

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Tom Hickey To Be Chief Marshal Of Bunker Hill Day Parade

When the Bunker Hill Day Parade begins in Hayes Square this year, Tom Hickey won't be watching it from the top of Belmont Street with his family and friends as he has done every year since he can remember. This year, as the Chief Marshal of the parade, he will be leading the parade through Charlestown and he couldn't be happier.

When asked about his reaction to being chosen Chief Marshal for the parade this year, he said, "I'm flabbergasted . . . I was thrilled when they asked me and I know it's going to be a wonderful day."

To be chosen Chief Marshal this particular year has a very special meaning for Tom Hickey, as the parade will not only be honoring those who fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill, but also honoring the 50th anniversary of the World War II victory and all those who served.

An Army veteran, Hickey fought at the Battle of the Bulge and the meaning of this remembrance will be a personal one for this year's Chief Marshal.

A paratrooper during his stint in the U.S. Army, Hickey belonged to a group called the "509" and had made many close friends of the men in the group who served in the war together. Just before the 509 was to go on another mission, Hickey and three other paratroopers were transferred

to the artillery group on the Rhine River in Germany. It was there that he and his three friends later learned that the entire 509 had perished.

"I pray for those men every day - they were good men and I think it was a miracle that I survived. I think about them all the time," said Hickey. For him, the anniversary of the World War II victory 50 years ago will honor those friends lost that day in Germany.

Married to the former Bridget Veronica Doherty, the couple has three children, MaryEllen, Tom and Brian, as well as six

grandchildren. An employee of the Revere Sugar Refinery until his retirement in 1973, Tom Hickey has been an active and enthusiastic member of the Charlestown community his entire life. A former barbershop quartet singer, Hickey has been the premier soloist at St. Francis de Sales Church for many years. It is most often his voice that can be heard at most Charlestown services, ceremonies and events.

He is a beloved member of this community and his many kindnesses and general goodwill have made him friends wherever he goes.



Earth Day Event At Paul Revere Landing Park In Charlestown Celebrates The Environment And History

On the site where 220 years ago Paul Revere began his famous "midnight ride," an Earth Day celebration was held to signal the creation of a new park in Charlestown. "This park is the result of unprecedented cooperation between federal, state and local government agencies, as well as environmental and community groups," said Secretary of Transportation James J. Kerasiotes.

"As a result of opening the new tunnels under City Square and removing the elevated ramps between the Tobin Bridge and Route 93, we have created open space that can be used to improve the quality of life for the area."

"The Charles River is one of our area's most precious resources," said Secretary of Environmental Affairs Trudy Coxe. "The Paul Revere Landing Park will provide a unique opportunity to continue the string of parks that already exist along the Charles, through Charlestown to Boston Harbor."

The Paul Revere Landing Park commemorates the crossing of the Charles by Paul Revere 220 years ago on the night of his famous ride. Since there were no bridges connecting Boston and Charlestown at the time, Revere rowed a small boat across the mouth of the river to

the Charlestown Ferry Landing. There, several fellow patriots waited with the horse he would use that night to alert every Middlesex village and farm.

The park, which is being enlarged and expanded to face the new City Square Park now under construction, is estimated to cost \$4 million and is a joint project of the Mass. Highway Department and the Metropolitan District Commission.

Both parks are part of the final phase of the Central Artery North Area (CANA) Project, which included the construction of tunnels under City Square and the demolition of the old elevated ramps

from the Tobin Bridge to Route 93.

Paul Revere Landing Park is the first phase of park construction between the Museum of Science and Boston Harbor. This will extend the MDC's Charles River Reservation and connect the esplanades in Boston and Cambridge with Charlestown and the North End.

Over seven miles of continuous pedestrian, bicycle and handicappedaccessible pathways will be built to connect over 40 acres of new public spaces. The cost of design and construction for the parklands surrounding the Charles River Basin will total \$80 million.




Program On 'Parental Stress' At The Charlestown Branch Library







★ Finnish Minelayer To Visit Charlestown Navy Yard . . . The Boston National Historical Park will host Finnish Minelayer FNS Pohjanmaa from Wednesday, May 3 to Saturday, May 6. The ship will arrive at 9 a.m. on May 3 at Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. FNS Pohjanmaa will be open to the public on Thursday, May 4 from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 2 to 4 p.m., as well as Friday, May 5 from 9 to 11 a.m. There is no charge for visiting the ship.

Pohjanmaa is over 255 feet in length and carries a crew of 90. Equipped with missiles, anti-submarine mortars, depth charges, mines and countermeasures, sonar and helicopter landing area, the ship also functions as a ship for 70 trainees accommodated in Portakabins on the mine deck.

The National Park Service has hosted over 100 ships from around the world during the past 10 years since the inception of the Visiting Ships Program at the Charlestown Navy Yard. This summer promises to be busy with more visiting ships. Upcoming are planned visits from HMCS Iroquois (DDH-280) from May 12-15 and USS McInerny (FFG-8) from May 19-23.

- ★ Board Of Appeal Hearings . . . The city of Boston Board of Appeal met on April 25 in Boston City Hall to hear the appeals on two Charlestown properties. They are:
 - · John White sought permission to

allow his Mobil Station at 428A Medford St. to be used for the display and sale of five used and/or new cars.

Attorney John Tobin joined White in making a presentation to the board. Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, told the board that the petition by White had been through the community process by means of the CNC and there was no opposition from abutters. The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and Amy Chardavoyne, aid to City Councillor Diane Modica, both expressed approval. The board approved the petition.

 Hugh C. Bigney sought permission to construct a shed dormer at the rear of a three-family dwelling at 12 Mt. Vernon St. Evers, the BRA and Chardavoyne recommended approval as the addition is consistent with the surrounding buildings. Evers said there had been no opposition from abutters. Boston Fire Department Completes First Phase Of Defibrillation Training Program

Boston Fire Department (BFD) Commissioner Martin E. Pierce Jr. has announced that the first phase of the department's defibrillation program has been completed. "The people of Boston are already benefitting from the training that firefighters have received," stated Pierce.

Boston averages two victims of cardiac arrest each day and over 700 annually. Eighty percent of these cases present themselves with ventricular fibrillation, which is the ineffective quivering of the heart muscle with no cardiac output and pulse.

Victims experiencing ventricular fibrillation have only once chance for survival - an electric shock - to send the heart back into normal rhythm. Time is of the essence - each minute that passes decreases the chance of survival and after 10 minutes, the condition is fatal. An automatic

In June 1994, Boston firefighters began a training program conducted by the city's Emergency Medical Service. Boston EMS trained firefighters in the causes, signs and systems of cardiac arrest, cardiac anatomy and physiology, protocols for use of automatic external defibrillators, and hands-on experience with the equipment.

In September 1994, the first defibrillator units were put into service on fire companies. "Adding defibrillator units to our engine companies increases the geographic availability of these units. We have firehouses in every neighborhood of the city, and in most instances, our apparatus can be on the scene in less than four minutes," stated Pierce.

To date, all engine companies and the department's two heavy rescue companies are equipped with defibrillator units. In addition, over 500 firefighters have received the training from Boston EMS on the use of defibrillators.

The BFD also has 214 state certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). The department is in the second year of an aggressive campaign to train 80 firefighters per year to become EMTs. "We responded to over 54,000 incidents last year, a 15-year high," noted Pierce.

"Of those incidents, 16,000 were rescue or medical related. This drives home the point that with this training, we are headed in the right direction. I can see a point in the not too distant future, when all newly hired firefighters will be EMTs. In the end, the citizens will be better served," concluded Pierce.


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Applications Due By May 5 For Boston's Newest Public School

Boston parents whose children would benefit from a comprehensive, innovative curriculum designed to prepare students for life and work in the 21st century are urged to apply now to the Boston Renaissance Charter School.

The Boston Renaissance School, which opens its doors for the first time this September, is a newly established public school created by the state of Mass. under the 1993 Education Reform Act.

This year, the Renaissance School will admit 630 students in grades K-2 through 5. During the next four years, the school will expand to grade 12, serving 1,265 students. The school is located at 250

Stuart St., adjacent to the Park Plaza.

Admission is open to all Boston school-aged children. There is no admission test, tuition, fees, or other costs. If there are more applicants than available seats, admission will be determined on the basis of a lottery.

Applications are available by calling the Renaissance School at 345-3472 or 451-9113. Completed applications should be mailed to the Renaissance School, P.O. Box 3383, McCormack Station, Boston, Mass. 02101. Applications must be submitted by Friday, May 5.

The Renaissance School's academic year will be 206 days in length.

The school day will be seven to eight hours long, depending on grade level. The school building will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to provide before and after school programs, including traditional extended day activities, tutoring and computer-assisted instruction. Parents and students will be linked to the school by a home computer and modem provided by the school.

The school's curriculum emphasizes reading, writing, mathematics, science and computer skills, along with a well-rounded introduction to arts, music and literature. Based on careful research and the best practices from schools around the country, the curriculum

combines the best of what is old and what is new.

The day-to-day operation will be overseen by a school headmaster with broad authority to establish an effective learning environment, including hiring and firing teachers and setting rules of civility and conduct for students and staff. In the first year of operation, the school will be staffed with about 35 teachers.

At the Renaissance School, parents are invited to be partners in their children's education. Working with teachers and school staff, parents will help set education goals for their children and meet quarterly with teachers to monitor progress.



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Vaccine-Preventable Diseases Still Occur

This is National Infant Immunization Week, a national initiative aimed at emphasizing to parents and health-care professionals the importance of up-to-date immunizations.

Immunizations protect against nine preventable diseases including: diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), pertussis (whooping cough), polio, measles, mumps, rubella (German measles), Haemophilus influenza type b, and hepatitis B.

Many people think that these diseases are no longer a threat; but, cases of these diseases still occur throughout Mass. and the United States. An outbreak of pertussis in Mass. resulted in over 400 reported cases of pertussis during 1994. Many more cases most likely went

unreported.

Studies indicate that about 70 percent of the children in Mass. have received all the necessary vaccinations by the time they are 2 years old. It is very important that the remaining 30 percent of children be identified and receive the recommended vaccinations to protect them from preventable illnesses.

SHOULD YOU SELL OR TRADE IN YOUR BUSINESS CAR?

When you shop for a new car or truck, it is often tempting to accept the car dealer's offer to take your old vehicle as a trade-in, so that the exchange of vehicles is wrapped up in one transaction. But if you have your own business, and if you are buying or selling business vehicles, you need to consider the tax consequences before making final plans to trade in your old car or truck. First, calculate your tax basis in the vehicle by taking your original cost and subtracting all depreciation deducted. Then check the market value of your old vehicle - would you have a profit or a loss from a sale? If you're facing a taxable gain, you are probable better off from a tax standpoint trading the vehicle in on the new one. The result: No gain is required to be reported on your tax return.

On the other hand, if your tax basis is more than the market value, consider selling the vehicle yourself. The sale of the vehicle will result in a loss which can be deducted on your tax return. A word of caution: Selling your old vehicle to the same dealer who sells you the new vehicle will be treated by the IRS as a trade-in. No loss deduction is allowed if the vehicle is traded instead of being sold.

Special rules apply if the old vehicle was used less than 100 percent for business or if the standard mileage allowance was used to figure vehicle expenses in prior years.

Calculate your tax basis before bargaining for a new business vehicle. Advance planning is the key to lowering the amount of income tax you pay.



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

While attending a "30th" birthday recently, I won a "fixed" raffle drawing and lo and behold, the prize was


