### Charlestown Property Owners To Receive Appraisal Notices

Mayor Kevin H. White today announced that Charlestown property owners will be receiving their appraisal notices in the mail on Saturday or early next week.

The notices will include Boston's estimated fiscal 1983 tax rates of \$20.50 for residences and \$37.50 for businesses and industry, the Mayor said. He emphasized, however, that

the tax figures must be certified by the State Department of Revenue before they would become official.

Charlestown will be the fourth Boston neighborhood to receive the appraisal notices. Earlier mailings have been sent to Allston-Brighton, West Roxbury, and East Boston.

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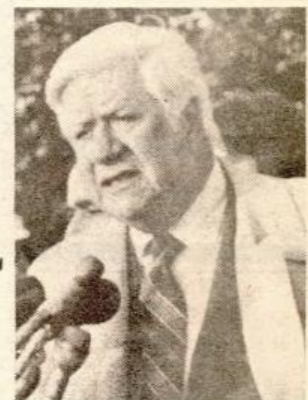

# Kennedy Center Election Challenge To Go To Full Board

Write-in candidate Sal Giarratani's challenge against the recent Kennedy Center/APAC Election will be recommended to the full board as invalid.

Giarratani challenged the disqualification of four write-in votes he received in the October 19 election, for a seat on the Board representing Precinct 1. Without approval of these ballots from the Kennedy Center Board of Directors Election Committee, Precinct 1 could go with only one representative, instead of the two allowed in each precinct, until the next election. However, Giarratani will be given a chance to argue his case before the full board at the November meeting.

The Election Committee decided to make a recommendation instead of a final ruling (which they have the power to do) because Giarratani's challenge was against the by-laws rather than the Election Committee rules, according to Committee Chairman Phil Coleman.

Giarratani submitted his written challenge to the Election Committee of Charles Johnson and Coleman last Thursday, following the election. In his letter Giarratani stated, "I am officially challenging the assumption and right of the Election Committee to declare write-in votes as inadmissible in a precinct without any candidates on the printed ballot and all write-in votes in general. . . banning write-ins is a denial of free expression for the citizens of a community that supposedly are served by the social service agency's actions. . . if the Kennedy Board, as a whole wishes to bar write-in candidates, they (should) vote to place such restrictions in the by-laws of the organization." Giarratani met with Coleman and Johnson Tuesday night, at which time he stated his position in detail. According to him, the committee presented him with a list of voting rules drawn up by board member Gus Charbonnier in 1976, which included that no write-in votes be accepted.

While the Election Committee was able to show this list, they were not able to provide the minutes whereby those voting rules

were adopted through a motion of approval.

Also in these rules, according to Giarratani and Coleman were statements that no absentee votes would be accepted; that a precinct without a candidate would remain unrepresented until the next election; and that campaigners could not campaign within 100 feet of the polls. These three rules were made known to the candidates and the public at-large through the 1982

APAC Election Rules, a copy of which was given to all persons requesting nomination papers and through the Patriot in the October 14, 1982 issue. Although these three rules were made publicly known, the rule concerning write-in votes was excluded.

In addition, the Kennedy Center By-laws do not address this issue either.

According to Coleman, Charbonnier's recommendations were also reaffirmed in 1977 and voted to

be used as guidelines for the years that followed. However, again, the Election Committee was unable to show where such a motion was ever passed.

Coleman said that the Election Committee will recommend to the full board that Giarratani's ballots not be counted, but that the full board make a ruling on his challenge since Giarratani's issue is against the Kennedy Center By-laws — an area in which Coleman's committee does not have

authority.

"My standpoint is that I have gone by the rules of the election. But I can give him the opportunity to go before the board and argue his case against the by-laws," said Coleman.

Counting of write-in votes is not unheard of in other APAC boards in Boston. South Boston's APAC board recognizes write-ins although no one has yet won an election through a write-in ballot.

Other APAC's said they

did not allow write-ins, however, this is stated so in their by-laws and to the candidates before the election.

APAC rules, in general, do not specify whether a write-in candidate can be seated on the boards. It is a rule tailored to community needs.

Under state and city election rules, which sometimes serve as models for agencies without guidelines, write-in votes are acceptable.

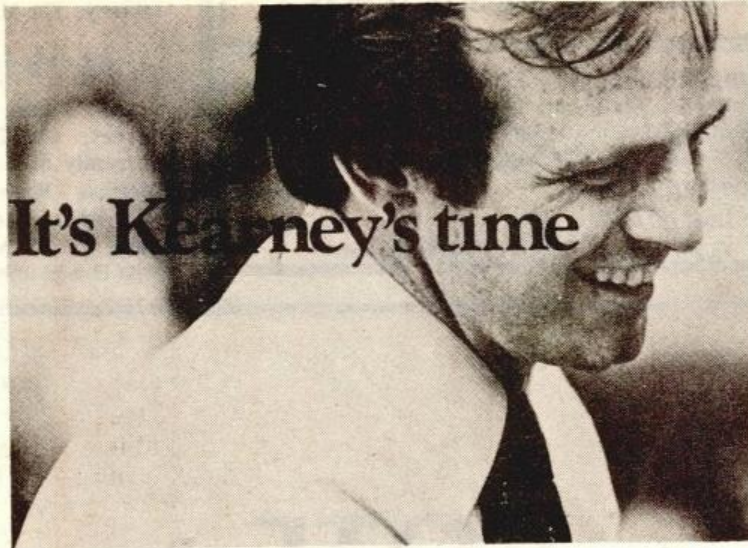

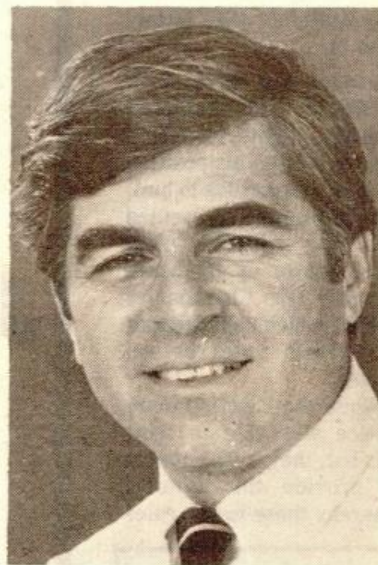

### Election Commissioner Proposes Improved Voting Procedures

Boston Election Board Chairman Michael A. Joyce announced he has introduced steps to expedite voting and ensure maximum efficiency in the polling places at the November 2, election.

Joyce outlined the new procedures to Secretary of State Michael Joseph Connolly in a recent letter detailing the proposed changes and the way those changes would be implemented. Joyce's proposal addresses the problems brought to light during the September 14 primary election.

In making the announcement, Joyce said, "I am optimistic that the solutions I've proposed will eliminate any difficulties experienced during the primary elections and will address all the concerns raised by Secretary of State Connolly about the way elections will be conducted in Boston in the future."

\*Each voting machine will be thoroughly tested before

election day to prevent over-voting and guard against possible dysfunctions. The test, which will be conducted five times on each machine, will involve checking all candidate and question levers as recommended by the machine's vendors.

\*A telephone pyramid system has been devised whereby on the evening before the election, Election Department personnel will call all election day wardens who will then be required to call the other workers who will be under their control election day. This system will also occur election morning and will remind workers of their responsibilities as well as determine if any poll workers will be absent. The Election Department will receive status reports throughout the day and evening.

\*All voters who have been registered in the city since January 1, 1979 will be placed on a list merging the

registered voter lists of 1979, 1980 and 1981. This list will also be broken down alphabetically and according to precinct. It will be used along with the 1982 voter list and the 1982 omitted list which will be available at each poll.

\*Wardens, clerks and extra personnel have been trained throughout the month by both the Election Department and the Secretary of State's office. Additional training has also been provided for election workers by voting machine custodians.

Boston's Board of Election Commissioners announced that a copy of the Boston voting list will be available in each ward of the City at neighborhood libraries. In addition, a copy of the omitted list, which includes voters who were on the 1981 voting list but were omitted from the 1982 list, will also be available.

The appraisal notices have been prepared by the City's Office of Property Equalization (OPE), which is in the final phases of a three-year-long revaluation of the City's 105,000 real estate properties, including some 3,100 in Charlestown. Of the Charlestown properties, about 1,900 are one, two, and three-family residences.

"It has been a complicated and painstaking process," Mayor White commented on the revaluation. "It has been done

with expedition, with integrity, and with great sensitivity. Now, for the first time in the tax history of Boston, we will have an equitable distribution of the tax load."

Included in the appraisal notices are a number of items of information such as the full, fair cash value of the property and the estimated tax rate.

A neighborhood information center will be established in Charlestown at St. Mary's Parish Hall, 46 Winthrop Street, to answer any questions property owners might have about

the appraisal notices they will be receiving.

The information center will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, October 30, and Saturday, November 6, and from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. from Tuesday, November 2, through Friday, November 5.

Property owners are being asked to make their first inquiries, however, by telephone at 242-3400. Questions can be answered over the phone, or an appointment can be made for a personal interview at the center.

### Job Search Comes To Charlestown

Job Search Project, the youth employment arm of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Boston is being relocated into the local Clubhouse. Formerly located in downtown Boston, the program is designed to prepare teenagers for non-subsidized, private sector employment. Last year, over 90% of the graduates landed jobs soon after completing the course.

Lori Cavanaugh, the Job Search Counselor for the Charlestown Clubhouse, will run groups of 5 to 10 students through the three week program. Classes will be held after school, and will be open to Bostonians from low income

families between the ages of 16 and 19.

While only one quarter of the U.S. work force is between 16 and 25, this group represents nearly half of the country's unemployed. And Charlestown is no exception. The program addresses a real problem in our city, and is making significant progress.

The first two weeks consist mainly of group seminars. For two after-school hours each day, Lori will teach interview techniques, proper work habits, resume and letter writing, how to fill out job applications, and how to

cope with on-the-job stress. Fridays are devoted to individual instruction, with each counselor meeting privately with teens to discuss personal situations and to clear up uncertainties.

Week three focuses on the actual job hunt itself. Until this year, Job Search Project staff did all groundwork to find employment openings and arrange interviews. Not any more. "Our philosophy is one of self-sufficiency," Lori declared. "After giving them some solid direction, we let the kids find the jobs themselves. It's the next logical step."

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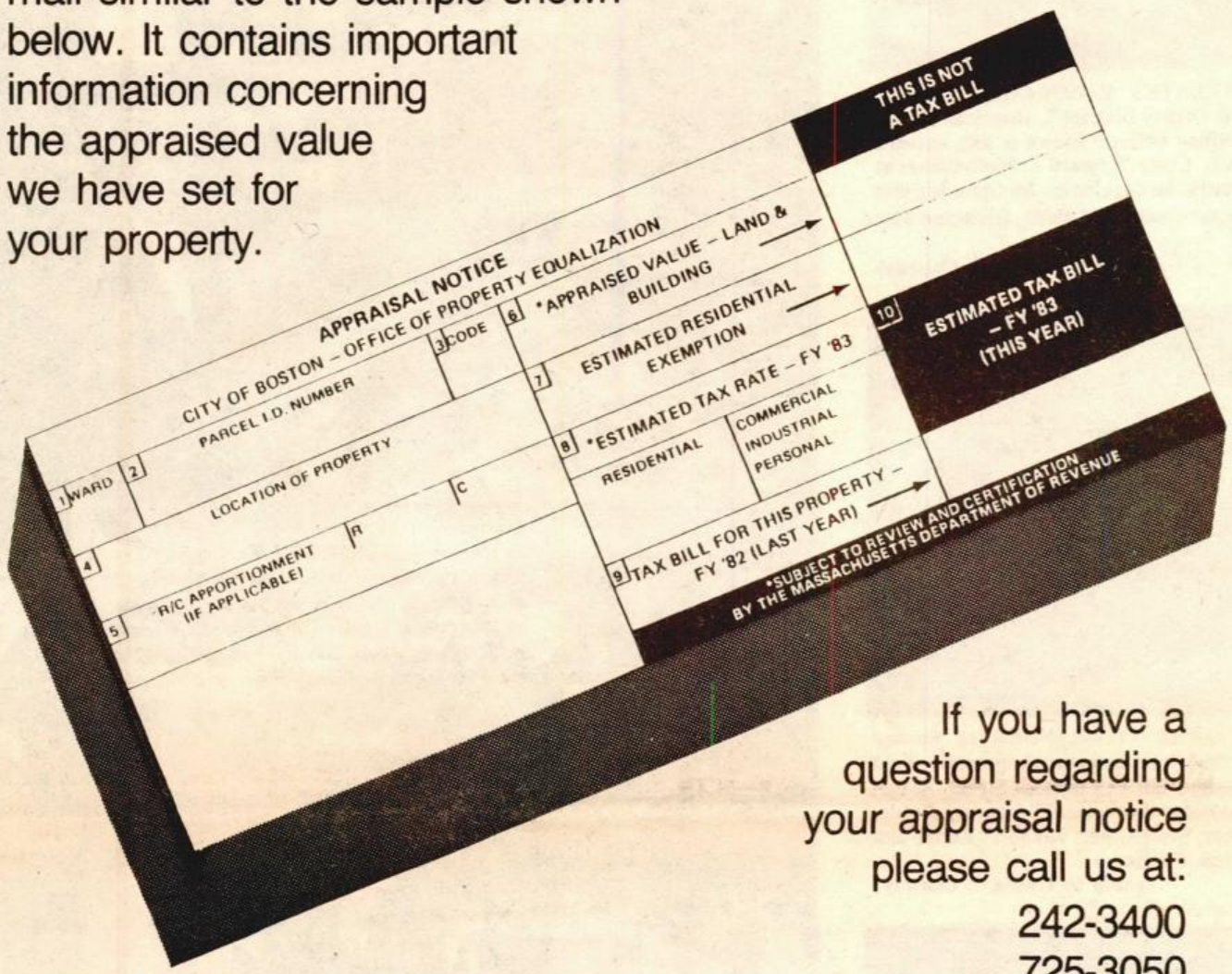

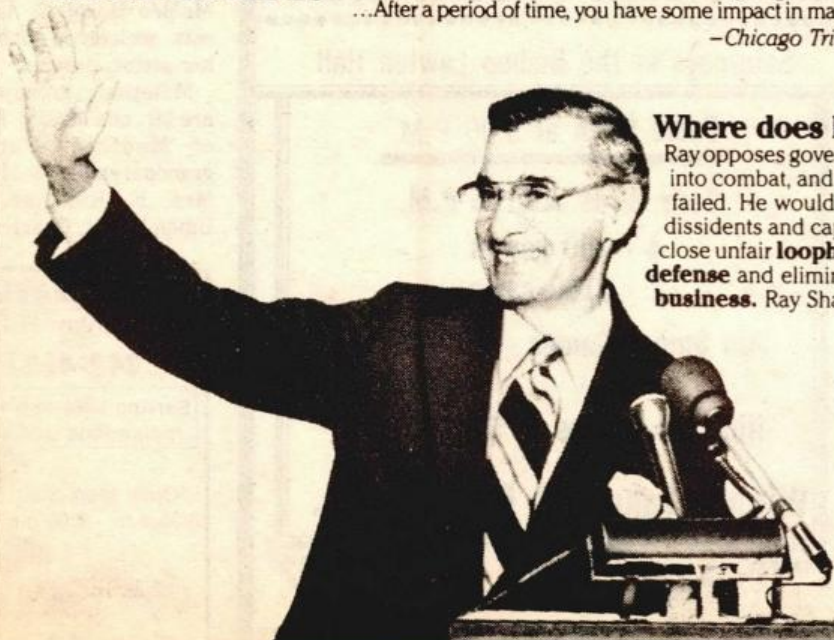

## Fuel Assistance Program Begins

Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) has begun to accept applications for the 1982-83 Fuel Assistance Program to assist low-income households with heating bills. In some cases, renters can receive assistance if heat is included in the rent.

The amount of fuel assistance a household can qualify for depends on income and size of household. All eligible households may receive some level of assistance, with the neediest clients receiving the largest payments.

Income from all members of the household 18 years of age and older must be reported when calculating total household income. A household's total gross annual income cannot exceed the following guidelines in order to receive assistance under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

2	10,885
3	11,640
4	13,950
5	16,260
6	18,570
7	20,880
8	23,190

Add \$2,310 for each additional person over 8.

When visiting an intake office, applicants must bring proof of income for their household and a copy of a heating bill. Heating bills that are dated after October 1, 1982 and unpaid can be considered for payment. Without both documents, an application cannot be processed.

This year's program again includes a provision for rent assistance. Applicants for rent assistance must meet the same income eligibility guidelines as for fuel assistance. Their rent must include the cost of heating the home.

In addition to heating and rent assistance, eligible households may receive a free kit of weatherization materials that can save money on future heating costs.

You can apply for fuel assistance by calling ABCD at 357-6031 or the Neighborhood Service Center (NSC) at 241-8866.

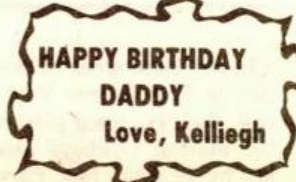

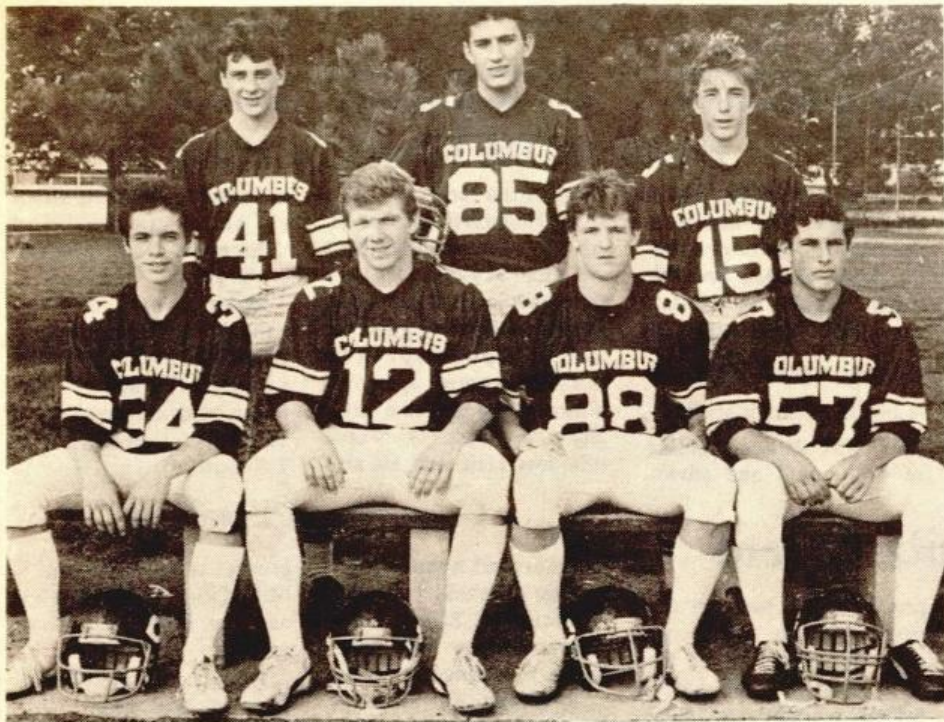

## Construction Of The Chelsea-Water Street Connector Scheduled To Begin In November

Construction on the Chelsea-Water Street Connector and the Little Mystic Channel Crossing should begin soon now that the Massachusetts Department of Public Works has awarded the contract to R. Zoppo Co., Inc. of Avon, MA.

Under the contract, Zoppo will link Chelsea and Water Streets and add a new bridge over the Little Mystic Channel. These two new links will make a continuous street running from the City Square area to the Moran Terminal on the Mystic River. Water and Chelsea Streets will be joined together adjacent to the Navy Yard near the Commandant's house. This new link will be constructed through a corner of the Navy Yard which required the moving of the Navy Yard's granite wall last spring.

The second link will be a new bridge over the Little Mystic Channel connecting existing Chelsea Street and Terminal Street in the industrial area near Moran Terminal. The bridge will be located at an angle beneath the Mystic Bridge.

The project also allows for good access to Gates 4 and 5 of the Navy Yard. These gates will be the entrances for vehicles. Gates 1 and 2 will then be used principally for pedestrians and emergency vehicles.

The new bridge will improve access to the Moran Terminal area, removing the need for trucks to travel on local residential streets. With completion of the project, trucks will have direct access to City Square and the expressway interchange located there.

Two new exit ramps will be constructed to the industrial area at the easterly end of Terminal Street.

The contract also includes all incidentals related to the project such as earthwork, grading, a traffic signal system, street lighting, signing, pavement markings, drainage, utility relocations, paving, curbing, guardrail, sidewalks, retaining walls, barrier rails, fencing, landscaping, and the demolition of one building, the former Jimmy's Lounge.

Plans for the Chelsea-

Water Street connector were done by the firms of Louis Berger and Associates and H.W. Lochner Company who were hired by the Boston Redevelopment Authority and Massport in 1978. The firm of Childs, Bertman, Tseckares and Casendino assisted in the architecture, landscape and urban design parts of the project. This firm as also been very active in the designs of the North Central Artery project which at this time awaits funding approval for the Federal Highway Administration.

Streets expected to be affected by the construction either through temporary blockade or traffic flow are Henley, Wapping, Lowney Way, Chelsea, Vine, Hunter, Decatur, Bunker Hill, Bainbridge, Dupont, Water and Medford.

Construction is expected to begin around the first of November with completion schedule for November 17, 1984. The contract cost of \$4,977,290.00, is almost one million dollars more than estimated in 1978 when actual planning for this project began.
