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PE Builds Important Skills, Prepares Students for Lifetime of Fitness

In Physical Education, students have been exposed to a large variety of sport skills, cooperation skills and safety skills.

In sports skills, students have worked on a large variety of movements, such as correct technique in passing balls with hands and feet.

Additionally, students have learned the basics for racket skills and are progressing in learning how to use the body muscles efficiently, with coordination in all aspects of sport movements.



One very important component in team sports is kindness. This is to be shown to the students' team and to the opponents' team. All students are expected to share with teammates. Students are also taught to put less emphasis on winning and focus on treating others with respect.

PE is a very fast paced class, in which one student sprinting without full attention can cause an injury to self and others. Students are constantly reminded to be alert and to attempt to always be aware of surroundings when moving and when using equipment.

Students will continue to progress in all aspects of physical activity in PE class. Lessons will continue to be taught in a positive atmosphere in order to encourage a lifelong involvement in physical activity.

Students Learn About Composers, Build Skills, Prepare for Concert

ASU Student Among Nation's Top Athletes In Swimming Competitions



One of our ASU students has made a name for herself in the world of swimming. Ujin, a 3B student, started swimming in 2012 at age 6. In 2013, she took a first place and second place in events at the Mongolian Amateur Swimming Association's Competition. The following year, she received three gold medals, a silver medal and a team bronze medal in the Engui Tal LLC sponsored 4th Annual Competition.

Last November, she returned to the Mongolian Amateur Swimming Association's Competition in Erdenet city and won four gold medals, even earning third rank among adult athletes in the breaststroke event. Most recently, she participated in the State Youth Championship in Ulaanbaatar in March

and won a gold medal, a silver medal and two bronze medals. In just three years, she has

earned eight gold, two silver and three bronze medals and has risen to the title of 2nd rank athlete. Congratulations on your outstanding accomplishments, Ujin! Keep swimming, and maybe we will see you someday among the Olympic athletes.
