hole in a chain

link fence. One grabbed the money bags while the other assisted the first robber through the fence and into the van.

Residents of Austin street told police the hole had been cut in the new fence Sunday, apparently by

the gunmen in anticipation of the holdup.

The owner of the van, Joseph Baker, a carpenter from Melrose, told the FBI that his van had been stolen from a Suffolk Downs parking lot on Sunday.

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## Your Dental Health

**TEETH KNOCKED OUT?**  
In those first frantic moments after a child (or an adult) has had teeth knocked out much can be done to salvage the lost teeth. First, attempt to place the tooth or teeth back into their sockets after quickly rinsing them with water. If this cannot be done rinse the tooth with water and place it carefully between the teeth and the cheek. If this, too, is impossible place the tooth in a jar of water. Second, bring the patient and his tooth to the dentist immediately. In this way the tooth can be properly treated and secured in place. The sooner that this is done, the higher the chances that the tooth can be retained. Remember, after a tooth is placed back into the mouth, keep the patient upright and calm so that the tooth won't be swallowed or inhaled.

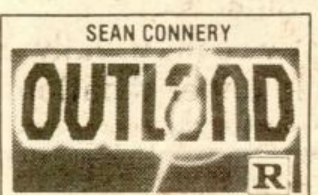
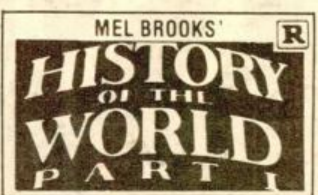

# Boys' Club News

Sometimes, as adults, we fail to remember how hot and, often-times, boring summer in the city can be for a youngster. Nearly as soon as the euphoria of summer vacation begins to wane, the search for something to do begins.

If the shadow of Proposition 2 1/2 clouds the opening of the Bunker Hill Swimming Pool, hundreds of youngsters will find themselves with more idle time to fill than ever before. As the pool has serviced the community for more than 30 years, the Charlestown youngster has never tasted a summer unsweetened by the cool, blue waters at the top of

the hill.

If the threat becomes a reality, the Boys' Club Day-Camp Program will be one of the few community programs designed to service the needs of a large number of youngsters during the upcoming summer months.

In anticipation of a larger than ever demand for space, the Club has decided to double its enrollment in each of the four two week sessions. One hundred boys and girls can now be accommodated.

During each session, the campers will leave the Club at 9:00 a.m. each weekday and travel to various beaches, picnic

grounds, amusement parks, etc. They will return to the Club between four and four thirty on the same day.

Each camper will receive a lunch every day and a Boys' Club tee shirt for each session. Duffle bags will be available for \$1.50

What it amounts to is ten day trips by bus, ten lunches, and a "T" Shirt for a total cost of \$35.00 per camper. Parents interested in registering their children are asked to write a check to the Boys' Clubs of Boston.

The dates of the four sessions are as follows:

- Session One - Monday, June 22 through Friday, July 3.
- Session Two - Monday, July 6 through Friday, July 17.
- Session Three - Monday, July 20 through Friday, July 31
- Session Four - Monday, August 3 through Friday, August 14.

## "That's My House!" Awards Program Offers Cash Prizes To Homeowners

On June 1 Charlestown Savings Bank launched a unique community-based recognition program awarding cash prizes to homeowners in each of Boston's sixteen neighborhoods.

This landmark awards program will recognize the most outstanding home improvements — based on imagination, execution and results — that have been completed in Boston since October 1980. It is believed to be the first program of its kind ever offered by a bank in the United States.

Interior projects such as remodeling a kitchen, and exterior efforts including painting, siding and roofing, are among the home improvements that the Charlestown program will recognize. Energy-saving efforts such as insulating and home additions such as installing solar panels will also be considered in the recognition program.

"Resourcefulness will play a key role in the judges' evaluations," explains Robert W. Garver, President of Charlestown Savings Bank. "We are looking for examples of creativity, reflecting home improvements that were carefully planned and efficiently executed."

"Conscientious homeowners set an important example in their own neighborhoods. They make a real contribution to the community at large and we at the Charlestown Savings Bank want to recognize that contribution."

The recognition will take the form of \$1,000 cash prizes for each of the sixteen neighborhood honorees selected. An additional \$2,000 will be awarded to the grand prize recipient, who will be selected from among the sixteen winners.

A community focus is reflected

in every aspect of the awards program, including the selection of judges. Each of the Boston neighborhoods will be judged by its own three-member panel, featuring local community leaders with a special interest in housing matters. The neighborhoods represented include Charlestown.

The grand prize recipient will be chosen by a blue-ribbon panel consisting of three nationally-known professionals offering varied perspectives on urban housing.

To be eligible for the "That's My House!" awards program, the entrant must own and occupy a 1 - 6 family home within the city of Boston and must be at least 18 years of age. The home improvement must reflect an investment of at least \$1,000 in supplies and/or labor. Do-it-yourself labor will qualify.

All home improvements must have been completed between October 1, 1980 and October 1, 1981. Home improvement loans, from Charlestown or any other bank, are not a requirement for eligibility. In fact, if a home loan was obtained for the improvement in question, the entrant must not reveal the identity of the institution supplying the loan or the application will be disqualified. Only one entry per home will be accepted for the program.

Entry forms for "That's My House!" are available at all Charlestown Savings Bank branch offices and at scattered locations in neighborhoods throughout Boston. The deadline for all applications is October 1, 1981. Awards will be announced in mid-November.

"This city-wide awards program is only one example of Charlestown Savings Bank's

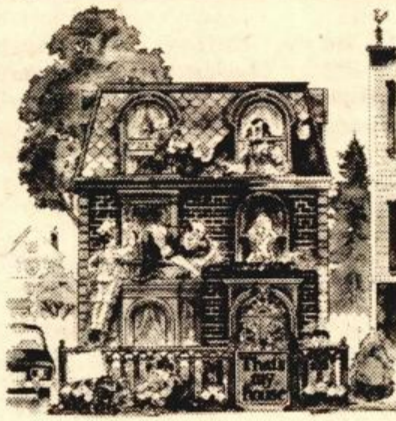

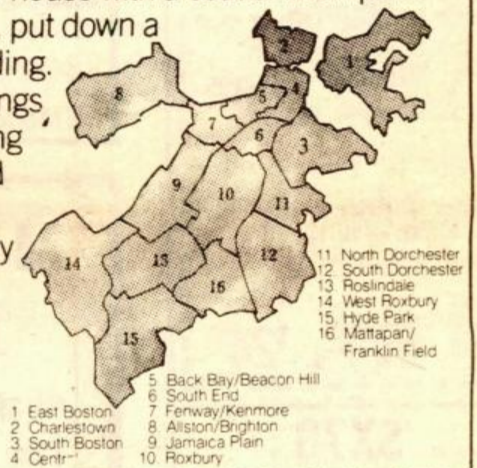

### Layoffs And Youth Gangs Topic Of Police Meeting

Residents were told that between 500 and 700 uniformed personnel could be laid off by July 1 if Mayor Kevin H. White and the City Council do not get together and agree on floating a city bond, regardless of anticipated state aid, according to Deputy Superintendent Joseph Saia at Monday's Police/Community Relations Meeting.

Saia also reiterated that Station 15 will not re-open.

The small group of residents in

attendance showed no reaction to the news. Saia also said that present sub-stations in other communities would probably be closed, come July 1, when Proposition 2½ goes into effect.

Street gangs was the most widely discussed topic by residents who pin-pointed the Harvard Mall Playground and the old Charlestown High School as places with the most flagrant public drinking, loud music, and vocal harrassment.

Residents complained of broken glass and vandalism as byproducts of these groups. One resident said his friends were afraid to visit his home because of harrassment by the youths.

Saia said those two trouble-areas would be visited by a special anti-crime group which moves around the district resolving this type of complaint

Other information given was as follows:

- 100 patrolmen will be positioned on the Bunker Hill Day Parade route with secondary positions once the parade has passed their location.
- negotiations with the Charlestown Town Council will

be made to combine the police meeting with the council meeting, once a month.

- that Saia will speak with someone from Johnny's Foodmaster on reminding truck drivers to use the School Street exit for Rutherford Avenue after making deliveries and to stop using Main Street as a route onto the expressway.
- that two policemen have been assigned to the Bunker Hill Street Projects between 5:30 p.m. and 1 a.m. to patrol by car and foot. They will patrol only this area unless assigned a priority call.
- that the police department does not sanction the Guardian Angels, a crime alert group, comprised of New York City Youths.

The Old Charlestown Schoolgirls' Association recently held a gala Reunion Dinner at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Charlestown. This event, the first for this new organization, saw over 530 women with the common bond of having attended school in Charlestown, travel from as far away as California to renew old friendships and acquaintances.

The formation of this new organization came about in the spring of 1980, following the Annual Old Charlestown Schoolboys' Association Reunion. Wives of several of the Old Schoolboys' discussed the great time their husbands had at the men's annual event and thought that they should either picket the men's gathering the next year to protest the exclusion of women or form their own organization.

Obviously, they decided to form their own organization. In several articles and advertisements placed in the Charlestown Patriot, Marie Walsh and Mary Doherty suggested that women who attended schools in Charlestown prior to 1935 (the same guidelines currently used by the Old Schoolboys) who were interested in the formation of such an organization, contact Marie and from these articles and word of mouth, the list of interested women grew daily.

In order to formulate plans for a dinner and to introduce the founding officers, a meeting was

called for a Sunday afternoon last January in the Community Services Mall at One Thompson Square. Under the guidance of Jim Carr, Secretary of the Old Charlestown Schoolboys, an application form was developed. Coffee and dessert was planned for the occasion and to the amazement and delight of the committee, over 300 eligible women became Charter Members on that day.

The founding officers of the Old Schoolgirls are: President Mary Coughlan; Vice President Mary Doherty; Secretary Marie Walsh; Treasurer Sister Stephen Marie; and Board Members Eileen Carroll, Kay Perreault, Genevieve Porter, Kay Twomey, Peg Doherty, Margaret Motherway, Helen Cotter, Margaret McElaney.

From this initial meeting, plans were underway for the Reunion Dinner to be held May 15th. Memberships continued to arrive, the Knights of Columbus Hall was secured, caterer hired and arrangements for a band were made.

List of members were organized so that a booklet could be printed with names, addresses, and Charlestown schools attended by the women. A stick pin was designed as a gift for members to commemorate this first reunion.

Unfortunately, due to limited space in the hall, many members had to be disappointed as there

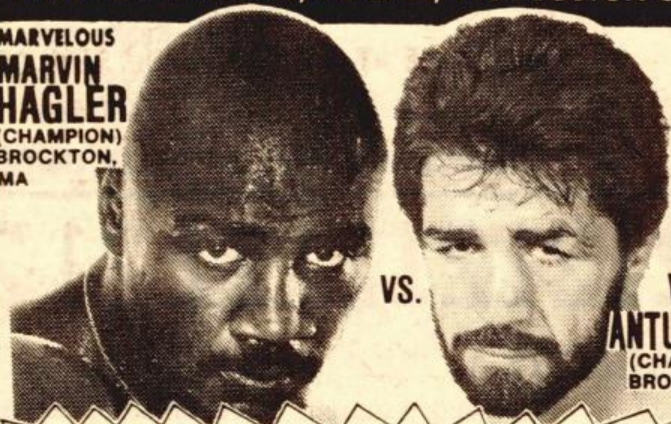

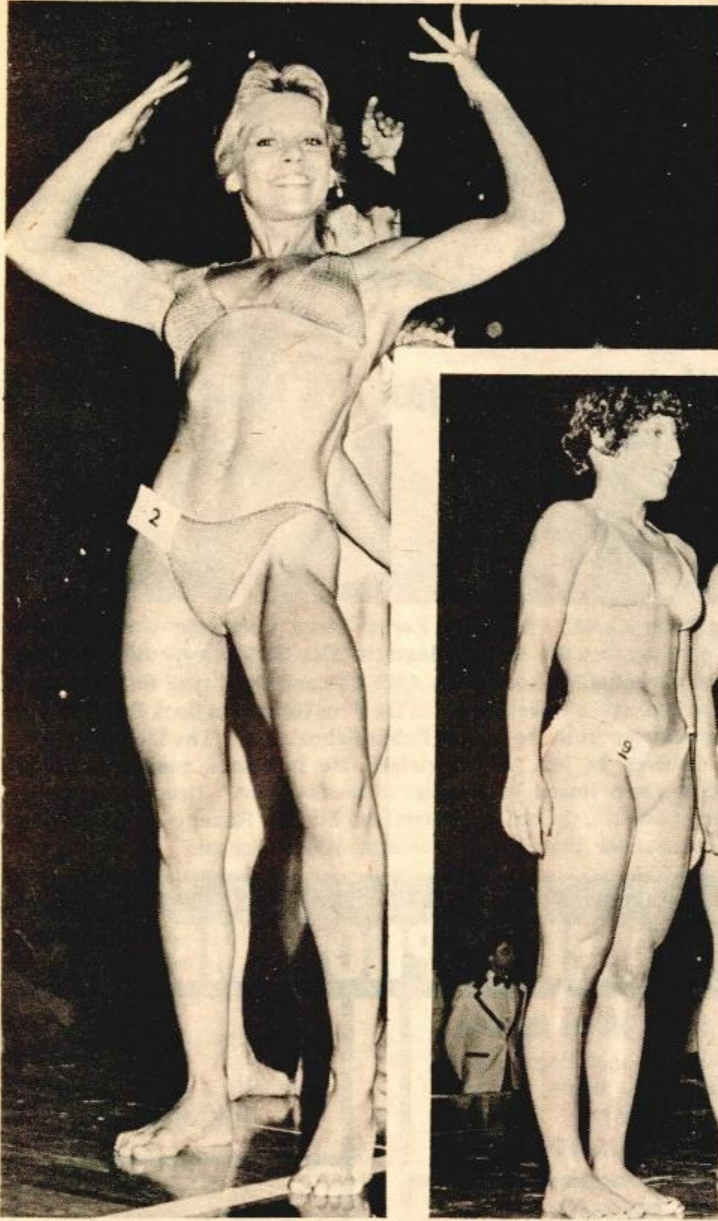
