

# Public Hearing On MBTA Cuts

There will be an important public hearing to discuss cuts in MBTA service on Wednesday, June 10th at the Kent School auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. Representative Richard Voke requested the meeting after he was presented with signed petitions from Charlestown residents concerned over the changes in service on the Bunker Hill and Main Street bus routes.

Representative Voke has filed

legislation which if passed will prevent arbitrary cuts in bus service in the future, but in the meantime he feels, "the best way to get results from the MBTA is to keep the pressure on them. We can't let them cut service without putting up a fight".

The hearing will be conducted by MBTA officials and everyone attending will have the opportunity to speak. Everyone is invited. Come and bring a friend.

# Property Revaluation Underway In Charlestown

A program to revalue all real property in the City of Boston by the Fall of 1982 is now underway. The State Supreme Judicial Court has mandated that all 351 cities and towns in the Commonwealth revalue property to determine full market value.

Representatives from the Office of Property Equalization (OPE), the agency established to carry out this task, are currently visitng properties in Charlestown. Data collection inspections began in Thompson Square, continue through the neighborhood, and finish in the Medford Street area.

During their visits, which will take 20-30 minutes, the OPE representatives will record such information as square footage, perimeter and the story height of your property in addition to the number of apartments, number of bedrooms, type of plumbing and the electrical and heating system. Their only function is to collect the information necessary for valuing your property equitably and accurately.

OPE representatives will identify themselves with picture identification cards bearing the City of Boston seal. Do not for any reason admit anyone to your property without proper identification.

# Two Critically Injured In Medford Street Fire

over 60 percent of her body while Robert Fitzgerald, also 23, remains on the critical list at Boston City Hospital, with first, second, and third degree burns over 90 percent of his body.

According to witnesses police were the first to discover the fire at 254-256 Medford Street and notified dispatchers of a working fire. Patrolmen Gary Greenwood and Anthony Pezzulo entered the second floor apartment bedroom where the fire began, according to the fire department spokesman, and rescued Whalen. A third floor rescue was attempted by Pezzulo, Greenwood, and Patrolmen John McLean and Saul Chajmowizz, who arrived later on the scene, but flames kept the men from entering the stairway to the third floor. McLean was knocked down to the second floor landing by flames

and heavy smoke, causing him to hit the ground. He was taken to the New England Medical Center and treated for back and knee injuries.

Firemen rescued Amanda Burnett 24, and her young son Benjamin. Neither of them were injured.

Fitzgerald was the last to be rescued, approximately 20 minutes after the fire began, and taken to Mass. General. Two hours later he was transferred to Boston City Hospital.

"I smelled smoke and thought it was my wiring," said Debbie Cooney who lived on the first floor with her five month old baby. I started alerting others and grabbed the baby and ran out. I saw flames coming out of the second floor and heard a woman screaming on the third floor with

Representative Voke was one of only four Boston legislators to support the "better budget", and alternative budget plan which would have returned 17 million dollars more to Boston than the





budget recommended by the House Ways and Mean Committee. Although the better budget was narrowly defeated, its supporters filed so many amendments that the House leadership recessed the House until today in order to have time to regroup.

Representative Voke strongly disagrees with those elected officials who are doing little or nothing to lessen the impact of Proposition 21/2. "I find it hard to believe that the intent of the supporters of Proposition 21/2 was to jeopardize the lives and safety of the people of Charlestown. I am committed to returning an amount of state aid to Boston which will give the city government enough money to provide essential services to its neighborhoods," declared Representative Voke.

Debate on the state budget resumed this morning with Representative Voke renewing his pledge to bring as much local aid as possible back to this district.

teeth back into their sockets after quickly rinsing them with water. If this cannot be done rinse the tooth with water and place it carefully between the teeth and the cheek. If this, too, is impossible place the tooth in a jar of water. Second, bring the patient and his tooth to the dentist immediately. In this way the tooth can be properly treated and secured in place. The sooner that this is done, the higher the chances that the tooth can be retained. Remember, after a tooth is placed back into the mouth, keep the patient upright and calm so that the tooth won't be swallowed or inhaled.

Sometimes, as adults, we fail to remember how hot and, oftentimes, boring summer in the city can be for a youngster. Nearly as soon as the euphoria of summer vacation begins to wane, the search for something to do begins.

If the shadow of Proposition 2 1/2 clouds the opening of the Bunker Hill Swimming Pool, hundreds of youngsters will find themselves with more idle time to fill than ever before. As the pool has serviced the community for more than 30 years, the Charlestown youngster has never tasted a summer unsweetened by the cool, blue waters at the top of the hill.

If the threat becomes a reality, the Boys' Club Day-Camp Program will be one of the few community programs designed to service the needs of a large number of youngsters during the upcoming summer months.

In anticipation of a larger than ever demand for space, the Club has decided to double its enrollment in each of the four two week sessions. One hundred boys and girls can now be accommodated.

During each session, the campers will leave the Club at 9:00 a.m. each weekday and travel to various beaches, picnic grounds, amusement parks, etc. They will return to the Club between four and four thirty on the same day.

Each camper will receive a lunch every day and a Boys' Club tee shirt for each session. Duffle bags will be available for \$1.50

What it amounts to is ten day trips by bus, ten lunches, and a "T" Shirt for a total cost of \$35.00 per camper. Parents interested in registering their children are asked to write a check to the Boys' Clubs of Boston.

Session Four - Monday, August 3 through Friday, August 14.



"Wanna?": "Want to?"


"Ya.": The opposite of "Na". Now look that up in your Funk and Wagnall's.

# "That's My House!" Awards Program Offers Cash Prizes To Homeowners



in every aspect of the awards program, including the selection of judges. Each of the Boston neighborhoods will be judged by its own three-member panel, featuring local community leaders with a special interest in housing matters. The neighborhoods represented incude Charlestown.

The grand prize recipient will be chosen by a blue-ribbon panel consisting of three nationallyknown professionals offering varied perspectives on urban housing.

To be eligible for the "That's My House!" awards program, the entrant must own and occupy a 1 - 6 family home within the city of Boston and must be at least 18 years of age. The home improvement must reflect an investment of at least \$1,000 in supplies and/or labor. Do-it-yourself labor will qualify.

All home improvements must have been completed between October 1, 1980 and October 1, 1981. Home improvement loans, from Charlestown or any other bank, are not a requirement for eligibility. In fact, if a home loan was obtained for the improvement in question, the entrant must not reveal the identity of the institution supplying the loan or the application will be disqualified. Only one entry per home will be accepted for the program.

Entry forms for "That's My House!" are available at all **Charlestown Savings Bank** branch offices and at scattered locations in neighborhoods throughout Boston. The deadline for all applications is October 1, 1981. Awards will be announced in mid-November.



# **Old Charlestown Schoolgirls' Association Holds First Annual Reunion**

The Old Charlestown Schoolgirls' Association recently held a gala Reunion Dinner at the Knights of Columbus Hall in, Charlestown. This event, the first for this new organization, saw over 530 women with the common bond of having attended school in Charlestown, travel from as far away as California to renew old friendships and acquaintances.

The formation of this new organization came about in the spring of 1980, following the Annual Old Charlestown Schoolboys' Association Reunion. Wives of several of the Old Schoolboys' discussed the great time their husbands had at the men's annual event and thought that they should either picket the men's gathering the next year to protest the exclusion of women or form their own organization.

Obviously, they decided to form their own organization. In several articles and advertisements placed in the Charlestown Patriot, Marie Walsh and Mary Doherty suggested that women who attended schools in Charlestown prior to 1935 (the same guidelines currently used by the Old Schoolboys) who were interested in the formation of such an organization, contact Marie and from these articles and word of mouth, the list of interested women grew daily.

In order to formulate plans for a dinner and to introduce the founding officers, a meeting was

called for a Sunday afternoon last January in the Community Services Mall at One Thompson Square. Under the guidance of Jim Carr, Secretary of the Old Charlestown Schoolboys, an application form was developed. Coffee and dessert was planned for the occasion and to the amazement and delight of the committee, over 300 eligible women became Charter Members on that day.

The founding officers of the Old Schoolgirls are: President Mary Coughlan; Vice President Mary Doherty; Secretary Marie Walsh; Treasurer Sister Stephen Marie; and Board Members Eileen Carroll, Kay Perreault, Genevieve Porter, Kay Twomey, Peg Doherty, Margaret Motherway, Helen Cotter, Margaret McElaney.

From this initial meeting, plans were underway for the Reunion Dinner to be held May 15th. Memberships continued to arrive, the Knights of Columbus Hall was secured, caterer hired and arrangements for a band were made.

List of members were organized so that a booklet could be printed with names, addresses, and Charlestown schools attended by the women. A stick pin was designed as a gift for members to commemorate this first reunion.
