

The Boys' Club of Boston was established in 1893 in response to a social need for a place and a way for boys to engage in wholesome, developmental activities during their leisure time. In 1982, the need still exists in these more sophisticated, somewhat more prosperous, but essentially same environments of Boston.

From its original modest setting on the second floor of a small wood frame building in Charlestown, the organization has grown to include three large clubhouses and memberships in Charlestown, Roxbury, and South Boston. The program was expanded in 1979 to include girls and was subsequently renamed The Boys and Girls Clubs of Boston.

In its 89th year of service, the Boys and Girls Clubs is today a big and busy Clubhouse - a place and a way for fun and learning. Its activities are recreational and educational, its new and expanded programs in keeping with current demands upon the boys' and girls' futures. Stimulating the interests, energies, and intellects of the over 5000 members, its general program incorporates numerous sports and games, vocational and cultural classes, training in civic, government, and citizen responsibilities. In an unregimented, nonsectarian milieu, this training is characterized as informal while it is directed toward the individual - his particular talents and problems.

The Boys and Girls Clubs of Boston offers youth a well rounded, year-round set of choices regarding their use of their free time. It also makes some new ways and some new places for every youth, including that youth who feels he/she does not fit his prescribed

The Boys and Girls Clubs of Boston is eighty-nine years old, and wiser than ever to the way and play of boys and girls.

Congratulations to this outstanding Charlestown/Boston institution which is providing the boys and girls of Charlestown - a place to go and a way to grow!



SETTING THE FACTS STRAIGHT

It is not a "fact of life" that several or all of the permanent teeth have to be lost as we grow older. Except for accidents or malformations, teeth are lost as a consequence of decay or periodontal (gum and bone) disease - conditions which can be prevented or arrested by timely and proper care. The primary cause of loss of teeth is neglect!

A toothache that "goes away by itself" does not mean that the tooth has recovered from whatever affected it. Pain is a warning signal that something is wrong and that no time should be lost in consulting a

Fillings do not weaken teeth! The truth is that unfilled cavities weaken teeth, and if neglected lead to loss of a tooth which timely filling could have completely prevented.

Drinking lots of milk does not prevent tooth decay. Milk is the richest dietary source of calcium, needed for teeth and bone-building, and an excellent food. But milk cannot arrest the process of tooth decay or prevent its inception.



TIPS FOR TEETH

ORTHODONTICS

For the treatment of crooked or overcrowded teeth, for spaces that can be closed, for bites (occlusion) that do not properly mesh, for health reasons to preserve the dentition, and for esthetics to make the teeth conform to the facial structure.

There are about 4,000,000 dental patients being treated with orthodontics in the United States at this time. One fifth (20%) of these patients are adults, twenty years of age or older. The increase in adult patients is primarily due to the technical developments in orthodontics making braces less noticeable and more acceptable to many adults. Patients have become more educated in what orthodontics can do. We realize that serious dental disease, like gum disease or tooth loss, may be prevented by orthodontic treatment. Also many adults are just dissatisfied with the appearance of their teeth and wish to do something about it. Perhaps it is status to be under treatment; perhaps it is desire from childhood; or perhaps it is an opportunity to be the center of attention. Whatever the reason, adults are being treated.

One other reason could be that financially orthodontics is not a terribly expensive procedure and a very good value because of the benefits that may be derrived. Furthermore, dental insurances may help to reduce the cost and newer methods do not show the stainless steel bands that used to be so unsightly. And if there are many people having orthodontics done, it is a comfort for the new patient to go along with the treatment. What a subject to talk about!



Issues On Aging

Questions: When is a person old?

Answer: A person need not be old at the age of 65. This age was first chosen by Emperor Bismarck in Germany in the 1800's to denote the time when citizens should begin to collect benefits and was later adopted by the U.S. government for social security purposes. Unfortunately, the age of 65 became a symbol in our society of being old, of suddenly having reached the declining years. Yet, this is not true for many people. Everyone ages at different rates. Heredity, health, personality, and the environment are just a few of the factors which influence aging.

We all know people who stop functioning in their 50's and others who go on well into their 90's. Consider the creativity and later life success of conductor Arthur Fiedler, anthropologist Margaret Mead, and George Burns, acting into his 80's. There are several older people in our community who, although less famous than those mentioned above, are none-the-less living their lives to the fullest-still working, socializing and learning-at any age many would consider old.



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




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
