A tour and briefing of the status of development in the Charlestown Navy Yard is being presented on Tuesday evening, September 11, 1984. This program will be presented

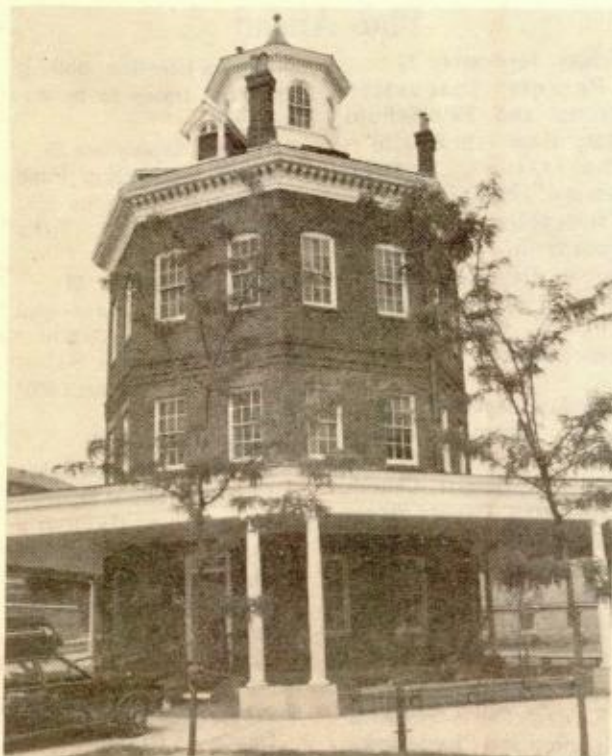

## Voke Supports MDC Sewerage Project

From the office of Representative Richard A. Voke.

Representative Richard A. Voke has given his initial approval to an MDC plan which will help control the dumping of untreated sewage into the Boston Harbor.

The East Boston Pumping Stations Facilities Project is designed to use new facilities on existing MDC sites in East Boston and Chelsea, as well as an upgrading and expansion of the terminal facility in Winthrop, in order to greatly expand the Commission's capacity to handle sewage.

Presently, sewerage is pumped from Boston and parts of the North Shore to the Winthrop Terminal Facility. There, the sewerage is supposed to be screened and pretreated before it is pumped to the Deer Island Treatment Plant. However, on occasion, more sewerage is pumped to the Winthrop

Terminal Facility than it can handle. When this situation occurs, the excess or overflow of raw sewerage is dumped directly into the Boston Harbor, thereby relieving the system of its burden, but polluting the Harbor as well.

The MDC plan provides for the necessary upgradings and expansion needed at the terminal facility to correct the polluting problem. By constructing a new flowline to the Deer Island facility, while increasing the pumping capacity dramatically at the terminal facility, the MDC should be able to ensure that all sewerage is properly treated and that no untreated sewerage enters the harbor.

According to Representative Voke, this plan "attacks the heart of the Boston Harbor Clean-up question. Before the harbor can be cleaned, the sources that pollute it must be dealt with. By ensuring that no untreated sewerage

enters the harbor from the Winthrop Terminal Facility, the MDC is taking the first step in protecting our Boston Harbor."

"This project has many other good points. For example, the project will help alleviate the flooding and back-up problems that a number of recipients in Boston and surrounding communities face as a result of the system's inability to properly handle sewerage. It also provides for the combining of a number of facilities which will lower operational and maintenance costs," commented Voke.

The cost of the entire project will be approximately 22 million dollars, of which, 90 percent is expected to be paid for by state and federal authorities. The remaining 10 percent will be borne by the MDC.

The facilities are presently in the design stage and are expected to be operational by June of 1986.

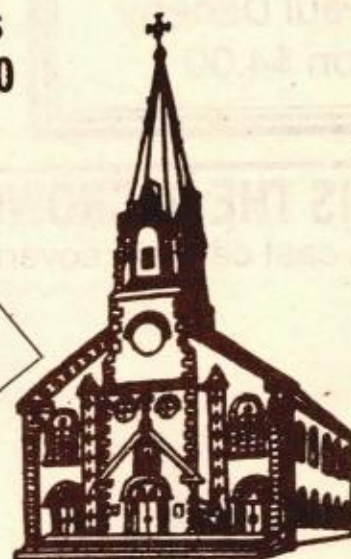

# Pharmacy Offers Increased Service Through New Computer

Medical science proves it takes more than the Mary Poppins remedy of "a spoonful of sugar to make the medicine go down." Modern technology suggests it may take a computer.

Last February, High Pharmacy "went on line" and entered into the world of automation becoming Charlestown's only computerized pharmacy.

Terms such as hardware and software may not be readily associated with the phrase "take as directed" since the talk of computers is foreign and unwelcomed to some. One woman awaiting a refill on her prescription stated, "I have no faith in computers!"

To others, computers are

viewed as the "wave of the future", a new "toy", a practical and invaluable tool for innovative business practices.

High Pharmacy, 85 High Street, maybe computerized, but is not lacking the personalized service which originally made High Pharmacy a "neighborhood" drug store.

High pharmacists Carmen and Stephen Menino, stated the computer uses are "invaluable". Not only does the computer keep accurate records on all clients, but also alerts the pharmacists to possible sensitivities medications may cause a person.

In citing example of the computer's importance, Carmen Menino said the computer will signal if a

medication (which can be as simple as a cough syrup) is high in sugar content and dangerous for a diabetic customer. By alerting Menino, he is able to suggest an alternate medication which would be less likely and cause harm.

In addition to alerting the pharmacist of possible sensitivities, the computer is able to keep a record of family as well as individual medication history. This is "invaluable" in the treatment of some hereditary illnesses.

"We have entered into the day of specialization," stated Carmen Menino. "By means of the computer, I can keep records of all the medications taken by a person. I have had instances where I have had to let one doctor know

about another doctor's prescription which may offset the new medication prescribed."

Stephen Menino stated the computer "is amazing" in the amount of work it is able to accomplish. "Most people think we just sit back here and count pills. That's simply not true. The computer is amazing. It goes the whole nine yards," stated Menino.

Carmen Menino states the computer was "worth the investment" - a \$25,000 investment, at that, which will pay itself off "down the line" in three or four years.

While some may fear the service received at High Pharmacy will change as a result of the computer, both Meninos stated this is not true. "We are still a

neighborhood pharmacy. We strive to give personalized service. No, this is not a cold type of situation," stated Carmen Menino.

The elder Menino stated the computer is a "mechanical aid" which will help serve their customers better and more efficiently "there is no substitute for our professional responsibility."

The computer services the pharmacy in a number of ways according to the pharmacists. In addition to being a "real time saver," the computer keeps a record of all prescriptions, prices, and doctors. All receipts are kept on file for one year which is important for all third party billing such as insurance companies and Medicare or Medicaid. This enables those who lost their receipts to still receive another copy for reimbursement from the third party billing.

Also, the computer is able to record the inven-

tory of the pharmacy cutting down on paper work.

As far as security, the computer is well secured with the necessary pass words to activate the files which are known only to the pharmacists. At night the computer is shut down and a back up storage file is removed from the pharmacy should there be a fire or other unforeseen trouble. By having the back up system, Carmen Menino explained the pharmacy would be able to operate the following day without causing delay to the clients.

As far as customer reaction to the change, Menino stated there are mixed feelings. The older clientele are apprehensive, "it's a big educational process to the older group," stated the pharmacist, "but the younger are enthusiastic."

How do the pharmacists feel about the computer? Stephen Menino stated, "It's great. It's our new toy."

## Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

How do I talk to my kids about drugs?

It's not always easy. The challenge includes finding the time and the place, and understanding we might be worlds apart on the subject of drugs. There are steps that parents can take to help them talk to their kids without embarrassment.

The first step only concerns you as adults. Try to remember your own teenage years. How did you look? What crowd did you hang out with? What was it like that first boy/girlfriend? What did you do on Friday and Saturday nights? What did you think of your parents? Try to remember the risks you took in spite of your parents. It's important to remember. The patterns and fears of adolescence are the same for every generation. Remembering is the bridge to understanding.

The next step is to evaluate your own feelings and attitudes about drug use in your family. Are you against all drug use by your teenagers, or are you inclined to accept moderate use of alcohol or marijuana? What kind of example are you? Are your children coming to you with problems? Do you know your children's friends? Is there praise as well as criticism in your family? Do your children communicate with each other or just with the parents? Are problems worked out openly? Each family has a different dynamic, and it is important to look at this. There is no "right" or "wrong" family.

Step three is education. Know as much about drugs as your kids do. Kids experience drugs, parents need to have much more than extensive "street" knowledge. You should be concerned about your kids getting involved with drugs. In 1979 a survey produced evidence that 64% of all high school seniors had tried drugs sometime. Use is on the rise. So be informed.\*

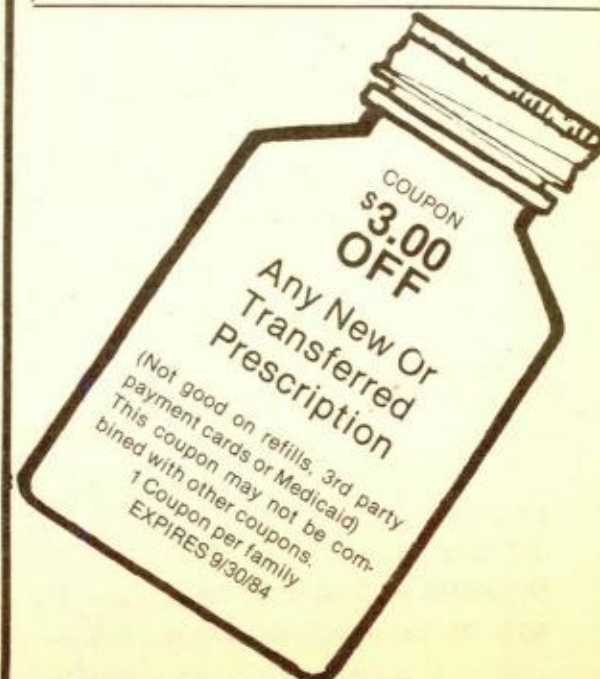

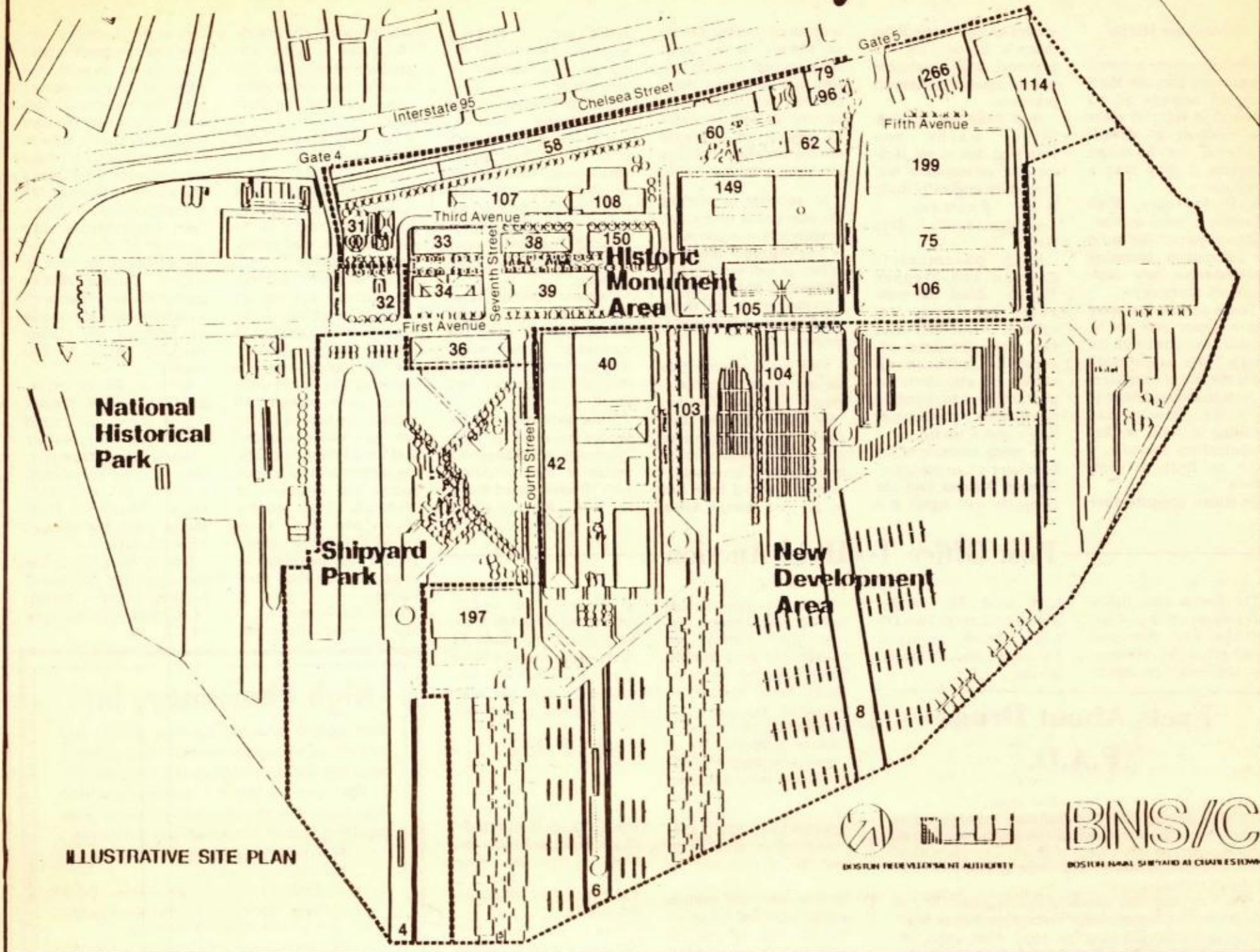

## Overcrowding: A Crisis Situation

The housing crisis in Boston reaches into every neighborhood in this city and seriously affects hundreds of families. A recent report entitled **Family Emergency Awaiting Response**, researched and compiled by the city's Emergency Shelter Commission, focused on Boston's doubled and tripled up family population — families with at least one child living with one or more other families.

During the past six months the Emergency Shelter Commission has received and documented an increasing number of requests from families living in overcrowded conditions who are being evicted from their homes. Left with no alternatives, they are forced to live in the streets or in their cars. Instances of families whose last resort for shelter is to double and triple up with other families is not confined to isolated

neighborhoods. This happens from Charlestown to Dorchester to East Boston to Allston/Brighton.

### Families in Every Neighborhood are Affected

In Dorchester alone there are 249 families reported to be living in doubled and tripled up situations. In Mattapan there are 401 and in South Boston 154. Even in a small community as Charlestown, there are 14 known cases. These numbers are telling. Even though they are high, they represent only the cases that are known to churches and community-based organizations. The number of families living in overcrowded situations that are not known to such support groups goes unreported.

### Families are Left With No Housing Alternatives

Many of the families that participated in this survey cited similar reasons for their living conditions. A majority spoke of the small supply of available low income housing in Boston.

Other causes frequently listed were arson, condominium conversion and unaffordable rents. It is clear that the phenomena of families doubling and tripling up is a direct result of Boston's housing crisis.

Overcrowded living conditions are not without their effects. Without exception, participants in the study reported severe stress and tension to be the primary result. Other related problems include violence in the family, and alcohol and drug abuse. The quality of life for these families is seriously disrupted by the overcrowded living conditions in which they live. The rising tide of frustration causes strain within the home as

families are unable to buy or rent their own house and are forced to double or triple up.

### The Problem Must be Addressed

There is no simple solution to the housing problem. For the victims of overcrowded living conditions, the most serious need besides a safe, decent, affordable home, is adult education and employment training. The study also emphasizes the need for practical skill development, among respondents so they can increase upward job mobility — and therefore their ability to generate a decent income so they can afford to pay rents. Also gleaned

from the study was the need for such programs as English as a Second Language courses, counseling, child care and youth recreation.

This study underscores the lack of adequate, affordable housing and the need for increased community programming in all Boston neighborhoods. Again, the need for a comprehensive housing plan is emphasized. We must work to increase this city's housing stock and protect our most vulnerable citizens. In recent years, many neighborhoods have felt the effects of real estate speculation. For example, neighborhoods bordering the Southwest Corridor construction project have

witnessed property owners leaving buildings vacant, anticipating increases in property value.

### The Time to Act is Now

Many members of the families who participated in the study share a common feeling: despair. After living for years under such stressful conditions, these people have little hope that they can earn a decent living and provide their families with a safe home and good family life. Before conditions for Boston's families are allowed to deteriorate further, the city must provide a responsive plan that will give everyone an opportunity to work towards owning a home of their own.

## Mental Health Given Support In Federal Funds

The Department of Mental Health has awarded \$559,000 for a series of special programs designed to increase services to unemployed persons in the Commonwealth who are mentally handicapped.

The Center House, Inc., of Boston was awarded up to \$68,000 to provide technical assistance in the area of vocational services to the staffs of mental health treatment and rehabilitation programs. Working in collaboration with the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commis-

sion, The Center House will deliver 75-100 individual programs designed to expand awareness of vocational training among mental health professionals.

The Center House has provided vocational services to severely emotionally and mentally disabled adults since 1959, and currently operates programs used by some 350 individuals daily.

The new program will consist of statewide and regional workshops to educate professions about the benefits and the

availability of vocational programs for the mentally disabled, as well as on-site technical assistance to programs that serve the mentally ill. The funds were part of special moneys appropriated by Congress in the 1983 Jobs Bill to support alcohol, drug and mental health programs related to unemployment. Rather than use the federal funds to increase existing services, the Department chose to encourage innovative projects that will benefit mentally ill persons who have been laid off or are

having difficulty entering or re-entering the labor market.

The new programs, all of which are expected to begin in September, also include a drop-in center to be operated by a consumer group, the Mental Patients Liberation Front, and an Immigrant Training Project that will train Indo-Chinese, Hispanic, Portuguese, and other immigrants to help fellow immigrants who have emotional problems use existing services in the community and assist them in finding jobs.

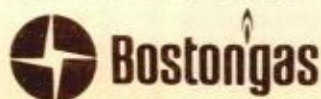

## DAV Scholarships Available To Offspring Of Veterans

Applications for Disabled American Veterans (DAV) scholarships are available and must be completed and returned to DAV National Headquarters by November 15, according to DAV National Adjutant Denzel D. Adams.

The DAV Scholarship Program is designed by assist the children of service-connected disabled veterans whose parents are unable to provide the cost of a college education. A parent must be rated as service-connected by either the VA or military, but does not have to be a DAV member.

DAV scholarships are awarded on the basis of

high school records, test scores, and evidence of need for financial assistance. Selection is by an independent committee. All students who wish to apply for a DAV scholarship must take the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). No other test scores are acceptable.

Students eligible for DAV scholarships are seniors in public, parochial, and independent schools, and freshmen, sophomores, and juniors in good standing at an accredited college, who are taking undergraduate studies leading to a bachelor's degree in any course of study. A DAV scholarship recipient may attend any

accredited college or university in the U.S.

Scholarship range from a minimum of \$200 to a maximum of \$3,000 each. A DAV scholarship recipient who maintains satisfactory progress toward his or her degree, according to the standards of the college, will retain the scholarship throughout the normal period of college attendance, or until requirements for a bachelor's degree are completed.

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## Coleman Repeats Call For Review Committee

The following is a press release submitted by the Coleman Campaign Committee.

State Representative candidate Phil Coleman is repeating his call for a District Legislative Review Committee this week following revelation of Representative Richard Voke's voting record on five specific bills.

Each of the five bills, Coleman reports, date back to a two-year period of late December, 1981, to mid-November, 1983. He said each would have generated substantial interest and public reaction in Charlestown and Chelsea had local residents been aware of the items.

The first of the five, (S. No. 2205, December 21, 1981) would have protected land developers from any changes in local environmental or health codes for up to three full years following receipt of authorized building and construction permits. Rep. Voke voted for the proposal even though the bill would have diminished the protective and "home-rule" powers of local health boards.

Slightly more than one year later, the incumbent opposed two House reform proposals which would

have enhanced the public's right to know about legislative dealings. The first proposal called for open hearings of all legislative committees; the second item called for prohibiting any legislative action on any bill that had yet to be published, an item which supporters claimed would have stopped the practice of voting on items never seen by legislators.

In May of 1983, the incumbent voted against a bill calling for a study of the licensing of doctors and dentists. Part of the proposed law also called for the notification of other States whenever a Massachusetts physician was convicted of a felony relating to moral turpitude. This particular vote preceded a September 27, 1983 roll-call during which the incumbent voted against a zoning bill mandating immediate notification of all interested parties whenever a local board of appeal or zoning commission intended to review and discuss a proposed zoning code variance or change.

Coleman says the legislation would have guaranteed notification of Charlestown and Chelsea

homeowners and tenants who lived near the several on-going construction projects which have required zoning code variances. However, the legislation failed to gain approval in the legislature.

"By reviewing these individual items, we can see that the incumbent has clearly voted on several matters without first seeking local opinions and preferences," notes Coleman. "A District

Legislative Review Committee is the best way to insure that the votes and decisions offered by the representative do in fact reflect the preferences of local residents. I want both communities to be totally aware of everything that is happening up at the State House. We have to stop this practice of letting the constituents know what you are doing only during the eight or nine months of an election campaign."

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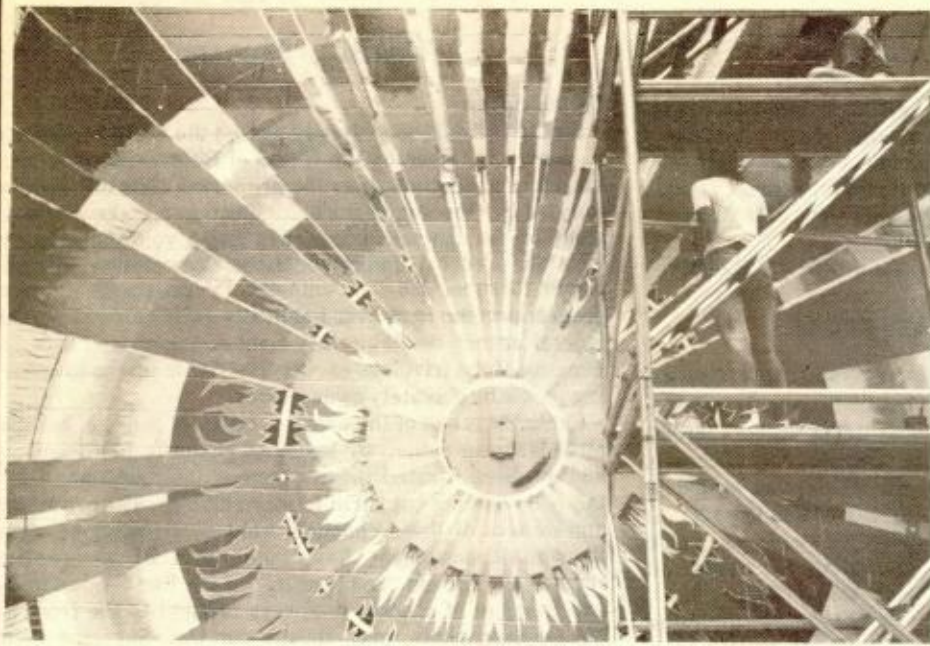

## Parental Stress Line Receives 25% Of Calls From Fathers

Fathers experiencing problems with their children are making increased use of the Parental Stress Line, a 24-hour telephone counseling service for Massachusetts parents. According to Sarah Belcher, Stress Line Director, in the past year one out of every four calls to the Line has been from a father, compared to one out of every ten during the Line's previous four years of operation.

Ms. Belcher speculates that the increase in calls from men may represent a trend that fathers are participating more in child care. "Some recent examples of calls include:

- (1) a father who is concerned because he is disciplining his children by hitting them;
- (2) a remarried father whose daughter doesn't get along with her new stepmother; and
- (3) a father whose two toddlers' behavior is getting on his nerves."

Ms. Belcher reports that, "These are the same types of calls that we get from mothers; the difference now is that we are getting more of them from fathers as well. Male callers, as well as female callers, find it helpful to talk about their concerns, and they appreciate the emotional support which they receive from the Parental Stress Line volunteer counselors.

The Parental Stress Line has received over 50,000 calls in its five years of operations. The toll-free number 1-800-632-8188 is available to parents in Massachusetts 24 hours a day. The program is sponsored by Parents' and Children's Services, a private counseling service in Boston.

Dear Ms. Collins:

I wish to inform you of this department's decision to reverse the direction of Mystic Street in Charlestown as requested in petitions submitted by a majority of its residents. In responding to both these petitions and City Councilor Robert Travaglini's request, a study of the areas was conducted which concluded that: 1) Mystic Street traffic volume is excessive and not compatible with the population density, 2) a redistribution of traffic on both Polk and Mystic Street will provide a better balance of traffic flow.

Based on these findings a decision has been made to:

1) reverse traffic flow on Mystic Street, 2) reverse traffic flow on Polk Street, 3) Monitor the reversals for a thirty day period in order to assess impacts, 4) the reversals are scheduled to begin on September 4, 1984.

Thank you for directing our attention to this matter. Please keep us informed regarding the impacts of the temporary change.

Senate Bill 2191 has already passed the State Senate and is to be acted upon by the House of Representatives upon its return to sessions after the primaries.
