My fellow Americans we hope you will take the time this weekend to attend the Memorial Day Mass at Il a.m. on Sunday at St. Francis de Sales Church, sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion to show our fellow citizens - we do remember.

The American Legion, represented by 3.1 million men and women who served this nation during a time of war, know first hand the sacrifices all of America's veterans made to preserve our way of life - our blessed freedoms - in America.

Once a year, countless Americans gather across our land, just as the members of Post 26 have, to remember those who gave their lives so that we might be free. On this day, the feelings and emotions run high. For it is difficult to live with the reality that any war is nothing more than a failure of diplomacy on the part of governments.

Those we remember on Memorial Day did not make government policy. Rather they answered the call of human beings being persecuted and slaughtered by others who sought to dominate the world. Our sons and daughters, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, who gave their lives did not roar off seeking fame and fortune. No, they just wanted to keep America free - and to give others the same freedom they cherished so much.

Today, the world is rapidly changing. Citizens across this land are calling for sweeping changes in social programs as a "so-called Peace Dividend" from the thawing of the Cold War. Yet, as we remember those who have given their lives for our freedom, we must raise a cautionary voice.

It was not the Cold War that sent thousands of Americans, and those from more than two dozen other nations, to the blistering sands of the Persian Gulf just 18 months ago. No, it was a brutal dictator who still remains in power. More than 260 Americans died in Operation Desert Storm. We remember them today.

It was not the Cold War that sent many of our sons and daughters into Panama to oust a dictator whose soldiers had become aggressive and abusive to American citizens. Nearly two dozen Americans died in Operation Just Cause. We remember them today.

It was not the Cold War that sent troops into Grenada to stamp out a repressive regime and rescue American citizens. Eighteen Americans died there. We remember them today.

And it was not the Cold War that motivated a terrorist to drive a bomb-ladened vehicle into a Marine barracks in Beirut, Lebanon in October 1983. More than 250 Americans died. We remember them today.

There seems to be a feeling among many citizens that this nation has not been at war since the long struggle in Vietnam came to a close for America. Yet, nothing could be further from the truth.

New Flagpole Is Raised On John Harvard Mall

This year, 1992, marks the 50th anniversary of the formation of the John Harvard Mall. It was built by Harvard College in 1942 and given to the city of Boston. The mall is a park on Town Hill in Charlestown where John Winthrop's company of 800 settlers established the strongest settlement within Massachusetts Bay in 1629, leading to the settlement of Boston.

The Friends of the Harvard Mall are a small nonprofit group dedicated to the restoration and preservation of the Harvard Mall. The Friends have been trying for several years to replace a flag pole in the center of the mall which was pulled down by vandals about 10 years ago.

Recently, Metro Equipment, under contract by the Boston Parks Department and under the engineering direction of Stanley Ivan, has been repairing and re-







★ Phone Services Updates . . . The New England Telephone Co. is in the process of rehabilitating all cables and switches in Charlestown, according to Richard Colan, NE Telephone Manager of Public and Community Relations.

New fiber and copper circuits will replace 100 percent of the lines currently served by submarine cable under the water off the Charlestown coastline, Colan said. "As part of the process, every telephone in Charlestown will receive the new fiber technology," he stated. Residents will realize the difference in their service with the absence of static or noise on the line.

The work coincides with cable work taking place as part of the Central Artery "Big Dig," Colan added. "This is a major project," he said, "that will continue in the community for up to 12 to 15 months."

★ Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . The reconstruction of the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) began this week by the Middlesex Paving Corp. The work needed on the steps will force the contractor to close them off to pedestrian traffic. Parking will be prohibited on Mead Street between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, for the length of the project. Residents will see the steps fenced off and railings coming down by the end of this week. Parents are advised to warn their children to stay away from the area to avoid injuries.

Although the work on the stairs coincides with the street reconstruction project, a separate contractor was hired to perform the work. Residents with questions or concerns should call Middlesex Paving Corp. in Chelmsford at (508) 256-6534 or Bryant Associates Resident Engineer Ralph Cunningham at 242-3498.

Work on Devens and Washington streets did not begin as scheduled due to preconstruction survey requirements. However, these two streets will see some activity by May 26. Work on Washington Street will take place just between Austin and Union streets until after the Bunker Hill Day Parade on June 14. After the parade, work will proceed along Washington Street to Old Rutherford Avenue.

Cunningham states that work is continuing "at a good pace with the contractor basically on schedule."

The installation of water mains continued on Chestnut Street, reaching the intersection of Mt. Vernon Avenue.

Work on Adams Street began with the stripping of the pavement and the underlying cables. The new storm drain was installed from Common to Winthrop streets this past week and most of the roof drains were connected.

Work on the lights in the Training Field got underway with the bases being installed. According to Cunningham, the contractor cut throught the walks to install the conduit, and had new concrete poured for the weekend visitors.

Nearen Row received a base and a binder course of pavement, and the new concrete sidewalks were poured after the new street bounds were set. "Nearen Row is once again open and travelable," said Cunningham, "until the top course of pavement goes down."

The light bases with their gas connections were installed on Essex Street, and the curb was started at the Rutherford Avenue end of the street.

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

As we stand tall at those sights and sounds, a lump forms in our throats, and tears well up in our eyes. For we know, we are remembering those who left with a smile on their face,


ready to do what America had asked them to do.

Voke Announces Free Eye Exams For Charlestown Elderly

Noting May is Older Americans Month, state Rep. Richard Voke announced that the Commonwealth, in conjunction with the Mass. Society of Eye Physicians and Surgeons, will provide free eye health screenings to senior citizens. Over 30 hospitals statewide will host the exams and more than 100 ophthalmologists have volunteered to conduct the

"By offering eye screenings at no cost to the elderly, I hope the program will be useful to those on fixed incomes or who ordinarily could not afford an eye test," stated Voke. "The exam will assist doctors in diagnosing potential eye diseases at an early stage. Therefore, I encourage our seniors to avail themselves of this opportunity," added Voke.

Examinations will be conducted at the Mass. Eye and Ear, Brigham and Women's, New England Medical and University hospitals in Boston. The date for the exam is Saturday, May 30. Seniors with last names beginning with A-K are asked to attend between 9 and 10 a.m., with the rest to attend from 10 a.m. to noon.

Doctors will test seniors for glaucoma, cataracts and macular degeneration. In addition, testing will be conducted for vision strength and blood pressure. "While the state's financial picture continues to be clouded, I'm pleased we are able to coordinate volunteers to provide such a valuable service to the elderly," concluded Voke.



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Veterans Plates To Be Available At Registry Of Motor Vehicles

Jerold A. Gnazzo, Registrar of Motor Vehicles, has announced that Veteran plates will be available to the 650,000 veterans in Massachusetts at all Registry of Motor Vehicle branches, as will Purple Heart and Pearl Harbor Survivor

To acquire a Veteran or Purple Heart plate, veterans must present a DD form 214, DD form 215 or a letter from the V.A., Massachusetts Veteran's Service or from their current commanding officer if still on active duty. Pearl Harbor Survivor plates are available to all military personnel on active duty at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, as verified by the Department of Defense. Recipients of these plates must also have one of the forms required

for other Veteran plates. Veterans may call the V.A. at 1-800-827-0520 to clarify their eligibility or for any additional information.

The cost of a Veteran plate is \$80 for a two-year registration with \$40 of the fee to be distributed for the maintenance of the Soldier's Homes in Chelsea and Holvoke.

Along with military documentation, veterans applying for a plate must have an RMV-3 form from their insurance agent, current registration and plate. For a newly acquired vehicle, veterans must present an RMV-I form from either a car dealer or their insurance agent. Veteran plates cannot be used for vehicles requiring a commercial registration - such as a pickup truck.

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
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

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
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
