On the street or off, what to do with that parade of unsightly black/blue/green bins your neighbors have to look at?


The LADWP has suggestions for good curb appeal:

Ask your gardener or handyman for some ideas Check with Pinterest, Home Depot, Lowe's or Ikea. Keep it simple or make it an opportunity to enhance your property. Here are a few we saw in the Knolls, Manor and Lakeridge Estates.

A tight-knit enclave of 58 homes—all but four of which were built between 1957 and 1962—Lakeridge Estates is the youngest of HKCC's three neighborhoods. It has two primary streets: Lakeridge Road, which runs uphill from Cahuenga East; and Lakeridge Drive, which overlooks the Hollywood Reservoir on one side and hovers well above the 101 on the other. Lakeridge Place intersects with the Muholland Bridge, and Longdale Lane branches off the main road. End-to-end, Lakeridge spans less than six-tenths of a mile.

A handful of homes here have been passed down through family. Two original owners remain: Harriett Steinberg, 95, wife of the late HKCC board member Howard Steinberg, and Sakaye Aratani, 101, wife of the late George Aratani, a founder of Kenwood Electronics and Mikasa. John Legend lived here for several years as did Jordin Sparks, two of many entertainers who have found homes and privacy in our HKCC neighborhoods.

Deer, coyotes and the occasional bob cat roam freely, enjoying slopes that adjoin both a wildlife corridor and the reservoir access road. Neighbors know one other and recognize that the quiet, abundant open space all around them make Lakeridge a hidden gem.

SOME BACKGROUND and UPDATES

While some of us actually live in the Hollywood Hills, many others want to visit our spectacular landmark locations like the Hollywood Sign, the Hollywood Reservoir, and the vista views of L.A. to the Pacific Ocean. Consequently, the Hollywood Knolls, Lake Hollywood Estates, and Beachwood Canyon are all overrun—understandably!

In 2017, these neighboring communities sought to gather actual data that would lead to lead to a plan to help our inundated area. Former Councilmember David Ryu used CD4 discretionary funds to pay for an exploratory study by Dixon Resources, a consulting firm specializing in municipal transportation and parking issues. Dixon proposed several changes, some of which have been achieved, such as the gate across upper Wonder View Drive, as well as serious progress on a recommendation to relocate the trailhead.

This relocation strategy from the Dixon Study has been approved by the L.A. City Council.

HKCC Board member Ken Gralla invited Mehmet Berker, CD4's Field Deputy for current Councilmember Nithya Raman, to review the area in person. Gralla showed him the potential risks for fire, safety, erosion, trash, homeless, wildlife corridors, as well as the complications of intersecting interests: LADWP which owns the land, RAP which manages its borders with Griffith Park and Cahuenga Peak, and adjacent homeowners whose properties are the threshold port of entry. We hope to have the support of CD4 as we go forward.





--We were able to get the Los Angeles Dept. of Recreation and Parks (RAP) provide fire safety monitoring on upper Wonder View Drive for the Fourth of July and Labor Day weekends. HKCC Board members Jerry Baker and Ken Gralla met with Fire Chief Armando Hogan, and pressed RAP's Tracy James to provide patrols and monitors. **DONE**

--We got the City to control access to the Cahuenga Peak/ Wisdom Tree trailhead at the end of Upper Wonder View Drive with a lockable gate now closed dusk to dawn. DONE

--HKCC is working to promote a new trail from lower Lake Hollywood Drive near the underground tanks through LADWP property to merge with existing trails, an idea originating with the late CD4 Councilmember Tom LaBonge. TBD

--Board members and residents are reporting illegal tour buses in our neighborhood. **TBD**

--HKCC provided feedback to L.A. City's plan for a new hiking trail behind the Ford Theater, another idea from Tom LaBonge, an avid hiker. **TBD**
