Mayor Launches 'Kids Compute 2001'



MAYOR Thomas M. Menino, C.R. Edwards Middle School Headmaster Charles McAfee and Boston Edison CEO Thomas May hold a \$250,000 check from Boston Edison to promote computer literacy in the Boston Public Schools. Fall Opening Of Rink In Jeopardy

The nearly new \$500,000 roof on the MDC's Charlestown Emmons-Horrigan-O'Neil Rink did not survive this winter's record snows, thus the rink has been shut down since Jan. 12. And according to MDC spokesperson Sam Campbell, the immediate future "does not look good."

Citing an accumulation of heavy snow on the roof, Campbell added that this "probably exacerbated some pre-existing structural damage."

Unconfirmed reports suggest that the rink's wooden beams were left in place from the last reconstruction and collapsed from moisture saturation.

Charlestown Youth Hockey Association President Dan McGoff said the orga-

nization is worried about the facility's reopening for the next season in October.

Damage is still being assessed by architects and engineers. There has been no official cost estimate by the MDC to date. While other rinks have suffered leaks and other roofing problems, most are operational. Two rinks in Hyde Park and Brighton have "comparably serious damage," said Campbell.

Jay Ash of Rep. Richard Voke's office said there has been steady communication with the MDC making provisions for the 10 weeks left of this season.

Ash said a meeting has been scheduled for early next week with the MDC and community leaders to confirm costs of the damage. Voke's Office is ex-

pected to help secure additional funds in hopes of a fall reopening.

All of this season's last 10 weeks of ice hours have been filled and Charlestown games scheduled at the North End's Steriti Rink. Where the annual McGonagle Tournament will be held, however, is still in question.

"The MDC has taken good care of us," McGoff said. "We've got ice time in the North End. Obviously, it's not that convenient, but it's ice."

McGoff said everyone is anxious to move ahead as soon as possible, but "the problem goes deeper than Charlestown Youth Hockey."

The CYHA will design a plan of action after a formal determination is made by the MDC.

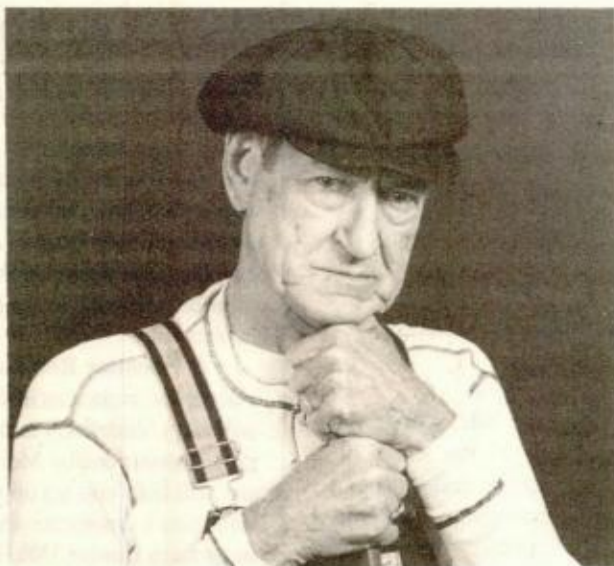

James Doherty Dies At 84

James Michael Doherty, 84, of Charlestown, a former assistant chief city clerk for the city of Boston and chief civil deputy sheriff of Suffolk County died Jan. 23 at Mass. General Hospital.

Doherty was born in Charlestown and lived there all his life. He graduated from Boston Latin School in 1929 and attended Harvard University from 1958 to 1960. During World War II, he served in the US Navy as a pharmacist's mate in the Pacific.

From 1963 to 1972 he worked for the city of Boston, rising to the No. 2 position in the office of the city clerk. He was employed in the sheriff's office from

1972 to 1992.

Doherty was an active volunteer in political and civic affairs. He worked on John F. Kennedy's state

and national elections and assisted Robert Kennedy in his 1968 presidential bid, traveling across the nation on his behalf. He also

advised Sen. Edward Kennedy on Charlestown community matters. He served as clerk and treasurer of the Charlestown Working Theater and performed in many of its productions. He was a former member of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council.

He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Esther (Cianciarulo); two daughters, Ellen Brumfield of Marston Mills and Rose Ann Doherty-Vinacor of Bearsville, N.Y.; and three grandchildren.

A funeral Mass was celebrated on Jan. 27 in St. Francis de Sales Church with burial following in Holy Cross Cemetery in Malden.

Charlestown Branch Library's Renovation Year - 1996

The Friends of the Charlestown Branch Library have announced that 1996 is Renovation Year for the library!

In response to a letter from the Friends' officers and board requesting to know when various long-sought improvements would be made to the library, the Boston Public Library and Boston Public Facilities Department responded in a timely and positive manner.

Meeting with officers and board members on Dec. 14, Worth Douglas, assistant supervisor, Brighton District BPL; Deborah Pierce and Anton Becker, architects; and Mark J. Burnes, PFD project mana-

ger, described the improvements being planned for the Charlestown Branch Library to be carried out this year.

The improvements include: a new elevator to allow the disabled access to the library's second floor; reconstruction of the rest rooms to make them handicapped accessible; (these two improvements will bring the library into compliance with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) requirements; all new carpeting throughout the library; construction in the meeting room to restore the performance stage facilities lost in last year's fire; repair of the leak in the meeting room ceiling; and restora-

tion of rear windows broken over the years and replaced with opaque materials.

Also, removal of debris and the crumbling brick wall behind the library and preparation of the space for brick paving and landscaping by the Friends Landscaping Committee to create a pleasant sitting-out patio (David Hawk, a Charlestown landscape architect has volunteered to assist the committee in planning the space); Mark Burns reported that a large caliper ornamental tree has been selected from the city's tree nursery and reserved for planting in the space; and finally, fencing around the rear area will be

revised to solve the present "gate-blocking-sidewalk" problem.

The work, presently in the planning stage, will be put out to bid in the spring and is scheduled to be substantially complete by next November. Before plans are finalized, a community meeting has been scheduled at the Friends' request, to allow community members to view the plans and comment on them.

The meeting has been set for Thursday, Feb. 8 at 6:30 p.m. in the library meeting room, 179 Main St., Charlestown. All interested Friends, citizens and library users are urged to attend.




'Townie Santa' Committee Meeting

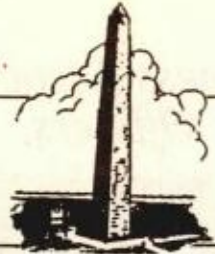



Residents Seek Further Input On City Square Design

Neighbors will continue to seek input on specific proposals for City Square redevelopment. Residents and Charlestown Neighborhood Council Zoning and Development Committee members recently reviewed the latest draft of guidelines with representatives of the design consulting team of Childs Bertman Teseckares, and the state's Central Artery North Area project and Division of Capital Planning and Operations (DCPO).

The Jan. 23 public meeting marked the latest step in a three-year community process to help design its own neigh-

borhood redevelopment. However, residents were left with concerns about a continuing level of meaningful input.

Committee Chairman Tom Cunha said, "This has been the community's first opportunity to zone, work on guidelines, really try to sculpt a gateway to the community, and now it seems like we're at the whim of a developer."

Among the lingering community concerns for the upcoming finalized design guidelines for the five vacant parcels in City Square are: 1) the Central Artery North Area (CANA) Parcel 1 may be too restrictive in size or shape for a developer; 2) that preserving Charlestown's view of the Old North Church be given special attention; and 3) that calling for a building on CANA Parcel 6 be favored over a parking lot.

Cunha suggested that residents meet with DCPO Commissioner Lark Palermo, whose office manages the process of conveying state-owned land for sale and lease, before reviewing specific development plans for the parcels. He said a pre-review meeting would be an opportunity for Palermo to understand Charlestown's concerns firsthand. "We just want to affect the process," Cunha said, "not her decision."

Committee member Jim Conway added that Charlestown's local elected state officials, Sen. Thomas Birmingham and Rep. Richard Voke, should be invited.

"We did a hell of a job on the zoning," Cunha said. "As a committee, we should take on this process now. The guidelines don't bring out the flavor or the character of the design."

Cunha asked for a meeting with the DCPO com-

missioner and that points raised on the presented drafts be responded to.

Five of six CANA parcels will be developed according to lot-specific guidelines. Parcel 5 is the site for City Square Park.

Uses of the five available parcels vary from allowing housing and shops to a hotel, firehouse and parking.

Of specific concern in City Square for residents at the meeting were to preserve views of the Old North Church from Charlestown, and having meaningful input on proposed development on parcels 1 and 6.

The slightly sloping piece of land between Constitution Road and Chelsea Street, Parcel 1, will share parking space with the National Park Service. Residents said that they were concerned that its seven specific guidelines may together create a potentially confining design for developers, leaving it as an undesirable parcel.

Parcel 6 is located near the City Square Shell gas station, bound by Rutherford Avenue, City Square and Harvard Street. Its guidelines allow it to be used solely for parking and call for "a substantial screening facade" on the City Square boundary. Residents said this use could create an unattractive walled-in look, an unacceptable effect for the community.

Cunha will seek approval from the full council at the Tuesday, Feb. 6 monthly meeting to send his draft of a letter to Birmingham and Voke regarding meeting with Palermo. The letter will cite a best-case scenario that the community will have input in the decision-making process, according to Cunha.



REMEMBER THE NANNY TAX RULES

If you have household employees, this is the time of year when you may begin to think about payroll taxes and W-2 forms. Here's a summary of your payroll tax obligations for household employees, including some new requirements for 1995.

By Jan. 31, 1996 you must have issued W-2 forms to all household employees who earned at least \$1,000 or more during 1995 or who had taxes withheld from their wages, regardless of total earnings. By Feb 29, you must send a copy of each W-2 to the Social Security Administration, along with a W-3 transmittal form.

Thanks to a recent change in the law, you weren't required to file quarterly payroll tax returns for household employees during 1995. However, you may be required to file "Schedule H" with your 1995 personal tax return. This new payroll tax form is required if you withheld any taxes from household wages during 1995, if you paid \$1,000 or more to any household employee at least 18-years-old, or if you paid total household wages of \$1,000 or more in any calendar quarter of 1995 or 1994.

When you file Schedule H, you must pay any taxes that you withheld from your employees' wages during 1995, as well as the employer's share of social security/medicare tax. You also may owe unemployment tax. For 1995, the IRS will allow you to pay household payroll taxes in one lump sum, due by the extended due date of your tax return (generally Apr. 15, 1996).

If you file Schedule H, or if you issue a W-2 form to any household worker for 1995, the IRS now requires that you have an employer identification number (EIN). You can obtain an EIN by filing IRS Form SS-4.

The rules for household employees may have been simplified, but they are still far from easy. If you have any questions or if you need assistance, please give us a call.
