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Planning To Sell Your Home?

THE GOOD NEWS: PRICES ARE UP

Charlestown sales prices for the first four months of 1986 are up 17% over 1985 and up 61% over 1984 prices!

THE BAD NEWS: SALES ARE DOWN

Charlestown sales are down 22% (by number of properties sold) and down 17% (by dollar amount of properties sold) from 1985 sales.

ARE CHARLESTOWN PRICES GETTING OUT OF REACH OF HOME BUYERS?

There are many reasons for the soft market: many investors have been pushed out of the market by the Condo ordinance, many investors are on the sidelines waiting to see what happens with tax reform. It is also likely many people are simply priced out of the market.

Charlestown is not alone: brokers we've talked to in Boston and Cambridge tell us their sales are off.

A property owner in Charlestown should consider that the market may be reaching a temporary price plateau.

GIBSON'S GOOD NEWS:

GIBSON SALES ARE UP GIBSON PRICES ARE UP

In spite of a general softening of the market, Gibson's Charlestown sales prices are up 20% and total sales are up 23%.

Over the last five years, Gibson sales prices average 26% higher than the average Charlestown sales price.

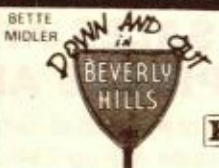

Last Community Meeting On North Area Project?

Throughout the life of the North Area/Central Artery Project, the people of Charlestown have worked hand-in-hand with the Department of Public Works (DPW), other agencies and their consultants to develop a plan for Charlestown that meets the needs of both the agencies and the community. In fact, people in the Charlestown community have been directly responsible, not only for proposing the highway structure that was finally accepted, but also for lobbying to regain funds for the project after it had been cancelled during a massive federal highway construction cut-back.

Now, after several years of cooperation, and just as final design recommendations are being submitted to the Federal Highway Administration, the DPW has broken its commitment to

Charlestown by neglecting to hold community meetings, and not informing us in any way of progress being made on project plans. No community meetings have been held since January, and as far as we, the members of the North Area Task Force, are aware, this upcoming meeting on June 17th is the last planned meeting between the community and the DPW, despite requests by elected officials on our behalf that they be continued.

There are many issues still unresolved. For example, the community has not been asked to give input into the construction phasing planned for the next several years. Yet, we are the ones who will have to live with construction truck traffic and noise, reduced parking, closed streets, and, above all, diverting of traffic through Charlestown between the Tobin Bridge and Route 93. In addition, no effort has yet been made by the DPW to

plan for a grievance procedure for the people of Charlestown during construction — a commitment the DPW made to us as early as 1982.

It therefore behooves us as a community to actively voice our concerns to the DPW. Please make it a point to attend our **last scheduled community meeting** to let the DPW know that we won't stand for their lack of attention to our community.

Bring your friends and neighbors to the Knights of

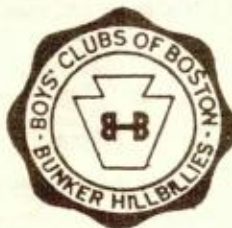

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Public Workshop To Be Held At Charlestown Navy Yard

The National Park Service has scheduled a public workshop to discuss proposed revisions to the General Management Plan for the Charlestown Navy Yard tonight,

June 12th, at 7:30 p.m. in the Hull Room, Building 5, at the Navy Yard. All are invited.

At the workshop, the proposed modifications will be

described, and the audience will have an opportunity to present concerns and ask questions.

The General Management Plan is a guide to the long-range management, preservation and development of

the lands and structures which comprise the National Park Service portion of the Navy Yard. Among the changes proposed are: Providing an outdoor warm

weather seating area to accompany an indoor food service; a shift in emphasis at the Commandant's House to make the facility more available to the public; and adaptive reuse of portions of the Ropewalk and Chain Forge, with private developers funding the restoration and exhibit developments.

The public workshop will provide an opportunity for citizens to discuss these proposed changes with NPS officials. Materials describing the changes will be available. Written comments will be accepted through June 30, 1986.

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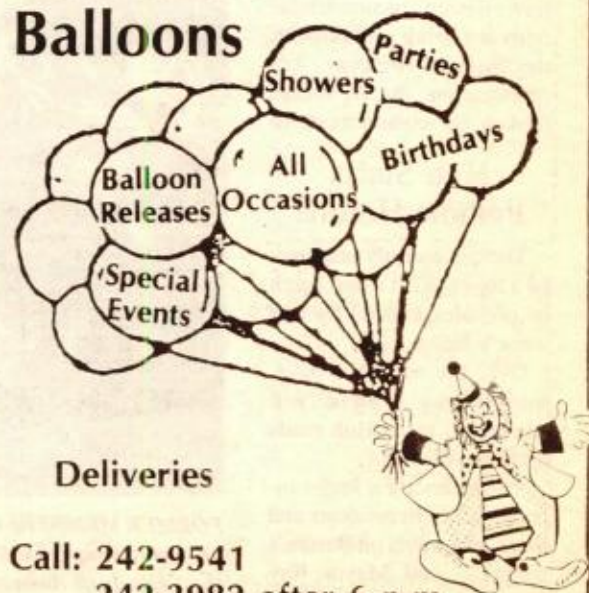

On May 29, 1986 at 7:00 a.m., Detectives Gleason, Russo, Leahy, and Donahue, assigned to Area A and armed with a search warrant issued by the Charlestown District Court, made a peaceful entrance into an apartment on Chestnut Street and arrested its occupant for possession of Class B substance and receiving stolen property.

On May 30, 1986 at 9:00 a.m., Detectives Leahy and Donahue, while on patrol on Main Street, observed a young man smoking a marijuana cigarette and placed him under arrest.

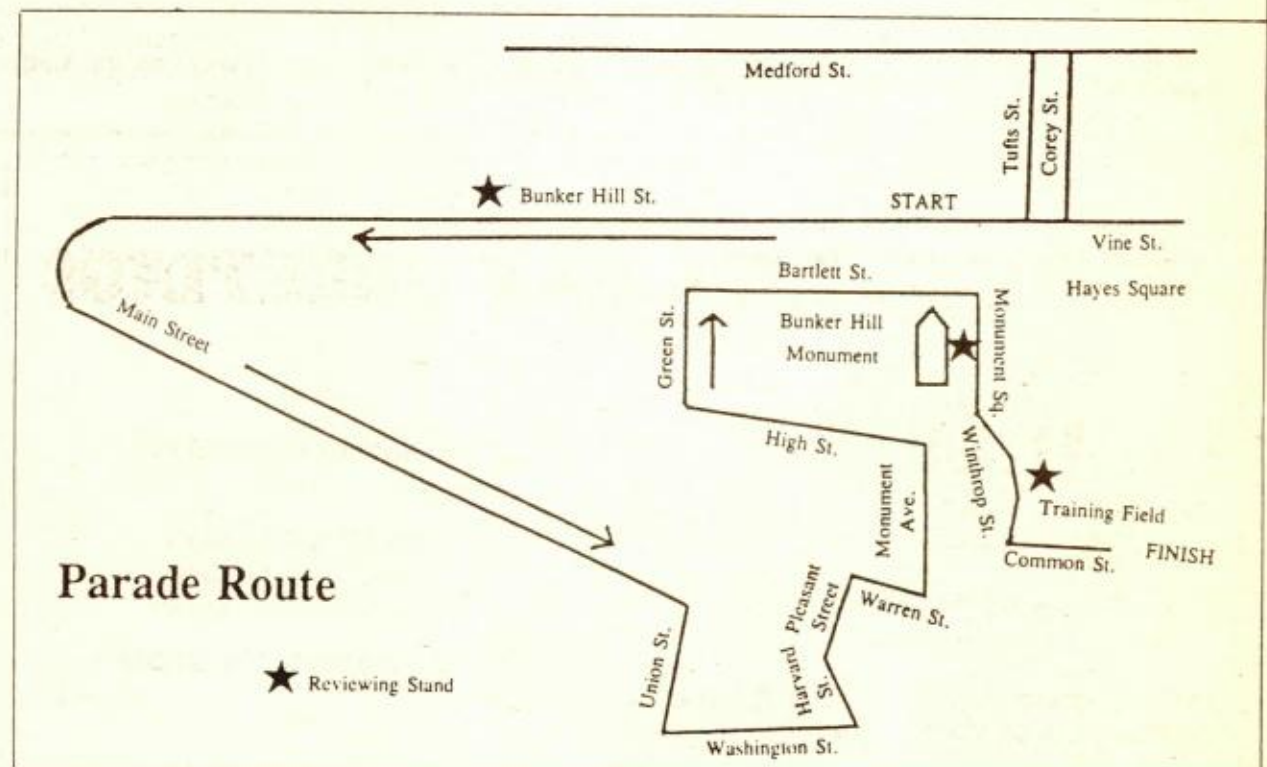
Asia Families led by Mrs. Maureen Dunn, whose husband is among the men missing in Southeast Asia.

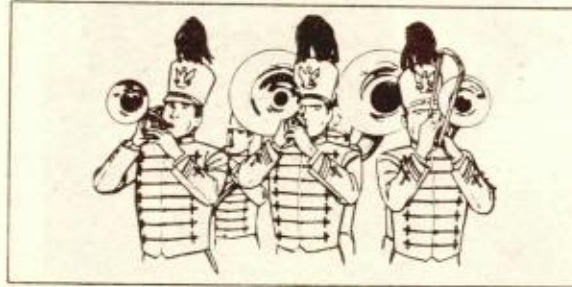

Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises on June 17th

The Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises, sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion under the auspices of the City of Boston, will be held on Tuesday morning, June 17, 1986.

The program, according to Standing Committee Chairman James W. Conway, Past Commander of Post 26, will begin with an Ecumenical Service at Saint Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill Street at 10:00 a.m.

Following the service, the veteran, military, militia, and patriotic organizations will assemble outside the church and form a procession to march to the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds for the Patriotic Exercises, commencing at 11:00 a.m.

The Monument Orator on this, the 211 Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, will be Captain Philip M. Quast, USN, the commanding officer of the USS BUNKER HILL (CG-52), the Navy's newest Aegis Guided Missile Cruiser

which will be commissioned this fall for service.

A native of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, Captain Quast entered the Navy in 1956 and received his bachelor of science degree from Carroll College in 1961 and his masters degree from Marymount College of Arlington in 1984. Quast is also a graduate of the Naval War College, the Armed Forces Staff College, and the National War College.

During his thirty years in the U.S. Navy, Quast has received a number of military decorations and awards including the Bronze Star, a Gold Star in lieu of a second award, the Meritorious Service Medal, and the Navy Commendation Medal. In recognition of his performance as Commanding Officer of the USS Benjamin Stoddert, Captain Quast was the first recipient of the Admiral James Stockdale Leadership Award for the Pacific Fleet. The USS BUNKER HILL (CG-52), the second U.S. Navy ship to bear this name,

will be commissioned on September 20, 1986 at the Charlestown Navy Yard joining the fleet along side its

oldest commissioned vessel, the USS CONSTITUTION. The USS BUNKER HILL, CV-17, was built in the

Quincy Shipyard and commissioned for service in 1943. It served this country in the Pacific during World War II. During the Battle of the Philippine Sea her aircraft sank one Japanese carrier and assisted in downing 476 enemy aircraft, before being struck by two Japanese Kamikazes suffering severe damage and the loss of 392 crewmen either killed or missing.

In keeping with the tradition of the Battle by which she was first named, the Battle of Bunker Hill, the BUNKER HILL (CG-52) will serve to preserve the peace of this country. The U.S. Navy commemorates the Battle fought 211 years ago by placing the ship in commission near the site of that historic battle which proved to be a rallying point in the Patriots' cause.

Captain Quast is married to the former Margaret (Peggy) Barbara Lord of Santa Barbara, California. The Quasts have five children; Tim, Molly, Gretchen, Annie and Thomas Joseph.

On this occasion, the members of Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion

will present to Captain Quast the bronze plaque designed by a Post member, that was salvaged from the World War II Destroyer, the USS BUNKER HILL. The plaque will be taken to Mississippi and mounted on the new Aegis Cruiser, to be unveiled at the commissioning of this Cruiser in the fall.

At the conclusion of the formal ceremonies, a wreath will be placed at the base of the statue of Colonel William Prescott on the Monument Grounds.

Chairman of the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises, James W. Conway and the committee, extend a warm welcome to all residents, organizations from within and outside the community, to join with them on the morning of the 17th of June - the 211th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, at both the Ecumenical Services at Saint Francis de Sales Church at 10:00 a.m. and at the Patriotic Exercises at the Monument at 11:00 a.m.

With the cooperation and attendance of all, these commemorative exercises will be truly a fitting tribute to our fallen heroes of Bunker Hill.

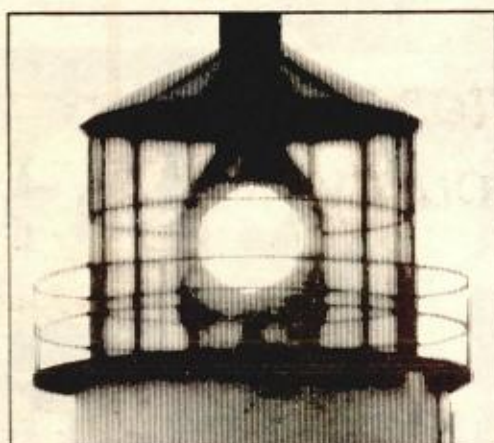

The agenda will include the receiving of annual reports and electing officers for the ensuing year.

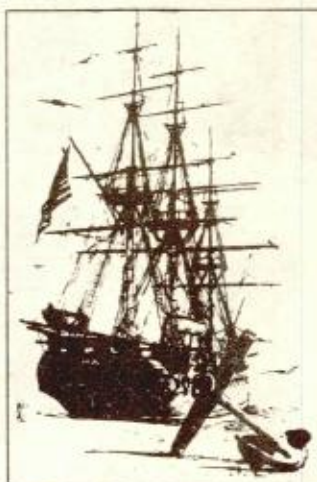

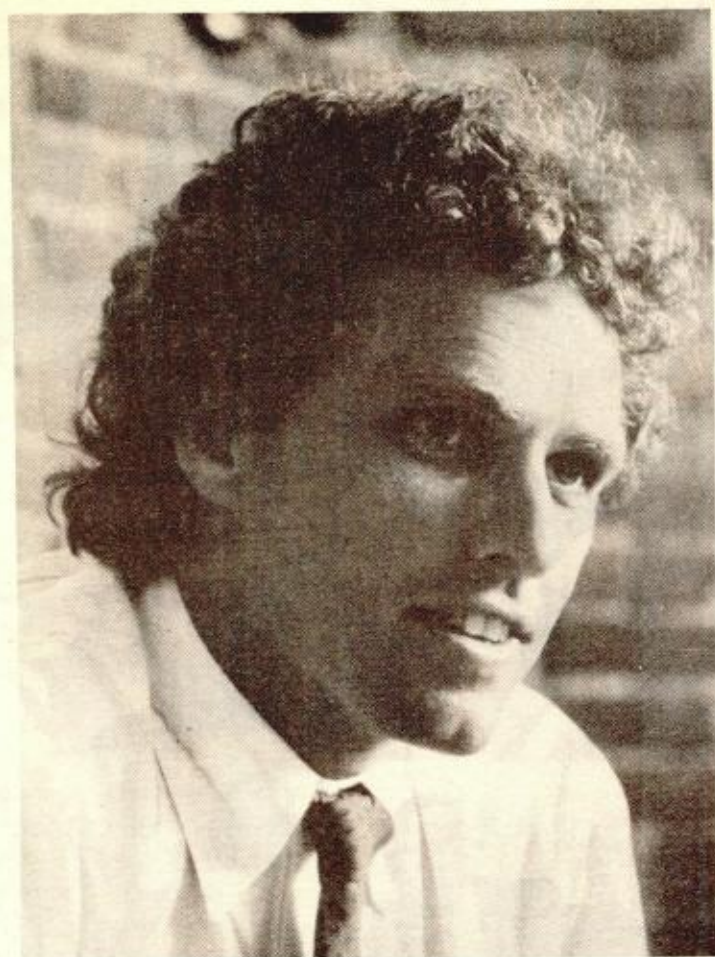

Historical Demonstration Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill

As residents look forward to the Bunker Hill Day celebrations this weekend, many will be delighted to learn that the Redcoats will once again be coming to Charlestown to challenge local Patriots for the possession of Breed's Hill, in an historical demonstration of the famous Battle of Bunker Hill. Many may remember the "battles" of years past, complete with hangings, gun fire, and cannon blasts, which drew tens of thousands of spectators to the Monument Square area each year. Despite an eleven year absence, the Charles-

town Militia Company 1775, the last remaining militia troop in the City of Boston, hopes to revive this event, which once was a highlight of the week's celebration.

The Militia Company has been attempting to secure permission to sponsor a battle reenactment for the past five years without much success, however, two months ago members of the company, armed with letters of support from the community and pictures and articles about battles which took place in the 1970s, approached John Burchill, the Direc-

tor of the Boston National Historic Park. This time the militia was successful.

Two months is not much time to organize a Battle, secure the necessary funding, design and make authentic Colonial and British dress, among a list of other details, but the militia team of only 22 members, under the leadership of Captain Frank Maggelet, has done just that. Shortly after receiving Burchill's okay, five members or so of the militia conducted a door to door fundraising campaign in Charlestown which produc-

ed approximately \$2500. Maggelet and his company began to seek out old members of the militia company for support or the use of their colonial attire. Hats were designed and patterns cut, and the sewing began. Militia men took part in various drills in order to master the professionalism and accuracy, as was done in battles past.

In an effort to add to spirit and realism of the Battle of Bunker Hill, both the British troops and the Patriots will spend the weekend in an 18th Century encampment on the Monument Grounds. Maggelet promised the accommodations will be "just like they were over 200 years ago", as the men sleep on the dewy grass of the Square under white tents similar to drop cloths. They will cook over open fires and dress in 18th century attire. The campsite will look very authentic, added Maggelet, with its Colonial and British flags for the respective camps.

While Maggelet admits this year's battle may not rival the battle demonstrations of years past, it will revive a tradition long missed in Charlestown's Bunker Hill Day celebrations. However, he did promise that "each year it will be bigger and bigger."

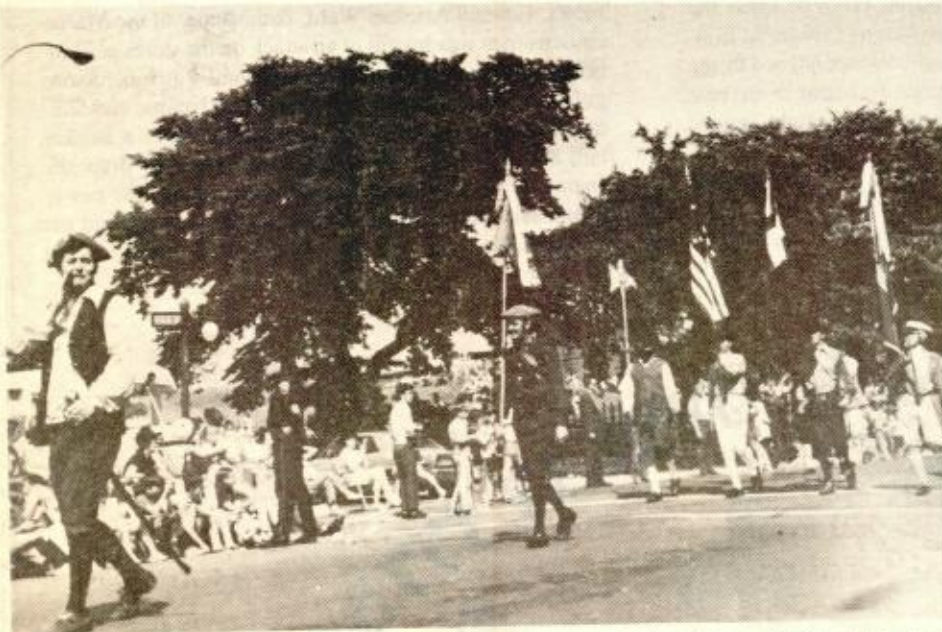
The Battle will take place this Saturday, June 14th, immediately after a parade of both the Colonial and British troops from the Bunker Hill

Monument Grounds starting at 1:30 p.m. The parade will go along Lexington Street to Bunker Hill Street then onto School Street to Main Street, up Monument Avenue, and back to the Monument Grounds. The Battle's first shot will be at 2:00 p.m. The public will be invited to tour the British and Colonial

camps on Saturday between 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. and again between 4:00 and 6:00 p.m.

Don't miss an opportunity to watch history repeat itself. Be sure to bring your camera, but don't shoot until you see the whites of their eyes!

The Battle of Bunker Hill . . . And The Birth Of A Nation

On July 4th, Americans everywhere will celebrate with much pomp, parade, oratory and fireworks "Independence Day". This year will be special as we honor Ms. Liberty on her 100th birthday. Isn't it interesting that the word synonymous with America has changed through the years? In the eighteenth century the word was "independence"; in the nineteenth, "liberty"; and in the twentieth "freedom". It jars my sensibility a bit to think of Colonel Prescott as a "Freedom Fighter" but, of course, that is what he was. Another notion that also seems strange relates to the Fourth.

As a boy I remember being taught that July 4th was our most important holiday. It was "Independence Day"; the day America declared her independence from the tyranny of the English King; it was America's birthday. Recently, on reflection, I have begun to question the simplistic version of the important beginnings of our great country. The Declaration of Independence is certainly an important document issued on July 4, 1776. But the signers were really *certifying* America's birth; when one thinks about it, they were issuing a birth certificate for an infant born a year earlier at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The Battle of Bunker Hill has long been proclaimed as the most important battle of the American Revolution; the battle which the Patriots lost, but the battle at which they won the war.

Descriptions of the encounter and the devastation that was wrought on both sides are vividly stamped in the

in their time of need. Donations to the besieged citizenry increased and militia and Minutemen throughout the colonies heightened their preparation. Meanwhile, General Gage rigidly executed the provisions of the Port Bill. However, all through the severe Winter, wagon and sled loads of wood and supplies continued to be provided Charlestown and Boston citizens by towns such as Lexington, Reading, Sharon and Salisbury, to name but a few.

Meanwhile the British administration were determined to force complete submission to the Port Bill, and the Act altering the charter of Massachusetts passed in May of 1774. The Patriots resolved to resist its execution. The ring of towns encircling Boston and Charlestown filled with militia from far and wide. And the deliberations of the councils of this period, committees of correspondence, committees on safety, and the Provincial Congress, developed a plan to prevent collisions between the militia and the British Regulars. Hostilities were to be avoided. In early April, it was proclaimed in England that Massachusetts was in a state of rebellion. The King assured Parliament that measures would be taken to quell the rebellion. For its part, the Massachusetts Provincial Congress warned local committees of correspondence to see to it that the militia and Minutemen be found in the best posture of defense whenever any exigency might require their aid.

The warning was needed. On April 18th, determined to destroy the stores collected at Concord, General Gage ordered Colonel Smith, at the head of about eight hun-

tion of Bostonians and Americans everywhere with his stirring oration on the occasion of the fifth anniversary of the Boston Massacre. He pleaded for a peaceful settlement but noted that if the only way to liberty "is through fields of blood", Americans stood ready. And now as the course of events cascaded around him, he was the American leader on the scene.

Adams and Hancock were in Philadelphia representing Massachusetts at the Continental Congress. In late May, Warren wrote to his friend Samuel Adams exhorting him to convince the Congress on two matters of vital concern: first the need for a united army under one commander, and secondly the growing need for a civil government. Adams' favorable reply and that of the Congress arrived in Boston on June 18th. Washington was appointed General of the Continental Armies on June 16th, too late to come to Charlestown. Warren never knew of Washington's appointment.

In early June, the Council of War began considering the expediency of anticipating General Gage's movements. General Artemas Ward, commander of the Massachusetts men was fearful of an attack on the stores at Cambridge. Veteran military men, General Putnam, distinguished commander of the Connecticut troops, and Colonel Prescott, argued strongly for fortifications at Bunker Hill and Dorchester Heights. They wanted to draw the enemy out of Boston on to common ground. The newly commissioned Generals Warren and Ward opposed the action at the time . . . the Army was not ready . . . it



memories of those of us, especially of Charlestown and Boston, who daily view the Bunker Hill Monument in all her splendor. The course of events leading to the battle, the eventual decision to fortify the hill and challenge the British are often forgotten. They should not be.

In the Summer of 1774, the breach between the Patriots and the Loyalists became wider daily and political excitement increased rapidly. The Boston Port Bill was inflicting great suffering on the citizens of Boston and Charlestown. People from all over Massachusetts and from other colonies were incensed at the blockade and the occupation of the towns. They sent wagon loads of supplies to relieve the oppression of those citizens who were unable to leave Boston and Charlestown.

Meanwhile the British Governor, General Gage, sensing the disturbed mood of the populace, consulted with his officers and made an important military decision. Intelligence had come to General Gage that several towns had withdrawn their powder from the powder-house on Quarry Hill in Charlestown (now Somerville). It was the custom to store in this powder-house, the powder belonging to the towns and to the Province. General Gage immediately resolved to transfer the balance of this powder, "the King's powder", to Castle William. On Thursday morning, September 1, 1774, two hundred and sixty British troops embarked at Long Wharf, Boston in thirteen boats. They sailed up the Mystic River, landed at the Ten Hills, marched to the powder-house, and seized all of the powder in it, two hundred and fifty half-barrels.

Word of this action spread through the Province and beyond like wildfire and occasioned agitation, skirmishes and mob activity. Most of all it mobilized the desire of distant towns and colonies to assist Boston/Charlestown

dred troops, to march on Concord. He reached that town about seven in the morning on April 19th. After partially destroying the stores, the Regulars skirmished with the Minutemen at the North Bridge and were under constant attack on the road back. If they were not met with reinforcements in Lexington, they might have been cut off. Constantly harassed and dispirited by the continuing attacks of the Provincials on their rear, the British troops were saved by their arrival at Charlestown neck. Crossing over and now safe under the protection of the British warships, the main body occupied Bunker Hill, which provided asylum for the night. On the twentieth they returned to Boston.

As the story of the events of this memorable day spread throughout the country, Minutemen and volunteers rushed to the neighboring Boston towns. In two days, twenty thousand armed men had assembled. Charlestown and Boston were in a state of seige. Though the British troops had left Charlestown, the peculiar situation of the town and the threats of the British commander convinced many of the remaining inhabitants that Charlestown would be destroyed if it were occupied by American troops. The evacuation began.

In the midst of this whirlwind of events stood Doctor Joseph Warren, President of the Provincial Congress and Chairman of the Committee on Safety of Boston. Doctor Warren was a beloved and admired physician of Boston, respected leader and a patriot. As President of the Provincial Congress, he was at the young age of thirty-four, in effect, the Governor of the people of Massachusetts. A native of Roxbury, he was educated at Harvard and was a close friend of both John Hancock and Samuel Adams. On March 6, 1775, he had earned the admira-

did not have the cannon and powder. It was finally agreed that the fortifications would take place, but not until the army was better organized and supplied.

But General Gage brought the matter to a crisis. On June 13th, the American commanders learned that Gage planned to take possession of Dorchester Heights upon the night of June 18th. The Committee on Safety, chaired by Doctor Warren, deliberated for days issuing orders to augment the militia and increase supplies, and then on June 15th, the Committee passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, it appears of importance to the safety of this colony that possession of the hill called Bunker's Hill in Charlestown, be securely kept and defended; . . . therefore, resolved, unanimously, that it be recommended to the Council of War, that the above mentioned Bunker's Hill be maintained by sufficient forces being posted there . . ."

On Friday, the 16th of June, the commanders of the army, in accordance with the recommendations of the Committee on Safety, took measures to fortify Bunker Hill. Colonel William Prescott was given command.

This act of rebellion and defiance was the true proclamation of independence . . . The decision to fortify Bunker Hill was a positive, strategic statement which said . . . we are free, this is our country and we will live and die for it. The Americans issued a challenge to the British which they could not ignore. *The Battle was joined and a Nation born.*

And what of the young doctor who attended the birthing? Joseph Warren, who provided energy and vigorous leadership through those turbulent days, died on that bat-

Residents Oppose Developers' Plans

by Kathy Giordano

Planned development of the parcel of land on Pleasant Street, between Warren and Main Streets (across from the Warren Tavern) was met with opposition by neighborhood residents at an open meeting held on Tuesday, June 10th at the American Legion Hall. Developer Bruce Daniel and architect William Winder presented plans for twelve two-bedroom condominium units with street level garages, providing 12 to 18 parking

spaces. When finished, each unit is expected to sell for \$140,000 to \$150,000.

The concerns of those in attendance included the overall architectural design including Mansard and Gable roofing, a carriage house effect with large "barn doors" on the garages. It was suggested that one architectural style from the same historic period be carried through the design. Other concerns were the blocking of sunlight on homes on Warren Street due to the height of the planned

units and an increase in the existing parking dilemma in that area. One resident suggested that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) put a one year moratorium on all development until the full impact can be assessed from completed developments and by developments currently underway at the old Boston Filter site, Connie McCarthy's old store,

Tontine Crescent, the old High School on Monument Square, plus the parking needed for the Warren Tavern and Sully's Pub.

A follow-up meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 18th at 7:00 p.m. at the American Legion Hall, 27 Chestnut Street at which time the developer will present alternative plans. All are welcome to attend.

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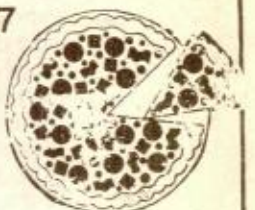

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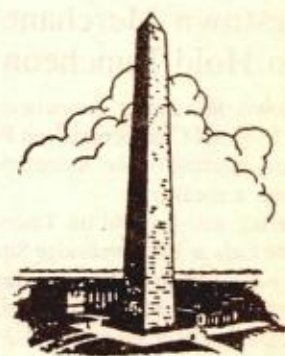
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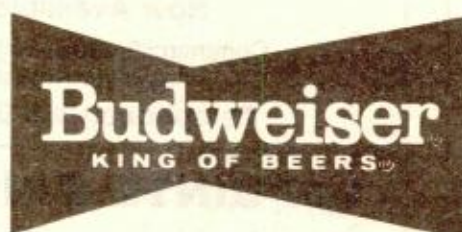
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
