Plaque Dedicated In Memory Of "Smokey" Johnson



## Planning And Zoning Committee Setting Agenda For Addressing Local Issues

The Planning and Zoning Committee of the Neighborood Council held a meeting on September 10 to form the community panel that will assist in rezoning decisions, and to discuss possible topics for future meetings.

The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) is working with the Committee and the panel as they establish an Interim Planning Overlay District (IPOD) in Charlestown. An IPOD provides temporary zoning regulations for an area where the Zoning Commission has determined that current zoning may be inappropriate. These temporary regulations may stay in effect for a maximum of two years; afterwards, new zoning may be implemented by the City.

Dave Armametti of the BRA supplied the gathering with a copy of the zoning code from the City and a workbook containing Charlestown demographics. Ar-

The Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will meet with two of the prospective developers of the P-2A Parcel (located at the intersection of Bunker Hill and Main Streets) on Wednesday evening, September 23 at 7:00 p.m. at the BRA mametti told the group not "to be intimidated by the technical stuff" in the code book as it is to be used as a reference. He added that the workbook should be taken as a "point of departure" and not as the final guide.

The Committee and the panel members concluded that additional information need be gathered as they set their agenda. In future meetings, the BRA will explain the zoning code, a traffic study will be submitted and a study will be made of variances granted in Charlestown in the last year.

In addition to gathering information, the Committee decided to invite representatives from other Boston Neighborhood Councils who have already worked on IPODs in their area to the September 17 meeting. Chairman Dennis Mc-Laughlin stressed that these individuals would assist with process and procedure to save the Charlestown


community from making time consuming errors. The three communities suggested include: Port Norfolk, Brighton/Allston and East Boston.

The Committee and the panel concentrated much of the meeting on future topics of discussion such as conflicts in neighborhoods where both residential and business zoning exist, the effect the Committee may have on variances, and general zoning labels established now that do not specify development in the future.

McLaughlin questioned whether decisions that the Committee makes now could later cause a restriction on the use of variances. Rich Johnston of the North Area Task Force said that legally the Committee and the panel have nothing to do with variances. Once the zoning code is done, he added, the theory is that everything the community needs is already supplied so that variances become unnecessary. However, Johnston also said that the Committee should not be so restrictive in their zoning decisions that they force people to obtain variances.

McLaughlin also questioned the effect current zoning decisions could have on the future of Mishawum or the Bunker Hill Housing Development or the possibility of one day having a nursing home in Charlestown. In both cases, it was said that as long as an area was identified as a particular zoning category, future







## Ground Breaking Ceremonies For New Housing To Be Held On Saturday

Residents of Charlestown are invited to attend the official ground breaking of the Townhouse Development being built by the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation (EDC). The ceremonies will be held at 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, September 19 at the site on Main and Baldwin Streets.

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn will be the guest speaker.

The EDC's first development project is an example of a partnership between the City, the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the neighborhood. It is a \$3.2 million construction project comprised of 26 townhouses. There will be 13 affordable units and 13 market price units, six of which will be two-family dwellings.

The Board of the EDC, chaired by Thomas S. Cunha, has set as its goal the "highest quality at the fairest price, in the shortest time.

The affordable units will benefit from City of Boston linkage funds and various site improvements which will be paid for by the BRA and the City. The EDC proposal featured the highest percentage of affordable units of which 70 per cent will go to first-time home buyers who qualify for the Massachusetts Housing/ Finance mortgage money. Construction financing is being provided by the First Mutual Bank of Boston, which will also make available permanent mortgage funds for the market rate units.

The EDC will conduct a public lottery to attract qualified first-time home buyers for the 13 affordable units. The lottery is planned for the early part of 1988.

The site along Main Street was once the H.P. Hood parking lot and the scene of many Kiwanis carnivals in the 1950's.

The homes will all have at least two parking spaces at the rear of each building. The City of Boston will construct a new road at the rear of the parcel.

President Tom Cunha commends his fellow Board Members, all neighbors, and residents of Charlestown for their persistence in this nearly three-year effort. Cunha stated, "This will give us an inspiration that local people can share in the real estate boom by getting both jobs and housing."

The EDC proposal gathered the most local support last Spring when the EDC and three other developers

competed for the BRA designation. BRA Director Stephen Coyle stated, "The Charlestown EDC has worked very hard and we at the BRA have been able to secure linkage funds which will allow this quality housing to be sold to local residents at affordable prices."


Both Cunha and Coyle hope that this success will be followed in the future with more affordable housing sponsored by the Charlestown EDC.

The EDC's Vice President. Dave Dow, is also the Executive Director of Local 218 Carpenters' Union. The Carpenters' Union has provided technical support and encouragement to the EDC because it supports the dual goal of jobs and housing for Boston residents.

The development should take approximately ten months to complete. The EDC hopes to be an example and standard of good housing for local residents and an encouragement to other friends and neighbors to step forward and work for the goal of increased home ownership by longtime residents.



## "A Promise Of Permanency" Exhibit Opens At Charlestown Navy Yard

#### by Mary Ziniti "In 1789 (two years after

the Constitutional Convention), cautious, but optimistic, Benjamin Franklin ob-

served that our Constitution had 'an appearance that promises permanency.' The past 200 years have proven Franklin correct." So reads



an introduction to the IBM computer exhibit that celebrates the bicentennial anniversary of the United States Constitution located in the National Park Service Visitor Center, Building Five, in the Charlestown Navy Yard

The Constitution of the United States has survived the turmoil of the Civil War in the 1860s, allowed women to vote in 1920 and now joins the computer revolution of the 1980s. The computer exhibit, "A Promise in Permanency," is sponsored by IBM and the Boston National Historical Park, and includes a colorful video display that visitors may touch to bring alive historical facts about the nation's chief governmental charter.

This traveling exhibit is based in part on a permanent exhibit at the Independence National Historical Park Visitor Center in Philadelphia. The Philadelphia exhibit is presented by the National Park Service and funded by Bell of Pennsylvania, a Bell Atlantic company, with support from IBM

The 1,500 square foot exhibit - one of three constructed by IBM - will be on display at the Visitor Information Center until Jan-

uary 8, 1988. The center is open to the public, free of charge, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., seven days a week.

In one of the programs -"The Constitution in Our Lives" - visitors touch select any of 85 topics involved in Supreme Court decisions, from cigarette warnings to the death penalty. Constitutional text pertinent to the topic appears, and videodisc footage of significant news events relating to it may be viewed.

A second program -"The Constitution Through 200 Years" - offers a moving time line of images from 1787 to 1987. Touchsensitive pictures of newsmaking people, events and court cases may be selected for more information on their historical significance.

Photographs, a time-line mural and a display case focusing on framers of the Constitution complete the exhibit.

Roy Blount, Jr. as the guest speaker. Author, humorist and contributing editor for Atlantic magazine, Blount is also related to William Blount, a signer of the Constitution.

The address by the 20th century Blount focused on a theme similar to that which appeared in a recent edition of IBM's corporate magazine called Think, entitled "If I Had Been A Delegate." Blount hypothesized what could have happened if he had been at the 18th century Constitutional Convention with 20th century knowledge.

The IBM exhibit on the Constitution at the Navy Yard should be on everyone's must-see list.

Mayor 'Raymond L. Flynn announced that the city's third annual Harborpark Day, scheduled for September 19, will be part of the festivities Boston is staging to observe the bicentennial anniversary of the United States Constitution.

The events planned at the Navy Yard and Christopher Columbus Park will highlight the progress made towards expanding opportunities for public access, recreation and economic growth on the harborfront," noted the Mayor.

At the Navy Yard, there will be a tent for children's games, a performance featuring Liam Tiernan and



"The quality of the Boston Public Schools' early childhood program has been called into question by an alarming rise in the number of students kept back in first grade and by reading scores well below national norms on standardized tests.'

That's how Boston's own task force describes the condition of early childhood education, said Attorney Stephen Tassinari, a candidate for the Boston School Committee.

"When twenty percent of students in the first grade fail, something is terribly wrong," said Tassinari.

Fortunately, under the leadership of the present Superintendent, the Boston School system itself has recognized the problem and proposed solutions, added Tassinari. Solutions, he said, that are as imaginative as they may be difficult to implement.

"But, in my view they should not deter us from taking that course which will provide the greatest benefit to the young people of Boston.'

Tassinari said that Boston had some significant strengths in the area of early childhood education. It is one of the few school sys-

"We'll probably spend many more times the amount of money on remediation and special education than we'll spend on early childhood education." said Tassinari. "I believe it is a challenge worth pursuing."



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### An AIDS Healing Service Question:

A reflection on healing when not a cure . . .

Are you ready to experience an evening of acceptance, assurance, hope, but most of all love through honesty? Then do read on.

As a non-professional member of a Charlestown parish church. I'd like to reflect and share a little of what might happen to anyone that is open enough to receive the gifts offered at an ecumenical AIDS Healing Service. Such a service will take place at Saint John's Episcopal Church. 27 Devens Street, on Tuesday, September 29 at 7:30 p.m.

Looking back at what I've most poignantly felt after leaving any of these services, two things come quickly to mind.

The first is that this is not a "faith healing." It is the Lord who heals and not our faith. This is not "magic."

Healing is not dependent on saying the "right words." but being in a relationship with Jesus Christ - the higher power. You will find that it is in working with the Lord, and not trying to change God's mind as He goes about seeking to renew His creation, that healing comes.

Also remember, healing is not an alternative dynamic given to the medical profession, but rather an integral part of the Lord's desire to heal the whole person. Healing can differ from a cure as it brings peace even though the physical conflict may remain. This all brings the sense of a continued healing that goes on within me. On a healing level, this seems to me to only come as an outpowering on oneself and what a person is seeking. The second is being

touched by honest love which can be experienced by anyone of us at anytime. This particular gift is so freely given to those who are willing to receive it. This sharing happens not only during the service, but in good conversations that occur at a reception following. For myself, this has opened the doors to some new friends, both with and without AIDS, that had been previously unknown. And while due to the nature of AIDS, the stark reality is such that although some of these friends are fragile. and their friendship may only be available for a short time, the strength I've gained from knowing them passes human understanding. One final thought comes

from a person with AIDS before he left this earthly plane, and that is, "Where there is love, there is no death.

election day strategy in her race for the District One City

DiLibero Workers Gather To Plan Election Day Push

Several dozen volunteers gathered at the Headquarters of District One Boston City Council Candidate Maria DiLibero last Thursday to discuss election day strategy.

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
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
